Some people are hooked on drink, others are addicted to drugs. Mike Hardwicke's personal problem is that he is a workaholic.

And Luton Town followers can thank their lucky stars that Hitchin-born Mike is made this way — for he is arguably the man who has done most to keep League football alive at Kenilworth Road in recent times.

What started off as a sparetime hobby has mushroomed into undoubtedly the best fundraising lottery scheme in the Football League.

Mike's million pound-plus annual turnover is the lifeblood of Luton Town and his talents as a promoter have proved to be 'just the ticket' with organisations outside the football club, too.

For the genial 56 year old is now running lotteries for the local council, and for Middlesex County Cricket Club.

In the sixties Mike was a committee member at Hitchin Town FC and he started fundraising for them merely as a hobby.

His flair for raising cash soon showed itself and he was quickly snapped up by the Littlewoods Pools organisa-

tion, who appointed him their area manager for the Home Counties.

Having followed the fortunes of Luton Town for many years, Mike was only too glad to take on the job of Commercial Manager at Kenilworth Road in 1970, when he succeeded Harry Haslam.

Mike's big break came in 1978 when legislation regarding lotteries was altered in Parliament. New regulations meant that tickets could be sold at up to 50p each, and Mike was soon launching a scheme which saw seven successful lotteries begin to bear much fruit.


In his new, refurbished offices in Kenilworth Road, Mike is also in overall charge of the club's tickets and souvenirs operations.

Under his watchful eye the business has souvenir developed nicely, with the club's proud boast being that many of the items on offer are unique Hatters souvenirs and not mass-produced junk

that is available anywhere. This exclusivity is mainly down to Jenny Russell - one of Mike's happy band of 13 workers — who deals with the club's own souvenir manufacturers.

all sorts: from the conventional (badges, track-suits and holdalls) to the unexpected (babies bibs, cuddly teddies and ladies pants).

His department also deals with ticket sales, and Mike was pleased to report that by early August season sales had already reached a club record level.


Mike, who once played in local soccer, must be one of the busiest grandfathers around. His duties mean he is often at the ground for 10 hours a day, all the year round.

His wife Sheila is well used to it by now, and Mike freely admits that he thrives on hard work, although he will usually have to miss part of a home match because of his office duties.

He speaks affectionately of his team of workers and of the happy, family atmosphere at the club.

'I love all the players — they keep me young,' added Mike, who has a happy family of his own. Son Paul is a local juggernaut driver, and daughter Sandra now lives in Australia.

The club have recently had to deal with a lot of orders for souvenirs from Down Under but Mike assures us that it is nothing to do with his relatives.

This afternoon we continue the intriguing series on the history of Luton Town.

BOOKMAN, L. Bookman was one of the first players to gain full international honours whilst with the club. He became a star on Ireland's left-wing before the First World War when he was a Bradford City player. He was transferred to Luton on our return to the Football League in 1920 and, whilst with us, won three caps to take his total to four. He remained with us for two seasons, making 72 appearances in the Third Division (South).

BRENNAN, Bobby. We spotted Bobby playing in his native Belfast and brought him to Kenilworth Road in 1948. He quickly established himself at inside-forward in our first team and gained the first of his five Irish caps as a Luton player. He was transferred to Birmingham in 1949 for £25,000 and moved on to Fulham a year later. League record:



BROWN, Allan. Allan served Luton as 1950-51 16 Blackpool a player and manager. We had signed him from Blackpool in 1957 and he spent four years here, topping our scoring list in 1958-59. He had won all of his 14 Scottish caps before he joined us and he moved on to complete his League playing days with Portsmouth. In 1963 he became player-manager of non-League Wigan Athletic and did so well with them that we invited him back to take over as manager in 1967. We were in the Fourth Division at the time but he reorganised the playing staff and, in 1969, led us back into the Third Division. After leaving Luton, Mr Brown had spells as manager of Torquay, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool (twice). His League record: Apps


### **OUT AND ABOUT**

## A weekly feature which puts the spotlight on the First Division scene.

Bryan Robson seems determined this season to treat Manchester United fans to his vintage England shooting form. He rammed home three goals in his first four outings of the new season.

Last season, Bryan scored six goals in 11 internationals for England yet managed only five in 35 League and Cup games for United. But that's all behind him now and, after failing to score in United's opening fixture against Birmingham, he netted in successive matches against Nottingham Forest, West Bromwich and Everton.

Lucky United drew crowds of 48,673 and 43,186 for their opening two games at Old Trafford. That's just about as many people who have watched Halifax Town over the past two seasons!

Our own Paul Walsh was one of only two First Division hat-tricksters over the first two complete weeks of the season. While Paul was in such scintillating form against Notts County, Bob Latchford was powering in three goals for Swansea in their 4-0 victory over Norwich.

It was Bob's second three-goal hit for the Swans. He claimed a hat-trick on his debut for the club on the opening day of last season against Leeds, a few days after the completion of his £150,000 transfer from Everton.

It's clear from early results that West Bromwich could emerge as the dark horse in this season's Championship race, although they slipped at Watford last week. The Throstles' only previous title success was back in 1920 and, with new manager Ron Wylie only recently settling in, few people expected anything very special from the Albion this season.


But, after losing 2-0 at Liverpool, they bounced back to slam five second-half goals against Brighton and then overcame Manchester United 3-1 after trailing at the interval. Albion then travelled to Stoke to record a fine 3-0 victory.

New striker Peter Eastoe, signed in an exchange deal from Everton shortly before the big kick-off, scored in three successive matches and Ally Brown also weighed in with three goals as the club got away to one of its best starts in years.

### **SCORED TWICE**

Even allowing for Albion's excellent opening, Liverpool will remain the popular favourites to retain the Championship. They are probably the most complete team in Britain at the moment showing in their home game with Nottingham Forest that, even when their defence does have a rare off-day, they have sufficient creative ability to compensate.

After twice being in the lead, Liverpool trailed 3-2 at the interval and were still behind with only eight minutes to play. Then Graeme Souness scored an equaliser with Ian Rush providing the

winner in the last minute. David Hodgson, Liverpool's recent £450,000 signing from Middlesbrough, scored twice in the Forest game to take his tally for his new club up to three.

For all their capabilities, Liverpool are suffering like most clubs at the gate. The Forest game attracted only 27,145. Throughout the whole of last season, Liverpool had only two smaller League attendances than that.

Manchester City received a severe blow when England goalkeeper Joe Corrigan dislocated a shoulder against Watford and faced an absence of four to five weeks. Defender Bobby McDonald went into goal and kept a clean sheet.

After failing to persuade Arsenal to release Irish goalkeeper Pat Jennings on loan, City manager John Bond promoted Alex Williams for the following game at Notts County. Alex made a couple of appearances in City's First Division side two seasons ago and is believed to be only the second coloured goalkeeper to appear in the First Division since the last war.

Derek Richardson played 31 First Division games for QPR in the late 'seventies but Williams is now the only one at top level. His appearance has prompted a question from many fans - now that there are so many coloured footballers in our game, why is there such a dearth of goalkeepers? It's a valid question as agility and suppleness, qualities which are natural to most coloured



players, are two major requirements for goalkeepers.

Brighton, who hope to halt a run of nine successive away defeats here today, recorded up their first win of the season at home to Arsenal. Though England centre-back Steve Foster agreed to come off the transfer list a few hours before the match, he was dropped by manager Mike Bailey in favour of Gary Stevens.

## CELEBRATED


Neither of Arsenal's new £1/2-million strikers, Tony Woodcock or Lee Chapman, could find a way through a much improved Brighton defence and a goal from Gerry Ryan was all Brighton needed to give them their first victory of the season.


Ricky Villa celebrated his first appearance back in the Spurs' side, since the Falklands crisis reached boiling point, with a goal in their astonishing 6-0 victory over Southampton at White Hart Lane. Villa was one of several Spurs' players who put in an appearance at the launching of Tottenham's centenary publication 'And Spurs Go Marching On'. Lovingly compiled by Phil Soar, the book is superbly illustrated and is augmented by a fine statistical section provided by Ray Spiller. It is an outstanding book, well worth its £9.95 cover price and an absolute must for any fan who prides himself on his soccer library.

**Coventry manager Dave Sexton found** himself with both strikers on the injured list after only four games. When Garry Thompson was doubtful for the home game against Coventry, Mr Sexton warned his brother Keith to prepare to make his League debut against Sunderland. And it was during that game that Mark Hateley, the tall England Under-21 striker, broke a toe. He is expected to be out of action for about a month.

With Arsenal slipping into secondfrom-bottom place losing at Brighton, manager Terry Neill still did not seek scapegoats. Asked if he felt the lack of goals from his new strike force was to blame for the Gunners' poor start, Mr Neill said: 'It's not just their problem. The problem is for all of us. We have made a poor start and, when this happens, managers talk about getting back to basics. This is what we must do. Our fans must be very upset at the way things have gone so far. But I'm not going to ask them to be patient. I could appeal to them to wait and see if we can do what we did last season when we recovered to finish fifth. But I won't. Because football is an immediate business. The supporters pay money to be entertained, to watch a successful team. It's up to us to give it to them.'



Having conceded nine goals in their last two away games, Brighton can be excused if they opt for extreme caution this afternoon. But we needn't expect any panic measures from manager Mike Bailey.

The Brighton boss was angry at the attitude of his players after his team crashed 5-0 at West Bromwich and 4-0 at Nottingham Forest within the space of four days. 'I can't make changes because we haven't any other players to put in,' he stormed at the time. 'This makes it all the more important why those who do play have got their attitude right.'

Mr Bailey later persuaded England centre-back Steve Foster to withdraw his transfer request though the signs were that Republic of Ireland international striker Mike Robinson would be pursuing his quest for a new club. Both dropped their bombshell a few days before the new season was due to begin. Going back to last season, Brighton have now lost their last nine away games in succession with a goals record of 4-27. So it's clear that a considerable tightening up operation has to be done in defence if the club is to hold onto the First Division status it won for the first time in its history in 1979.

Mr Bailey could pull five men back in defence as he did at Forest a fortnight ago. Don Shanks and Graham Pearce held the full-back positions with Steve Foster, Gary Stevens and Steve Gatting in the middle.

Shanks, of course, opened his League career with the Hatters. He had been at Fulham as an apprentice but turned professional with us in 1970. After gaining England Youth honours in his first season here, Don made his League debut in 1971-72 and made a total of 90 League appearances before joining QPR in 1975. At Shepherd's Bush he earned a reputation for versatility but, since his move to Brighton in the 1981 close season, he has settled down again at right-back.

The luck of the Cup draw changed Pearce's life last season. He was a member of the Barnet team which powered its way to the third round of the FA Cup and he played so superbly in two games against Brighton that he was signed for £10,000 immediately after that tie was settled.

Foster made his England debut against Northern Ireland last February and quickly earned the respect of Ron Greenwood who took him to Spain with the World Cup squad. Steve won his third cap in the game with Kuwait. He opened his professional career as a none-too-successful striker with Portsmouth but it was after switching to a defensive role that he impressed Brighton who invested £130,000 in his transfer in 1979.

When Foster was under suspension for their opening game at home to Ipswich, Mr Bailey recalled Gary Stevens who completely subdued England striker Paul Mariner and generally played with such composure as to suggest the club would not miss Foster if he did get a transfer. Gary, who was once a young player with Ipswich himself, said after the game: 'It's up to the manager - but I think I should keep Steve out of the team now.'

## **BRIGHTON NEED BIG BOOST IN AWAY FORM**

Gary, who got his League chance in 1979-80 after joining Brighton, did keep his place as Mr Bailey changed tactics to include an extra defender.

When Mr Bailey signed Gatting from Arsenal for £200,000 last season, he explained: 'I had originally planned to use him in midfield. But we had a problem at the back and he has been performing superbly in the middle of the defence.'

Gatting made his League bow for the Gunners in 1978-79 and completed well over 50 First Division games for the London club.


If defensive changes have been made then we could see the return of Northern Ireland international left-back Sammy Nelson who missed early games through injury. Sammy, who has 49 caps, travelled to Spain with the World Cup team though he wasn't called into action. Sammy became an established international before he won a regular place in Arsenal's First Division side and he completed more than 250 League games for the Gunners before his £50,000 move to Brighton last season.

Perry Digweed opened the season in goal though Graham Moseley last season completed 100 First Division games for

Moseley, who has been on the injury list, will be challenging for a recall. Digweed made his League bow as a Fulham player against Bolton in January 1977 and, although he played only a dozen or so League games for the Cottagers, Brighton invested £150,000 in his transfer two seasons ago. Brighton, following his £20,000 transfer from Derby in 1978. He began his career with Blackburn but it wasn't until after he had moved on to Derby that he got his chance in League soccer in 1972-73.

Andy Ritchie and the transfer-listed Mike Robinson opened the season as the two strikers.

Ritchie entered First Division football with Manchester United in 1977-78 and made more than 30 League appearances for the Reds before moving on to Brighton for £600,000 two seasons ago. Last season he was Brighton's





leading scorer with 13 goals.

Robinson has been a fixture in the Republic of Ireland team for the past two seasons and now has eight caps. He began his career with Preston and, after scoring 14 Second Division goals in 1978-79, he was transferred to Manchester City for £750,000. Though he became City's top scorer, the move was not a success and a year later he moved on to Brighton for £500,000. He was Brighton's top marksman with 22 goals in 1980-81 and hit 11 last season.

Brighton also possess another Republic of Ireland striker in Gerry Ryan whose role in early games was often as substitute. Derby signed him from Bohemians for £40,000 in 1977 but collected £85,000 when he moved on to Brighton just over a year later. Gerry has 10 international caps.

Midfield players include newcomer Neil Smillie, Jimmy Case, Tony Grealish, Neil McNab and Gordon Smith. Smillie joined Crystal Palace as a schoolboy and made well over 50 League appearances for the Selhurst club before joining Brighton this summer in a straight exchange for defender Gary Williams.

Case spent eight years as a Liverpool professional. An England Under-23 international, Jimmy made more than 200 first team appearances for the Anfield side and signed for Brighton in the summer of 1981 for £350,000.

Former Hatter Grealish, who now has 27 Republic of Ireland caps, served his apprenticeship with Orient, made his League bow in 1974, and came to Luton for £300,000 five years later. Then he moved on to Brighton in a £100,000 deal in 1981.

McNab is a former Scottish Youth and Under-21 international who left Morton to sign for Tottenham in 1974. Bolton signed him for £250,000 in 1979 and collected a similar fee when he left for Brighton three seasons ago.

Smith has played for Scotland at Under-21 and Under-23 levels. He made well over 150 League appearances for Kilmarnock before signing for Rangers for £65,000 in 1977. Brighton paid £400,000 for him in 1980.

Brighton are now into their fourth season as a First Division club and early indications are that they will again be fighting to keep clear of the relegation zone.

Last season was their best since gaining promotion and they finished in 13th place. It had been hoped to show another improvement this term but the pre-season transfer demands of two key players undoubtedly had an unsettling effect upon the whole squad.

And now they find themselves with a great deal of lost ground to be made up.
