Groundsman Dick Wassell is a man who is fond of the occasional pint. He is also rather fond of Luton Town FC.

So much so, in fact, that Dick has travelled the length and breadth of England to cheer the team on.

Before Wimbledon and Wigan were elected to the Football League, bachelor Dick had watched Luton play on every single one of the 92 League grounds.

At his Luton home he has a massive stack of programmes as souvenirs of his travels — but he has an even bigger stack of memories to call upon.

Getting a job with the club was something of a dream come true for superfan Dick. He joined in August 1969 after working in the building and catering trades.

After seven years as a maintenance man and assistant groundsman, he was appointed chief groundsman in 1976. One of his predecessors, Eddie Hartley, now tends the Stoke City pitch after a spell at Coventry.

Tending to the Kenilworth Road turf has never been a piece of cake, with the pitch tending to wear heavily down the middle.

But drainage problems affecting the central area have now been resolved and Dick once agan had the pitch in superb condition for the start of the current season.

Dick always keeps an eye out to see how other groundsmen are getting on, and confesses that his favourite grounds are Roker Park, Sunderland and Fratton Park, Portsmouth.

He looks after Luton's pitch with the help of up-to-date machinery, and is assisted on matchdays by the club's apprentices.

Dick admits the pressure can really be on when a Saturday match in muddy conditions is followed by a game on the Tuesday night.

He watches each match keenly from beside the players tunnel and doesn't mind a bit if Brian Stein knocks in a goal after skidding over his beloved turf!

Dick is a true Lutonian, having attended school at Stopsley with former Town stars Bruce Rioch and Alan Slough — a duo he lists at the top of his all-time favourite players.

If you see Dick peacefully trimming the grass with a contented look on his face, he will probably be dreaming of the three away trips that have given him most pleasure down the years.

The first, says Dick, was in 'the dark days of 1964', when Luton travelled to Griffin Park to meet Brentford in a Third Division game.

Prior to the match, Luton had gone more than a year without an

away win — but Dick and his mates promptly went barmy with delight as the form-book was turned upside down and Town triumphed by an amazing 6-2 scoreline.

Not many people have memorable moments in Halifax, but it was the Shay ground where Dick's second attack of ecstasy occurred.

The date was 20th April 1968, and Town scraped through by a cliff-hanging 1-0 scoreline to clinch promotion out of the dreaded Fourth Division.

Dick travelled around to dozens of far-flung lack-lustre grounds in the sixties — Barrow, Workington, Hartlepool, etc. — and he reckons his dedication was more than adequately rewarded by the results at Halifax and Brentford.

By the time his third memorable moment occurred, those dark days were well forgotten. It was six years later, almost to the day, when Town travelled to WBA needing only one point to return to the First Division.

Barry Butlin scored after only six minutes and the rest, as they say, is history.

Dick Wassell will be looking for some more memorable moments to drink to this season — for although he is on the Luton Town payroll, nowhere is there a more dedicated supporter than he.

to the Second Division of the Football League in 1897, in place of Burton Wanderers. In those days the bottom three clubs had to apply for re-election. They were Burton Swifts, Burton Wanderers and Lincoln City. Luton were one of seven non-League hopefuls who went into the poll, the result of which was: Lincoln City 21, Burton Swifts 15 and Luton Town 13 elected; Port Vale 11, Burton Wanderers 9, Nelson 7, Glossop NE 5, Fairfield 3, Crewe 2 and Millwall 1 not elected.

We lost our League status three years later but returned to the fold in 1920 when we were part of the Southern League's First Division that was taken over en bloc to form the new Third Division (South).

FINDLAY, Jake. Jake served his apprenticeship with Aston Villa and made his League debut for them in a Second Division game against Sunderland in April 1974. Jake didn't get too many subsequent chances in Villa's senior team, though, so he was delighted to come to Kenilworth Road in a £100,000 deal in 1978. He played his first game for Luton at home to Preston in December 1978 and, apart from injury, he has since been our number one goalkeeper.



FIRST DIVISION. We are currently enjoying our third spell as a First Division club. It was in 1955, when we pipped Rotherham to the second promotion place on goal-average, that we first took our place among the elite and on that occasion we remained for five seasons. Our most successful cam-

paign was 1957-58 when we finished in eighth place. By finishing last in 1959-60 we were forced to return to the lower Division.

We won our way back into Division One in 1974 but we survived for only one season, this in spite of a magnificent late revival that saw us drop only one point in our final four games.



Ipswich won their first ever home
match in the Football League 4-2
against Southend in Division Three
(South) on 27th August 1938, and
their first-ever away match 1-0 at
Walsall a week later.

It was not until 1974-75 that Ipswich reached the last eight of the FA Cup for the first time though they have not been beaten as early as the third round since going down to Manchester United in 1969-70.

Ray Crawford was leading scorer in Division Two in 1960-61 and in Division One in 1961-62.

Colin Viljoen netted a hat-trick for Ipswich against Portsmouth in March 1967.

Ipswich have twice been knocked out of the FA Cup by Peterborough.

Mick Burns (goalkeeper) and Tom Lang (winger) were teammates with Newcastle United in 1927 and with Ipswich Town 19 years later in October 1946.

On 1st March 1980 Kevin Beattie missed a twice taken penalty against Manchester United and Frans Thijssen missed a second penalty. Gary Bailey, son of a former Ipswich goalkeeper, saved all three shots.


PROGRAMME AWARD




they beat us in the FA Cup.



SWANSEA'S LUCKY 13

Swansea City have been making a special contribution to this season's goals bonanza. With the season barely six weeks old, as many as 13 of their players had their names among the Swans' goalscorers.

Max Thompson reckoned he was a lucky 13th when he headed home their opening goal in the 2-0 victory over Tottenham. It was his first game in the First Division this season.

The Swans' goals burst was greatly enhanced by their 17-0 aggregate victory over Sliema Wanderers in the European Cup-winners' Cup when manager John Toshack used the opportunity to field some of his reserve players. Ian Walsh fired a hattrick in the first leg with Darren Gale scoring twice in the return game. Neither had played in their League team this season.

One of the most elated young men in the country this week was Stoke city's outsideright Mark Chamberlain who was included in the England squad for Wednesday's friendly international against West Germany. Less than five months ago he was playing for Port Vale in a Fourth Division match watched by just over 2,000 people.

During the summer he was transferred to neighbouring Stoke for £150,000 and settled down so remarkably quickly in the First Division that, with only eight games behind him, Mark found himself on the threshold of an international career.


Earlier it had been his brother Neville who had expected to reach the top first. Neville made his debut for Port Vale in 1978-79 but it wasn't until the following season that Mark got his chance.

Bob Paisley twice asked Mark to sign for Liverpool during the summer but the player chose Stoke. 'I didn't think I would be good enough to get into the Liverpool side,' he said

With our own Ricky Hill also in the England squad again, Bobby Robson's selection contained no fewer than six coloured players. Luther Blissett and John Barnes, both of Watford, Cyrille Regis (WBA) and Viv Anderson (Nottingham Forest) were the others.

The day may not be too far away when the England team contains more coloured players than whites. This situation would be welcomed by fans who have been demanding a more positive outlook from England teams. It's a fact that the majority of the best coloured footballers are forwards or midfield players.

Viv Anderson is one of the few who play in the back four and it is even rarer to see a coloured goalkeeper. An injury to Manchester City's Joe Corrigan did give Alex Williams a few more games at First Division level to display his skills but he is believed to be only the second coloured goalkeeper to appear in the First Division.

How does a manager set about motivating his players after they have received an eight-goal hammering? Alan Durban faced this task after his Sunderland side had been crushed at Watford.

'It's very difficult,' he admitted. 'I was worried on the day of our next game, at home to Norwich, for several of the players were visibly scared of losing again. Their confidence had left them.

'If Norwich had scored in the first-half I think it could have been disastrous for us. Happily, it was 0-0 at the interval and afterwards we really went to town. A 4-1 victory had the players believing in themselves again.'

Gary Rowell scored two of Sunderland's goals with Ally McCoist and John Cooke netting the others.

Coventry City derived a quick advantage from the exchange deal which sent Tom English to Leicester and took Jim Melrose to Highfield Road. Melrose celebrated his Coventry debut with a hat-trick against Everton and he opened the scoring for the Sky Blues at Manchester City in his next game though, on that occasion, Coventry lost the game 2-3.

When Coventry played at Everton they fielded the Thompson brothers together in the First Division for the first time. Earlier, when Garry had been injured, manager Dave Sexton blooded his brother Keith as

his replacement. When Garry returned to the side, Keith became substitute and was called on in place of Steve Hunt.

Lawrie McMenemy appears to have the world's problems on his shoulders at the moment. Still devastated by Kevin Keegan's walk-out on the eve of this new season, and looking for a replacement for former England striker Mike Channon who left at the end of last season, the Southampton manager found himself without two more first teamers for the home game against Notts County.

Striker Steve Moran and centre-back Mark Wright had been detained by Swedish police following an incident after their disastrous UEFA Cup-tie in Norrkoping. On top of this he is likely to lose yet another England international, Alan Ball, who is expected to join the Hong Kong club, Eastern Athletic, managed by Bobby Moore.

'We've lost far too many people too quickly,' shrugged Mr McMenemy. 'It takes time to sort these things out and, in the meantime, we have suffered one or two heavy defeats.

'But the ship's not sinking. It's rocking a little bit, that's all. I'm not going to leave. I'm going to put the situation right again.'

The Saints' boss received a standing ovation from the home crowd after Southampton had beaten Notts County 1-0. It was just the assurance he needed after such a series of disasters.

Liverpool's defeat at Ipswich ended an unbeaten run of 23 First Division games by the Anfield club and was their first away defeat in the League since they lost at Swansea last February.

When Liverpool's record had gone, the longest unbeaten runs in First Division football belonged to Manchester United and West Ham who had not been beaten in five games. The Hatters came next with four.

Manchester United are poised to top the country's attendance chart for the 11th season in succession. Old Trafford's average crowd is already some 12,000 higher than their closest rivals.

PSWEHTOWN

Bobby Ferguson's first weeks as the Ipswich manager were something of a nightmare. His team failed to win any of its opening six League games and found itself in bottom place in the First Division.

But, true to the Ipswich tradition set by his predecessor Bobby Robson, Mr Ferguson did not allow panic to set in. And, once they had put a spanking 6-0 away victory over Notts County behind them, Ipswich really looked as if they were on the way back to the top.

They then became the first side to defeat Liverpool this season — by 1-0 at Portman Road — after they had only narrowly failed to survive in the UEFA Cup. During their poor run, Ipswich had been beaten 3-0 by Roma in Italy. At Portman Road they made a spirited fight of it to win the second leg 3-1, which wasn't quite good enough.

Ipswich lost two key figures during the summer months. While Bobby Robson moved on to become the England manager, they also lost Dutch international midfield star Arnold Muhren, who moved to Manchester United at the expiry of his contract.

We can expect to see Ipswich lineup in a 4-4-2 formation with internationals Paul Mariner (England) and Alan Brazil (Scotland) forming the strike force.

Mariner, who has on three occasions been Ipswich's top scorer, was hoping to win his 28th cap against West Germany at Wembley this week. He was an ever-present member of the England team during the World Cup in Spain. Paul began his career with Plymouth and, after leading their scorers for the second time in 1975-76, he moved on to Ipswich the following season for £220,000.

Brazil was Ipswich's leading scorer with 28 goals last season and it was after an astonishing five-goal hit against Southampton that he won his recall to the Scotland team. He played in the World Cup in Spain and, if he was in the side for this week's clash with East Germany at Hampden Park, he will have won his tenth

cap. Alan made his League debut for Ipswich in 1978 and scored 13 goals in 1979-80 and 18 the following season.

Mr Ferguson received another setback when both his strikers were injured for the vital game against Liverpol. One of the voids was filled by the recall of Mich D'Avray who scored the only goal of the match. Mich was born in South Africa but he joined Ipswich as an apprentice and worked his way up through the junior sides. He made his League debut in 1979-80 but he has so far been limited to around a couple of dozen outings in the first team.

Eric Gates, who normally plays in midfield these days, moved into the attack for the Liverpool game but Ipswich also had another forward on the substitute's bench — Kevin O'Callaghan.

Gates, who scored 15 goals last season, has been capped twice by England. Eric made his First Division bow in 1974 and later threatened to leave the club when he failed to win a

he has been a fixture in the first team for the best part of the past five years. Though O'Callaghan is unable to break into the Ipswich team, he has

break into the Ipswich team, he has been a regular member of the Republic of Ireland national team for the past two seasons. He started his career with Millwall and, though he played only 20 League games for the Lions, Ipswich appreciated his potential and invested £250,000 in his transfer three seasons ago.

Thijssen is an experienced Dutch international who joined Ipswich from Twente Enschede for £200,000 in 1979. For three seasons he played on the opposite side of the midfield to his Dutch colleague Muhren but last season he was hit by injuries. He was injured again in the Liverpool game and had to leave the field.

Wark played in all Scotland's World Cup games in Spain and was aiming for his 19th cap against East Germany. John started in the Ipswich youth team and has developed into a prolifical goalscorer. He scored 15 in 1979-80, 36 the following season and

added 23 last season.

McCall is a most versatile player. He was normally considered as a forward but he spent the whole of last season at left-back. Steve made his League debut in 1979-80.

The versatile Mick Mills returned to midfield for the Liverpool game. Mick, who skippered the England team in Spain for the World Cup, has played for both club and country in midfield and in both full-back positions. He won 42 caps but it now looks as if England's new manager is looking for younger players. Mick was discarded by Portsmouth as a youth but has now smashed the Ipswich club record for appearances and he's now only some ten games away from his 600th League appearance for the club.

England's two centre-backs Terry Butcher and Russell Osman play in the middle of the defence.

Butcher was one of England's biggest stars in Spain and he was expected to pick up his tenth cap at Wembley this week. Terry has been in the Ipswich side since 1978 and was earlier capped at Under-21 level.

Osman was an instant success when making his debut in 1977 and, after gaining England Under-21 honours, he took his full cap total to seven in the match against Denmark in Copenhagen last month.

George Burley recovered from injury to reclaim the right-back position last season and, when Mills recently switched to midfield, the left-back spot was filled by Irvin Gernon.

Burley has been an Ipswich first-teamer since 1973 and was honoured by Scotland at Under-21 and Under-23 levels before gaining full international honours. He was in the Scotland squad for this week's clash with East Germany and, if he played, he will now have 12 full caps.

Gernon was introduced to First Division football last season when he made four appearances.

Laurie Sivell recently reclaimed the goalkeeping position from Paul Cooper. Sivell, one of the smallest goalkeepers in the game, first appeared in the Ipswich League team in 1969-70. There have been several periods when he has played in the reserves and, during one of those spells in 1978-79, he spent a short loan period with Lincoln City.

Cooper was a striker in his early days with Shrewsbury but he switched to goalkeeping and signed for Birmingham. Paul made 17 League appearances for the Blues before initially signing for Ipswich on loan in 1974. The transfer was quickly completed for £30,000.

Despite their poor start to the season, Ipswich have still suffered only one away defeat in the First Division. That was at Manchester United (1-3). Their other away games ended in draws at Brighton (1-1) and West Ham (1-1) and that remarkable victory over Notts County (6-0).

Ipswich won the FA Cup in 1978 but, though they've finished in the top three places in the First Division five times over the past eight seasons (and been runners-up for the past two), the League Championship has eluded them since Alf Ramsey's team shook the world by lifting the title at the end of the club's debut season in the top flight back in 1962.

But they have recovered in time this season to make yet another challenge for top place.


