# REVIVAL EXPERTS

IT WAS a case of "Smile though your heart is breaking" for both managers at Kenilworth Road as Luton Town and Southampton knocked each other punch-drunk to earn a draw.

They were like boxers incapable of self-defence and prepared to risk permanent damage by concentrating everything on attack.

The day's winners were the freezing spectators who were given another treat of goal-mouth thrills and excitement.

The heartbreak for the Town's fans was that they had to suffer as their team once more gave visitors a two-goal start, then battled back, missed a penalty and finally had to complete a second revival in an astonishing last half-hour.
For Lawrie McMenemy, the heart-

break was in seeing his team score three

goals away from home for the first time this season and still fail to win. He wasn't too happy, either, about the way his side's

two-goal lead was pegged back.
"I got uptight about the way we got ahead again with five minutes left, then lost another equaliser," he said. "But after I simmered down I remembered that Luton had missed a penalty and put a good header just past the post. They gave us a real bombardment in the second half."

The Saints boss revealed that he did everything he could to stop his team think-ing they had won the game by half-time, when they were two up.

### HOLD ON

He wants Luton Town to hold on to First Division status this season, and if he is still fifth from bottom when the final table is compiled he'll be happy enough. The match was full of in-

Southampton, yet the Saints had the good luck to meet the Town on a day when passing and shooting was well below the normal Luton standard.

### BLOCKED

There could well have been three or four more goals at either end, includ-ing a couple before Southampton broke to score the

first. Paul Walsh put David through at an ang and Peter Shilton blocked the shot when a pull-back to the waiting Brian Stein might have made a goal a formality.

In the 26th minute Walsh made another tricky run down the right, leaving Reuben Agboola floundering. His pass went to Stein, who turned Chris Nicholl inside out to give himself clear chance, but shot

Southampton scored straight from the goal kick.

Brian Horton, the hard man in midfield and very much the inspiration for the later fight-back, made a poor header on the half-way line which Dennis Rofe seized on. He fed Danny Wallace on the left wing, and pace took the winger past Kirk

The keeper made a good save with his leg as Steve Moran got through between Goodyear and Stephens Goodyear and Stephens from a pass by Steve Williams, but was beaten again five minutes before half-time. Southampton worked a rehearsed move from a throw-in which put Moran clear on the right wing. Findlay beat out the crossshot, but as bodies flew everywhere to try to cover Keith Cassells kept calm, made space for himself, and drove a shot into the roof of the net, with Horton desperately unlucky not to make a saving header.

### ROCKY

The need to push forward more often in the second half left the Town looking even rockier at the back at times. It seemed as though too many men were playing a notch below their best all at the same time, yet the combined effort and determination was enough to repair the damage. David Armstrong missed

a couple of chances, but as the Town roared into ction after the break it was Moss who unwittingly sparked the revival.

Nicholl blocked a cross by Hill with his hands, but Moss smashed the penalty against the angle of bar and post. Stephens netted from the rebound with a sidefooted volley, only to see his effort ruled out because Moss was adjudged to be offside, standing on the sixyard line as Shilton was

That was cruel luck, but

it served only to increase the Town's attacking energy.

### CLASSIC

Ricky Hill scored a classic with a run at the defence and a left-foot shot across two defenders and beyond Shilton from the inside right position in the 63rd minute, and six minutes later came an equaliser well worth its place in the BBC "Goal of the Month" contest.

It started with Findlay making a save from a far post header by Armstrong. The ball was worked the length of the field to the left wing, via Stephens, Horton, Raddy Antic and Turner to Moss.

The Town had put Antic on in place of Money after Hill's goal to try to boost attacking flair from midfield, but the idea seemed to have misfired in the 84th minute when Cassells made minute when Cassells made another quick break for the Saints. He fell, but still managed to recover in face of a challenge by Turner, passed back to Mick Mills and from his low cross Armstrong flashed a 25-yard shot into the net.

It should have been all over then, but once more the Town hit back, with three minutes to go. Turner started a cross-field move just inside the Southampton half, and Stephens carried down the right wing.

Walsh met his hard low cross with a shot which bounced of Shilton's body and Goodyear toe-poked in the equaliser. And if we moan about poor defence, at least it's some consola-tion to know that dethat de fenders can attack.

THE POINT rescued in the 87th minute by Clive Goodyear's first goal in the First Division turned out to be just enough to prevent the Town from dropping level on points with one of the bottom three teams.
