Technical stuff like shutter speeds, aperture and exposure settings are not the only problems which face a sports photographer.

He also has to watch for those wayward shots on goal and players careering off the pitch.

Taking pictures from besides the goal can be a dangerous game — just ask Luton Town's official photographer Gareth Owen.

Gareth's worst moment in this respect was two years ago when West Ham's hard-man skipper Billy Bonds collided heavily with him.

As you can imagine, a clash with Big Billy is no laughing matter. Just ask the Steins and Walshes of this world!

Gareth is a freelance photographer who spends much of his time working for Luton Town. A large percentage of his work is providing material for match programmes. As well as shots of soccer action, he will be kept busy photographing match sponsors and competition winners.

There is far more to his job than just taking action pictures during the 90 minutes of a match.

His wife Kim is used to seeing him disappear into his home darkroom on a Sunday to develop and print his pictures.

Looking back, Gareth recalls several occasions when he has

returned from midweek matches and gone straight into action in the darkroom — still developing and printing as late as 2 a.m.

Gareth takes a lot of genuine pleasure from working at Kenilworth Road. He is Luton-born, and can remember as a small boy watching the team play.

Working for the club he supported so avidly is something of a dream come true for him.


On leaving school, Gareth entered photography in 1969. He became an industrial photographer at Vauxhall Motors and later joined the world of newspapers and his work has graced the pages of several local newspapers.

He first became involved with the Hatters in 1975, and was a regular contributor to a short-lived club magazine called 'The Hatter'.

This was a newspaper-style production issued in addition to the match programme. It proved popular with some supporters, but was scrapped at the time of the club's financial crisis.

Fortunately, the club pulled through those troubled times, and Gareth has been photgraphing the action and personalities at Kenilworth Road ever since.

These days he works as a freelance photographer, and his work can be seen in a variety of newspapers,

magazines and even on TV.

The club appointed him their first 'official photographer' and an arrangement was made whereby he would have his own photo-call at the ground.

As a result, virtually every Luton Town team photo or player portrait you see in the media will have been taken by Gareth with the club's blessing.

This arrangement is obviously of benefit to the club itself, and to Gareth, and is typical of the business-like approach the club is adopting these days.

During a game, Gareth's task is obviously to get action shots from the area that matters — the goalmouth. And, inevitably, there is a certain amount of pressure on him to capture pictures of the Hatters' goals as they go in. He says the two pictures that have given him most satisfaction are 'goal shots' taken at Kenilworth Road. One involved John Faulkner netting against Fulham some years ago, and the other was a great action shot which showed Brian Stein bagging a goal against Brighton earlier this season.

Gareth, father of seven year old Kerry and four year old Paul, hopes to produce many more photos of this calibre and hopes his stay with the club is a long and happy one.

Escorts: Paul Josling aged 11, also plays for school and Wing Under-12 teams. Also likes swimming and roller skating.


Paul Goodyer, aged 11. He plays for school and Wing Under-12 teams, and is also interested in swimming.







Dear Sir, I was extremely impressed with the club's ambitious ideas for a super space-age type of sports and all-weather indoor stadium to replace the existing Kenilworth Road ground.

I realise that the plans for this super stadium are only at an early stage, especially as it looks as if the proposed allocated site at Lewsey Farm has now been withdrawn, due to the local community being upset at the idea.

However, I feel the only viable and financially successful solution is to move Luton Town FC to the new city of Milton Keynes.

Everything about Milton Keynes is ideal for an ambitious soccer club like Luton with the motorway links, the inner road network, the large catchment area of football supporters and an environment with a modern look ahead attitude.

In this way, the Hatters, although losing their association in some way with Luton and all its historic connections, would regularly attract 15,000 to 20,000 supporters at every home game. And, when they fulfill their vast soccer potential, who knows, crowds of 20,000 to 30,000 could be feasible!

I feel sorry for the local fans who have supported the Hatters through thick and thin and especially those older folks who have attended almost every home game for many, many years.

Parking facilities to and from the 'Bowl' are perfect for soccer. We all would like the Hatters to own their own stadium but realistically, the current support and local attitude could not possibly support a successful and ambitious soccer club.

Dear Sir, As you have asked for supporters' views regarding Luton's future ground, I have decided to write to you. The following are my basic feelings:

- 1. Any new stadium is a major project and could cripple the club financially as Chelsea and others have discovered with just one stand.
- 2. Facilities must be at least up to the

standard of all rival entertainments in order to compete.

- 3. All stands must be covered adequately to keep out all the rain and most of the wind. Preferably, the whole ground should have a large, retractable roof to protect supporters and pitch in winter, and let in the sun and breeze during summer.
- 4. Seats must be wide and comfortable (they are not at most grounds), with clear views of the pitch.
- 5. At least some of the ground to be for standing supporters, or they won't come to the match.
- 6. Any new ground should be away from residential areas there is no need for it to be there, and also close to the M1. Special buses could be run from selected points in the town for home supporters and from the railway station for away fans.
- 7. Any new ground must be near the town. There are too many problems in having Luton Town FC at Milton Keynes or elsewhere.

I have read all the reports in the local newspapers and the letter spots, and was upset by reading one saying that you will have to move out of Luton. Don't worry, I shall continue to support you wherever you go, as many thousands of others will but I shall know in my heart of hearts that it shall never be the same team.

A certain new city seems very anxious to have Luton FC, and I have no doubt they would look after all the publicity and prestige that a successful and good football team brings to the area. Think of Liverpool and Manchester United.

The two cities are no longer the working industrial areas they once were, and if it were not for their football teams, what would they be known for?



PLEAT, David. David Pleat rose from Reserve team coach to team manager within about three years of joining Luton in 1974. He looked after the second team until Christmas 1977 when he was given the first team job. Then, within a matter of weeks, Harry Haslam moved on to Sheffield United and Mr Pleat found himself in the managerial chair.

Under his command, results continually improved and he achieved his first major success when winning the Second Division Championship last season.

As a youngster with Nottingham Forest, Mr Pleat was picked for the England Youth team and celebrated his First Division debut for Forest by scoring a goal. But he didn't get a great deal of encouragement at the City ground and he moved on to Luton in 1964.

He soon won a regular place and he was a member of the Hatters' senior side for most of his three-year spell with us.

In July 1967 he moved on to Shrewsbury where he remained for only one season. He then signed for Exeter City and spent two seasons in the senior side at St James Park. Another transfer took him up to Peterborough where he completed his League playing days in

He then turned his hand to coaching and the chain of events that followed saw him return to his old club at Luton in 1974.

1967-68. That equalled the then record for the Fourth Division. Our 88 points last season was, of course, a new high.

Our lowest points total was 18 from 34 Second Division games in 1899-1900. Our lowest in a 42-game season was 29 in the Second Division in 1962-63. The worst for a 46-game campaign was 33 in Division Three in 1964-65.

RIOCH, Bruce. Bruce came to Luton almost as a last hope after he had been turned down as a youngster by Chelsea, Arsenal and Tottenham. He turned professional with the Hatters in 1963 and made his League debut during 1964-65. He was on two occasions our leading scorer, hitting 24 when we took the Fourth Division Championship in 1968. Such was the progress he had made at Kenilworth Road that Bruce attracted a host of scouts and in 1969 he became the first Third Division player to command a six-figure fee when Aston Villa signed him for £100,000. He played for Villa in the 1970 League Cup Final.

He also won a Third Division Championship medal with Villa before joining Derby for £200,000 in 1974. Just over a year later he collected a League Championship medal and, it was while he was at the Baseball ground that he won the first of his 24 Scottish caps. Everton signed him for £180,000 in 1976 but he returned to Derby in a £150,000 deal a year later. In 1979 he joined Seattle Sounders and a year later he took up an appointment as Torquay's player-coach. He still plays for Torquay and is now their player-manager.





OVENTRY THROUGH THE YEARS

● While still in the Southern League Coven-

try won FA Cup-ties at Preston in 1909-10, and at Sheffield Wednesday in 1910-11, the only instance of a non-League team winning on First Division grounds in successive seasons in the history of the competition.

● In 1919-20 Coventry didn't win any of their first 19 League games and didn't score in the last 11 of these, finally breaking their duck with a 3-2 win over Stoke on Christmas Day 1919.

 Harry Storer was manager of Coventry from 1931 to 1936 while also playing county cricket for Derbyshire.

Defender Roy Kirk scored the winning goal for Coventry in an FA Cup-tie at Northampton in November 1954 with a clearance from 25 yards inside his own half.

Ocoventry's game with Southend in January 1962 was stopped after three minutes because both teams were wearing blue and white shirts. Coventry then changed into red shirts and the game continued.

 Coventry's game against Aston Villa at Villa Park in October 1937 attracted 68,029 fans — a record for a Second Division game.

Reg Matthews, who was capped for England in the fifties while with Coventry, is the only goalkeeper to play for England while playing for a Third Division club.

• Coventry suffered the biggest home defeat in the history of the League Cup when crashing 8-1 to Leicester at Highfield Road on December 1st 1964.

Coventry share with Grimsby the experience of playing in six different divisions of the Football League, having played in both sections of Division Three before the war and having played in all four of the present divisions.







Their last appearance here was on the 8th March 1975 in a Division One match. A crowd of 14,423 saw Coventry win 3-1.


I would like, at this point, to welcome back former Town player and now City manager Dave Sexton. Dave is making one of his rare appearances at the club and we don't see him around this area very often.

I suppose that when speaking of Coventry three names come immediately to mind, George Mason, George Curtis and Clarrie Bourton. Bourton was a goalscorer of the highest quality and, in season 1931-32, was the Third Division's leading scorer with 49 goals. From 1931-1937 he scored a total of 171 goals.

George Mason was the strength of City's defence just before the war. A big strong centre-half, he was always sure of a warm welcome when he came to Luton.

George Curtis made 486 appearances for City between 1956 and 1970 and is still connected with the club today. He is now respon-

sible for the commercial side of the club. George was known in the game for his hard but fair tackling and I am sure he is tackling this job with the same enthusiasm.

ENTERTAINMENT VALUE BETTER THAN EVER

At the half-way stage of yet another season we can look back with more gratitude, and forward with more optimism, than we have for many a year. We have returned to an era where the customer is having to be lured into the grounds and First Division clubs, in particular, have been making a conscious effort to produce quality football — and plenty of goals.

Newly promoted clubs like Watford and Luton Town have contributed a great deal to what has been an outstanding season so far. Watford won their first-ever away game at First Division level by 4-1 at Southampton and later won 4-2 at Arsenal. On their own Vicarage Road ground they crushed Sunderland 8-0!

Having jumped from the Fourth Division to the First within the space of four years, Watford could have been excused if they had made it their objective merely to cling onto their newly-found status. Instead, they carried on where they left off in the lower divisions and one of their rich rewards for a spanking first-half to the campaign came with the introduction of striker Luther Blissett to the England team — the first player in Watford's 91 year history to achieve that distinction.

Manager Graham Taylor can afford to laugh at the people who have been criticising his team's tactics. 'Watford have put the English game back by ten years,' said one jealous manager. If that really was the case then what a good thing it has been!

Watford have proved that any of the 92 Football League clubs, given ambition and shrewd planning, can reach the top.

Liverpool can look back with most satisfaction. The Reds somehow produce an almost geometrical efficiency without in any way impairing the joy of their basically simple game. Every Liverpool player has the ability to flick and chip first time balls with accuracy and the players have been so well drilled as to anticipate just what their colleagues are trying to achieve.

What's more, even Liverpool's biggest stars are prepared to run and sweat for the team effort.

EXCELLENT

In one spell Liverpool recorded nine consecutive League and Cup victories with a goals record of 27-2. How ironical that such a fabulous run should finish at, of all places, struggling Norwich City! Yet the Canaries were full value for their victory,

achieved by a John Deehan goal.

Liverpool still have an excellent chance of winning four trophies. They are through to the quarter-finals of the European Cup and are strongly fancied to beat the Polish champions Widzew Lodz.

The Reds are at home to Notts County or West Ham in the quarter-final of the Milk Cup and seem certain to take another big step towards what could be their third successive victory in this final. So far no club has ever won the League Cup in three successive seasons.

In the third round of the FA Cup Liverpool travel to Second Division Blackburn
Rovers for a Lancashire derby. There will
be no relaxing here for, strangely the FA
Cup is the only trophy that Liverpool have
failed to win during Bob Paisley's period of
office.

Indeed, misfortune has plagued him throughout his career in the FA Cup. As a wing-half Bob played in most of the rounds leading up to the final in 1950 but he was dropped to twelfth man for the Wembley game. There were no substitutes then, of course, so there was no way he would ever savour the glory of Wembley as Liverpool defeated Arsenal 2-0.

Mr Paisley remained bitter about that for many years, never forgiving manager George Kay. After filling so many backroom posts at Anfield, Mr Paisley was later to lead his club in triumph in every competition entered — European Cup, UEFA Cup, League Championship and League Cup — except the FA Cup. When his team reached the final in 1977 they were beaten by Manchester United.

Maybe someone, somewhere, has decreed that Mr Paisley's great career in football is to end without this void being filled?

ARGUES

For some reason any success achieved by Aston Villa has been acknowledged only grudgingly. But Villa, who won the League Championship in 1981 and the European Cup last season, are once again in with a chance of the League title and are through to the quarter-finals of the European Cup again. They meet Italian side Juventus at the next stage.

Manager Tony Barton argues that his team no longer has to prove itself. Results over the past couple of years have earned the club the right to be considered one of England's top three clubs.

Villa approached the holiday programme with one spurt of four successive League victories.

Manchester United haven't won the League Championship since 1967 but they have been mounting a strong challenge this season. Norman Whiteside, their newly found Irish star, and Frank Stapleton both went off the boil for a while but the Old Trafford club was sliding smoothly into top gear as the holiday games approached.

With Bryan Robson in such fine form United have turned on some fine performances. They can play it tight at the back, when needed, and one of their best results was a 0-0 draw with Liverpool at Anfield.

When the opportunity arose to build their goal difference they hammered Norwich City (3-0) and Notts County (4-0) at Old Trafford.

Manager Ron Atkinson is also looking for Cup successes. United have home draws in the next round of both cups, facing West Ham in the FA Cup and Nottingham Forest in the Milk Cup.

Nottingham Forest could prove to be the dark horse in more than one competition. Some adverse early results, and the continuation of Brian Clough's experimenting with his line-up, suggested that Forest were in for another transitional season.

But, by October, Mr CLough found a settled side that strung together some impressive victories. With Ian Wallace and Gary Birtles, now happily resettled with his old club, both scoring with such consistency Forest have been sweeping most opposition aside.


They crushed WBA 7-4 on aggregate in the second round of the Milk Cup and they defeated Watford 7-3 at the City Ground. A more modest 2-0 win over Brentford took Forest into a fifth round tie at Manchester United.


In the FA Cup Forest travel to Derby — the club managed by their former number two Peter Taylor.

One of the most embarrassing events of the early weeks was the long drawn out Justin Fashanu transfer saga. Forest manager Brian Clough issued a series of biting criticisms of his £1 million England Under-21 striker and even got the police to turn him away from the club's training ground when he was under suspension.

Justin, who was reputedly earning £900 per week with Forest, found himself completely ostracised but the serial came to an end when he signed for local rivals Notts County for £100,000 in December.

Because of football's financial plight, there have been precious few big transfers. Terry McDermott, Liverpool's England international midfield player, was one of them. After losing his place in the Liverpool side, he was transferred back to his former club Newcastle for £100,000.





Coventry City

Although Coventry City can look back on a satisfactory first half to the season, their comfortable position has been achieved almost entirely due to fine results achieved on their own Highfield Road ground. The Sky Blues possess one of the worst away records in the First Division.

Their first eight away League games produced only two points from draws at Ipswich (1-1) and Watford (0-0). The Sky Blues lost at Swansea (1-2), Birmingham (0-1), Manchester City (2-3), Tottenham (0-4), Liverpool (0-4) and WBA (0-2). They eventually ended that dismal sequence by winning 3-0 at West Ham on December 11th.

One source of satisfaction for manager Dave Sexton is that he now seems to have found a settled side. Mr Sexton took over as manager at the beginning of last season and he spent most of his first campaign experimenting with various line-ups. He used 24 players in his First Division side.

Mark Hateley and Gary Thompson seemed to have established themselves in the strikers' role with Steve Whitton as the third forward.

Hateley, who lost his place following injury earlier in the season later came back to regain his place from Jim Melrose.

Hateley is the son of the one-time much travelled striker Tony Hateley and he is remarkably similar in build. Mark has developed a dimension to his game that his Dad didn't possess for though he follows Hateley senior's prowess as a good header of the ball, Mark probably has greater skills on the ground. These have already earned him Youth and Under-21 caps for England and last season he was Coventry's leading scorer with 18 goals. This included a hattrick in the 5-5 draw at Southampton.

Thompson has been capped six times at England Under-21 level, scoring twice in three appearances last season when he netted 12 times for Coventry. Gary came through from the youth team to make his First Division bow in 1977-78.

Whitton also developed in the youth team and was first given a run in League soccer in 1979-80. It wasn't until last season that he earned a regular place, though, but then he ended it in style. After scoring twice in an amazing 5-5 draw at Southampton, Steve hit a match winning hat-trick in their next game at Manchester City.

OCCASIONAL

Melrose was signed from Leicester, in exchange for Tommy English, in September. He replaced the injured Hateley and scored a hat-trick against Everton in his second game for Coventry. Jim began his career with Partick Thistle and was capped seven times by the Scottish Under-21s. Leicester signed him for

£250,000 in 1980 and he was their top scorer in his first season.

Gerry Francis has been making only occasional appearances in midfield where Steve Jacobs, Ian Butterworth and Steve Hunt have been playing themselves in

Former England skipper Gerry Francis was signed from QPR for £150,000 last season. Gerry made his team debut for QPR in 1969. He was capped by England on 12 occasions when he was hit by the first of a series of injuries that was to interrupt his career.

He made a full recovery and in 1979 he was transferred to Crystal Palace for £465,000 but, just under two years later, he returned to QPR for £150,000.

It is believed he may be contemplating in going into management soon and he was mentioned in connection with the Brighton vacancy. Jacobs made his League debut against Arsenal in May 1980 and won a regular place last season. Butterworth developed in the junior sides and made his League debut last season.

Hunt began his career with Aston Villa but won only rare outings in their First Division side. When he was released in 1977 he signed for New York Cosmos. It was after joining Coventry in 1978 that he established himself as a First Division player and he returned for another spell with the Cosmos summer.

Paul Dyson and Gary Gillespie are the centre backs with Danny Thomas and Brian Roberts filling the full back positions. Dyson made his League bow against Everton in December 1976 and he has won four England Under-21 caps. Gillespie was signed from Falkirk for £48,000 in 1978 after only one season in Scottish League football and last season he became a fixture in the Scottish Under-21 side.

NUMBER ONE

Thomas is now on the fringe of the England team and was, in fact, in the squad for the game against Luxembourg at Wembley. Danny made his first League appearance in 1979-80, earning a firm place the following season when he was also capped by the England Under-21s.

With the departure of Jim Blyth to Birmingham during the close season, Les Sealey is now once again the number one choice in goal. Les made his first senior appearances in 1976-77 and has now about 130 First Division games behind him.

Mr Sexton had a big scare on the opening day of the season when Sealey was declared unfit — just days after Blyth had signed for the Blues! There was no alternative than to call up 16 year old youth team goalkeeper Perry Suckling who performed with such great distinction that England keeper Peter Shilton, who had kept goal at the other end for Southampton, took time off to give the lad warm praise.

Coventry, coincidentally, faced a similar problem almost exactly three years ago when both Blyth and Sealey were also unfit and another youth team keeper, Steve Murcott, played against Norwich.

The Sky Blues have been in constant membership of the First Division since gaining promotion in 1967. Though they have sometimes been dangerously close to relegation, Coventry have also enjoyed some highly successful seasons and, by finishing sixth in 1969-70, qualified for the UEFA Cup.

Dave Sexton took over as team manager during the summer of 1981 when Gordon Milne was promoted to general manager. But he soon found that he missed day-to-day contact with players so this summer he left the club to become manager of Leicester City.

Mr Sexton spent most of last season rebuilding the team and experimented with as many as 24 players in his First Division side — the great majority of their youngsters developed in the youth team.

A dismal run of 12 winless games put them in serious danger by mid-March but they made a gradual recovery and finished splendidly with 14 goals in their closing five games to take 14th place in the table.

In this season's Milk Cup Coventry defeated Fulham on away goals after their second round tie had ended 2-2, but then lost at home to Burnley (1-2).




