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
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BOOKIES TIP LIVERPOOL

With 32 clubs still left in the FA Cup this afternoon, the competition is technically wide open. Yet bookies, and a great proportion of the footballing public, are looking no further than Liverpool to find the ultimate winners.

The FA Cup is the one trophy which has constantly eluded Bob Paisley, both as a player and a manager. Although he has described this afternoon's home tie with Stoke City as 'just another game we'll be trying to win.' Mr Paisley must privately hope that he can crown his career with the one Cup he has always missed.

There should be little doubt about Liverpool beating Stoke. And yet some people have suggested there is some form of hoodoo over Mr Paisley in this competition. They were well beaten by Second Division Chelsea last season and they had a scare at Blackburn in this season's third

Simon Garner scored first for Rovers but this was swiftly equalised by David Hodgson and their leading scorer Ian Rush grabbed the winner on the stroke of half-time.

At the far end of the bookmakers' list of odds is tiny Torquay United, from the Fourth Division. The Plainmoor club has already equalled a club record by reaching the fourth round for the fourth time, and for the first time since 1971.

Torquay are, of course managed by former Luton favourite Bruce Rioch and he is not without hope of a further victory this afternoon and a firstever appearance in round five.

The Devon side knocked out Colchester (2-0 away), Carshalton (4-1 at home) and Oxford United (2-1 at home after a 1-1 draw) in previous rounds and now face the winner of the replay between Sheffield Wednesday and Southend on their own Plainmoor pitch.

In the FA Cup we're all in with a chance so could it be that tiny Torquay will prove to be the team ultimately to end Liverpool's hopes? No Fourth Division club has so far managed to survive beyond the sixth round.

Manchester United, this afternoon's visitors, are always serious contenders for the FA Cup as a glance at their recent record reveals.

But the club which most dearly wants to win it again is Tottenham, who have the chance of becoming the first club this century to win the trophy in three successive seasons.

The last club to record a hat-trick was Blackburn Rovers in 1886. Spurs have first to beat West Bromwich at White Hart Lane before they can start dreaming of another trip to Wembley and the possibility of creating yet another new record. Blackburn remained unbeaten in 24 FA Cup-ties between December 1883 and December 1886 and no-one has emulated that.

Spurs currently look back on 17 unbeaten games in this competition so they would need at least three replays if they are even to equal that this season.

But West Brom will be no easy side to beat. The FA Cup is their last hope of success this season and they have a tremendous record in Cup football. The Throstles have appeared in three semifinals over the past five seasons and last term they reached the last four in both competitions.

They were beaten by a fluke Q.P.R. goal late in the FA Cup semi-final at Highbury after going out 0-1 on aggregate to Tottenham in the Milk Cup.

Albion see it as something of a lucky omen to have been drawn against Spurs. For, in this season's third round, they extracted revenge by defeating Q.P.R. 3-2. Can they now also avenge that other semi-final defeat of last season by winning at Tottenham?

Lowly Second Division Derby County, who created the shock of the last round by beating Nottingham Forest, have what looks a good home tie against Second Division rivals Chelsea. Last season Chelsea fans ran riot at the Baseball Ground when they went there for a League match but Derby are giving them a warm welcome this

The Rams, managed by former Nottingham Forest number two Peter Taylor, may not find the adrenalin flowing so fast today, though. And Chelsea could be just the side to end their hopes.

Second Division clubs have done well in recent seasons. Sunderland started the trend by winning the trophy in 1973 and Southampton followed three years later. West Ham succeeded in 1981 whilst Q.P.R. reached the final last season.

So maybe Wolves can make it all the way this time? They appear to be the Second Division's brightest hope, even though they are away to European Champions Aston Villa this afternoon. Because of all their troubles of last summer, many people have forgotten that Wolves were Wembley winners of less than three years ago when they beat Nottingham Forest in the League Cup Final.

The Second Division leaders are so full of confidence that the thought of facing Villa in front of their own fans does not overawe them.

Barnsley are another Second Division side who could spring a surprise or two. They are managed by former Leeds and England star Norman Hunter who played at Wembley on numerous occasions in his playing days. He would relish a return as manager and his Tykes will probably progress one stage further this afternoon when they visit Second Division rivals Cambridge United.

Cambridge are through to the fourth round for only the second time in their history and they have never survived beyond this stage.

Leeds were once regular visitors to Wembley but few people expect them to survive this afternoon's visit to Arsenal, the club they defeated in the FA Cup Final of 1972 and the League Cup Final of 1968.

One Arsenal player who has vivid dreams of the twin towers is their new midfield signing, Vladimir Petrovic, the Yugoslav international. 'Every player in the world would wish to play in an FA Cup final,' he said through an interpreter. 'Of course that must be one of my main ambitions.'

Petrovic is to have English lessons to help him communicate with his teammates. But he hasn't been faring to badly so far with his sign-language and his intuitive football brain.

Coventry City could prove one of the dark horses. The Sky Blues recently hit top form and, as they have never appeared in a final of any sort, they could just make it at last. They have what looks like an easy home tie with Norwich City.

Now all the non-League clubs have disappeared, the spotlight will focus upon the new minnows - the Fourth Division survivors. Apart from Torquay, Swindon are the only other club from the League's basement still remaining. They travel to Burnley, who are struggling to escape relegation from Division Two, with the hope that history might repeat itself.

When Swindon recorded their most momentous feat of all, by beating Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup Final at Wembley, they won 2-1 at Burnley on the way. Swindon were in the Third Division in those days, Burnley in the First. Today they are again divided by two divisions.

Ipswich, who won the Cup in 1978, should make further progress at the expense of visiting Grimsby Town this afternoon. And Everton, who can dearly do with some success, should have little difficulty in ousting Shrewsbury Town at Goodison Park.

The fourth round draw threw up the intriguing possibility of a north-east clash between Newcastle and Sunderland this afternoon. Alas for Geordie fans, Sunderland were beaten in a third round replay at Manchester City whilst Newcastle lost at home to Brighton. So Brighton will play Manchester City instead.

Middlesbrough, inspired by Malcolm Allison, might push Notts County aside at Ayresome Park and Watford look set for a home win against Fulham. But Birmingham will probably be hoping for no more than a draw at Crystal Palace and the chance of victory in a replay at St. Andrews.

Games are more readily called off today than once was the case but many of our older fans will readily remember games they attended but of which they saw precious little because of thick fog. It is unlikely, however, that there has been another occasion when so many people have seen so little of a game, as at Stamford Bridge on an October day in 1945.

Though divisional football was not resumed for another season things were gradually getting back towards normal in that 1945-46 season and after six years of austerities huge crowds were flocking to sporting events. There was, therefore, particular interest in the visit of Moscow Dynamo, the first-ever Russian football team to visit this country.

An estimated 85,000 saw their opening match at Stamford Bridge and the 3-3 draw there coupled with a 10-1 win at Cardiff a few years later combined to give their game against Arsenal who were then playing home matches at White Hart Lane the attraction of a big European Cup game today.

The match would have been odd enough without the fog, for Arsenal fielded several guests including Stoke's Stanley Matthews and Blackpool's Stan Mortensen and the Russian Press publicised the fact that Dynamo were taking on an international team. But oddest of all was the fact that the Russian referee Nicolai Latychev ordered the game to go on even though visibility was no more than 10 yards. He then patrolled one touchline while the two British linesmen covered the other between them.

To make things worse for Arsenal, their young goalkeeper Wyn Griffiths, was kicked on the head while trying to save the opening Dynamo goal and played on in a daze until replaced at half-time by QPR's Harry Brown.

Arsenal, however, led 3-2 at half-time and a contemporary report claims that Russian-speaking spectator heard the Soviet manager tell the referee to call the game off before the end unless Dynamo got into the lead. In fact there was no need for this instruction to be put to the test for helped by the referee seeming to ignore the offside law they finally won 4-3.

Strangest of all they appeared to have 12 players on the field for the last 20 minutes since the injured Trofimov stayed on even after substitute Archangelski had come on to replace him.

No-one has ever seen (or rather not seen) anything quite like this game.

TURNSTILE OPERATORS AGE: 18 YEARS AND OVER

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Several games this season at Kenilworth Road have produced high attendances and demands for tickets, including this afternoon's FA Cup-tie. Our stadium has a maximum of 4,000 seats of which 3,000 are taken by season ticket holders. This leaves 1,000 of which the visiting club is entitled to a share.

In the event of a Cup-tie, the entire 1,000 seats are taken by the visiting club as their 25 per cent allocation. For League matches, the visitor usually take 250 which leaves us with 750. Out of those, we have to allocate an amount to visiting players under a Football League ruling and others to our own players and officials.

When they have been allocated, we are left with 550 for sale to the general public which, as you may appreciate, is nowhere near enough.

Games against Manchester United, Liverpool, Spurs or Arsenal are always popular and supporters should apply by post — enclosing a stamped addressed envelope.

This does NOT guarantee them a ticket or tickets and every application is carefully scrutinised but half of the applicants who apply by post are successful in their requests. The other half are offered for sale on Monday morning 12 days before the game and are usually snapped up almost immediately.

We do have irate customers who cannot obtain tickets but, as you will understand, this is beyond our control because of the small amount of tickets we have for sale.

However, we hope this explanation will help you to understand our problems.

I hope that some of our 'known' fans read them and come to watch the game and nothing else. For

their benefit, we have already given money back to Enclosure season ticket holders who have misbehaved. Don't let the next one be you.

THE WEEKLY LOOK AT THE HATTERS COMMERCIAL SCENE

Today, we welcome television once again to Kenilworth Road. Anglia Television, whose crew under the direction of producer Ted Ayling and commentator Gerry Harrison, will record the highlights of today's match for transmission later tonight.

It's a terrific compliment to the club that television has chosen to cover eight of our 12 Saturday home matches. That, in itself, is evidence - if any were needed - of entertainment value the team has provided.

But the arguments rage inside the game as to whether television is beneficial to football with the conflict centering around the decline in attendances being connected with increased TV coverage. Indeed, some clubs feel strongly enough to suggest a complete ban on television cameras.

The powers inside television argue that, if football were to cut itself off, the game would be the losers in the long run. Their argument is based on the fact that no football coverage would mean the time allotted to football being taken up by more TV coverage of minorty interest sports which could lead to a further decline in soccer's attendances.

In addition, football would lose the revenue received from television and clubs would realise a vast drop in their advertising income as television dictates the rates charged for advertising and attracts sponsors who receive prime advertising space around the perimeter of the ground.

With the current television contract expiring this season, there is obviously much hard talking to be done between TV officials and the Football League's television committee before a new format is reached for the next season. It's worth recording the thoughts of our Executive Director John Smith.

'I agree with the suggestion that one live game should be shown on a Thursday or Friday evening, the first half highlights should be shown as a warm up with the second half being shown live.

'Clubs could negotiate a deal with the television companies where they receive loss of compensation through the turnstiles. I am not against live television, but the current coverage is too routine although it has helped to promote the club's image and assisted us,' he said in a recent edition of Sports Final.

'I believe live coverage of only one game a week would help to bring back the crowds.'

MORE WATCHING THE BOX

League football is attracting bigger TV audiences. The could lead to restructuring of the Football League. Broadcasters Audience Research Bureau report an in-

crease of seven per cent on weekend viewing which, so far this season, has consisted entirely of League matches.

'I'm not surprised' says Brian Moore of ITV, whose figures are up a staggering 57 per cent since switching to Saturday night transmission.

Moore, presenter of The Big Match, pays League football a fulsome tribute. 'The game has never been more exciting in any of the 14 seasons I've been involved with the programme,' he said.

'We've been able to show a number of tremendous matches, with plenty of goals, and I can't help but compliment the managers, coaches and, above all, the players.

'I'm not surprised that more people are returning to the game. Everywhere I've been, people have gone out of their way to say how exciting matches have become.'

Moore, a director of Third Division Gillingham, added: 'The message from the pitch is that football is very far from

The increase in viewing figures does not surprise Graham Kelly, secretary of The Football League. 'The reason is simple,' he said. 'The game this season has been better, and more entertaining. Those people who have been staying away from games have missed some magnificent football.

'The trend is very encouraging. The overall increase in TV audiences is probably well in excess of seven per cent when midweek viewing of Milk Cup and international matches is taken into account.

'I agree with Brian Moore. There has been a dramatic change on the pitch. We all have our own theories on the reasons why, but it is obvious that the players are enjoying the game more and more and that enjoyment is communicating itself to the spectators.'

My view is that television and football need each other and, although I feel we are in need of a change, I am inclined to agree with John Smith's views that we could see a weekly live TV game next season.

At this stage it is too early to forsee the financial implications. But with the reduced amount of games featured, any club not receiving TV coverage could experience a drastic cut in its advertising revenue. Also if television were to negotiate loss of compensation for the featured clubs, would this mean a cut in the income to non-featured clubs?

Currently all TV money is shared equally between 92 clubs although the top clubs provide the lion's share of the entertainment. Any sizeable cuts in income to lower division clubs would have a dramatic effect on the game and

If such a thing existed, Alfie Lines would have liked a lie detector for Christmas.

For more people try to pull a fast one on Alfie than anyone else at Luton Town FC.

Alfie is the club's senior car park steward, and, as we all know, parking has never been easy in the Kenilworth Road area on matchdays.

Consequently, motorists will tell Alfie and his men all sorts of stories as they attempt to grab a parking space near the ground.

Some people claim to be Football League assessors, others say they are friends of players and officials and others masquerade as Pressmen.

The club has four car parks none of them for the general public — and it seems people will go to amazing lengths to get in.

But, however plausible the story, Alfie has become experienced enough to be able to spot the con-merchants and send them packing!

'A few tactical enquiries usually solves these problems, 'says Alfie. 'Sometimes threats are made to us, but we have learned to laugh these off.'

'Generally, much appreciation is shown by the majority of car park users, and this more than compensates for the few inevitable trouble-makers,' he said.

Alfie has been a car park steward for 10 years, and he currently works with a team of fellow-helpers whose efforts on matchdays are invaluable.

Ernie Rolt from Harpenden

('my key-man,' says Alfie) takes charge of the Oak Road car park, which is used by players and officials.

Ernie has been a car park man for eight years and shows particular dedication to his job. According to Alfie, he will start work at 9.30 a.m. on matchday and some of the special signs and parking cones used were provided by Ernie.

Pensioner Archie Brown has worked for the club for nine years. He operates the Hazelbury Crescent coach park, which can accommodate up to 30 coaches of visiting fans.

Eight years of service has been put in by Freddie James, whose current task is to supervise the parking area near the railway line for '82 Club members.

Looking after the Maple Road car park is Ron Whittaker, who deals with Century Club members, stewards, Press and TV personnel.

And manning the gate of the Oak Road car park, for VIPs only, is John Kelly.

Alfie was born in Hemel Hempstead and became a Hatters follower about 43 years ago. Before World War II he was a bus driver, and he later spent 26 years as an electrician at Skefco in Luton.

he was 40-years-old, and then spent a short spell refereeing local junior games.

One fond memory he has is the occasion when he refereed a game at Caddington many years ago. Dodging his way in and out

of the cow pats he was able to admire the budding talents of one John Wilkinson - now, of course, Town's secretary.

Of the many Luton games he has seen, Alfie's favourite remains a League encounter with Blackburn Rovers soon after the

MANCHESTER UNITED

Although Manchester United have been continually thwarted in their attempts to win the League Championship in recent years, the Reds have met with considerable success in the FA Cup. They have appeared in three Finals over the past six seasons and, with their League title hopes once again evaporating, they are making a special effort to return to Wembley again this season.

United won the FA Cup for the fourth time in 1977 when they beat Liverpool 2-1 in the Final. They have been beaten in four other Finals, including those of 1976 — when they lost 0-1 to Second Division Southampton — and 1979.

The Reds suffered tragic luck at Wembley in 1979 when they came back from 0-2 against Arsenal to score twice in the last four minutes. But, as they eagerly awaited extra-time, they conceded a goal to Alan Sunderland in the dying seconds to lose 2-3.

If we go back to season 1961-62 we can appreciate just how consistent United have been in




the FA Cup. Over these past 21 seasons, the Reds have won the trophy twice, been runnersup on two other occasions and been beaten in five semi-finals. They have twice gone out in the quarter-finals.

We can expect United to field virtually the same side that took a point from Kenilworth Road when they came here for a First Division match in October. The one exception could be the unfortunate Ashley Grimes who gave United a 13th minute lead that day. It was later equalised by Ricky Hill.

Grimes, who was deputising for the injured Arnold Muhren that afternoon, gets into the United side only occasionally though he is a fully fledged Republic of Ireland international with 12 caps. Ashley was once released by United after a trial in 1973-74. He returned to Bohemians and, when United decided they wanted him in 1977, they had to pay £35,000 for him.

Muhren first delighted English fans when Ipswich signed him from Twente Enschede for



£150,000 in 1978. His displays on the left flank of Ipswich's midfield were truly magnificent and the club was disappointed when he decided to leave last summer. But, at 31, the chance to join United was something he couldn't refuse. Arnold has been capped on numerous occasions by Holland.

Another United regular missing when they came here earlier was England winger Steve Coppell who was also on the injured list. One of England's World Cup stars in Spain, Steve is one of those players who loves to run at defences and to get around his man. He plays a deeper role than he used to but he still scored nine goals last season. United signed him from Tranmere for a mere £30,000 in 1975 and he now has 41 England caps.

England skipper Ray Wilkins was injured shortly after his appearance here and he was replaced as skipper of club and country by colleague Bryan Robson. Remi Moses took over Wilkins' role and performed so well that, even when he was fit again, Butch was unable to regain his place. He naturally hopes to be back in the side today.

Wilkin was back to his glorious best last season, following an injury-enforced lay-off, and was one of England's greatest World Cup successes in Spain. Ray, who was signed for £750,000 from Chelsea in 1979, now has 54 England caps.

Robson is one of the most complete footballers in the game. He now has 26 England caps and enjoyed an excellent World Cup. He scored more goals for England (6) last season than he did for United (5)! But this season he has now been regularly on target for United and, when he hit his eighth goal, he became their leading scorer. Bryan became Britain's costliest player when he joined United from WBA for £1,750,000 in 1981.

Moses, an England Under-21 international, played under manager Ron Atkinson at West Bromwich and was transferred to United for around £500,000 in 1981. He had lost his place following the arrival of Arnold Muhren last sum-

United's two strikers, Frank Stapleton and Norman Whiteside, have met with varying degrees of success this season.

Stapleton joined United from Arsenal for £900,000 during the 1981 close season as replacement for Joe Jordan, and started to repay that fee by leading United's scoring list with 13 goals last season. A consistent goal-

scorer for the Gunners since his debut in 1975, Frank was their leading marksman with 16 in his last season there. A fixture in the Republic of Ireland side, Frank now has 31 caps.

Whiteside had never been heard of until May last year. He was introduced to League soccer as United's substitute in their penultimate match of last season at WBA but then replaced Frank Stapleton against Stoke — marking the occasion with a goal. His subsequent rise was meteoric. He was included in Northern Ireland's World Cup squad and played in all five of their games in Spain. He scored four times in United's first five games this season and recently took his tally to eight. And he is still barely 17-years-old!

Mike Duxbury, Kevin Moran, Gordan Mc-Queen and Arthur Albiston have been filling the back four positions.

Duxbury won the first of his five England Under-21 caps shortly after he was introduced to the United side two seasons ago. He has played both full-back and centre-back. Moran made his League debut at Southampton in April 1979 and by the time he won himself a regular place in his club side in 1980-81 he was already an experienced international player! Kevin now has 13 Republic of Ireland caps.

McQueen has been capped by Scotland on 30 occasions. He began his career wth St Mirren and moved into English football with Leeds in 1972. He enjoyed many triumphs at Elland Road and United had to pay £500,000 to sign him in 1978.

Albiston made his League debut in October 1974 and later won five Scottish Under-21 caps. He won his first full cap against Northern Ireland in last season's British Championship.

Gary Bailey took over in United's goal in 1978, quickly establishing himself. He has been capped nine times by England Under-21s and is also an England 'B' international.


In the third round of the FA Cup United coasted to a fairly comfortable 2-0 win over West Ham at Old Trafford, Steve Coppell and Frank Stapleton scoring their goals.

So far they have eliminated Third Division sides Bournemouth in the Milk Cup (4-2 on aggregate) and Bradford City (4-1 at Old Trafford, following a 0-0 draw). In round four they won 2-0 at home to Southampton, and then thrashed Nottingham Forest 4-0 at home to reach the two-legged semi-final with a tie against Arsenal.




