SCENE ON ONE

BILLY BINGHAM'S CRISIS

The hurly burly of English First Division football has presented former Hatters' winger Billy Bingham with one of the biggest problems of his career. Now manager of the Irish national team, Mr Bingham is wondering where he'll find his next goalkeeper now both his first choices — Arsenal's Pat Jennings and Middlesbrough's Jimmy Platt — have lost their places in their club teams.

Arsenal's situation is, in many respects, a football manager's dream. Boss Terry Neill has two fine international goalkeepers and he doesn't really know which is the better. For some while Jennings and Scottish cap George Wood have been alternating in the Gunners' goal. When one has suffered an injury, then the other has made his comeback.

It's not a very satisfactory position so far as the players are concerned for both are now at the veteran stage and feel they should be enjoying regular first team football. Both have discussed their futures with the manager but, for the moment, they have accepted the situation reluctantly.

'I know George was upset when I got back into the side only because he was injured. Now the boot is on the other foot,' said Jennings last week as he turned out for Arsenal's reserves against Charlton. 'I took a knock so I can't complain about George winning back the position.'

With Platt now playing in Middlesbrough's reserve team, Bingham has been giving serious thought to the problem. Incredibly, it's nearly 10 years since anyone other than Jennings or Platt played in the Irish goal. And it's almost 20 years since a goalkeeper from the Irish League played in the full international team. Bobby Irvine was the last, when he turned out against Spain in Bilbao in May 1963.

For two decades, successive Irish managers have relied upon the Football League to provide them with their goalkeeper and, indeed, most other players. But, with the Platt-Jennings era inevitably approaching its end, there is now only one other experienced Irish-born goalkeeper in the Football League. And Eric McManus, another veteran, lost his place in Bradford City's Third Division side in January!

The dearth of Irish goalkeepers in the Football League is another indication of how the bottom has fallen out of the transfer

market. For years English clubs have milked the Irish League of its best players but now clubs are reverting to more local regions for their talent.

Bingham will probably give Linfield's George Dunlop his chance. He was the third keeper in their World Cup squad last summer. If that proves to be the case then it will be interesting to see if any English club makes a swoop for his services.

Now Liverpool have almost tied up their record-breaking 14th League Championship, and are out of all other competitions, we can probably anticipate an announcement from Anfield as to their next manager. The Liverpool directors have been playing their cards close to their chest and it's quite remarkable that there have been no leaks as to any possible short-list for the job.

Our assumption from this must be that they have not drawn up one and that they have either made a firm decision on the new man, who has been sworn to secrecy at the cost of losing the plum job, or that they appointment will go to their outstanding coach Ron Moran.

There was believed to have been a move to persuade Bob Paisley to stay at the helm for a little longer. But, having been at pains to do the correct things by announcing his impending retirement at the beginning of the season, it would seem unlikely that he will go back on it.

A season which opened like a nightmare is ending on a high note for England 'B' striker Justin Fashanu who has happily settled down at Notts County. Fashanu, whom Nottingham Forest signed from Norwich for £1 million during the 1981 close season, was ostracised by Forest manager Brian Clough during the early weeks of this season.

He loaned the coloured forward to Southampton for a few weeks but, when he returned to the City Ground, he made it clear to the player that there would be no future for him with Forest.

After many wrangles Fashanu eventually agreed to take a massive pay cut and join local rivals Notts County who signed him for a bargain £100,000. 'I suppose I could have stayed out my contract with Forest,' he said. 'But life was becoming unbearable. I was impressed by the honesty of the County directors.'

'They told me there was no way they

could afford to pay me the salary I was drawing from Forest and I liked their straightforwardness.'

After netting his seventh goal for County, Fashanu declared that his move to Meadow Lane was 'the best move of my career.'

Another striker to declare his relief at joining a new club was Scottish international Alan Brazil, who joined Tottenham from Ipswich for £500,000 shortly before this season's deadline. He recently scored in successive games against Arsenal and Forest to show that he has quickly slotted into the scheme of things at White Hart Lane.

Now there is speculation over the future of both Garth Crooks and Steve Archibald. Crooks, top scorer last season with 18 goals, lost his place for a while this season. And Archibald, who enjoyed a magnificent first season after his £800,000 transfer from Aberdeen, has gone off the boil.

Archibald hit 25 goals in 1980-81 but, with Brazil's arrival and the emergence of players like Mark Falco and Gary Brooke, the whole shape of the Spurs' team is shaping. There is a chance that Glenn Hoddle, whose season has been ruined by injuries, might move into Italian football next season.

Any vote to decide the most underrated team of the season would surely poll heavily in favour of Stoke City who, almost unnoticed, have crept into contention for a place in next season's UEFA Cup. Indeed, there was every chance that they might equal a club record by finishing fourth in the table.

Manager Ritchie Barker has produced a fine footballing side at the Victoria Ground. His £150,000 signing of the then unknown Mark Chamberlain last summer has proved one of the shrewdest deals of the campaign and his recent introduction of young striker Ian Painter has proved almost as successful.

The Potters have a nice mix of youth and experience, internationals Dave Watson (England) and George Berry (Wales) — the two central defenders — plus midfielders Sammy McLroy (Northern Ireland) and Mickey Thomas (Wales) coming into the latter category.

Without any real pressures upon them, Stoke now look likely to participate in the UEFA Cup for the third time next season.

BEHIND THE SCENES

Stan Everett is another of the happy band behind the scenes at Luton Town who seem to have been at the club for donkey's years.

In Stan's own words, he has been 'helping out, on and off' for many years, and has been youth team physio for 10 continuous years.

Stan was born in Luton 60 years ago, and has followed the team's fortunes for at least half a century.

He has a full-time job as a senior technician at Luton College of Higher Education, but his part-time work with the Luton youth team really is a labour of love.

He is considerably experienced in the field of sports physiotherapy, for he worked at various levels with the Bedfordshire FA for more than 26 years.

In addition, he spent 27 years attached to the St John Ambulance organisation, and has also attended a number of soft tissue injury courses laid on by the FA.

Working with the St John organisation Stan has carried out first aid treatment at a wide variety of public events and sports.

In addition he is a vice-president of the Chiltern

Youth League, and was a committee member soon after it was formed in the early fifties.

Stan is another example of an injured sportsman who turned to physio work. He recalls that, with a group of friends who had just left school, he was in the process of forming a new team when tragedy struck.

A crippling injury to his left knee meant he had to quit the game, and the injury still occasionally gives him problems all these years later.

Stan works alongside Town's other physios, John Sheridan and Ian Siggers, and his duties are not totally confined to working with the youth team.

He is usually around before a first team game and can be found giving players a massage and generally helping out just before kick-off.

In his time treating sports injuries, he has rarely seen very serious accidents on the field, although he can recall having to deal with a double leg fracture when on duty with the county side.

He had to take Richard Money to hospital after the defender broke his nose in



this season's home game with Notts County, and admits that injuries involving players' heads or breathing are the worst kind to have to cope with.

Stan says treating injuries is a fairly sophisticated business these days, and a physio needs more than just the magic sponge in his little bag.

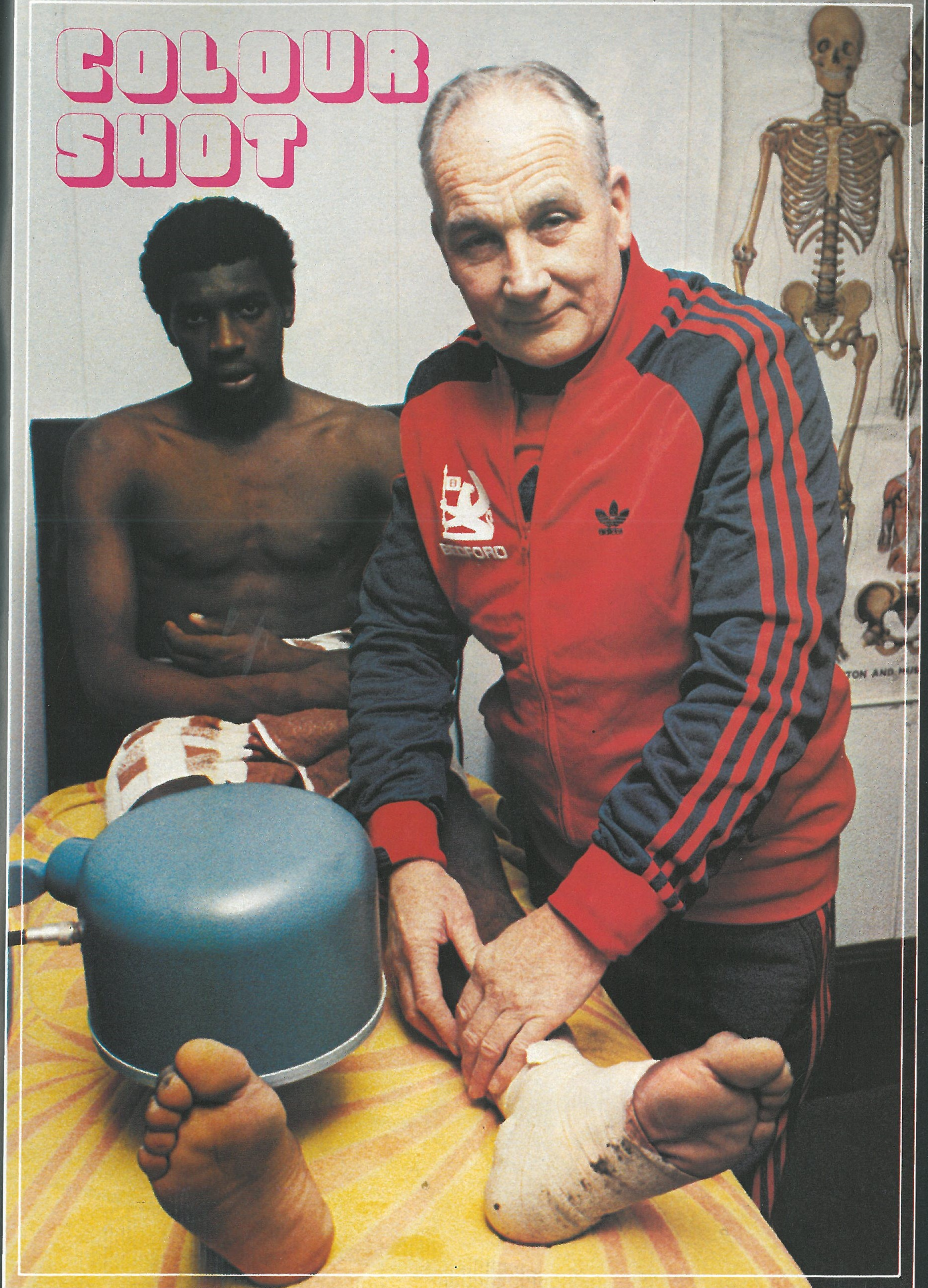
The contents of Stan's bag include sterile dressings, bandages, antiseptics, cotton-wool pads, crepe bandages, aerosol sprays, ice treatments and various other items.

Stan has enjoyed dealing with the youth team, particularly this year during their fine run to the FA Youth Cup semi-finals. Unfortunately the lads bowed out of the Cup in the semi-final second leg at Norwoch, before an amazing crowd of 8,000.

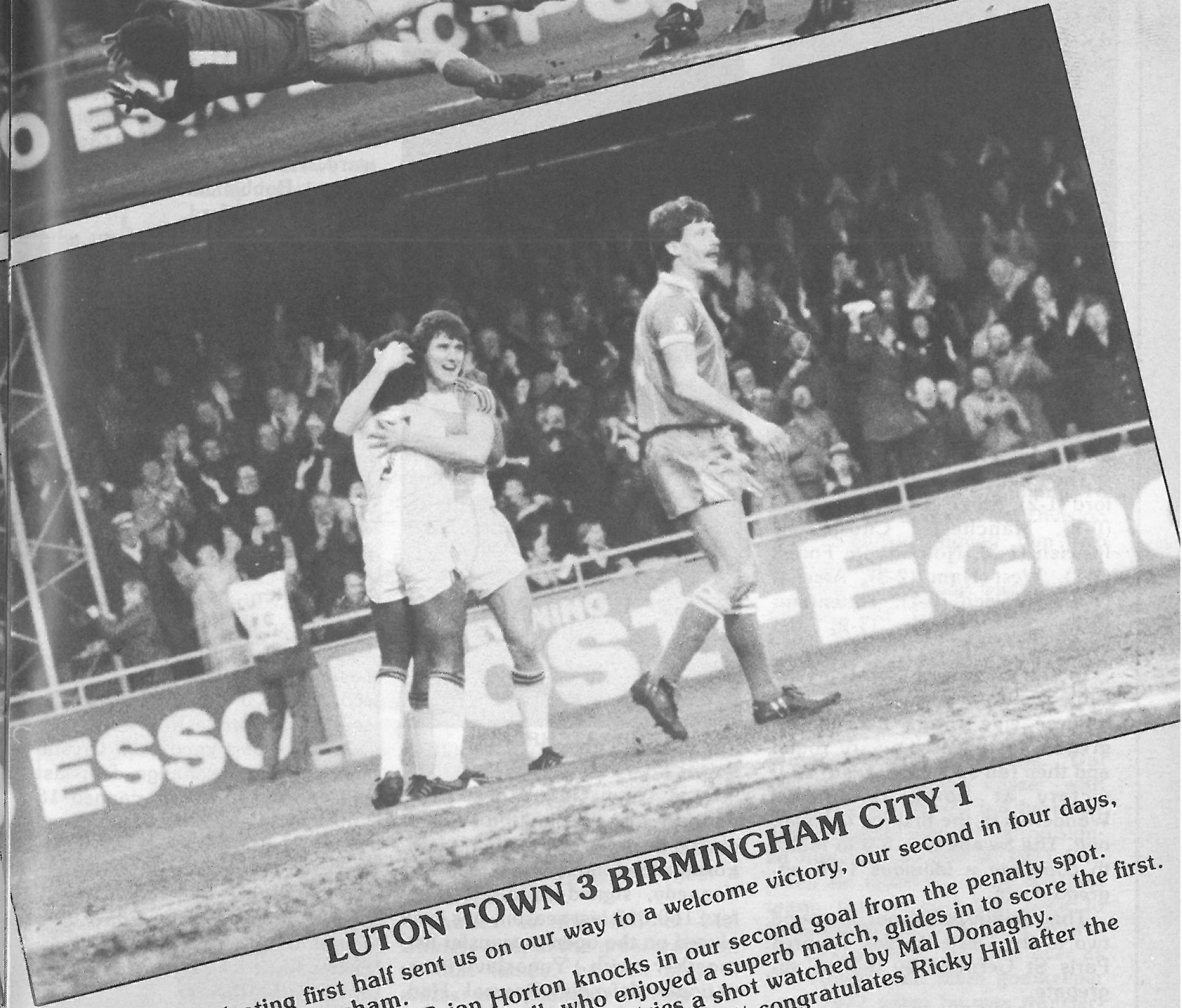
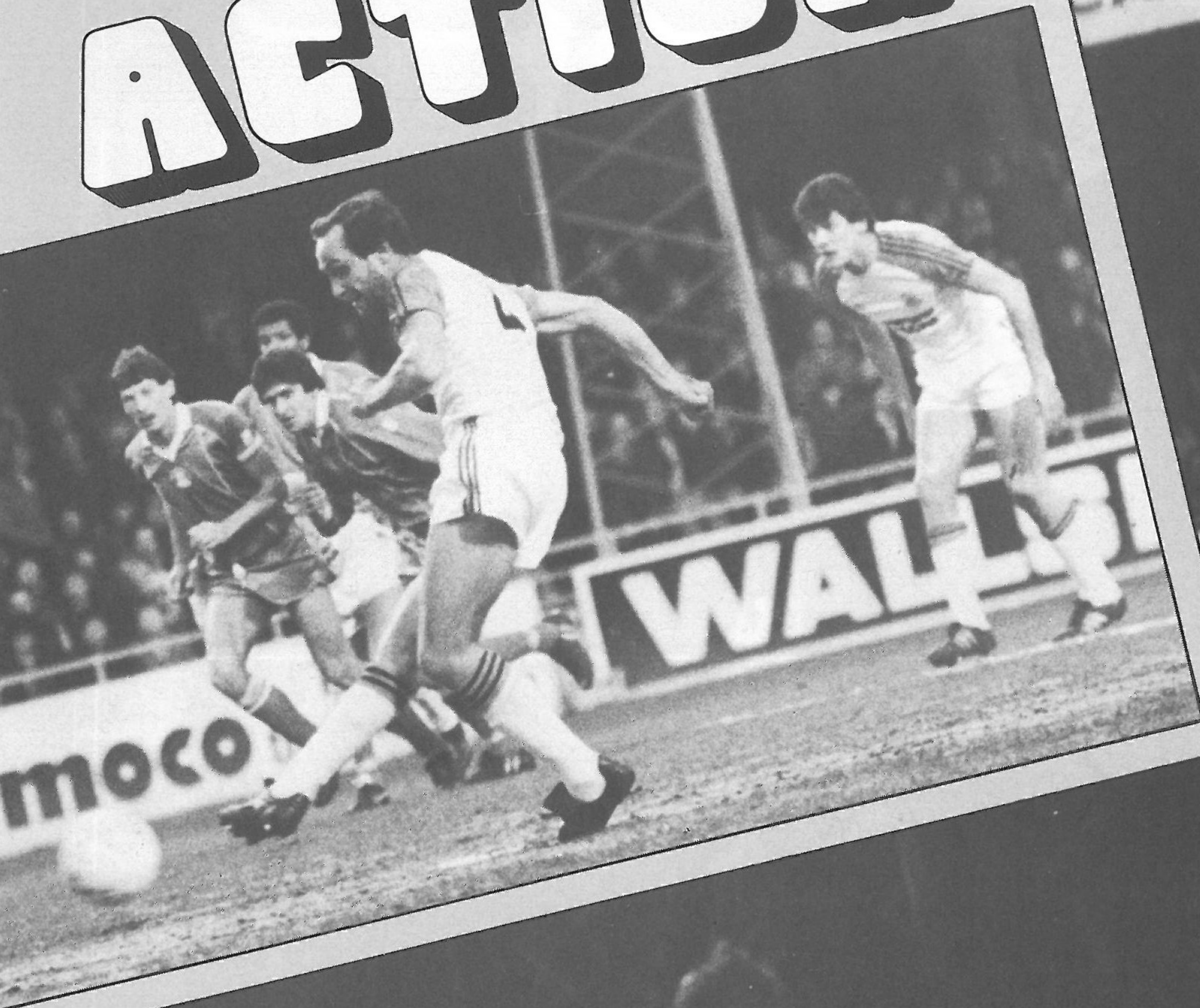
It was a big day for Stan and the young players, and he admits to being a great admirer of coach John Moore who guided the team that far.

SWANSEA

Now the euphoria of last year's debut season in the First Division has faded, Swansea City find themselves fighting in earnest for their survival in the top section. And, with matches running out, the odds against their escaping have been growing longer.

Swansea crowned their first season in First Division football by finishing sixth last term. They also won the Welsh Cup to qualify for the European Cup-Winners' Cup.

This season, though, the Swans have found the going tougher. Since winning 2-0 at Nottingham Forest last May, the Swans have played 20 away League matches without a win. This season they have collected single points at Notts County (0-0), Brighton (1-1), WBA (3-3), Coventry (0-0), Everton (2-2), Sunderland (1-1) and Birmingham (1-1).

They have been beaten at Watford (1-2), Stoke (1-4), Aston Villa (0-2), Manchester City (1-2), Ipswich (1-3), Nottingham Forest (1-2), West Ham (2-3), Arsenal (1-2), Norwich (0-1), Tottenham (0-1), Southampton (1-2) and Liverpool (0-3).

In the European Cup-Winners' Cup Swansea defeated the Portuguese side Braga 3-2 on aggregate in the preliminary round and then ran up a club record 12-0 victory at home to Sliema Wanderers in the first leg of round one. The Swans won 5-0 in Malta to complete a fabulous 17-0 aggregate win.

They finally went out in round two to the Ossie Ardiles' inspired Paris St Germain by 0-3 on aggregate.

In the Milk Cup Swansea ousted Bristol Rovers (3-1 on aggregate), but then lost at home to Third Division Brentford (1-2) after drawing 1-1 at Griffin Park. Their

FA Cup hopes ended in round three when they lost 1-2 at Norwich.

Manager John Toshack has

naturally been making a few changes in his struggling team. Former England midfield man Ray Kennedy, signed from Liverpool for £160,000 last season, has been placed on the open to transfer list, together with Yugoslav international defender Dzemal Hadziabdic and Welsh international goalkeeper Dai Davies is to be freed at the end of the season.

Welsh international winger Leighton James was given a free

transfer several weeks ago and is now playing for Sunderland. Alan Curtis, the Welsh international striker, has been out of the side for some while.

So, whilst battling against relegation, Mr Toshack has also been re-building his team for next season.

Young striker Darren Gale has been tried out in attack but the forward line for recent games has been — Robbie James, Ian Walsh and Bob Latchford.

Gale is a local discovery who was given a brief taste of First Division football on the final day of last season when he was brought on as substitute against Aston Villa. After scoring twice against Sliema Wanderers in the European Cup-Winners' Cup this season, he was later given a run in the attack and scored a couple of useful goals.

James is a Swansea discovery who made his League bow in 1973 and who has now completed well over 350 League appearances for the club. Robbie won his 17th Welsh cap in the match against England at Wembley in February. Last season he was Swansea's top scorer with 14 goals and he has scored seven times this term.

Walsh was signed from Crystal Palace in an exchange deal last season. Ian has been capped 18 times by Wales and also earned Under-21 honours. He scored a hat-trick against Sliema Wanderers.

Latchford is Swansea's top scorer with 23 goals and this includes hat-tricks against Norwich and Bristol Rovers.

Bob began his career with Birmingham and, after twice topping their scoring list, he joined Everton for a then British transfer record of £350,000 in 1974. He

was the Toffees' top scorer in his first five seasons at Goodison, his shooting form earning him 12 England caps. Swansea signed him for £150,000 upon their promotion to Division One in 1981 and he scored 12 goals last season.

Since John Mahoney dropped out through injury, the midfield has included Jimmy Loveridge, Garry Stanley and Ante Rajkovic.

Mahoney, who played for Wales against England in February, now has 61 caps. John opened his League career with Crewe in 1965-66 but really established

himself after joining Stoke for £17,500 in 1967. In 1977 he moved on to Middlesbrough and Swansea signed him for £100,000 during the 1979 close season.

Loveridge made his League debut in 1979-80 but had made only four League appearances prior to this season. In spite of this he won a Welsh Under-21 cap last season.

Stanley opened his League career with Chelsea in 1975 and was transferred to Everton for £300,000 four years later. Swansea signed him for £150,000 in 1981.

Rajkovic is a Yugoslav international who was signed from Sarajevo two seasons ago.

Nigel Stevenson and Dudley Lewis have been playing in the middle of the defence.

Capped four times by Wales, Stevenson made his League debut for Swansea in 1975-76. Lewis came into the side for a brief run two seasons ago. Even though he spent most of last season in the Reserves, Dudley won two Welsh Under-21 caps. Chris Marustik and Gary Richards have been filling the full-back positions.

Marustik made his bow in 1978-79 and played himself into the national team last season. He won his sixth Welsh cap this season before injuries forced him out of his club team for a while. Richards took his League bow at Aston Villa on the closing day of last season but didn't play again in the League until the recent reshuffle in the side.

Jeremy Charles and Neil Robinson are both trying to regain a place in the side.

Charles is the son of Mel Charles and, in the great tradition of that family, he can play in almost any position. Jeremy was top scorer with 26 goals in his first season (1976-77) and so far has been capped by Wales on seven occasions.

Robinson began his professional

career with Everton, making 16 appearances in their First Division side. Swansea signed him two seasons ago.

Since the decision was taken to release Dai Davies, local boy Chris Sander has been playing in goal. He was blooded in League soccer in the final game of last season.

Davies has been capped by Wales on 52 occasions. Dai started his League career with Swansea in 1969-70 but he never held a regular place. Everton signed him for £15,000 in 1971 but, when he failed to make the first team, they loaned him back to Swansea in 1973-74. After returning to Goodison, he took over as the Toffees' first team goalkeeper until 1977 when he was transferred to Wrexham. Swansea paid £45,000 to sign him in 1981.
