
Luton, needing points to guarantee their First Division future, come to The Dell looking for a repeat performance of the one they laid on here on their last visit in December 1977. Both clubs were chasing promotion from the Second Division at the time and the Saints were unbeaten in nine home League games that season.

But a goal 18 minutes from time by Ron Futcher gave Luton full points and their first League win on this ground for a quarter of a century.

Our last home win over Luton was also by a solitary goal in April 1977, Alan Ball scoring very early in the game.

Clashes at Kenilworth Road have produced more goals in recent years and the Saints have usually come out of them pretty well. Indeed, we looked certain to make it three wins in a row when we led 3-2 with only a couple of minutes to play there in November this season.

Goals from Danny Wallace and Keith Cassells had put us well in command by the interval but the Hatters hit back in typical style through Ricky Hill

and Brian Stein to level the scores. But, when David Armstrong edged us in front again with only six minutes to go we seemed to have knocked the stuffing out of the home side.

Yet they still found the effort to strike back again with defender Clive Goodyear hitting the ball home with only a couple of minutes to go.

We won both our previous games at Luton and our visit in April 1978 was a critical one for us. We were third in the Second Division table, pursued hotly by Brighton who were aiming to push us out of the promotion bracket.

There was no score until the 52nd minute when Ted MacDougall put the Saints in front. Ricky Hill equalised eleven minutes later and then there was deadlock. Whilst one point would probably have suited us, two would give us that extra bit of breathing space and the pressure was really on David Peach when we were awarded a penalty two minutes from the end.

With the club's future probably hanging upon his effort, David slotted the ball home to give us full points and put us on top of the table. We then needed two points from two games to be mathematically certain of returning to the First Division.

In October 1976 David Peach converted a penalty early in the game and then scored from open play to put us 2-0 in front at the interval. Though Brian Chambers reduced the arrears for the Hatters, further efforts from Ted MacDougall and Nick Holmes made it 4-1 to the Saints.


400 UP FOR MICK HOLMES

Nick Holmes hopes to make his 400th first-team appearance for the club against Luton this afternoon — just nine years and two months after making his debut against Arsenal at Highbury. It has been an eventful career that has taken him to all the major grounds in England and seen him step out at Wembley on three occasions.

Nick numbers among only three Saints people who have taken that famous walk out into the Empire Stadium with the club three times, sharing the distinction with former defender David Peach and manager Lawrie McMenemy.

And he's now the only player at The Dell who was on the professional staff when Lawrie McMenemy arrived during the summer of 1973 though Malcolm Waldron was attached to the club on schoolboy forms.

So Nick is now the club's elder statesman as he looks back on a highly successful association dating back to his signing as an apprentice in



August 1970. It was in November 1972 that he joined the professional ranks and it was in March 1974 when he stepped out gingerly at Highbury to make his First Division debut.

It was certainly an awesome occasion for the fresh-faced Nick as he was included at centre-back facing the famous John Radford and Ray Kennedy, then Arsenal's twin strikers.

He was surrounded by big stars. Bob Wilson was in the Arsenal goal, Pat Rice and Sammy Nelson the full-backs. Alan Ball and Charlie George were Gunners' players at the time and little Georgie Armstrong was on the wing.

The Saints' team was: Martin, Byrne, Mills, Fisher, HOLMES, Steele, Paine, Channon, Gilchrist, Peach, Stokes.

Arsenal won the match 1-0 thanks to a 16th minute goal from Alan Ball with a half volley from the edge of the box. He later joined the Saints and is one of the players whose attitude Nick has admired during his career.

Nick made only one other appearance that season, when being called on as substitute for the injured Terry Paine at Burnley in the April. A 0-3 defeat almost certainly doomed us to relegation and for the next four seasons Nick played his part in taking Saints out of the Second Division and back to the top flight of League Football. His first goal was at The Dell when Notts County were the visitors and it helped Saints to a 3-2 victory.

One of the highlights of Nick's career was undoubtedly in 1976 with the Saints F.A. Cup run, finishing up at Wembley.

Memories of that great clash with Manchester United will remain indellibly inscribed upon Nicks mind for life. For much of the time it was an epic struggle against all-star United.

Then came that magic moment when Jim Mc-Calliog lobbed the ball over a square United defence and little Bobby Stokes nipped in to place a perfect ball well wide of Alex Stepney's left hand and marginally inside the post for our winner.

Few Saints fans will need reminding of the Saints' team that day but, for the record, it was:

Turner, Rodrigues, Peach, HOLMES, Blyth, Steele, Gilchrist, Channon, Osgood, McCalliog, Stokes.

After that Cup victory Saints' Manager Lawrie McMenemy changed the side into one he felt would win promotion.

Indeed, it was to be two more years before we gained promotion but victory at Wembley earned the club a place in the following season's F.A. Charity Shield game against the League Champions Liverpool at Wembley.

The match was settled in Liverpool's favour by a John Toshack goal shortly after the interval. Over the next couple of years the Saints' team

underwent many changes, one of the constant members being Nick. In fact, in the match when we ensured our promotion — a 1-1 draw at Orient in April 1978 — Nick was one of only two survivors of our Wembley success. David Peach was the other.

The 1979 League Cup run also stands out in Nick's memory, especially the semi-final against Leeds when having been two down halfway through the first leg, goals from Steve Williams and Nick gave them a draw and then victory by 1-0 took Saints and Nick to their third Wembley appearance in three years.

That Wembley appearance had added lustre, for Nick marked the occasion with a goal.

David Peach had given us a half-time lead but the Forest side came out for the second period a vastly different proposition, gradually taking control of the game.

Garry Birtles scored twice and Tony Woodcock made it 3-1 when Nick brought a brief moment of hope back for the Saints when he ran through to score two minutes from time. Sadly, there was not enough time for us to recover.

As well as those Wembley appearances the two away League games that Nick remembers were the 6-2 victory at Wolves and the 6-0 victory at Carlisle while the 5-0 League Cup victory over Derby County at The Dell is one he remembers well. Although he admits that our last home game against Liverpool takes a high place in his memories as it is not often in his career he has been on the winning side against Liverpool and to score twice was a very welcome bonus.

Nicks consistently high level of performance is reflected in his appearance record. In the first four seasons after our return to the First Division, he missed only eight matches.

And now today he marks his 400th first-team game for the club. It is also his 195th in the First Division so he will shortly be hoping to mark yet another milestone.

Nick is Hampshire born and bred and has over the past 12 years, become one of the most respected players on the staff. In that time he has been a great club member, playing in just about every position, and this loyalty and his honesty as a professional was rewarded three years ago when manager Lawrie McMenemy appointed him club captain. He is also president of the Isle of Wight Supporters Club, his wife Carolyn hails from the I.O.W. where he is now president. Nick has taken a well earned testimonial as a reward for his loyalty to Saints over the years.

TODAYAT THE DELL

Although Luton are still fighting for First Division survival, it is very unlikely that they will adopt negative defensive tactics here at The Dell. "We reached the First Division by trying to play entertaining football," explained manager David Pleat. "Our best chance of staying up is to play the way we know best."

It's refreshing to find a manager of courage who puts the good of the game above any short-term club problems and football people throughout the country hope the Hatters can survive as a First Division club.

Injuries have taken a heavy toll on Luton. Leading scorer Brian Stein has spent many weeks on the sidelines and has only recently been considered for a first-team recall. While goalkeeper Jake Findlay is out for the rest of the season.

BRIAN STEIN first played in Luton's League eleven in 1977/78 and for the past two seasons has been top scorer with 19 in 1980/81

and 21 last season. He was leading again with 15 in December when he was laid low. And this wrecked the partnership built up between him and Paul Walsh as an attacking duo. At the time Walsh had scored 12 goals but, after Stein's departure, Walsh didn't score again in four months until last Saturday when he grabbed a hat-trick to celebrate Brian Stein's return to action.

PAUL WALSH is a former England youth cap who was Charlton's top scorer with 13 goals last season. He was valued at £330,000 when Luton signed him last summer.

Because of this dearth of goals, Manager Pleat felt compelled to go into the market for a new striker before this season's deadline. He completed the transfer of TREVOR AYLOTT from Millwall for £55,000 and it wasn't long before the new man started to recoup that fee with some valuable goals.

Trevor began his career with Chelsea, making his League debut

in 1977/78. He made some 30 senior appearances for the Stamford Bridge club before joining Barnsley for £50,000 in 1980. He scored 15 times for Barnsley last season and then joined Millwall during the summer for £150,000. Another fairly recent arrival in the side is centre-back PAUL **ELLIOTT**. Paul made his way into Charlton's first-team only last season but Luton paid an initial sum of £95,000 to sign him in March. When he has played 60 First Division games and won three England caps, Charlton will receive a further £50,000.

Luton signed goalkeeper TONY GODDEN on loan from W.B.A. when Findlay was injured. Tony was a reserve player with Gillingham and it was after moving on to West Bromwich that he made his League debut in 1976/77. He lost his place in the Throstles' first-team a few weeks ago.

Team performances were bound to be affected by the many changes forced upon the side.

The versatile N. Ireland international MAL DONAGHY has been playing in the second central defensive position. He has also played for club and country at leftback and in midfield. Mal joined the Hatters from Larne for £20,000 in 1978 and was ever-present over the past three seasons. He played for N. Ireland in the World Cup finals and now has 20 caps. Kirk Stephens and Richard Money are the usual full-backs.

KIRK STEPHENS was signed from Nuneaton for £5,000 in 1978 and he was drafted into Luton's senior side four seasons ago. He celebrated his 150th League appearance this season and is expected to be their right-back to-

RICHARD MONEY was signed from Liverpool for £100,000 last season. He began his career as a midfield player with Scunthorpe and played for Fulham until joining Liverpool for £350,000 in 1980. DAVID MOSS is Luton's third forward, providing the openings for Paul Walsh and Trevor Aylott. After making more than 250 appearances for Swindon, Moss joined Luton for £90,000 in 1976. He scored 13 times in his first season, 24 in 1979/80 and 16 last

Luton have won four away games in the First Division — at Birmingham (3-2), West Ham (3-2), Brighton (4-2) and Nottingham Forest (1-0). They drew at Tottenham (2-2), Liverpool (3-3), Stoke (4-4), Sunderland (1-1) and Notts. County (1-1). The Hatters were beaten at Aston Villa (1-4), W.B.A. (0-1), Coventry (2-4), Swansea (0-2), Everton (0-5), Norwich (0-1), Ipswich (0-3), Arsenal (1-4) and Watford (2-5).

They reached the fourth round of the Milk Cup after ousting Charlton (3-2 on aggregate) and Blackpool (4-2) at Kenilworth Road. They went out at Tottenham by 0-1.

In the third round of the F.A. Cup the Hatters ran up a fairly easy 3-0 win over Fourth Division Peterborough with Brian Horton (penalty), Ricky Hill and Paul Walsh scoring the goals.

They bowed out to Manchester United (0-2) in the next round at Kenilworth Road.

Luton's best run in the F.A. Cup came in 1958/59 when they reached the final during a previous spell in the First Division. Unfortunately they failed to find their form at Wembley and went down 1-2 to a Nottingham Forest side reduced to 10 men by an injury to Roy Dwight.

This is their third spell of First Division football. They first rose to the top in 1955, remaining for five seasons. When they came up again in 1974, they suffered immediate relegation.

Luton, runaway champions of the Second Division last season, were realistic enough to appreciate that they were not going to win the League Championship just yet. So Mr. Pleat pledged his team to play the sort of rip-roaring attacking football that sent the fans home happy.

The Hatters' first seven League games produced 38 goals - very







SOUTHAMPTON FOOTBALL CLUB

1964~65

Though we eventually finished fourth in the table, we never quite found the consistency to launch a serious promotion drive. We once again pitched our faith in attacking football and our total of 83 League goals was bettered by only one other club — Derby (84) — in the Second Division.

George O'Brien topped our scoring list for the fourth time in five seasons, claiming 32 this time. O'Brien's tally included all four goals in our 4-0 Dell drubbing of Charlton and hat-tricks against Rotherham and Plymouth.

Our 6-1 victory over Rotherham here in the November was notable in that both O'Brien and Martin Chivers hit hat-tricks.

Another Saints' hat-tricker that season was Terry Paine, in the 3-3 draw with Derby at The Dell.

We scored two splendid victories over Charlton. Before beating them here by 4-0 we won 5-2 at The Valley, coasting to a 3-0 lead by the interval.

One new signing during the early weeks of the season was English international midfield player Jimmy Melia from Wolves. Jimmy had won two international caps in his Liverpool days, he was transferred to Wolves in 1964 but left to join us within the year. He later played for Aldershot and Crewe. Then managed Aldershot, Crewe, Southport and now, of course, Brighton.

Another new arrival was goalkeeper Johnny Hollowbread from Spurs, who is now a publican in the area.






