Home draw is enough to keep boss happy...

LUTON TOWN 0, STOKE CITY 0

LOOKING for three points from the two holiday weekend games to ensure First Division survival for another season, Luton manager David Pleat was content in the end with two after Stoke City frustrated his depleted side at Kenilworth Road on Monday.

The second scoreless home game of the season might have gone either way, and if the result was disappointing it soon looked a lot better as other results became known.

The Town may be clear of the drop already, and the value of the performance against Stoke was that it left them poised to make certain in Saturday's final home game of the season.

By that time the players will have had a rest, and Paul Walsh may be able to return to inject the missing sparkle into attack.

Stoke boss Ritchie Barker cheerfully admitted that Walsh's absence following his injury at Southampton had made a big difference to the game.

He claimed that Stoke didn't really operate an offside trap. It just happened because their defence realised they could edge forward behind clearances—"Luton lacked a bit of pace up front... but we wouldn't think of doing that if Walsh had been playing."

I am one of the spectators who accept that with some misgivings, but agree with both managers that the result was about right.

The Town's problems are behind the scenes rather than on the pitch. The strength in reserve is so sparse that with Walsh joining Brian Stein on the

injured list the Town put out a side with only two experienced attackers, Trevor Aylott and David Moss.

They both battled hard, but it was left to Tony Godden to save the point with two tremendous saves in the first half, when Stoke were too good for a disorganised Town side.

The Town played half the game with Moss on the right wing, Aylott in the centre and Raddy Antic floating behind them.

Brian Horton had passed a fitness test on the pitch before kick-off, and played after a pain-killing injection to prevent further enforced changes.

The presence of 18-year-old Ray Daniel as substitute, and 17-year-old Garry Parker the other player in contention for that role, underlined Mr Pleat's point when he said that his team choice had been governed by who was fit and able to play rather than by a considered selection from a full squad.

BETTER

Stoke had much the better of the first half. The 45-minute corner count was 8-0 to the visitors, and but for Godden's outstanding work Stoke would have been at least two up by the interval.

The strength of his game is in his ability to make quick reflex saves, and when the chances arose to prove the point he denied Sammy McIlroy in the 30th minute and pushed a header by Ian Painter onto a post 13 minutes later.

The Town had a let-off when Micky Thomas pro-

duced a cracking volley which whistled wide, while the only first-half danger to Paul Fox at the other end was when he blocked a shot by Moss, who had been put clear by Aylott, and then watched Wayne Turner blast the rebound well wide.

The Town looked a more confident outfit after the break when Moss reverted to the left wing and Turner was moved up into attack.

They were still unbalanced, but the amount of effort put into it almost overcame that problem.

WIDE

Aylott nearly snatched a goal with a solo burst and a shot which curled wide of the far post with Fox beaten and Turner, not too happy as an attacker, sent a fair chance wide after good work by Moss.

Horton had a 20-yarder pushed round the post, but tiredness and tension crept into the last 20 minutes or so.

McIlroy struck a sweet half-volley a fraction too high to remind the Town that any mistakes at the back could be fatal, but on the whole the defence had a good day.

Paul Elliott, patchy in his first few weeks, played with cool authority, particularly in the first half, and Richard Money has come back to form at an important time.

Even so the final whistle came as a relief because Stoke looked the stronger in the latter stages and news that all the other endangered teams had failed to win made the Town's point look a real holiday treat.

...but McMenemy is not amused

SOUTHAMPTON 2,
LUTON TOWN 2

PRE-MATCH comments by the rival managers underlined their differing attitudes to the draw at Southampton.

David Pleat had said in his Luton News column a week ago that a draw would do nicely. Lawrie McMenemy told his fans in his programme notes that unless they saw a home victory a point gained in the previous away match at Stoke would be as good as lost.

Having seen his team flatter to deceive against the Town, McMenemy was in no mood to talk to reporters about the game.

PRESSURE

Perhaps he had every reason to be choked, because Southampton had been ahead once and then seen their England goalkeeper Peter Shilton beaten from about 30 yards by Raddy Antic. And the Saints piled on enormous pressure in the second half against a makeshift re-arranged Luton formation, but could not find a way through.

Mr Pleat, by contrast, shared the Luton fans' delight at a performance which included the right mix of football values—a touch or two of inspiration, a lot of good teamwork, and a dogged determination to overcome the odds when things went against them.

With Brian Horton out injured, Antic played in midfield, with Wayne Turner holding his place in that department and for a long time it was an even contest between two sides prepared to attack.

The first half was full of sparkling entertainment, with both sets of forwards looking good, and two defences holding out well until they were faced by set pieces.

The Town's first real attack brought a goal in the sixth minute. Antic swung a long ball forward to the right wing and Paul Walsh raced clear and pulled a perfect pass back into the path of David Moss. His shot was goalbound until it hit Chris Nicholl and went for a corner.

Moss curled in the kick towards the near post, and Paul Elliott claimed his first goal in Division One with a neat deflection, with Southampton saying that sweeper Reuben Agboola got the final touch to make it an own goal.

SET PIECES

The Saints fought back well and put pressure on a Town defence that rarely looked in trouble until two more set pieces caused their downfall. From the first, a hard low free kick, Mark Wright poked in the equaliser, and nine minutes later a corner was not properly cleared and David Armstrong headed a 28th-minute goal to give his side the lead.

The Saints had three minutes to enjoy that before Antic took a free kick from 30 yards and rattled in a shot that beat Shilton off a post, with the ball never more than a foot or so off the ground.

Shilton was beaten again five minutes later when Moss hit a post

from 25 yards, but the England goalkeeper did well to regain his balance and save when Trevor Aylott was first to the rebound.

The pattern changed after the interval. Walsh limped off in the 50th minute with a thigh strain and the Town took a long time to settle down into a new formation.

Clive Goodyear went on at left-back, Richard Money went into midfield, and Antic moved up into attack.

Southampton did most of the attacking after that, but although there were some alarms, the Town defence, with Mal Donaghy outstanding, showed the determination and spirit which could keep any side safe.

Tony Godden made three important saves, and was let off once when a header by Dave Puckett looped over him and bounced back off the crossbar, while Shilton had to be alert at the other end to beat out a far-post header from Aylott after a perfect deep cross by Moss.
