# WE RED YOU! LUTON PLEA TO STAR TRIO

BRIAN HORTON is to be offered a new contract which Luton manager David Pleat hopes will keep the skipper at Kenilworth Road for at least another season, writes Eric Harris.

When Horton signed from Brighton two years ago, he

"He is a model professional and has been less trouble to me than anyone else since he arrived here from Spain," Pleat said. "He deserves another club over here."

# Pleat salutes Hatters heroes

AMID all the euphoria in the Luton dressing room after the vital victory at Maine Road on Saturday, manager David Pleat stood back with water in his eyes.

A traumatic climax to the season had been successfully negotiated with a slender 1-0 victory over Manchester City which ensured the Hatters' survival in the First Division for another nine months.

Choking back the tears, the Luton boss shared the feeling of delight with his players who had to wait an agonising 85 minutes before Raddy Antic scored a hero's goal to send City into the Second Division for the first time in 17 years.

But Luton supporters did not know of the other half of the torment Pleat had been through in the build-up to a match which was the most important since the side were last involved in the First Division relegation battle eight years

ago.
The manager's father-inlaw died early on Friday
morning only hours before the team left for
their hotel hideout in
Staffordshire to escape
from eager journalists
anxious to question his
players on their survival
chances.

But the ecstasy of watching Antic scoring that

priceless goal was something Pleat couldn't hide.

"This has been the worst week in our lives," he said. "After losing to Manchester United on Monday, it has been difficult to come to terms with everything.

'The Old Trafford defeat, and the results of the previous weekend, made it difficult for me to compose myself. How could I expect the players to be composed?

"I have felt for the players' families because I know what they have been through and I am more proud today than when we won promotion last season.

'I'm sorry for our fans who have had to share a terrible week with us but I want them to know how proud I and the players were of them. We have never had away support as great as that.

'We have received hundreds of letters and telegrams from people who didn't want to see us go down. I'm pleased we have repaid their faith in us by winning.

'But, more than anything, I'm proud of my players. It hasn't been easy — but it's a most satisfactory climax to the season."
