Furious City 14 5.83 wildmen attack **Luton team and** supporters in vicious relegation revenge

disgruntled Manchester City fans fought running battles with police and Luton supporters after seeing their team dumped into the Second Div-

At least three Luton fans and four from Manchester were treated in hospital for cuts and bruises after a series of vicious confrontations.

In one astonishing incident a small group of Luton fans was set upon outside the ground by rival fans armed with sticks and

City fans piled out of their coach when it stopped at a junction to join in the attack. Residents from nearby homes were also involved. Twenty police eventually arrived to stop the fight.

The violence started on the pitch and Manchester City now face a Football League Inquiry after their supporters physically at-tacked Luton players at the end of Saturday's relegation struggle.

City fans erupted in fury when Raddy Antic's priceless goal five minutes from the end had dashed their hopes of a real nivision place. They swe to not be pitch and attacked the Luton team as the final whistle went and police

horses were required to drive them off.


Ricky Hill, Luton's midfield international star, said he was kicked and punched: "It was very nasty. I felt some blows and kept on running till I reached the dressing room."

Evening Post-Echo photo-grapher Tony Ward, who witnessed the scenes of fury on the pitch, said: "It really was quite frightening for a while."

In the battle outside the ground, a police horse was badly cut in the face by a brick thrown by a City fan and rampaging fans overturned one police van and smashed the windows in two others. The horse was recovering today.

Ten people were arrested and 45 ejected from the ground during the tense relegation battle.

Inspector Bob Barton of Manchester police said the trouble was caused by "about 1,000 disillusioned City supporters." Only ten arrests were made outside the ground and none of those who attacked Luton players were caught "It was players were caught. "It was difficult to pin-point cul-

He added: "The Luton fans were very well-be-haved and gave us no cause for concern at all."

City fans staged a two-hour demonstration outside the stadium demanding the immediate resignation City chairman Peter Swales.

Meanwhile Luton fans faced another worry: re-newed rumours that the Hatters might move their ground to Milton Keynes.

The Evening Post-Echo conducted an on-the-spot straw poll of fans on the terrace at Maine Road,

asking whether they would support the team if it moved to the new city.

Out of 100 people asked, only 18 said they would defi-nitely continue to support the Hatters.

Luton Town shareholder Tom Hunt of Butterworth Path, Luton, said: "Milton Keynes is too far away. There is no direct public transport link.

"I would appeal to Luton Council and local business-men to ensure we do not move in our centenary year."

Don Maxwell, of Stockingstone Road, Luton, said he was disgusted by the attack.

He added: "If Luton had gone down I would have stuck with them but I had a feeling we would win."

Several Luton fans were praying for a goal before the winner came five minutes from time.

Dusty Wright, of Lewsey Farm, Luton, said: "I was praying. The tension was unbearable."
