





### IT WON'T BE OVER TILL THE FINAL WHISTLE . . . as history has proved!

To think that on May 14th, 1981—exactly two years ago—the Blues were striding out boldly at Wembley in a bid for F.A. Cup glory in a Thursday night replay against Tottenham Hotspur. SEVEN of the City players on duty on that memorable occasion will step out today against Luton Town for a match that should be viewed as having much more significance . . . the battle for survival in the First Division.

Certainly the outcome will have more influence on the City club's future as the team give their final performance of the 1982-83 season in a bid to retain

City's 17-year association with the First Division.

Fates will be decided when the final whistle blows this afternoon. The vanquished could well be the victims for the chop (along with Brighton and Swansea who were relegated last week-end) though the result from Birmingham's visit to Southampton will be monitored most anxiously.

Three teams are seriously scrapping for survival today and this match at Maine Road between 19th-placed City (47 points and -22 goal difference) and 20th-placed Luton (46 points and -20 goal difference) will be the most critical to the relegation issue.

It's City's lowest League status since the start of the John Bond managerial era when within 3 weeks he had lifted the Blues from the bottom of the table by

early November 1980.

Wembley for the Blues in May 1980, top of the First Division table on January 1st, 1982 and League leaders again on September 4th, 1982. The decline since the F.A. Cup 4th round defeat at Brighton last January 29th has been desperate. In the space of 15 weeks City have skidded into the present troubles—a run of 16 League games since the Cup k.o. and only the third victory of this period achieved in the vital match at Brighton last Saturday. Two of the games have ended in draws.

Luton have lived with these kind of problems for most of this season, their first back in the top-flight since promotion as clear-cut Second Division champions just 12 months ago. Despite a barrage of goals over the opening weeks in new surroundings they have crashed into trouble and it's a fear which has haunted them since last October when they started a run of 9 League games without a win.

The barren spell, which dumped them down the table—they were in 8th place, their highest position of the season, before the slump started—was ended

with a 3-1 victory. Their victims: Manchester City, on December 11th at Kenilworth Road.

The form which brought them 18 goals from 6 games played in September, has completely evaporated. But the most devastating result must have been last Saturday when visitors Everton crushed them 5-1 and plunged Luton back into the mire from which they had been patiently extricating themselves. And one of their remaining life-lines vanished at Manchester United last Monday night when they surrendered 0-3, a game that was vital to win to give them any worthwhile hope.

So the scene is set on the final day of the League season for a test of nerve, a

nail-biting finale.

The winners will unquestionably be safe: if Luton lose they will go through the trap-door into the Second Division: if City fail only a mathematical miracle could save their agony since goal difference favours Birmingham. A drawn match will still save City . . . it cannot rescue Luton.

Amazing Finish v Luton: 1957

But it's worth remembering that nothing is over till the last kick of the game. And City have evidence in their archives that a few loyalist Luton fans may well remember. The match between the teams at Maine Road on October 26th, 1957 ... a League meeting that must rank as providing one of the most dramatic finishes in which a Blues team has been involved.

City were in rampant home form at the time. Six teams had visited Maine Road and each had crept away with their tails between the legs, a total of 20

goals blasted through them while the Blues conceded only 7.

Luton arrived with a determination to change things. Goals by Gordon
Turner and Reg Pearce—the latter following a 40-yard dribble—gave them a

deserved 2-0 lead. Even when Luton lost full back Seamus Dunne through injury with 35 minutes to go, the City attack could not get functioning against the 10 men (there were no substitutes in those days) and many fans among the 30,633 attendance began to drift away despondently.

There were 60 seconds to go, a 0-2 deficit to face, and City pulled off an amazing rescue act. In the 89th minute striker Billy McAdams, the Northern Ireland international, reduced the arrears and within one minute Colin Barlow

slipped in the equaliser with the last kick of the game.

About 50% of the crowd had already left, though after the roar greeted

McAdams goal some of them started filtering back.

The memory is still quite vivid with City's winger and point-earner, Colin Barlow, who was at Maine Road earlier this month re-living the dramatic moments—and spreading hope with the story. Though he was the first to admit that such drama in October of a season would not make the stress demands on the heart that a similar situation today would bring.

City's team that remarkable day against Luton was: Trautmann; Leivers, Sear; Barnes, Ewing, Warhurst; Barlow, Hayes, Johnstone, McAdams, Fidler. Wing half that day, Ken Barnes, is nowadays on the City staff as chief scout.

Results in City's Favour

The form book will not provide a guide today. But recent history tends to favour City. When Luton were last in the First Division (1974-75) the Blues clinched a 1-0 home win through Mike Summerbee's goal. And, by irony, played a relegation match at Kenilworth Road on the closing Saturday of that season in which victory by an overwhelming margin might have saved Luton.

City finished that season in 8th place.

The game ended 1-1, City's early goal from Dennis Tueart being equalised in the second half by Jim Ryan, leaving Luton with a season's record of 33 points from their 42 games (in the days of 2 points for a win). The Hatters were dependent on Tottenham losing their final game of the campaign 48 hours later against Leeds, but a 4-2 win for the Londoners gave them a life-line and they ended with 34 points and a better goal average. So Luton disappeared into the Second Division for a stay of 7 more seasons. Indeed, until promotion last May.

In the League Cup, too, City have had the edge. In the 1977-78 season there were 3 meetings between the teams in the 3rd round, the opening game at Kenilworth Road ending 1-1 with Peter Barnes providing the Blues goal in the second half with Ron Futcher scoring for Luton in the same period. Ron later

played, albeit briefly, for City.

The first replay, at Maine Road, ended scoreless and the third clash—at Old Trafford—went in the Blues favour in extra time. Gary Heale had given Luton a 2-1 interval lead in a competitive match, but Mike Channon and Brian Kidd added to the earlier penalty from Dennis Tueart to give City a 3-2 verdict and a place in the 4th round.


The next League Cup meeting was also in the 3rd round, on September 23rd, 1980 with Luton having the home advantage. Dave Bennett and Tony Henry netted the City efforts while Raddy Antic scored for Luton, who went

down 1-2.

The most recent meeting between the teams was last December 11th in the League at Kenilworth Road when goals from Paul Walsh (55th min.), Brian Stein (70th min.) and Asa Hartford own goal (86th min.) overpowered the Blues, who scored a consolation through David Cross (66th min.)

But today it matters more than ever for both clubs!



#### HISTORY REPEATS.

If Luton have the feeling that this is a familiar predicament in which they find themselves on the final day of the 1982-83 season they'd not be very far off the mark. Except the circumstances are possibly even more critical than the state in which they found themselves for the final match of the 1974-75 campaign—when relegation from the First Division stared at them just as bleakly.

Luton had been promoted from the Second Division as runners-up in 1973-74... and at the end of their first season in the top-flight they were in an uphill battle

against relegation. Just like their situation is now.

Luton were third from bottom of the table with just one game to go. Like their plight is today.

And on April 26th, 1975 they desperately needed victory in their closing game to have any chance of escape. Their opponents: Manchester City. It's almost history repeating itself.

The difference is that Luton played hosts on the last occasion and our Blues were not in the same kind of distress. In fact, the Blues were comfortable in mid-table (they finished the season in 8th spot) and were playing more for pride and reputation when they visited Kenilworth Road. Luton were playing for their lives

The Luton team under tension that day was: Barber; John Ryan, Buckley; Anderson, Faulkner, Litt; Jim Ryan, Husband, Alston, West, Aston. Sub: King.

City paraded plenty of stars: Corrigan; Hammond, Donachie; Doyle, Booth, Oakes; Hartford, Bell, Marsh, Daniels, Tueart. Sub: Keegan.

And there were 20,768 packed inside the 25,000-capacity ground (the limit in those days), most of them hoping that Luton's revival of three successive victories (at the expense of Everton, Leicester and Birmingham over the previous 17 days) would continue.

But Dennis Tueart, one of the two survivors from that match who appears today, spoiled home hopes. In the 13th minute he sized up an ill-judged back-pass from Jim Ryan, rounded Steve Buckley and calmly slotted a shot wide of 'keeper Keith Barber.

Luton started their salvage operation. And 18 minutes from time the 'guilty' Jim Ryan snatched the equaliser. They might have been level a little earlier when Joe Corrigan palmed a John Aston centre into his own net while under pressure, but referee Dave Wallace disallowed the effort adjudging a foul on City's 'keeper.

It ended 1-1 and Luton crept into 19th place with all their fixtures played. At the end of that final League Saturday, Carlisle United were doomed following a draw at Derby, and so were Chelsea, who drew at home to Everton. The other booby prize was to go to Luton or Tottenham Hotspur, who had lost at Arsenal and had one match left to play. Spurs

were at home to Leeds United some 48 hours later.

It was a nightmare week-end for the Luton club and their fans. Rescue hopes were finally wiped out when Tottenham put up one of their better displays of the season and beat Leeds by 4-2... condemning Luton to relegation.

Luton didn't have many grounds for complaint that victory eluded them against City. The Blues showed the better ability to play the ball about and it took the fight and will out of the nervous Luton side.

The home fans booed the decision to replace **Steve Litt** with bouncy newcomer **Andy King**, the substitute who was having his first taste of League football. King, of course, was to go on to a fair measure of success with current club Everton and with West Brom, as well as a spell at Q.P.R.

Rodney Marsh also suffered the indignity of removal from the action with just 5 minutes to go, replaced by Ged Keegan. Typical Marsh reaction was to shun a seat on the trainer's bench and to sit among the fans in front of the terracing near to the dressing room entrance.

However, it caused confusion when a throwin was awarded at the spot where Marsh was sitting signing autographs and the referee 'ordered him off'.

In extrovert fashion Marsh responded by taking off his blue City shirt, which had caused the problem, and sat out the match barechested—and impish.

"The referee told me I was distracting the players. I told him it was the first time I had managed to do that all afternoon."

But it did lead to discipline problems back at Maine Road. "I was very hurt at being substituted" said Marsh later, "I felt it was a token gesture and meant very little so late in the last match of the season. I don't know why I was pulled off but there are probably politics involved" he complained. "I can say no more."

City boss **Tony Book** explained: "I wasn't happy with what Rodney did. I shall be speaking to him about it. I pulled him off for tactical reasons."

Luton stumbled back into the Second Division for a stay that was to last 7 seasons. Until their promotion as champions only last May. And here they are again, the final day of the season, and history could well repeat itself.

Soccer's planners could hardly have dreamed up a more dramatic or gripping finale to the season if they had programmed the fixture computer themselves!

The First Division relegation issue has had more twists and turns than an Agatha Christie novel and the outcome is that a handful of clubs are still deeply involved as to who eventually goes down with Swansea and Brighton.

We are in the thick of that dogfight . . . so are today's Maine Road visitors, Luton Town. It amounts to our own personal Cup final—except the prize is a place in the top-flight next term. I have always maintained that the fight would go right through to the last kick of the campaign. Yet I never seriously

expected it to be as close as this.

There was a stage when I felt a couple of victories would be sufficient for us to stay up. We achieved those by beating West Brom at the Hawthorns on Easter Saturday and then we defeated West Ham. It gave us 44 points at that stage and it seemed that would be sufficient bearing in mind that last season Leeds United, who finished third from bottom, were relegated with 42 points.

But it seems 50 points might have to be the safety target, although three points for a win, launched initially last season, has still to level itself out. I believe it will take as long as six more seasons, before a fair average of what it needs to stay up can be

obtained.

Meantime, it looks as though a half century has got to be the aim at the outset of a season. And that's a sizeable task. It means a club has to win 17 games, almost half the 42, to reach that target.

After defeats at Arsenal and home to Nottingham Forest, we were left with a twogame cliff-hanger to wind up our programme. Both fixtures had to provide us with maximum points to have a realistic chance of remaining a First Division team.

Three were obtained at Brighton in a magnificent all-round team performance where resilience and commitment were at a peak. I have looked on this week as 'half time'—second period faces us this afternoon against Luton.

By a further quirk of fixture planning, the Hatters wound up their season with two visits to Manchester this week. And that has been a daunting prospect for them. We

all know what happened when they faced United at Old Trafford on Monday . . . now for the crunch this afternoon.

Most traumatic time of my life


Our destiny remains firmly in our own hands. The players know that victory will get us out of trouble and we shall be presenting First Division football for you once again next August.

If we apply ourselves in the manner of last Saturday at the Goldstone Ground there will be no doubts about our ability to remain among the elite. All the players applied themselves magnificently against the F.A. Cup Finalists who had scalped us on their way to Wembley in the fourth round at the end of January.

It was a week after that disastrous defeat that I took over as manager and the four months since have seemed like four years! It has been the most traumatic period of my time in football.

That is why victory at Brighton was personally satisfying for the team proved they can do a job when the chips are down.

I have said it was a brilliant team effort that saw us to victory, but I don't think the players will mind if I single out



**Kevin Reeves** for special mention. He was naturally the hero of the afternoon on the strength of his match-winning goal from a **Bobby McDonald** cross in the 74th minute. But his attitude was that shown by others in recent weeks in playing when clearly not 100 per cent fit.

Kevin has taken a lot of criticism from the media because he is not a prolific goal-scorer yet has a £1m price tag hung round his neck. But his colleagues at Maine Road have tremendous respect for him as a first class professional. That's probably the highest acclaim any footballer can receive.

His goal in the victory at Brighton was certainly the most vital he has scored in the three years he has been at Maine Road. I would like to think he finishes the season with at least one more this afternoon . . . maybe the

winner, even!

However, no matter what happens against Luton today, the real work starts in earnest next week preparing for a new season. The summer months are vital. It is a time for recruiting new faces and I can assure you there will be new faces by the time we kick off again.

We already have one newcomer earmarked in the shape of **Ian Thompson**, a 24-year-old schoolteacher from the West Country. At this stage

we must regard him as purely one for the future. Joining us from the ranks of non-league football, some work will have to be done to smooth off possible rough edges.

What I am aiming for is a happy blend of mature experience and eager youth which, we sincerely hope, will give you fans a little more to cheer about next term. At least, we have kept you on your toes this season with all our ups and downs!

Lack of consistency has always been our main problem. It has been difficult to gauge how the team will perform from one game to the next.

But I thank you for your support, an accolade that is echoed by the players. And while on the 'thank you' subject, I would like to pay tribute to the hard working backroom staff who have helped me considerably in the recent months of

uncertainty.

Tony Book has been a guiding light in his capacity of assistant manager with Glyn Pardoe and John Ryan doing sterling work on the coaching side, too. Our future remains in extremely capable hands so long as Ken Barnes remains chief scout and in the medical room, Roy Batley does an invaluable job along with Doctor Norman Luft, our 'resident' G.P. Thank you for your 100 per cent backing and support at all times.

And to you fans, have a good summer . . . see you all next season.

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

There's plenty of end-of-season activity scheduled by City and one of the first dates for your diary should be next Tuesday night, May 17th at the Social Club when the club sponsors SAAB stage their QUIZ competition (starts at 8.00 p.m.). A team of 3 City players will pit their wits against a celebrity panel selected by SAAB, the motor manufacturers and dealers.

On the following night, Wednesday, May 18th, City are staging a Player of the Year dinner at the Valley Lodge Hotel in Wilmslow. It's a mixed function and all the City players will be guests to see the Supporters' Club choice, Kevin Bond, receive his trophy after a clear-cut success in the

annual competition.

The dinner looks like being a sell-out and the few remaining tickets, priced at £15, are available from the club's commercial manager, Phil Critchley, who is based at the ground.

• Kevin Bond is choice of the fans as City's Player of the Year for 1982-83, and it's a tribute to the character of the 25 year old central defender that he's had a runaway win in the popularity stakes a little over 12 months after unfairly being the target from a section of very vocal critics.

Bond's determination to stay to face and fight those 'knockers' has been evident in his displays for the Blues during the current campaign. He's had the first team's star rating on 9 occasions from

the 48 senior games completed (and Kevin has missed two of these matches) and has certainly proved his resilience in the recent period when the chips have been down for the City team lighting relegation. Five of those man-of-the-match acknowledgements have been claimed by him over the last 12 games!

Kevin polled 58 percent of the Supporters' Club ballot and his nearest rival was runner-up **Tommy Caton** (last year's winner) who achieved a 21-percent poll. In third

position is midfielder Asa Hartford, who gained 7 percent of the vote.

The turn-round in Kevin's fortunes is not a new experience. When his father, **John**, managed Norwich City he was subjected to abuse from the terraces after establishing in the first team and had to weather that storm, too. He did so quite effectively. At the end of the 1979-80 season he'd clearly turned round public opinion by carrying off three of the Norwich club's Player of the Year awards—the one given by the players and staff, an award from a Supporters' Club and finally, from a local garage sponsor. He followed up by getting the Norwich team captaincy as successor to **Martin Peters**, the former England international.

Although it was felt by some observers that the size of a similar problem at Maine Road would be far more difficult to overcome, Kevin has proved it can be done. Next month, when he celebrates his 26th birthday on June 22nd, he will be starting his 11th year in football—a career which began at Bournemouth, again, under

his father's management.

Kevin joins an illustrious list of names on the trophy. The competition was introduced by the Supporters' Club in 1966-67 and the list of winners is: 1966-67—Tony Book; 1967-68—Colin Bell; 1968-69—Glyn Pardoe; 1969-70—Francis Lee; 1970-71—Mike Doyle; 1971-72—Mike Summerbee; 1972-73—Mike Summerbee; 1973-74—Mike Doyle; 1974-75—Alan Oakes; 1975-76—Joe Corrigan; 1976-77—Dave Watson; 1977-78—Joe Corrigan; 1978-79—Asa Hartford; 1979-80—Joe Corrigan; 1980-81—Paul Power; 1981-82—Tommy Caton; 1982-83—Kevin Bond.

The Young Player of the Year award for 1982-83 has been presented to the versatile Andy May, who had his 19th birthday last February. Andy, 8 times on first team duty this season (4 games as sub) made his senior

debut for City as a sub at Ipswich Town on April 17th, 1982, but has had only limited opportunities since then.

This season he's made more Central League appearances than any other player (25 in all) and has operated mainly as a central defender, though he's given valuable performances at full back and in midfield. He was back on duty with the senior squad last Saturday as sub at Brighton.

Second place in the poll went to **Steve Kinsey**, winner in the previous two seasons, while goalkeeper **Alex Williams** took third place.



#### BRIAN STEIN Luton Town's Player of the Year 1981-82



STILL the club's leading scorer though he's only played 11 minutes as a substitute since being injured against Manchester City—a broken bone in his foot—last December 11th. His opening 22 games of this season produced 15 goals and his absence for 5 months has obviously been an important factor in the team's struggle in their first season back in the First Division.

If he ends this term as the leading scorer it will be for the third successive season he's been the club's top marksman. The 25 year old striker was ever-present in the Luton team that won the Second Division championship in 1981-82 when he scored 21 of their 86 goals. That team total was more than any other club in the top two Divisions.

South African born, he emigrated with his family to London in 1967, leaving in a hurry because his father, Isiah, had outspoken views on apartheid and was frequently under arrest.

Brian, a Cape coloured like the famous Test cricketer, Basil d'Oliviera, began playing his soccer for several unkown teams—like North Paddington Boys' Club, Crouch End Vampires, Sudbury Court and Edgeware Town.

The holder of 8 'O' level and 'A' level certificates in history and sociology he began working as a clerical officer for the local health authority while playing for Edgeware in the Athenian League. That's when he was spotted by a Luton scout and persuaded to sign at Kenilworth Road in October 1977. Though he was 19 years old at the time and felt he might be too old too start in soccer.

He was called into the first team the following month as a substitute at Mansfield Town (1-3 defeat), replacing Gary Heale. That was on November 12th, 1977, and he also came on as sub in the following match.

His first full game was at Crystal Palace on Boxing Day 1977 a 3-1 win, and the following day, at home to Sheffield United, he scored for the first time in the Second Division—two goals in a 4-0 win. He scored once more that season when he completed 24 games, 6 of them as a sub.

The following term, 1978-79, he hit 10 League goals from 34 matches (3 as sub) and scored a further 4 in the League Cup. And as an ever-present in 1979-80 he netted 8 times.

His partner and tutor in those early years was the well-travelled striker Bob Hatton . . . "I owe such a lot to Bob" admits Brian.

When Luton finished 5th in the Second Division in 1980-81, just two points adrift of a promotion place, he contributed 18 goals, again as an ever-present. And last season he figured in every match and improved his scoring haul—21 goals.

It looked certain that he would set up further records in this campaign when he blitzed into 1982-83 with 8 goals in his first 7 matches. But the serious injury blow happened against Manchester City last December 11th when he broke the bone in his foot—his worst set-back since a ligaments injury side-lined him in 1978-79. He attempted a come-back as a sub in the April 12th League match at home to Birmingham City, but jarred the ankle injury and has not been seen in senior action since then.

Brian tips his younger brother, Mark, as a likely success in soccer.

IT'S WIN or bust this afternoon for Luton. DEFEAT (they've already had 17 of those in the League) will get them relegated.

A DRAW (there have been 13 of those) will also send them back from whence they came last May as impressive title-winners of the Second Division.

"We are not only going to need a tremendous effort, but we need every player at the top of his form. It's not original . . . but anything can happen in football. We beat Manchester City at Luton only last December, so we are capable" said Hatters boss David Pleat this week—though he must be acutely aware that Luton have won only 4 of their 20 League visits this term.

The crisis has been hovering for most of this season. It hasn't been helped by the 5-month absence of top scorer Brian Stein through injury (a fractured foot) sustained in the 3-1 win over our Blues last December 11th.

Suddenly the fears have taken a frightening shape. It is the disastrous home result last Saturday, a 1-5 defeat by Everton, that is responsible for the acuteness of their anxiety. That shocker, with last Monday's 0-3 defeat at Manchester United to add to the agony, leaves only one escape route. They have to win.

"Last season when I was awarded the Manager of the Year prize for the Second Division I attempted to remain calm about it and take the fuss about our promotion in my stride. I'm trying to remain calm about our current situation. But I am unbelievably fragile at the moment. Inside me I'm bitterly disappointed that we are in these difficulties". continued the Luton manager.

It's something of a surprise that a team capable of scoring 64 goals should be bogged down in such deep despair. But there have got to be reasons, apart from Stein's absence.

"Yes, a lack of strength in depth when injuries and loss of form have occurred" answered David. "And a certain naivety in our approach. When we have been behind in a game, rather than sit back and be patient we have gone forward looking to get back on terms. We've been too eager to retaliate and left ourselves wide open to the opposition. We've paid the penalty for it" he went on ruefully.

That naivety was obvious against Everton. The Merseysiders piled 5 goals past Luton last December and repeated the dose last Saturday. Yet the deficit was only 1-2 at half-time . . . and then the push to salvage the match, featuring adventurous full back raids, cost them dearly, they were hammered. It was a costly match in many respects. They also lost the services of their flying winger David Moss with a painful rib injury.

But at least there will be the return of £150,000 defender Paul Elliott, signed from Charlton at the start

He's finished a two-match suspension and the England Youth star should return to make the defence more resolute, possibly wearing the number 3 shirt in place of former Liverpool reserve Richard Money. Clive Goodyear, a 22 year old has been holding his own at the heart of the defence, a successful recommend from one of the manager's former playing colleagues.

a philosophical view expressed this week by Luton Manager David Pleat.

since April 1978 but has still only totalled 39 League games . . . and 28 of them have been in this campaign, for him a real test of adjustment.

The lack of experience for the top grade has helped take its toll. Only skipper Brian Horton had any previous First Division knowledge before the kick-off last August and though he's unquestionably been as dependable as ever—he missed one game in '81-82 and only 2 games this term—his inspirational moments have been fewer. And he's now aged 34, carrying a heavy responsibility for legs that have battled bravely for well over 600 games.

Ricky Hill has missed only one match this term (in the Milk Cup) and merits mention as the team's most consistent player. His contributions have been recognised by a wider audience over the past 12 months. He was not only the club's Player of the Year in the promotion season but has since picked up two full England caps. Impressive stuff.

Looking likely to gain England attention is striker Paul Walsh, ever-present and second leading scorer with three League hat-tricks in his tally. A lively bundle of energy with clever control and pace, he was one of the players under the scrutiny of England manager Bobby Robson at Manchester United last Monday.

Partnering Walsh in attack is the bulldozer built Trevor Aylott, a prodigious worker and surprisingly neat with his distribution for a man of such size. He was bought before the March transfer deadline from Millwall and has netted twice in 11 matches.

Success in the Youth Cup has speeded the development of the club's youngsters and there have been opportunities—albeit very tough ones—for teenagers like winger Ray Daniel, who endured his first full League match at Old Trafford last Monday and Gary Parker, who was probably bewildered in the same match which marked his first League chance.

Tony Godden is on loan from West Brom and occupying the goalkeeping job in the absence of Jake Findlay, who fractured his thumb in a 1-4 defeat at Arsenal last March 19th and was ruled out for the rest of the season. Godden has found plenty to do.


Mal Donaghy returned from a very rewarding campaign with the Northern Ireland team in Spain last summer where they did so well in the World Cup, but as a member in all but two of the team's games this season he must have wondered at times what has been hitting him.

Kirk Stephens and Richard Money have been the full back partnership more often than not, forming the pairing since Money's arrival from Liverpool in March 1982 at a cost of £100,000. They've both adopted a bold approach and while it can be successful it can also prove a strain for the defence. Luton have conceded 84 goals, room for plenty of questions to be asked.

Still, boldness may have to be their friend this afternoon.



Nowadays he takes freelance assignments, still living in his adopted city of Manchester.

QUEEN MARY reckoned that when she died and was opened, they'd find "Calais" lying on her heart. Whether they ever did is a matter for the historians. When the time comes to open up Manchester City, it's a fair bet that they'll find, among other things, the name "Luton Town".

The few League matches I watched between City and Luton in the 1950's were

uneventful, that is if you exclude one of Roy Paul's infrequent goals.

City had been relegated in 1950, but they got off to a flying start the following season and it was not until the October, a fortnight after the Luton game at Maine Road, that they had their first defeat. Peter Doherty destroyed them almost single handed at Doncaster in spite of George Smith's hat trick.

George scored both City's goals when they went to Kenilworth Road the

following February.

The next four meetings ended 3-2 each team winning on its own ground.

In the F.A. Cup there were some rum goings on. City already had beaten Luton home and away shortly before the War, so the Bedfordshire men had a bit of ground to make up. Their chance came in the fourth round in 1953, and having beaten Blackurn Rovers 6-1 in the previous round, they had plenty of confidence at Maine Road where they earned a draw 1-1, **Ivor Broadis** scoring for City and **Jesse Pye**, late of Wolverhampton Wanderers, for Luton.

City never had a look in in the replay although Broadis had the satisfaction of scoring again. Gordon Turner helped himself to three of Luton's five goals, and

"Dos" Little added to the tally with an own goal.

Bolton Wandereers did better than City winning 1-0 at Luton in the next round, and Luton must have been sick of the sight of Lancashire opponents because they met Blackpool four times before going out in the third round the following season.

But it was a short respite. In the fifth round in 1955, City played in a blizzard at Kenilworth Road where a fine display by **Don Revie**, and a goal in each half by **Roy Clarke** put City still farther on the way to Wembley where Newcastle United beat them.

#### NIGHTMARE TRIP

But the Cup-tie to end all Cup-ties came in the fourth round in 1961, and a few City players of that era to say nothing of their supporters must still have

nightmares of that trip to Kenilworth Road.

It was a dreadful day of torrential rain, and most people expected the game to be called off. But **Ken Tuck**, the referee, decided to make a start. **Alec Ashworth** put Luton two up after eighteeen minutes before **Denis Law** scored a hat trick. He repeated that feat between the 56th and 66th minutes, but with twenty minutes to go and with the floods rising, **Mr. Tuck** abandoned the match.

"I'll bet you never got six before" remarked one of the locals to Denis later.
"Well" replied Denis "you've lost your bet. I once scored six in a replay at school

and they all bloomin' well counted".

A few days later City went back to Luton with the same side. There was a hint of blue sky although the pitch still showed signs of the punishment it had taken. Now it was City's turn to be on the receiving end, and an injury to **Ken Barnes** midway through the first half just about killed their chances. **Ashworth** again scored twice and **Jim Fleming** once for the home team, and **Law**, inevitably, replied for City.


Eight years later Luton were drawn to play at Maine Road in the fifth round, but my nerves couldn't stand the prospect, so I watched Liverpool of the First Division fight hard to beat Doncaster Rovers of the Fourth at Anfield. City won 1-0

that day, and unlike 1955, they went on and won the Cup.

Since then they have not met Luton in this competition, and I don't suppose they mind very much!

# Before you get involved in after-match discussions, read what Peter Gardner has to say in the PINK FINAL

DAVID PLEAT is entitled to feel a sense of injustice as he reflects on the vagaries of a season that draws to a close with his Luton team struggling with Manchester City for First Division survival.

At the nub of almost every proposal designed to safeguard the future of football—from the second virtually discarded Chester Report to the protracted wrangle over television contracts—is the fundamental need for more entertaining play. And while others merely have talked about it, Pleat has made a practical contribution . . . for which he may be about to pay dearly.

If City win this afternoon's match, or even secure the one single point that will save them from relegation, Luton will be dispatched to the Second Division, from whence they came with high ideals a year ago. Pleat did not view his club's promotion simply as a means of making up the numbers mid-table in the First Division. He demanded of his players the attacking style that was the hallmark of their surge through Division Two.

He returned from watching the World Cup finals in Spain determined that his team would endeavour to enhance the game in this country. But, as the League table shows, he who dares does not always win.

Luton have had their moments, among them the spectacular entertainment value of a 3-3 draw with Liverpool at Anfield. But they have not been blessed either with consistency or good fortune.

Success has come to others with less romantic notions: Queen's Park Rangers, for example. Terry Venables last seen at Maine Road in charge of Crystal Palace, 'the team of the 80's'—will be returning to the First Division next season as the boss (perhaps literally) of Q.P.R. because points count more than praise.

Whatever they may have achieved with flair on their artificial pitch at Loftus Road, some of QPR's results away from home—and I remember with particular dismay their match at Leeds—have been gained by the use of blatant offside tactics. Their deployment of a defence little more than a yard from the half-way line is known, euphemistically, as 'attacking the ball'.


When Luton were beaten at Old Trafford last Monday night, Ron Athinson, the Manchester United manager, credited them with playing the most enterprising football of all the sides at the bottom of the table. And City's John Benson described them as one of the most attractive and courageous teams in the First Division.

But, as Pleat would be the first to acknowledge, teams are not relegated by accident.

The more senior of City's supporters are still awe-struck when recounting how, in 1937-38, the Blues went down with guns blazing—having scored 80 goals, three more than the champions, Arsenal. The problem was that City conceded 77.

Luton's predicament is lamentable because their boldness has failed at a crucial time, not merely for the club themselves but for all those entrusted with the health of the sport. We must hope that Pleat does not lose his nerve-likewise Luton's directors-and abandon his policies for a safer, less interesting style, with the emphasis on caution and the cutting of losses.

It always has been difficult for clubs of limited financial resources—the vast majority nowadays—to keep pace with their ambitions. Some people in the game may consider Pleat's methods naive. But if more followed his example then a sizeable proportion of those who have deserted the grounds might just be tempted back.





#### **ASA HARTFORD**




#### **WAYNE TURNER**
