

NO GOALS,

IT WAS 31 matches ago when Luton Town fans last saw their team in a goalless game. And an away point at Villa Park, where only two visiting teams have won so far this season, would leave some managers delighted.

But for manager David Pleat the result was little compensation for a team performance which fell a long way short of the sort of flowing, attacking football he believes in.

It was frustrating and disappointing, and one match fact sums up the off-day misery: Aston Villa goalkeeper Nigel Spink didn't have a single shot to save in the whole of the 90 minutes.

A solid defensive display by Paul Elliott and Mal Donaghy was the only encouraging feature of a match which left most spectators, including Mr Pleat, baffled.

Villa manager Tony Barton shared the bewilderment and admitted that the Town's play had ruined his pre-match planning.

"We know how Luton normally play. We were ready for them to attack us, and hoped to get them on the break. But it just didn't happen . . . Luton didn't come forward in numbers."

Villa veteran Des Bremner was even more disappointed. Fighting for his First Division place, he has

been converted from mid-field to defence, and is competing with Brendan Ormsby for the No 5 shirt.

"I was expecting to be under pressure and hoped I would be able to show that I can play well in defence," he said. "But Luton never gave me the chance . . .

"We did nearly all the attacking, but things didn't seem to drop for us around the box."

Barton complained that for all their possession Villa were short on variety of ideas, and didn't get round the back of a Town defence which was under a lot of pressure but never got into serious difficulty.

Alan Curbishley and Mark Walters threatened to get round the back of Mitchell Thomas and Kirk Stephens,

but invariably wasted the ball when they did achieve promising positions.

If the defending was reliable enough, the Town's failure to push full-backs forward like they usually do played a major part in Spink's 90-minute siesta.

More telling still was a lack of attacking support from midfield. Brian Horton spent most of his energy on defensive duties, and the inexperience of Frank Bunn and Garry Parker got nowhere against Curbishley, Dennis Mortimer and Steve McMahon.

Villa had almost a free run up to the edge of the Town's penalty area, but their passing and shooting was pathetic, and for all their considerable possession they rarely looked like

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getting to close quarters.

Paul Rideout looked more menacing than the suspended Pete Withe had done at Kenilworth Road in October, and at least got two shots on target. Les Sealey dealt with both efficiently.

The only scares for a Town defence which was remarkably unruffled when full-back Colin Gibson overlapped and hit an attempted centre which bounced on to and over the bar, and a couple of hopeful penalty appeals.

It was optimism of the cheekiest order when Villa claimed hands against Donaghy, who blocked an attempted cross by Walters at close range. But I have seen penalties given for the sort of "save" Stephens made when the Town defence was pulled apart for once by Walters and Rideout's shot hit the defender and went for a corner.

Referee Roger Dilkes called it accidental hands, and had been equally unimpressed in the first half when Brian Stein tried to go through on his own and fell dramatically when challenged by Allan Evans.

With very little service from midfield, Stein, Trevor Aylott and Paul Walsh still contrived to cause the odd problem to a Villa defence which was in danger of going to sleep through inactivity.

Ironically, for a team outplayed in terms of possession, the Town created the clearest chance of the match in the 30th minute. Walsh burst through the middle, drew two defenders, and passed accurately to give Parker a clear run at goal. But his hot, from the edge of the penalty area, was well wide of the far post.

We had to wait until the last five minutes, after Sealey's good finger-tip save from Rideout, for the Town attack to show some of its potential.

Villa were getting the jit-

ters after 85 minutes of frustration, and the Town at last looked menacing. But Walsh and Stein both put shots wide, and in the best move Stein made a marvellous run down the left wing, cut in past two men on the by-line, and was then robbed by a third when Walsh was waiting in vain in a perfect position for a simple pass.

Both teams left the field

to a chorus of boos from customers who hadn't had much entertainment for their money. They expected a Town team with attacking flair and a rocky defence. On the day, things were exactly the opposite. The defence was much too strong for a Villa side short of variety, while the Town attack was almost non-existent.
