PATCHED-UP TEAM HAS ITS DESERVED REWAR

TUESDAY'S victory pushed the Town three places WITH relief competing up the First Division table.

They went to eighth, level on points and goal difference with seventh-placed Spurs. The Londoners are above Kenilworth Road on the Town by virtue of having scored more goals - both clubs have a zero goal difference but Spurs have conceded and scored four more than the Town.

On Saturday, when the First Division programme was cut by FA Cup-ties, the Town held 11th place in the table, with Liverpool and Manchester United continuing their personal contest for the championship.

At Anfield the champions came back from a goal down to dispose of Spurs 3-1 while at Old Trafford Manchester United looked unimpressive and over-anxious for 50 minutes before beating Leicester 2-0.

West Ham reclaimed third place but failed to close the gap when they were held 1-1 at home by struggling Wolves. Nottingham Forest, who had a day off, dropped down to fourth, but had a chance to go back into the top three last night when they were at home to Everton.

Notts County suffered double disaster: while they were being knocked out of the cup by Everton at Meadow Lane, Wolves edged a point above them.
