

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

In a strange way Birmingham have Luton to thank for stinging them into the necessary action to get out of trouble.

With just eight games left Blues looked dead and buried. They took a pasting at home against Norwich with former Blues striker Keith Bertschin getting two of the four goals and then were belted 3-1 by Luton at Kenilworth Road.

From then on Blues never looked back. Winning goals came in the 88th minute. Bringing successive victories against Coventry Everton and Sunderland. They were then held 1-1 by Brighton at St Andrew's. That was followed with

a crucial home win against Spurs and then victory at Southampton.

Blues had worked a miracle and so had Luton whose boss David Pleat said after another minor miracle in Manchester: 'I am delighted for the team for it would have been an injustice if we had gone down playing attacking football all season.'

Although there has been very little change in the personnel at both clubs since they faced each other at the end of last season there is a very different atmosphere at St Andrew's and Kenilworth Road.

Luton's rise has been personalised through the selection of Paul Walsh and Brian Stein, who both won their first caps for England against France. Stein did not do too well but there was a lot of promise in the performance of Walsh.

At the same time Blues keeper Tony Coton's displays have not gone unnoticed by our international hierarchy and Mick Harford has also made his mark whenever Bobby Robson has been around.

That has all come about by the hard work and dedication put in by the players and the manager. No matter what happens here on in with Blues it has been a successful season.

Good runs in the Milk and FA Cups and good runs in the League have rekindled a great deal of interest. There is a buzz about St Andrew's now that has been missing for a long time.

The emergence of Howard Gayle is causing a lot of excitement and there is still a lot to come from him. Teamed up with Mick Harford and Robert Hopkins who has more dart and drive than a ricochetting pin-ball there is still a bundle of good football to watch at St Andrew's for the rest of the season.

A European place doesn't look possible . . . but survival last season didn't either.

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TONIGHT'S VISITORS . . .

• When the Blues statistics were giving cause for concern during the so-called festive part of the season at Christmas, Luton had every reason to toast the arrival of 1984 with a smile and more optimism at Kenilworth Road.

Luton were riding high and had both Liverpool and Manchester United as the only sides between them and the top of the First Division after they celebrated a Boxing Day win over Notts County.

Manager David Pleat's all footballing outfit, with the breezy reputation of a side whose first love is attacking soccer, were in a lofty situation in the League that had not been enjoyed for a good 25 years.

As Birmingham City moved into the New Year with a challenge of a different order, Luton were in a position where, if they could maintain their results from the first-half of the season, a place in European competition might be the least of what they would finish with in May.

Though the respective circumstances of the clubs were of contrasting variety, the foundation fight for success or survival both required hard, honest graft

for 90 minutes and, since the first day of 1984, the records make it only too obvious which team has come out best.

While Birmingham have enjoyed a rainbow spell that has made them one of the most successful sides in Division One, Luton's promising fortunes have gone into reverse gear by comparison, a regrettable loss of momentum for a much admired side that threatens to undo all their earlier impressive work.

The flamboyant nature of their football saw them sail close to the wind last season, the first in the premier table again after winning the 1981-82 Second Division Championship. They plastered Division One defences throughout last term to crack in 65 goals — and only four other sides bettered that — but it was at the expense of conceding 84.

At the finish, 10 months ago, they went into a cliff-hanger against Manchester City when it was a 'them or us' crunch encounter and, with nerves stretched to breaking point, manager Pleat saw his side saved by a winner from Yugoslavian substitute, Raddy Antic.

The same kind of formula, with little modification, was the basis for Luton's new ambitions and despite an immediate setback against Arsenal in the opening match, they quickly got down to business and the goals flowed to get them underway in characteristic style with 3-0 and 4-1 wins over Leicester and Sunderland.

It's every manager's dream to have the scoring, responsibilities well spread in the side for obvious reasons and it must have been a quiet source of satisfaction for the Luton boss to see how and where those goals came from. They were hit by Walsh, Hill, Bunn, Moss, Horton and Stein, and in 13 strikes, no player scored more than a single goal per game.

The Town shot six past City in the previous season but were below Blues when the final points were counted, a typical example of how adventurous the Luton style can be but, perhaps, not apparently all that successful at the end of the day.

When it was mentioned that Luton will never be on terms with the best while they stick out their chin, the manager replied with his usual honesty — 'Provided we score more than the opposition, we will continue to stick out our chins.'

The policy suffered a hic-cup in the League Cup when they failed on aggregate against Rotherham, met defeat by a wide margin at Anfield, followed by upsets against Spurs and Coventry. Yet, overall, it clearly functioned to their benefit until Christmas.

Since that time Luton have been on a winter slope when they have slipped away from an enviable spot in the League and have wrestled with a hangover that has proved very costly in terms of points.

They stumbled out of 1983 with defeats against West Ham and Sunderland and there was no joy on the New Year Bank Holiday affair against Nottingham Forest when a typical 90 minutes saw them earn nothing out of a five-goal thriller.

Their local derby in the third round of the FA Cup against Watford took two games and embraced 11 goals — but once again, despite Luton's applaudable policies, they were left to reflect on another expensive piece of misfortune.

Four days later the odd goal in three saw Arsenal clear the table, yet, there was a brief respite with a three-point result at Molineux before the goals seemed to dry up in a period of matches that include the painful memory of a 5-0 hammering by Manchester United.

One of the reasons why the results have turned against them could be the prolonged absence of David Moss, a key man in the elite standard when it comes to pure football skills. Moss, of the silky control and positive finishing, is now fighting for match fitness again five weeks after his trip to hospital for an operation to rectify a torn stomach muscle.

A player on whom such as Stein, Walsh and others rely on for a supply of the ball from the wing, Moss has been out of contention since late October and, with last season's England cap Ricky Hill also missing a number of games in the last six weeks, it has meant a big loss of true Luton firepower.

Ricky Hill represents the jewel of the Kenilworth Road Youth policy, an ever present in last season's 42 League games with nine goals and recognition from Bobby Robson to go with it.

Luton's London-born midfielder got the international breakthrough when called off the subs bench against Denmark and was then picked afterwards for his first full game against West Germany.

More recently he has been followed by the arrival of both Paul Walsh and Brian Stein, gifted front line colleagues who picked up their debut England caps against France, when the result was an obvious disappointment but it certainly served as an opportunity for both to broaden their experience in top class football.

Walsh has been the subject of much transfer speculation this term, a player with magic control whom Mr Pleat reportedly spent £400,000 on acquiring from Charlton for the start of the previous season.

No manager wants to swap such a talented player for a sack of sterling

when times are going well — but Walsh, who could reasonably be sold for a handsome profit, might become the centre of a situation that is not rare in football — Bob Latchford and Trevor Francis were similar affairs for Birmingham City.

Last season ex-Aston Villa keeper Jake Findlay featured between the posts in the majority of League games but, after four goals went past him at Highbury, in March, he lost his place to the on-loan Tony Godden, presently Albion's second choice goalkeeper.

The Luton boss placed a priority on giving his defence more security in this position after the narrow escape from Second Division football and he plumped for Coventry's Les Sealey, one of the 'old brigade' that left last summer when Bobby Gould took over to reshape the Sky Blues.

Sealey was on the end of six at Anfield and five before his own supporters in February when Ron Atkinson's side took their chances, but three goalless draws against Villa, Liverpool and QPR in recent weeks suggest a heavier net of safety has been pulled around his goalmouth.

One of the initial investments made by Luton's manager since he took over in January 1975 was Kirk Stephens, a £5,000 full-back, born in Coventry and signed from non-League Nuneaton in 1978.

This 29-year-old full-back has proved a splendid buy with over 200 senior appearances now on record for Luton and, also bought at the same time by the club, was Mal Donaghy, a central-defender who cost £20,000 from Irish club Larne FC.

Mal has been undisturbed in the defence this season and has taken his Northern Ireland caps to the 25 mark to underline the consistency of his professional work.

Alongside him is the equally everready companion, Paul Elliott, just 12 months a Luton player after being captured from Charlton for a reported fee of £145,000. Paul, 20 on 18th March, is highly respected as a first class pivot prospect and more experience is certain to push this six-foot plus defender into a future candidate for an England cap.

The skipper and anchor man of midfield is 35-year-old veteran Brian Horton, a Hednesford born man of many League campaigns who came to Luton for £100,000 via Brighton and Port Vale. A shrewd link player between defence and attack, Brian is now nearing his 600th senior game.

Former apprentice, Mitchell Thomas has added more than a dozen additional first team games to a record that showed only four prior to the start of the season. He is emerging into a solid man in the full-back role and, also making his contributions in the defensive area again, has been Clive Goodyear, a 23-year-old Lincoln born player who filled the No. 5 shirt on the majority of occasions last season before the arrival of Paul Elliott.

Birmingham born Frank Bunn has made significant advance to have his most active first team season in midfield and former apprentice Gary Parker is an 18-year-old who spotlighted his growing challenge for regular senior games with his first League goal in February against Wolves.

Trevor Aylott, a £55,000 buy from Millwall last season, missed the early games but was amongst the goals in regular fashion from October until Luton's striking rate first began to dry up at the turn of the year.



WORTHINGTON, Frank S.

(Striker)

Born Halifax, November 1948.

Began his striking with Huddersfield Town as an apprentice on leaving school in 1964, turning professional in November 1966. After appearing in 192 competitive games for the 'Terriers' (49 goals) he was transferred to Leicester City for £70,000 in August 1972. For the 'Filberts' he amassed 239 League and Cup outings (78 goals) and then moved to Bolton Wanderers in September 1977 for £87,000.

At Burnden Park he became an instant success and in 88 matches he hit another 38 goals, taking his tally to way past the 150 mark in serious competitive

He left Bolton in November 1979 signing for Blues in a £150,000 transaction. and at St Andrews he continued to upset the defences, claiming 34 goals in 88 major outings. His next move - in March 1982 - took Frank to Leeds United in a player/exchange deal involving Byron Stevenson, and £100,000 cash. For Leeds he netted 15 times in his 35 outings before going to Sunderland for £50,000, in December 1982. And then during the last close season he made another switch - this time from the North East to the immediate south - when he joined Lawrie McMenemy's Southampton.

Capped eight times by England while with Leicester, Frank also collected two Under-23 caps and represented the Football League XI. During the summer of 1979 - prior to his move to Blues -Frank assisted Philadelphia Fury in the

His record in League Football up to the end of the 1982-83 campaign, looked like this: appearances 591, goals 195. A wonderful striking rate in any form of football.

WRIGHT, Patrick D.

(Full-back)

Born Oldbury, November 1940.

Played in the Handsworth League with Springfield Boys Club before signing apprentice forms for Blues in 1957, turning professional in November 1959. Made his League debut v Blackburn Rovers (A) during that same month after just seven Reserve team outings. Added two more League games to his tally before leaving St Andrews for Shrewsbury Town in September 1962. At the Gay Meadow Pat's career took off, and in five years he played in well over 200 games, scoring three goals. He then tried to improve his status in senior football by joining Derby County in October 1967 but appeared in only 14 first team fixtures for the 'Rams' who sold

him to Rotherham in September 1970 following a stint on loan with Southend earlier in the year. Pat came out of League soccer in England in 1972 and went over to play in the States, returning to this country in 1981.

WRIGHT, William

(Defender)

Born Liverpool, April 1958.

Nephew of the former England and Everton right-back, Tommy Wright, Billy spent almost eight years at Goodison Park before joining Blues in readiness for the start of the 1983-84 season.

He became associated with Everton on leaving school in 1974 and turned professional in August 1976, making his debut in League football against Leicester (H) in February 1978. That was the first of 166 in Division One for Billy during his days with the Merseysiders. He also appeared in 26 domestic Cup-ties and represented England 'B' and the Under-21s (6 caps).

Billy made his League debut in a Blues shirt in the opening game of this campaign against West Ham United at Upton Park, after having played in the pre-season friendlies.



BILLY WRIGHT

WYLIE, Ronald M. (Midfield)

Born Glasgow, August 1933.

A former Scottish Schoolboy international, Ron played for Clydesdale Juniors prior to joining Notts County in 1949 at the age of 16. He turned professional in September 1950 and made his League debut in 1951.

Appeared in well over 250 games, 227 in the League, and scoring 40 goals. All his time with County was spent playing in the Second Division, and in 1956 he had the misfortune to break a leg.



RON WYLIE

County, in fact, were relegated in 1958 and Ron was transferred to Aston Villa in the November of that year for a fee of £9,500, manager Eric Houghton, who had been at Meadow Lane with Ron, completing the appropriate forms in a Birmingham Hotel.

At Villa Park, Ron weathered a shaky start to go on and appear in a total of 250 League and Cup games for the club, winning a Second Division Championship medal in 1960, a League Cup winners tankard in 1961, and collecting a runners-up prize in that competition in 1963 (when Villa met Blues).

He was voted Villa's 'Terrace Trophy' Player of the Year in 1965 and in that very same season was named 'Midland Footballer of the Year'.

He left Villa for St Andrews in June 1965 - £15,000 exchanging hands for his services.


With Blues he continued to create in midfield and before announcing his retirement from the professional scene in the summer of 1970, aged 37, Ron had added a further 149 appearances to his massive tally.

On leaving St Andrews he went back to Villa Park where he became coach. assisting in the team-work which gained Villa promotion from the Third Division in 1972. He left Villa in 1974 and joined Coventry City.

From 1976 to 1981 he was assistantmanager at Highfield Road under Gordon Milne, and afterwards had a spell as coach in Cyprus and managed the Hong Kong club, Bulova, before signing a three-year contract as manager of West Bromwich Albion in July 1982.

In his career Ron played in a total of 551 League matches for County, Villa and Blues, scoring 51 goals.






