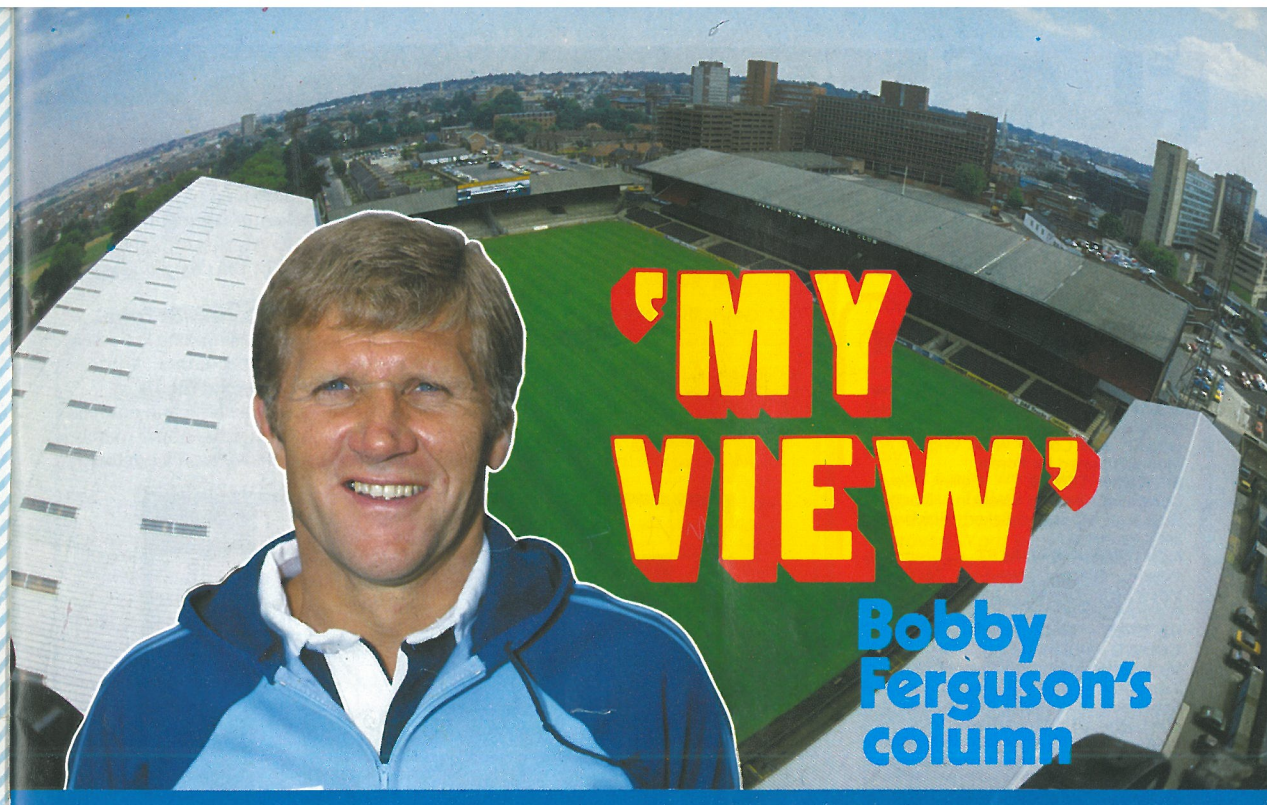
### PROGRAMME AWARD

**H**AVING at last managed to halt our run of consecutive League defeats with last week's draw against Watford, we are hoping to secure what would be a most welcome victory at Luton's expense this afternoon.

It was very encouraging to turn in such a spirited display against the FA Cup semi-finalists. Watford are a side who pressurise opponents and have put their own disappointments behind them this season to challenge for a place in Europe.

With our own problems it meant it was a very nerve-wracking 90 minutes and while we certainly had the chances to win the game I have no doubt Watford went away saying the same thing.

Now we must maintain the improvement against a Luton side who know all about battling against relegation. It wasn't until the very last day of last season that they were able to relax and know that their First Division place was safe.

There are no similar problems for them this term and manager David Pleat is no doubt enjoying life far more from his vantage point in the top half of the table.

We were at Kenilworth Road just over a fortnight ago, of course, and once again it was a case of errors in defence and missed chances, something we cannot risk repeating today.

Apart from the team performance against Watford, the most encouraging aspect of the day was the crowd reaction. I cannot praise our supporters enough for the backing they gave the players and as long as this enthusiasm remains in the stands and on the terraces we will never die.

No doubt our fans enjoyed the debut of new signing Romeo Zondervan who is going to be a great asset to the club, as well as the first home appearance of young Frank Yallop who followed up his debut at Everton the previous week with yet another impressive display.

Our second new signing, goalkeeper Mark Grew, appeared for the first time in our colours at the indoor Soccer Six tournament in Birmingham during the week when he fully justified our decision to spend £60,000 on him.

I kept faith with Paul Cooper against Watford and I thought he responded well to the challenge presented by Mark's arrival at the club. Competition for places at all levels is every manager's aim but I feel priority must be given to the goal-keeping position.

Our injury situation has improved since last week and George Burley came through the midweek reserve game against Watford well enough to

show that he will probably be available today.

Mich D'Avray is also likely to return up front and I am looking to him to put his height to good use. This was something we lacked against Watford, through no fault of our own, and it is an option which Mich provides.

The news of Kevin O'Callaghan, unfortunately, is not so good and he'll be in plaster for another ten days or so in an effort to clear up his achilles tendon injury. Hopefully, this will do the trick and he'll be available for the last few games of the season.

We still have a tremendous battle on our hands to beat the drop but if the determination of our supporters matches that of the players then I have every confidence that we can haul ourselves out of trouble.

I am writing this column prior to the final stages of the Soccer Six competition but no doubt many of our fans enjoyed the players' performance on Tuesday evening when they were the only team not to concede a goal.

I made no secret of the fact that the main attraction of this event was the money at stake but having accepted the invitation to participate we went there wanting to win.

That same attitude will be required today and I hope the vocal encouragement our fans give the players will be rewarded with a long-awaited win.

## 20 years ago

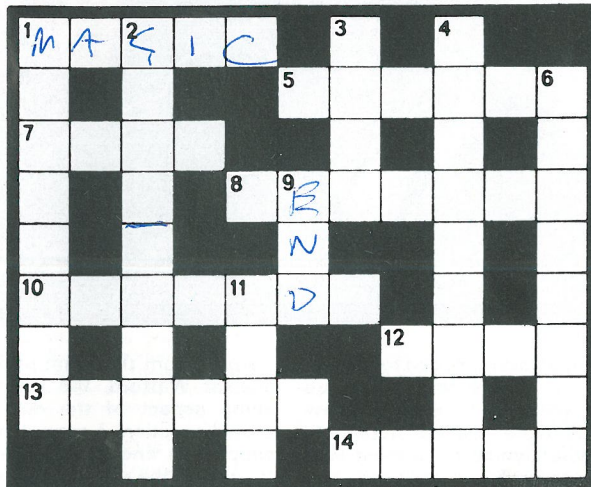

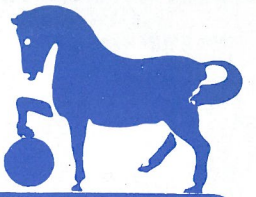

## Meet our MASCOT

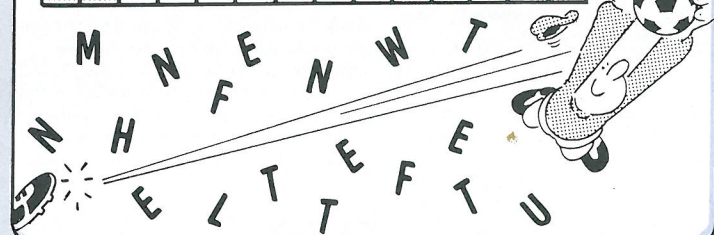

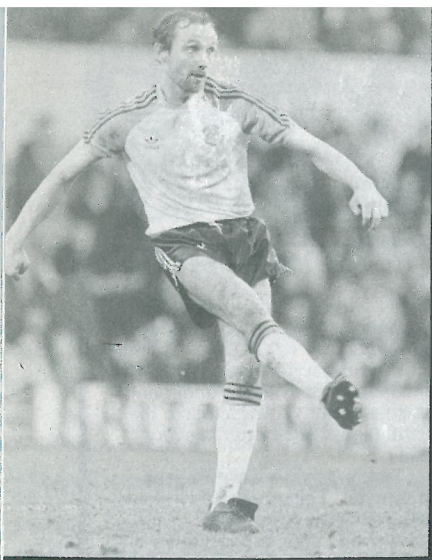


EVERTON 'nickname' v '82 DIV.TWO WINNERS





# LUTON TOWN



BRIAN HORTON

**LES SEALEY** — Goalkeeper who cost £70,000 from Coventry City last summer after his contract expired and he decided on a change of scenery. London-born, he had worked his way through the Sky Blues youth scheme and played well over 100 League games. Not surprisingly, he has been a regular for Luton this season.

**JAKE FINDLAY** — Former first choice goalkeeper who has been forced into the role of deputy since Sealey's arrival. A Scot, he had languished in the Aston Villa reserve side for nine years before Luton paid £100,000 to take him to Kenilworth Road in 1979.

**KIRK STEPHENS** — A bargain buy from Nuneaton, manager David Pleat's former club, who soon claimed a regular place in the side and has made a significant contribution to the club's

progress in recent years. He has pace, is strong in the tackle and likes to get forward at every opportunity but his enthusiasm and attitude, as much as his general ability, has enabled him to make the transition from non-league to First Division.

**MITCHELL THOMAS** — Local youngster whose chance to join the club came through the Manpower Services scheme and he did well enough to earn a professional contract. Capped by England at youth level, his debut came last season in the Milk Cup-tie at Charlton Athletic and he has since become a regular in the number three shirt.

**MAL DONAGHY** — One of David Pleat's first signings for the club in the summer of 1978 when he moved from Larne. A classy defender who has also played in midfield, he is now a regular for Northern Ireland and his uncomplicated style makes him a great club player who rarely misses a game.

**CLIVE GOODYEAR** — Commanding central defender who was signed as a professional in 1978 and seized the opportunity of a first team place when Mike Saxby was injured. He won a Second Division Championship medal

in his first season in the Football League and has always managed to turn in steady and consistent displays at the heart of the defence.

**PAUL ELLIOTT** — His £100,000 transfer from Charlton Athletic last season went a long way towards plugging a leaky Luton defence as he took the move into the First Division in his stride. His debut was successful, Luton drawing 0-0 after conceding 47 goals in their previous 27 games! London-born and the holder of eight England youth caps, he is still only 19 and could yet challenge for senior international honours.

**MIKE SAXBY** — Centre-half who cost a club record fee of £200,000 from Mansfield Town in the summer of 1979. Two years later, after becoming a regular choice, he was injured against Crystal Palace and missed most of Luton's promotion campaign. He spent two months on loan to Grimsby last season which helped him regain fitness.

**BRIAN HORTON** — Club captain who was transferred from Brighton three seasons ago and was the midfield inspiration behind the club's promotion to the First Division. Injury cost him a few appearances recently but his record is impressive and there are few players who contribute more during 90 minutes.

**WAYNE TURNER** — Hard-working defender or midfielder player who returned to Luton after a spell on loan at Lincoln during the 1981-82 season and immediately earned himself a place in the Hatters' first team squad. Last season he made 29 First Division appearances but he has been unable to figure so regularly during the current campaign.

**GARY PARKER** — Spotted player for the Oxfordshire youth side, he was signed as an apprentice in June, 1982, and ten months later became a full-time professional. A midfield player with good vision and a powerful shot, he made his League debut at Manchester United last season.

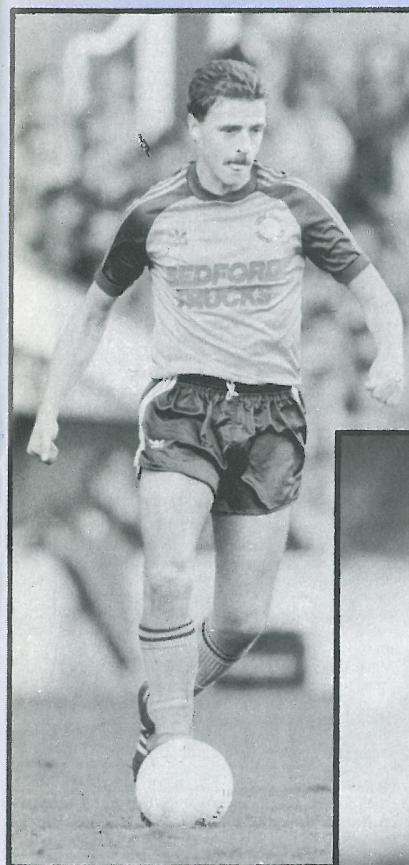
**RAY DANIEL** — Another promising young midfield player whose debut came at Old Trafford last season. An

ex-Luton schoolboys player, he became a Luton apprentice in June, 1981, and signed full-time professional forms 15 months later. He is very skilful, reads the game well and packs a useful shot.

**RICKY HILL** — London-born midfielder player who made his debut back in 1976 at the age of 17 and who last season gained senior England honours. Despite a troublesome injury, he did not miss a single game during the 1982-83 campaign. Difficult to dispossess when in full flight and with an excellent goalscoring record, he is also good in defensive situations.

**RADDY ANTIC** — The club's first continental signing and a Yugoslav international, he arrived for a bargain fee from Spanish club Real Zaragoza. Although used regularly as substitute, he is a big favourite with the Luton fans and was hailed as a hero on the final day of last season when he scored the only goal at Maine Road to condemn Manchester City to the Second Division... and keep Luton up.

**FRANK BUNN** — Birmingham-born forward regularly on target for the reserves but whose first team chances have been restricted due to Messrs Stein and Walsh. A professional since

May, 1980, he is very strong and his unselfish style makes him a favourite with his playing colleagues.

**CHUKWUEMEKA NWAJIOBI** — Striker who prefers to be known simply as Emeke, much to the relief of Pressmen and commentators. He was transferred from Dulwich Hamlet in December, 1983, after only a handful of games for the Isthmian League side and when given his first team chance with Luton he soon proved popular with the fans. He decided to put a pharmacy degree first before entering professional football and this he achieved at the University of Cardiff.

**PAUL WALSH** — Exciting young forward who recently had a £1 million price tag placed on his head by Luton after it was rumoured that both Liverpool and Manchester United were keen to take him north. After winning youth and under-21 caps, he gained senior honours during England's summer tour to Australia last year and was also included against France last month. He was signed from Charlton Athletic, his only previous club.

**TREVOR AYLOTT** — Burly striker who scored both Luton's goals in the 2-1 defeat of Ipswich earlier this month. A Londoner, he started his career with Chelsea, had a brief loan spell at QPR and then moved north to Barnsley. He

was with Millwall last season before Luton paid £50,000 to take him to Kenilworth Road just before the transfer deadline and when they were desperately in need of reinforcements to join the fight against relegation.

**BRIAN STEIN** — Goalscoring forward who partnered club-mate Walsh for England against France last month, a far cry from his early days in the game

He also has an excellent record from the penalty spot and although one of the more senior members of the Luton side he still has a lot to offer.

A WIN and a defeat in our last two games keeps us in mid-table in the Football Combination.

Our game at Leicester City last Saturday was doubtful because of heavy rain but eventually the referee gave the go-ahead although conditions were extremely difficult for the players.

We took longer to adapt than the home side and it was as a result of a mistake by Mick Stockwell, who slipped and fell, that Leicester scored the goal to give themselves a 1-0 interval lead.

However, within 30 seconds of the restart, Iain Sankey pulled us level with his first goal of the season with a crisp, right foot drive.

The goal gave us the boost we needed and we had several chances to go in front but just when it seemed we were going to have to settle for a point we were stunned by a home goal in the last few seconds.

It was disappointing to return from Leicester with nothing to show for our efforts. The lads did well to pull

He started the season in the first team but a broken wrist cost him his place and after being unable to overtake Mark Wallington he was loaned to Oldham Athletic for a spell.

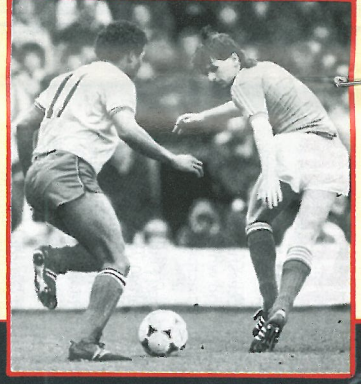

Also on parade at the two-day event was former England youth cap Frank who arrived at Portman Road via Canada, despite the fact that he was born in Watford.

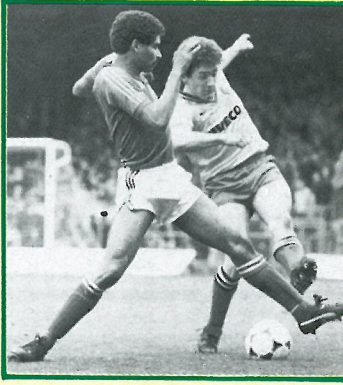
He emigrated to Vancouver with his family when he was only ten but six years later, after three return trips for trials, he was back in England to launch his career with Ipswich.

A combination of the transfer market and the club's prolific youth policy has produced a new-look Ipswich Town line-up.

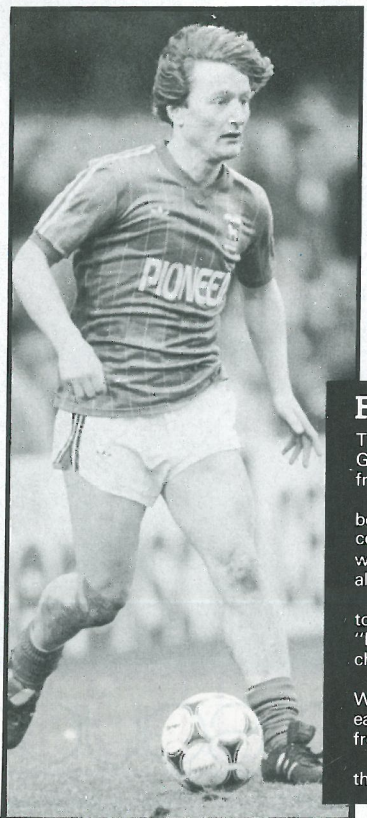

"But for the time being I'm keeping my fingers crossed that I'll be okay. I want to be fit for the last half dozen games of the season."

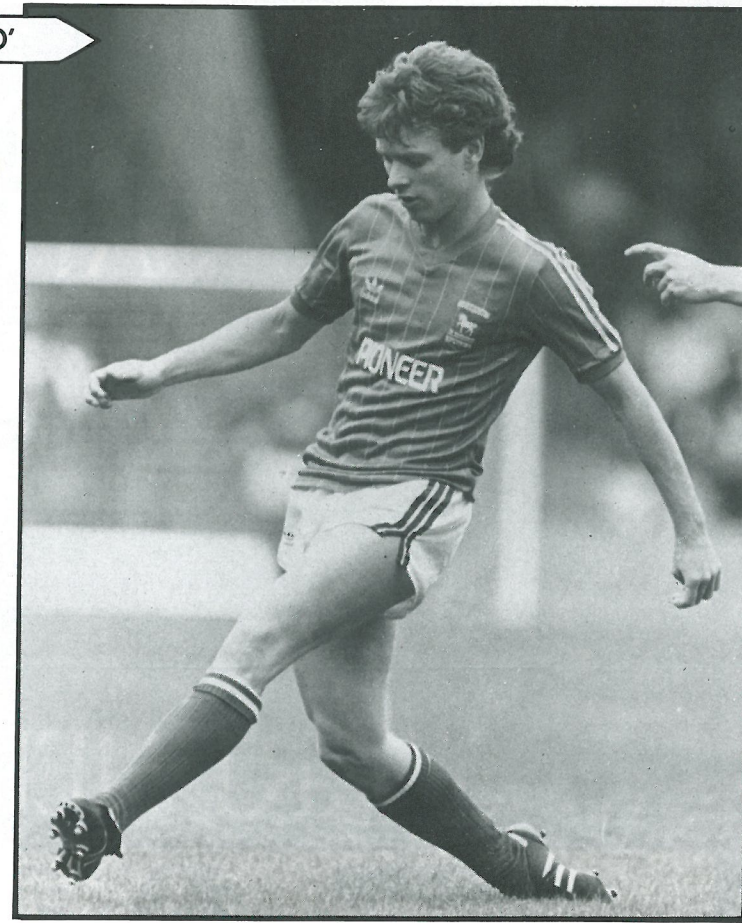
## OLD FRIENDS

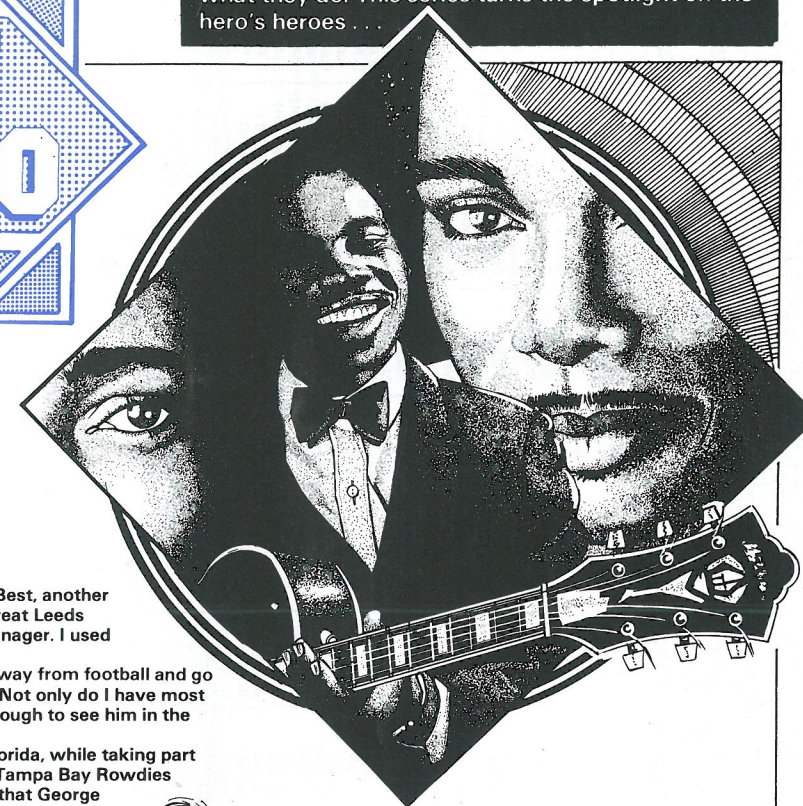

"My first thought was to pick Pele, without a doubt the greatest footballer of all time, but then I learned he was the choice of George Burley and had already been featured," he says.

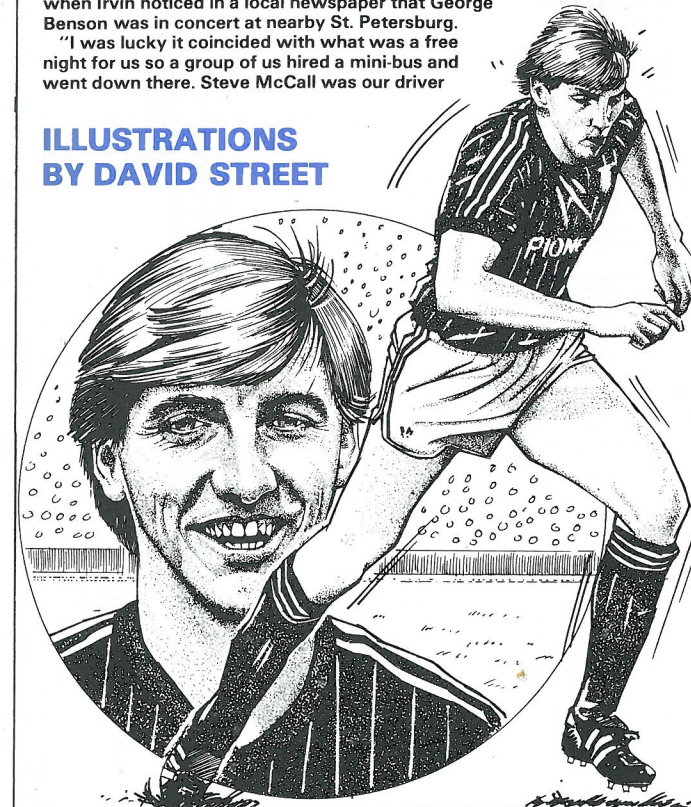
"It crossed my mind to go for George Best, another favourite of mine, or anyone from that great Leeds United side when Don Revie was the manager. I used to idolise them all.

"I was lucky it coincided with what was a free night for us so a group of us hired a mini-bus and went down there. Steve McCall was our driver

# SUPERFANS

GRAEME BROOKE'S debut as an Ipswich supporter coincided with Portman Road's largest-ever attendance.

Now a 20-year-old insurance clerk, Graeme was only 11 at the time and admits: "Being small for my age I hardly saw a thing that day!"

But Graeme must have enjoyed what he did see of the FA Cup quarter-final against Leeds United, in the company of 38,000 other fans, on March 8, 1975. Because he has only missed five home matches since then.

And he explains: "Two of these were due to illness and the other was because I was on a ski-ing holiday in Austria with some friends and we missed a ferry connection after our coach was delayed in Germany. Instead of getting back to Portman Road to see the game against Luton we heard the result on the radio at Ostend Airport!"

Graeme, who lives in Dovercourt, has been a regular away supporter since 1978 when he was in his last year at school and estimates to clock up around 8,000 miles every season in his pursuit of Town.

"There's a regular group of five or six of us who travel all over the country to see the team and because we share the petrol it helps to keep the cost down," he says.

But Graeme also admits to having an understanding boss at the Royal London Insurance offices in Colchester. He explains: "I might not have made it to so many games if I wasn't allowed to take my holidays at such awkward times."

"Midweek games are particularly difficult. There have been times when I've travelled up to Liverpool or Sunderland and not returned home until 5.00 or 6.00 a.m. I have to be up again at 8.00 a.m. for work — and my colleagues at the office are always telling me I must be mad."

Anfield is Graeme's favourite away ground and he hasn't missed a Town game there since 1977. He vows: "I won't miss one until we win but despite the fact that the best we've ever managed there is a draw, I've seen some great tussles."

Graeme and his friends have also seen Town in Europe and he nominates the 4-1 defeat of St. Etienne in France three years ago as the best performance he has ever witnessed by an Ipswich side.

"We travelled by rail to that one," he recalls, "and we were the only five or six Town supporters on the train. We were a target for the French people who mocked us

"It was played on a Friday night and I travelled down by train after work. But due to the trains running late I only arrived in time for the second half and it was eight o'clock the following morning by the time I returned home."

Graeme is in no doubt as to his most enjoyable excursion to see Town play. That was last summer when, along with friends Ray Slegg and Michael Ray, he travelled to Norway to take in Town's three-game tour. "We made up the entire Town support and we had a really great time," he says. "We travelled about 1500 miles by car during our ten days over there and the friendly welcome we received, together with the beautiful scenery, made it a terrific trip."



"The highlight was being invited back to the team's hotel after the game in Stavanger by Bobby Ferguson. We had a meal with the players and really appreciated the gesture."

"We arrived back on the ferry to Harwich at six o'clock on the Monday evening and got to Portman Road just in time for George Burley's Testimonial match against Aberdeen!"

and told us our team stood no chance.

"The lads really turned it on that night and although I'll never forget our FA Cup win in 1978 and the UEFA Cup victory three years later I'd say the display against St. Etienne stands above all others."

Distance rarely comes between Graeme and his favourite club. He thought nothing, for example, of driving to Glasgow to see the pre-season friendly against Rangers three years ago or of getting behind the wheel and heading for Aberdeen when Town won 1-0 in a Testimonial match for the Dons' veteran striker Drew Jarvis.

"I got back from Aberdeen in the early hours of the Monday morning," he remembers, "but another pre-season game at Swindon, which should have been easy, gave me far more trouble."

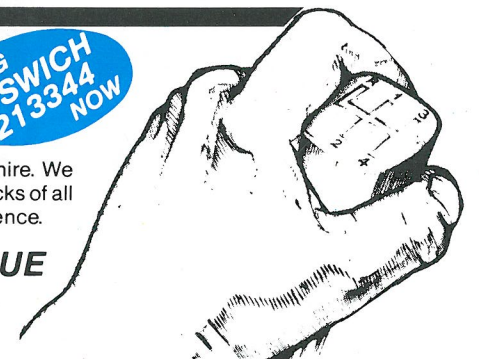
