personal goal famine which had stretched over the previous ten games.

The Town's problem was that for all their promise in attack final passes went astray too often, and while they had enough pressure to deserve more goals they never had the coolness in the box to get them.

Garry Parker kept them moving forward from midfield, but it was the defence who had to work hardest for most of the game, and goalkeeper Les Sealey again distinguished himself.

The Town looked a better combination than they had done at Tottenham, but there was no denying

West Ham's greater self-confidence in the early stages.

Brian Stein, still some way short of the sharpness that made him an England player earlier this season, had an early shot well saved by Phil Parkes but West Ham's increasing con-

trol brought them the first goal in the 23rd minute.

Paul Elliott did well to keep Dave Swindlehurst quiet, but while he was watching him, Tony Cottee was left unmarked to race through the middle and score after Geoff Pike's through ball had been flicked on by Paul Allen.

The Town tried to fight back and Frank Bunn almost gave Parker a scoring chance.

Walsh produced another when he beat Frank Lampard and crossed hard and low, but David Moss's shot on the turn was pushed round the post by Parkes.

West Ham conjured up a goal of pure skill to halt the Town's attempted revival. Pike broke on the right, pulled the ball back when he was unable to beat Mitchell Thomas, and Allen's delicate diagonal chip was headed in by Alvin Martin.

Both sides lived dangerously after that, and early in the second half the Town began to get their game together better than they have done for some time.

They took risks at the back by pushing forward, but Sealey made two superb saves, one from Trevor Brooking, and the other from Cottee.

And it was West Ham who looked rocky when Walsh scored in the 64th minute. Brian Horton started the move with a winning tackle in midfield;

he passed to Bunn who went down the right flank, leaving Steve Walford stranded, and delivered an inviting low cross.

Stein's miss-hit shot was blocked, but Walsh reacted quicker than anyone to score from close range.

Stein missed a reasonable chance three minutes later; with Sealey keeping the Town in it with saves from Swindlehurst and Cottee.

The Hammers were looking worried and the Town should have equalised in the 78th minute when Stein tricked his way past Billy Bonds.

The ball ran loose, but from an angle, Walsh lashed the chance wide of the near post.

Two minutes later West Ham settled it, thanks to a lucky bounce from a long cross. The ball ran loose to Cottee who helped himself to his second goal to kill off the Town's resistance.
