Things went from bad to worse in the second half as United became more and more frustrated in their efforts to score and with five minutes to go and the United defence in a tangle Denis Law, who was back with City after spending the peak years of his career with United, backheeled the ball past Alec Stepney to seal his former club's fate.

Law hated the experience and slunk back towards the centre circle while the crowd invaded the pitch. Referee David Smith took the players off the field and, with no sign of the pitch being cleared, a few minutes later abandoned the match.

The score of 1-0 stood and just about the only First Division match to last just 86 minutes was over. 56,996 were there to see it.

If seems an age to Nicky Platnauer, but in a little over two years he has gone from being a bank clerk with ambitions to play professional football to being a near automatic choice in the First Division.

The blonde haired utility player has embodied all that Manager Bobby Gould has demanded in terms of determination, effort and fighting spirit and it has earned him appearances in 38 Sky Blue matches this season — his first at Division One level.

Yet the modest Nicky says: "I don't don't consider myself a regular first teamer by any means. I could only say that if I was being picked week after week in one position, but I have been filling-in a variety of different roles."

In fact he has donned seven different shirts in the season's kaleidoscope and he frankly admits: "I do not know which is my best position.

"I have played up front, midfield, wide on the left and at left back but I suppose I shall probably end up as an attacking midfield player, so you could say that it is my best spot. But I would play anywhere for the good of the team."

Nicky's astonishing rise to prominence began a couple of years ago when he was playing for non-League Bedford Town which at the time was managed by Bobby Gould's brother Trevor - another former Sky Blue.

When Bedford sadly went out of business Bobby stepped in to sign the non-stop young man who always seemed to be in the thick of the on-field action, and took him to Third Division Bristol Rovers.

He wasted no time in demonstrating to the Bristol folk his aptitude for hard work. It bought him 7 goals in 21 League matches last season and virtually guarnateed that Bobby Gould would bring him to the Sky Blues when he was appointed manager here last Summer.

He got his chance early, going on as substitute in the opening match of the season at Watford when he brought delighted smiles to the faces of the Sky Blue fans with a series of determined forays deep into the Watford defence.

He has been involved in virtually every match since, apart from an 8 week lay-off with a pelvic injury, from which he has thankfully fully recovered.

He has much to reflect on with satisfaction. His best all-round performances of the season he believes were in the 4-0 defeat of Liverpool at Highfield Road and the 2-1 defeat of Sunderland. His great strength to any team is that he probably shows up in both penalty areas more than any other player on the pitch, and he has weighed in with a useful 5 goals for the Sky Blues.

"The one I enjoyed most was the winner against Forest a couple of weeks ago. We knew we badly needed the points from that match and we produced a great all round team effort on the day," says Nick.

But for all his massive effort this season he says: "I am still very much learning the game at this level. I want to stay with Coventry City. I have bought a house here and I have one year of my contract to go. I hope to produce enough next season to convince the club to keep me on. I hope to be a better player next season as a result of what I have learned this year."

"HODGIE'S" BOYS

in the European Youth Tournament in Russia at the end of this month, and two of them are goalkeepers, which is a remarkable tribute to the coaching skills of Alan Hodgkinson.

"Hodgie" the former Sheffield United and England goalkeeper has emerged as the leading coach in his specialist field in this country. He is goalkeeper coach to the England Youth squad and it is no coincidence that the Sky Blues have two such talented teenagers as Perry Suckling and Tim Dalton between the posts.

Alan will be in Moscow with the England Youth team for the championships and he expects Perry to be England's goalkeeper to add to the 12 youth caps that the youngster has already won.

Tim Dalton is almost certain to be the Republic of Ireland's goalkeeper in the championships, but there are no favourites where "Hodgie" is concerned.

"That is one of the great things about him," enthuses Perry. "He is just as pleased whichever of us does well. He is like a second Dad to Tim. myself and 17 years old Paul Whittington, but like any Dad he treats us all the same. Young Paul has come on 100 per cent under Alan's coaching and things are really looking good for the club for years ahead on the goalkeeping side of things. Goalkeepers do not peak until they are 26 or 27 years old so we have all got a lot of improving to do and 'Hodgie' is the man to get the best out of us.

Perry and Tim are approaching their maximum heights at the age of 18, and now they can expect to build muscle on to their sturdy frames. Perry confesses however to being surprised at just how massive rival goalkeepers are.

"I know goalkeepers are usually bigger than outfield players, but it shook me to see Mervyn Day for example at Aston Villa. I had seen him on television and I thought he was quite slight, but when I stood next to him he was absolutely massive. It was the same with Nigel Spink

and Gary Bailey - they are huge and I felt quite puny. I realised that you need bulk to command the penalty area and that's what these fellows have. Day for instance had enormous shoulders, but I suppose all that will come with a few years of our twice weekly training sessions under 'Hodaie.'

Today Perry finds himself lining up at the opposite end to his schooldays idol Les Sealey. They went to the same school -Leyton High in Essex, although Les had left when Perry arrived there. "Les' picture was on the wall of the school hall and it was always my ambition to emulate him and play in the First Division," says Perry. "I never dreamed it would be at the same





We mourn today a very good friend of Coventry City Football Club and of the city of Coventry.

Mr Phil Mead, a director of this football club for 35 years, was tragically killed in a road accident last week. He was 76. Everyone connected with this football club extends their deepest sympathy to his widow Muriel and their two sons, Tony and Roger. Mr Mead was christened James Reginald, but was known throughout the sporting, financial and business worlds simply as "Phil". It was a nickname

he acquired in his hometown of Brighton after the famous England cricketer of that name. His influence and friendship in this city extended far beyond the football club. He was a chartered accountant who became a partner and later consultant with Daffern & Co. He was a magistrate. He helped to form the Engineering Industries Association after the war, he was a former treasurer of the University of Warwick and he played a leading role in persuading this country's major orchestras to perform at the university concert hall. Many people benefited from Phil Mead's friendship.

There were those he helped directly and those he assisted through his many anonymous donations to worthy causes. He aided Coventry Boys Club and West Midlands Sports Centre for the Disabled in Coventry. He was also closely linked in helping pupils of drama at Sidney Stringer

Te was also closely linked in helping pupils of drama at Sidney Stringe School in Coventry to make trips to Russia and Amercia.

This Summer he was to have been honoured by Warwick University which was to have conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters. He loved to be involved in his local community and it was typical of him that on the night of his death he had just left a meeting to help organise his local village fete in Stoneleigh. George Curtis, Executive Director of Coventry City Football Club said: "Mr Mead will be sadly missed.

He was always smiling, always ready to help and always talked commonsense. He was a friend not only to this club, but to this city." There will be many people in this stadium this afternoon with their own personal memory of Phil Mead. One minute's silence will be observed prior to the match.

Four draws during March and four defeats during April have plunged Luton Town back down to mid-table just when it seemed that in this, their second season back in Division One, they might well end up with a place in Europe for next season.

Even so their attractive style of play allied to a remarkable recovery from the brink of financial ruin a few years ago make this little club popular with football fans in general and if foday's game produces as many goals as the corresponding one last season or the one at Kenilworth Road in December then we are in for a treat.



Founded in 1885, the 'Hatters' turned professional in 1890, the first team in the south of England to do so and had a short spell in Division Two from 1887 to 1900 before having to wait twenty years before becoming founder-members of Division Three (South) when that was formed from the Southern League.

There they remained until 1937 when climbing to Division Two and then 1955 they climbed into Division One for the first time ever. Four years later they reached the F.A. Cup final, going down 2-1 to Nottingham Forest at Wembley, but then came a decline. They slipped to Division Two in 1960, to Division Three in 1963 and to Division Four in 1965 to join Brentford as the only clubs at that time to have slipped all the way from Division One to Division Four.

Incredibly they had climbed back up to Division One again by 1974, but they stayed up for just one season in the midst of servere financial problems. They weathered the storm and in 1981/2 topped Division Two by a clear eight points after losing only four games all season.


Last season they began well enough, but a poor home record with only seven wins at Kenilworth Road all season let them down and it was fitting that their sixth away win of the season (at Manchester City in the very last match) served to keep them up.

THIS EESON

There have been no such problems this season for manager DAVID PLEAT (now in his sixth season at the helm) even though there has been a tendency to play their best football away from home. The 4-2 home defeat by us followed one by a similar scoreline at the hands of Spurs and yet during the same period they chalked up four successive away wins at Q.P.R., Watford, Stoke and Notts County. Their best performances recently have been draws at Aston Villa, Birmingham and Norwich while a 3-2 win over Notts County ended a lean spell at Kenilworth Road.

Former Charition striker PAUL WALSH is currently leading scorer for the second successive season with support up front from DAVID MOSS (ex-Swindon) and young striker GARY PARKER, who made his debut last season. BRIAN STEIN, now in his seventh season and RADDY ANTIC, who got the goal that kept them up last season, may also be pressing forward from midfield where they link up with skipper BRIAN HORTON, now in his third season at Luton and a player who has given tremendous service in the Football League since being released by Walsall in 1966.

PAUL ELLIOTI (from Chariton last season) and Northern Ireland World Cup hero MAL DONAGHY are likely to be the heart of the defence with KIRK STEPHENS (from Nuneaton in 1978) and MITCH THOMAS (who made his debut last season) on the flanks and our old friend LES SEALEY in goal.
