

Details are in the final stages, such that we could be playing in one of the major cities in


Sweden on Tuesday, 2nd October, against

After four years with Vancouver Whitecaps in Canada, Albion physiotherapist George Wright is now well under way in his second spell at The Hawthorns in charge of the limping, wounded and sick. He points out that the game hasn't changed but players' attitudes are a little less urgent. George, who had a long association with the club from 1971—when he came from Arsenal with Don Howe—until 1980, was asked to 'come back' to West Bromwich Albion by manager Johnny Giles, and without hesitation George said: "OK:'

I'm happy to be back with the club,' smiled George, who added: "There are just eight players left on the staff who were here when I was last at The Hawthorns—"Robbo, Derek Statham, Gary 'O,' Martyn, big 'C,' Barry Cowdrill, 'Crossy' and Tony Godden."

He also mentioned about promotion in 1976, and from that great day's winning team there is only Ally Robertson still on the staff.


Going back to his days with the Whitecaps, George enjoyedhis stay over in Canada, and among the players who climbed on his treatment table while he was physio there were some big names—Rudi Krol, Frans Thijssen, Alan Ball, Dave Watson, Terry Yorath, David Harvey, Peter Lorimer, Kevin Hector and John Wile, to name but a few, and he sends his apologies if he's missed someone who feels he should have got a mention!

Football in the N.A.S.L. was different to what it is over here in England, although it's 50-50 as far as the types of pitches are concerned...half of them (including the Whitecaps) are astro-turf, while the other half are good old grass, albeit not quite as good as the British turf!

''Injuries did crop up—they always do—in whatever sport you take part in,'' said George. ''And the injured players had to be treated just like they are over here.''

At this point I asked George if he had found any new machinery and treatment apparatus which was different to what he had seen before. "I certainly did," was the reply. "The Albion Directors have told me that 'yes' I can have it. I hope it will be here at The Hawthorns pretty soon."

The two machines which interested George most of all were both of the Electro-Medical types — one similar to accipuncture (for pain-relief) and the other for healing injuries very much quicker than instruments can over here.

Now 'back home' with his wife and family in Sutton Coldfield, George hopes to see Albion striving for honours with a full squad to choose from. • HE PLAYED FOR BOTH

Eddie Connelly was a truly wonderful inside-forward, potent, brainy and dangerous near goal. But his displays from time to time were marred by a flaming temper.

A Scot-born in Dumbarton in December 1916 Eddie began his footballing career with Rosslyn Juniors in 1933 and from there he went to Newcastle United for £90 in March 1935.

Made his League debut for the 'Geordies' versus Manchester United at Old Trafford in January 1936, at the age of 19 and at the time seemed destined for great feats.

Made a total of 30 League and Cup appearances for Newcastle (nine goals) before transferring South to Luton Town in March 1938, for a fee of £2,100.

Buzzed a little bit for the 'Hatters' and netted three goals in nine League games at the end of that 1937-38 season.

The following campaign he scored six times in 23 League outings and just prior to the ill-fated 1939-40 season he was sold by Luton to Albion for £2,000.

Would have surely gained international honours for Scotland had not the war interupted his—and all the others players'—careers from 1939 to 1945. But he did play 68 games in Albion's colours during the hostilities, scoring 16 goals.

He returned to Kenilworth Road, home of Luton Town, in April 1946— again £2,000 changed hands—and in his second spell with the 'Hatters' Eddie conjured up some more skills in making a further 38 League appearances (eight goals).

He then switched his services to Leyton Orient (June 1948) and after adding another 32 League matches and five goals to his overall tally he left Brisbane Road for Brighton in October 1949.

Made only six appearances for the 'other' Albion (one goal) before he retired from competitive football in 1951, at the age of 34.

Yes, there is no doubt at all that Eddie Connelly was an excellent footballer. At times he was criticised for over doing the fancy tricks but he certainly had craft and indeed there was a lot of good in Edward Connelly.







Annual General Meeting Report...



The 94th Annual General Meeting of the Company did not pass off without incident. However, in keeping with the customary family spirit of the Club all certainly ended well, particularly for Mr John G. Silk and Trevor Summers.

With Mr Millichip's and Mr Gordon's retirement from the Board leaving the way open for two new Directors and with six eminent business men, Baggies each and every one, seeking election, it was no surprise that on a hot humid evening the Spring Road gymnasium was humming with expectancy with a 'gate' some 50% up on the norm, when Mr Lucas opened the meeting.

Mr Lucas was happy to report a drastic reduction in the operating loss but he was quick to point out that unlike the past year or two the Club could not enjoy the buffer of having monies still to come in for the transfer of players; consequently, belts would have to be tightened still further.

Mr Millichip was elected President, with retiring President Mr Gaunt becoming a Life Member of the Club, both appointments being seconded by loud applause from the Shareholders.


Mr Hall was re-elected Vice-President for a further term in office. As previously reported. Messrs Silk and Summers were the two candidates voted in as Directors and for Messrs Foster, Andrews,

All six candidates had to endure an hour long count before the results were announced.

The only real sad note came when those present were requested to stand for a few moments silence in memory of departed friends.

AACKENZIE, BACK IN BUSINESS!

From 28th August 1982, until 4th October 1983—a period of 402 days, Steve MacKenzie was absent from Albion's first-team throughinjury. And during that long, agonising break, the 22-yearold, Essex-born, midfielder was perhaps the most unhappiest footballer anywhere in the country, never mind around The Hawthorns.

He suffered a serious, long drawn-out, pelvic injury and he had to undergo long spells of physiotherapy treatment, dogged training sessions—a lot of the time on his own—and then, after a couple of visits to see specialists in London, he gradually began to claw himself back into top-class competitive soccer action. And now thankfully 'Macka' is back in business—and he's hoping that season 1984-85 will see him show his full potential as a strong running, creative midfield player with the 'Baggies.'


He's already collected caps for England Under-21's but Steve's aim right now is to go one better and follow his fellow midfield colleague Steve Hunt into England's senior squad.

There's no reason at all why he shouldn't. He's got ability, stamina and a cracking good shot. He's fighting fit right now and eager to go places. At present his career has seen him serve with three clubs—Crystal Palace, Manchester City and Albion.

For the Londoners (Palace) he appeared in a total of just four irst-team games—none of them at League or Cup level. He was hen transferred from Selhurst Park to Maine Road for a fee of 250,000 in July 1978—the same month he turned professional. Ie was only 17 at the time and became one of the costliest senagers in the game.

Under Malcolm Allison, Stevehada total of 77 senior outings for Manchester City, scoring ten goals including a block-buster against Tottenham Hotspur in the 1981 F.A. Cup Final at against Tc Wembley.

During the summer following that Cup Final appearance heleft City to join Albion for £650,000 and in his first season at The Hawthorns (1981-82) Steve turned out in 37 First Division games, five F.A. Cup-ties, nine League Cup-ties and two U.E.F.A. Cup-ties, scoring seven goals in all. The next season—that disastrous one of 1982-83—he made just the one appearance—in the opening fixture at Liverpool—and last term he managed to play in 22 League and Cup matches, scoring four goals.



I simply do not accept that because England were not in there battling for supremacy that the tournament should suddenly become as magnetic as an unwanted 'B' side recording.

But that is what happened. Only the Final was shown 'live' by B.B.C. and the rest of the two-week long delicacies were sardined into as little space and time as possible.

Obviously those heads-in-thesand felt that we were not particularly interested in events which do not figure British participation. If that be the case why did they show the Olympic Games Final of the 100 metres?

We weren't interested in seeing

the magnificent Carl Lewis in action. Not much we weren't!

It would have been just as captivating to watch the exciting French in full flow...the emergence of Portugal...the destruction of the Germans. And so much more.

But the heads-in-the-sands were probably trying to ease the financial pain inflicted by the massive cost of covering the Olympics. If that was the case, I could well have done without some of the weightlifting, rowing, or even the swimming (up to the Finals).

And how synchro-swimming can be described as a sport is beyond me. I must confess to amazement at the way the young things stick their feet in the air well out of the water for minutes on end when I can hardly get my big toe to the surface!

But a sport ... No ... No ... No ... No ... No ... Chipperfield's Circus, maybe!

Domestic football returned to our screens with the start of the season and brought withit likes of Jimmy Hill and John Motson. It was enough to make me want to switch off.

They should be called the 'Drone Brothers', who are doing for TV commentating what bad coaching has done for the game itself.

Why they do not simply allow the excellence of the camera work tell the story, punctuated by the odd word or two, is beyond me. You would think they were capable of seeing something which for ordinary mortals such as you and me was impossible.




