EVERY MAN in the team had cause to walk off with pride after Luton Town saw off Watford in a hectic and fascinating local derby.


Watford shaded the first half, lost the lead twice, and were outplayed after the break and are now pinned deeper in the relegation zone after only one victory in 11 league
