Reg Hawley was 75 years old last week and all at Sheffield Wednesday send him our best wishes and thanks. By the way, it's not necessary to ring, offering Reg a home. When I say he occupies the box, he doesn't live there! Reg, of course, is a very keen amateur video enthusiast and records all our home games and some of our away games for my personal use. I should like to think that at 75 my life will be as active and full as the hectic existence Reg pursues.

We have had lots of enquiries as to the availability of these recordings to our fans. Our first enquiries threw up all sorts of restricting regulations and copyright rules, however, in the light of what is happening at other clubs, Dick Chester has reopened his investigations and, hopefully, these will prove fruitful in the near future.

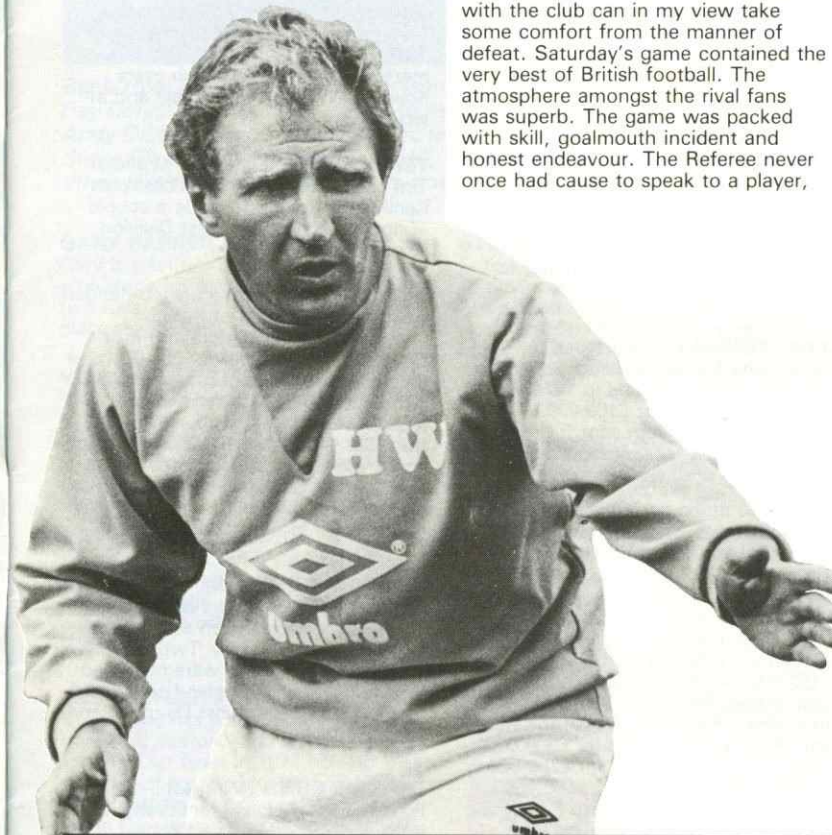
Tonight's game against Luton gives us a quick opportunity to bounce back from our result at Watford. Losing football matches is personally a bitterly disappointing experience. I have enough respect for the players now at this club to know that such bitter disappointment is shared by them. Fortunately in my sixteen months here, such disappointments have been rare. However, all those associated with the club can in my view take some comfort from the manner of defeat. Saturday's game contained the very best of British football. The atmosphere amongst the rival fans was superb. The game was packed with skill, goalmouth incident and honest endeavour. The Referee never once had cause to speak to a player,

no dissent, no retaliation, no dishonest, malicious fouls. One outstanding feature missed in most reports of the game was the fact that neither trainer was ever called upon. The game was full of hard, physical challenges, but the players responded magnificently. Some of the deliberate shamming and feigning of injury that takes place these days is appalling, resulting often in crowd tensions and unrest, and increasing ill feeling amongst opposing players. Referees cannot do anything about this! It is the job of Managers to manage. We must accept the responsibility of changing the attitudes of our players and affecting their behaviour for the better.

Of course, our 1-0 defeat at Watford was our third defeat in four league games, all of them by the odd goal. Against Coventry and Norwich we had penalties saved at crucial times, on Saturday we were denied by the post. I have frequently been asked during the past three weeks whether I would be rethinking my approach. I think about this all the time in an effort to improve matters, but as far as rejecting my principles at the first hint of a hiccup, NO CHANCE.

In the past sixteen months this club has been changed upside down. I say that with no disrespect to previous incumbents. In some respects our rapid progress has outpaced our ability to deal with it. Time will prove, I'm sure, that our approach is right and potentially successful. We are relatively inexperienced and still freshfaced, at this level and there's still a long way to go. Small setbacks merely strengthen my resolve to produce one of the country's most successful clubs here in Sheffield. You can help by continuing to show the sort of undying faith and support that was particularly evident during the latter stages of the games at Watford and Coventry.

Those of you who travelled to Luton will realise, we'll have to pull out all the stops tonight if we are to overcome David Pleat's very talented team. We need all the help you can give us.

PLENTY OF MILK CUP GOALS FOR LUTON

Luton are renowned for their attacking football and we have certainly been seeing the best of them in the Milk Cup this season. The Hatters kicked off with a 4-1 away win at Orient and, by winning their home leg 3-1, took that tie by 7-2 on aggregate.

In the last round they scored a useful 3-1 home victory over Leicester City.

This evening Luton will take a break from their First Division relegation problems to go for another outright victory in the Milk Cup.

Last season Luton finished 16th in the First Division but during the summer they lost two key players. Midfield man Brian Horton moved on to become player-manager of Hull City whilst England striker Paul Walsh joined Liverpool for £700,000.

For a club operating on a fairly small experienced squad, Luton have naturally been finding it difficult to come to terms with those losses.

It is hoped that the recent arrival of that stylish former England central defender Colin Todd will bring more stability into the defence. And Mr. Pleat signed striker Steve Elliott to play alongside Brian Stein in attack.

Republic of Ireland international midfielder man Ashley Grimes was among other summer signings. He played at left-back for the opening weeks of the season but has been out of the side recently. And Vince Hilaire, an England "B" and under-21 international midfielder, has made only occasional appearances.

One of the biggest successes has been goalkeeper Andy Dibble, a Welsh under-21 cap signed from Cardiff City.

An injury to England under-21 central defender Paul Elliott created further problems for Mr. Pleat.

So this is proving to be something of a transitional season for the Hatters and, in his search for his strongest team., Mr. Pleat has so far called upon 19 players. In the circumstances, it is not difficult to appreciate why performances have been inconsistent.

Unless they won at Manchester United on Saturday, Luton have won only one away game in the First Division, on Queens Park Rangers' artificial pitch (3-2) last month. They drew at Ipswich (1-1) but have been beaten in their other away games at West Bromwich (-04), Nottingham Forest (1-3), Tottenham (2-4), Sunderland (0-3) and Norwich (0-3).

adidas

The Hatters' side is likely to be chosen from:

ANDY DIBBLE (goalkeeper)
Andy developed in Cardiff City's junior teams and made his first league appearance for the Bluebirds in 1982. He won a regular place two seasons ago and won three Wales under-21 caps before his £125,000 transfer to Luton this summer.

JAKE FINDLAY (Goalkeeper).
Jake made his league debut for Aston Villa against Sunderland in 1974 and Luton signed him for £100,000 in 1978. He held the first-team spot for more than four years. Last season he spent a short loan spell with Barnsley.

COLIN TODD (Defender)
Colin's stylish defensive displays earned him 27 England caps in his Derby County days. In his early days with Sunderland, he earned England youth honours and 14 under-23 caps and when he joined Derby in 1971 the £150,000 fee was a new record for a cash transaction. Colin spent more than seven happy years with the Rams and then joined Everton for £300,000. Birmingham signed him for £250,000 in 1978 and he was valued at £65,000 when he joined Nottingham Forest in 1982. He spent a short period with Oxford last season before joining Vancouver Whitecaps. Luton signed him last month.

MITCHELL THOMAS (Defender)
Mitchell served his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road, made his league debut two seasons ago and won a regular place towards the end of last season.

STACEY NORTH (Defender)
Stacey graduated through from the youth team and made his first league appearance against W.B.A. on the closing day of last season.

MAL DONAGHY (Defender)
Mal was signed from Larne for £20,000 in 1978 and is now a regular member of the Northern Ireland team, winning his 32nd cap against Rumania this season.

WAYNE TURNER (Defender/Midfield)
Wayne developed in the junior teams and made his league debut in 1979. He was only an occasional first-teamer at first, joining Lincoln on loan in 1981/82, but has been a fairly regular member of the side for two years now, playing both in midfield and at left-back.

TIM BREAKER (Defender/Midfield)
Tim completed his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road and made a couple of appearances in the First Division last season.

ASHLEY GRIMES (Midfield/Defender)
Ashley is a Republic of Ireland international who joined Luton from Coventry this summer for £50,000 plus defender Kirk Stephens. He was first introduced to English football by Manchester United, who signed him from Bohemians, in 1977/78. He made about 100 senior appearances for the Old Trafford club and then joined Coventry for £200,000 in 1983. Ashley has 16 full international caps.

RICKY HILL (Midfield)
Ricky joined the Hatters as a schoolboy and has been a first-team regular for seven years. Two seasons ago his performances were rewarded by a call up to the England squad and he won full caps against Denmark and West Germany.

FRANKIE BUNN (Midfield)
Frankie served his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road and first played in their league eleven in 1980/81. But he was only an occasional first-teamer prior to last season.

GARY PARKER (Midfield)
Gary is a former Hatters' apprentice who made his first senior appearance two seasons ago. He earned a regular place towards the end of last term.

VINCE HILAIRE (Midfield)
Vince entered league soccer with Crystal Palace in 1977 and won nine England under-21 caps with them. He is also an England "B" international. Luton signed him this summer.

RAY DANIEL (Midfield)
Ray is a local lad who served his apprenticeship at Kenilworth Road. He made his league debut two seasons ago and went on loan to Gillingham last season.

BRIAN STEIN (Forward)
Brian, who has scored three Milk Cup goals this season, was blooded in Luton's first-team in 1977 and led their scoring list for the first time in 1980/81 with 19 goals. The following term, when they won promotion, he led the way again with 21. Brian has played once for the full England team and also has three under-21 caps.

STEVE ELLIOTT (Forward)
Luton signed Steve from Preston this summer after he had topped North End's scoring list for the third time in five seasons. He made his league debut for Nottingham Forest in 1979 but moved to Preston a few weeks later.

DAVID MOSS (Forward)
David has twice been Luton's top scorer since transferring from Swindon in 1978. He earned his name as a goalscoring winger with Swindon, claiming 60 goals in just over 200 league games.

CHUK NWAJOBI (Forward)
Chuck was born in Nigeria and previously played for Dulwich Hamlet. He made four league appearances for Luton last season and was recently recalled to the side.

The Man behind the Team...

PRESSURES DON'T CHANGE DAVID PLEAT'S IDEALS

Since leading Luton Town back into the First Division in 1982, David Pleat has spent much of his time facing the threat of relegation. In spite of this, he has always insisted upon getting out of trouble by playing positive, attacking football. Though the Hatters again face relegation, he hasn't changed his outlook.

Tonight he can forget about his First Division worries as he brings his team to Hillsborough seeking further Milk Cup success. Having achieved a Second Division championship success in 1982, Mr. Pleat would now like to go for one of the major trophies.

David Pleat rose from reserve-team coach to team-manager within about three years of joining Luton in 1974. He looked after the second team until Christmas 1977 when he was given the first-team trainer's job. Then, within a matter of weeks, Harry Haslam moved on to Sheffield United and Mr. Pleat found himself in the managerial chair. As a youngster with Nottingham Forest, Mr. Pleat was picked for the England youth team and celebrated his First Division debut for Forest by scoring a goal. But he didn't get a great deal of encouragement at the City Ground so he moved on to Luton in 1964.

He soon won a regular place and he was a member of the Hatters' senior

side for most of his three-year spell with them.

In July 1967 he moved on to Shrewsbury where he remained for only one season. He then signed for Exeter City and spent two seasons in the senior side at St. James Park. Another transfer took him up to Peterborough where he completed his league playing days in 1971.

He then turned his hand to coaching and the chain of events that followed saw him return to his old club at Luton in 1974.

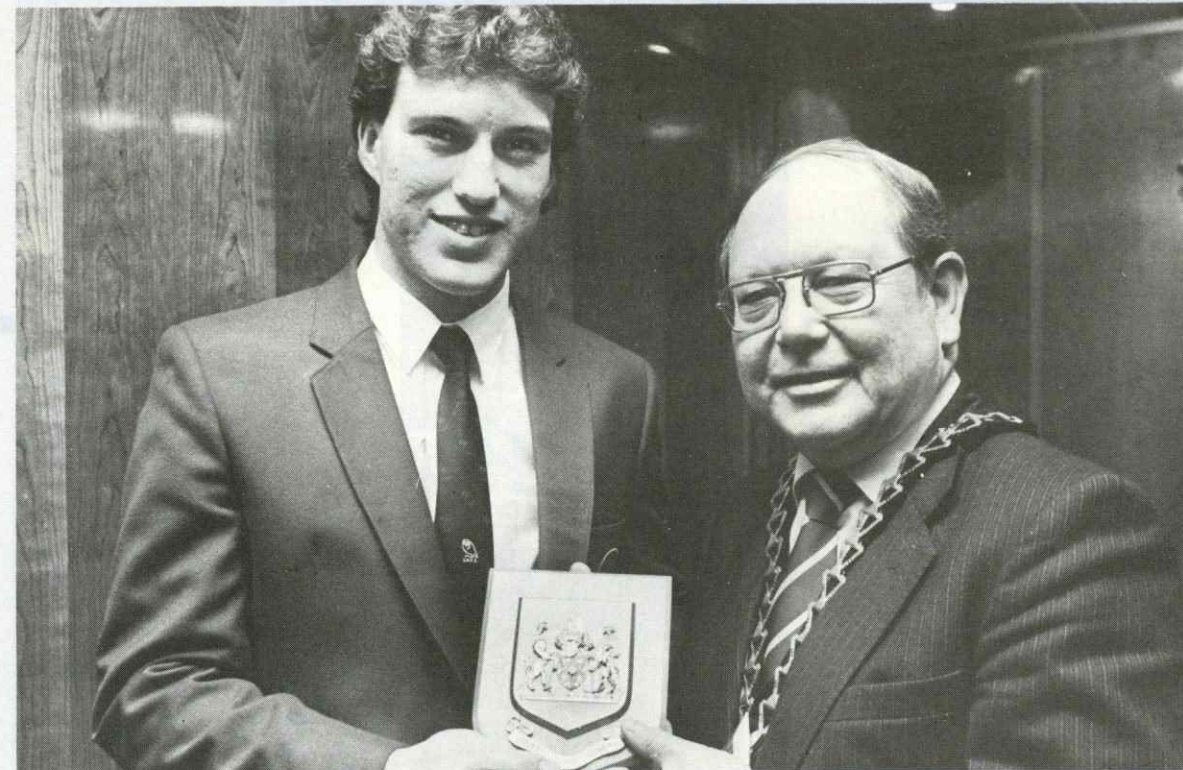

Football League Cup Second Round OWLS v ROTHERHAM UNITED Wednesday, 14th September, 1966

On an atrocious evening, over 20,000 fans were probably wishing that the Owls had continued their boycott of this relatively new competition. Wednesday, unbeaten early First Division league leaders faced their local rivals in their first-ever League Cup-tie and lost to a goal in the last 40 seconds having had what appeared to be a good goal disallowed in the 75th minute.

Programme extract:
"All of us here were pleased and excited when we knew that Rotherham were to be our opponents in the League Cup, a competition we have kept out of before this season. We have always felt here that the League Cup lacked a little something. The top teams in the land have steadfastly refused to enter since its inception and though we do not wish to knock it just for the sake of doing so we felt, sincerely, that it has not caught the imagination of the soccer public to the extent everyone would have liked. We have believed too that the English fixture list is congested enough without another competition and have advocated more than once a reduction of clubs in the First Division before the League Cup could be treated really seriously.

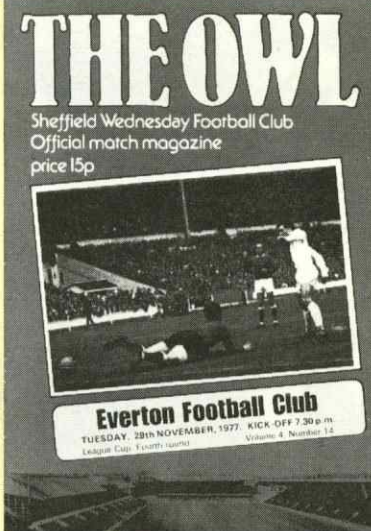

Football League Cup Fourth Round OWLS v EVERTON Tuesday, 29th November, 1977

A match between a team propping up the rest of the Third Division and one of the First Division's Championship contenders appeared to be a formality. In fact the scoreline failed to reflect the evenness of the game until the last half-hour and Everton's third goal just before the end tended to emphasise a difference which was not always apparent.

Tommy Tynan's superb equaliser — which meant he scored in all the four rounds that Wednesday played in — still stands out in the memory of a wonderful crowd of 36,079, some 25,000 more than for the previous Saturday's First Round F.A. Cup tie at Hillsborough against Bury.

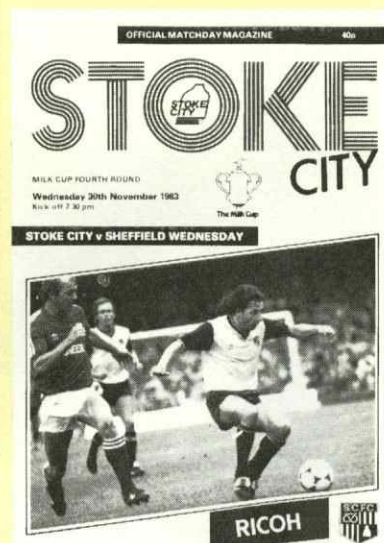
Milk Cup Fourth Round STOKE CITY v OWLS Wednesday, 30th November, 1983

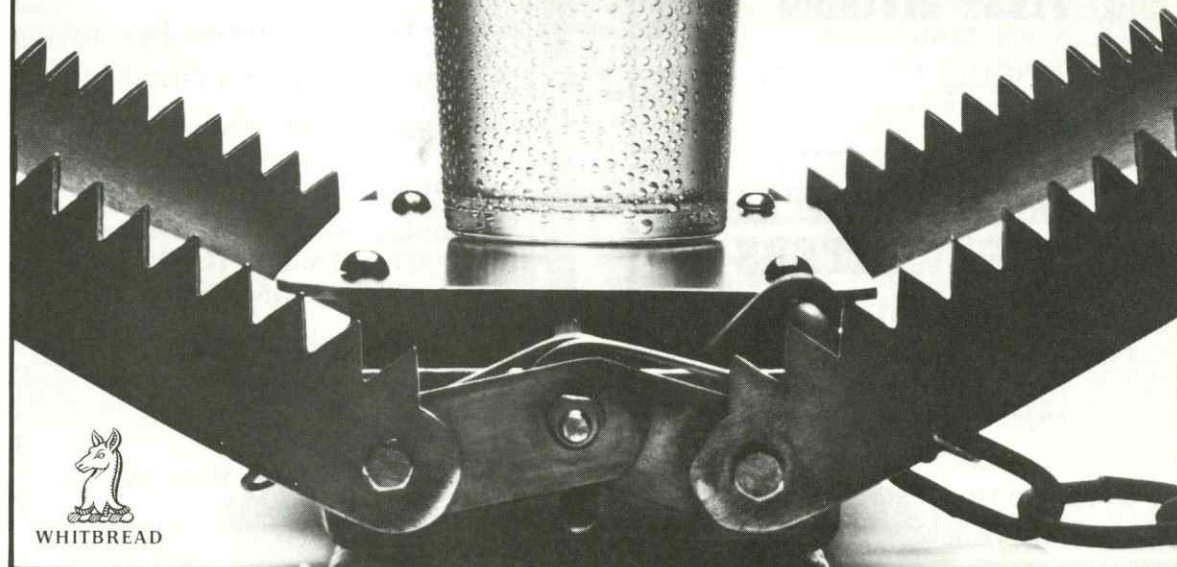

Cup Final programme for instance rarely appears in dealers catalogues. 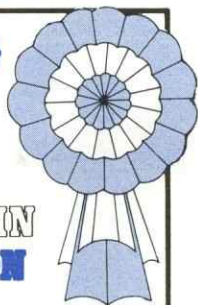

Good evening. A good cup match against Luton in prospect now and next Sunday Arsenal and nationwide TV... what more can you ask for? (No, please don't write and tell me). In the last programme (versus Norwich) I mentioned the media's apparent unwillingness — I was referring particularly to Grandstand, Match of the Day and On the Ball — to recognise the Owls' fine start in the First Division but it was some consolation, on the way to Hillsborough to see the Norwich game, to hear the splendid coverage of the club by Radio 2 with some interesting comments by Peter Eustace, Gary Bannister, and our Supporters Club Secretary Rita Nettleship.

YTV's cameras were at the ground to capture the team's most disappointing home display to date but that wasn't the fault of John Helm & Co. was it? Before that game Sheffield Wednesday had played 16 home games without defeat and Norwich had played 18 away games without a win. After the game I was going around saying that football is all about losing too but not many people seemed convinced.

The next day (Sunday 4th November) Wednesday manager Howard Wilkinson was the guest of Dean Peppall in Radio Hallam's 6.00 p.m. "Face to Face" broadcast. Howard said that the club receives hundred's of requests for the players to respond to worthy causes etc. "I pass this work on to Peter Eustace who deals with it very, very efficiently. Sometimes I wonder if he asks too much of the players but I'm wrong in every case because they always get involved totally. In some instances they have heard of a deserving case first and then made the initial contact which is very encouraging."

Dean then asked: You have now more of a corporate identity at Sheffield Wednesday. This season the players are sporting grey flannels and a club blazer. Is this all part of an overall build up of an awareness within the club that you are part of the community and when you are outside of the club, and particularly on match days, you are representative of that club? "Yes, that's so but I think that

it's bigger than that" Howard replied. "I think that whenever one reads about professional football and professional footballers very often the word is used, if not in error, then certainly lightly. I think that professionalism within our area of occupation is something that leaves a lot to be desired and what we have to do where we can is try to raise standards. Particularly relative to the way the customer views the footballer and the club.

"A uniform is part of that. It is not a desire to quell the individualism within a person. It's not a desire to bring everybody into the machine and turn out the mould the other end... it's nothing to do with that. It's just one of the ways I think that players can be made more aware of their professional responsibilities."

Dean: Did you find that, when you made this announcement that there would be formal attire of jacket and trousers on match days and on certain other occasions, everybody was generally in favour of it and that there was a feeling that the club had moved towards it anyway? Howard: "I don't know that they were all in favour of it." Dean: You got some adverse

reaction then, did you? Howard: "Yes. There was some reluctant resignation because in the main our young players are fashion conscious and they were being asked to rely on the taste of someone else to choose their clothes... which is not something they would always wish.

"I think that, as with everything, they've got used to it. Not only got used to it, but in a sense grown to take a little bit of pride in it. The response by others has been surprising to them. Spectators say how better they think the players look. Journalists remark how impressed they were by the 'collective unit' as they got off the coach. A director at another football club came up to me recently and said how smart our team looked when they went out to Sweden and what an impression they made compared with others who were in the airport concourse. So, perhaps it's a little bit like medicine. When it starts to do you good you start to like the medicine..."

Another probing question by Dean about advice to players on how to protect their private life and deal with unwarranted intrusion on occasions by supporters, got this answer from Howard. "The players have got to learn to say no. Some of them welcome the attention of supporters... some of them enjoy it and that is a natural reaction. Some of them can take it or leave it... some positively dislike it. At some stage in any job you've got to sit down and study the implications and demands of it. Our players have to think about their private lives... how they are to conduct themselves as representatives of Sheffield Wednesday. How they should live their lives as athletes. If they don't want to attract attention they should use their common sense and go somewhere where the odds are that they are not going to be instantly recognised. Football unfortunately can throw this sort of problem at people a little too early. Like the world of pop music, football, because of its nationwide coverage, can throw people into this kind of situation well before they can cope with it on too many occasions. That's one of the disadvantages." (More about this broadcast when space permits).

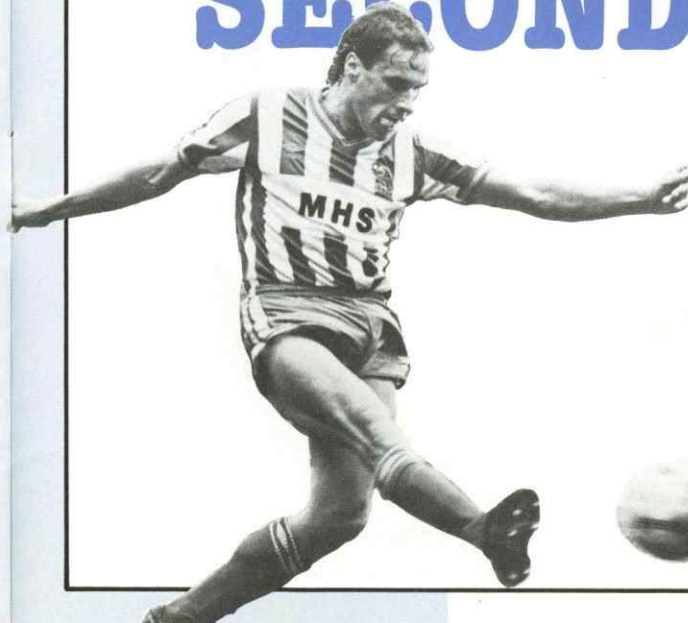

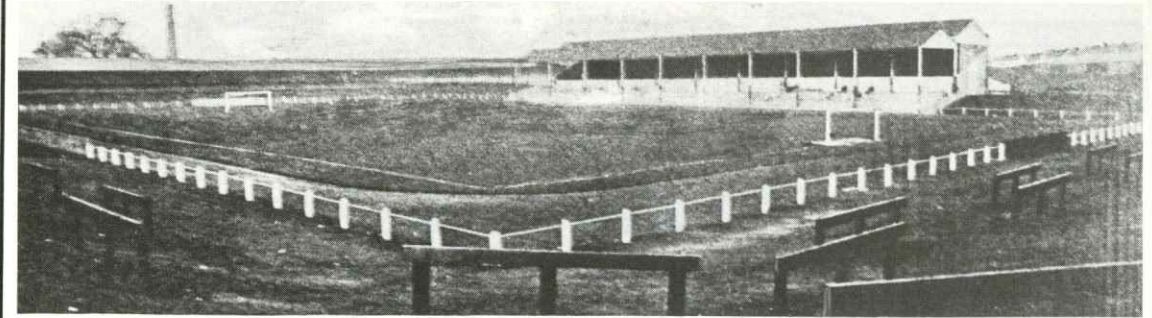

PICTURES FROM THE PAST



The renewed talk of a "cover on the Kop" prompted us to dig out two pictures from the past that sum up the hopes of what was going to be, and the very distant memory of what was the home of Sheffield Wednesday.

The model of a super-stadium, presented for public admiration in the 'sixties, came not long after the construction of the cantilever North Stand. The cost of the stand was then a mammoth £150,000 — but after nearly a quarter of a century of use it stands out as a monument to the club's forward thinking. There seemed no reason then why the revolution shouldn't transform the public's comfort all round the ground, and the concept of an all-seater stadium grew.

One thing you will notice is that there were to be no floodlight pylons; the lights would be along the top edge of the stands.

The picture of the past, taken around eighty years ago, looks out from the corner of the Kop; a simple fence separates the crowd from their heroes but the crash barriers look solid enough. Wednesday had acquired Hillsborough — then called the High

Bridge ground briefly before the more familiar first name of Owlerton was adopted — for £5,000 in 1899. Remarkably the ground was made ready inside three months, and within a few years established a ground record of 36,413. It wasn't long before the record was beaten and when the

present South Stand was opened in 1913 the ground became one of the finest in the country, holding 56,991 for a cup match in 1914.

Whatever the future holds for Hillsborough, it's unlikely to beat the current attendance record of 72,841.



For all the people in the North Stand if you look above your heads you will notice the new Speaker System is now in place and I am told by the sound engineers they have been designed in such a way to ensure easy listening. The big problem arises however over the Kop, as it is going to be a little difficult to totally eliminate the elements from causing what is known in the trade as a 'sound shift' but the positioning of the speakers and the quality should counteract that.

These two areas have been given the priority as the team recognises the fact that most of the vocal backing comes from these areas and on many occasions get a tremendous lift when the North Stand supporters start one of their choruses.

The south stand poses somewhat of a problem also because as there is very little space between supporters and speakers, the system has been specially tuned in order to be audible but not overwhelming, I am sure if it is

too loud you will write to me and in any event when the new system is installed I would love to hear your comments, I get as much pleasure playing Frank Sinatra as I do in playing Michael Jackson and up to now no request has ever been left out.

By the way don't forget to buy the new Sheffield Wednesday record and bring your songsheet along to the Arsenal match as we are going to sing both sides to the nation. The record is on sale now at the Wednesday shop, price £1.50.

BLUE & WHITE TOPICS

GAVIN OLIVER, 22, from Felling, Newcastle, has been with Sheffield Wednesday since July 1979. After a year as an apprentice he signed as a full professional in August 1980. When he first arrived in this city he stayed at the home of the club's doctor along with Bob Bolder and Kevin Taylor but after a while, the others having left, he was invited by John Pearson's family to stay with them. So, for about 3½ years he's been treated by them as one of the family and you can imagine the pleasure felt by that household, the girlfriends and Oliver's relatives when the two players are in the first team together.

The first time they started a match together in the first team was at Oldham two seasons ago. This season they played against Huddersfield in the Milk Cup and they were in the side again against Q.P.R. Gavin's dad, Ron, and grandad, John, journeyed down to London to see him for the first time in the First Division. It was fortunate that they didn't make the trip down to Luton in October for he lasted only two minutes in that game.

How did the Q.P.R. game go? "I think we battled well", he said. "I think the whole team could be pleased with their performance. It wasn't a great game with us not being used to the surface... we went down to London on the Friday and trained for an hour on the pitch in the afternoon... but in the end I think we adapted to it quite well. Apparently the club had put a lot of sand on it during the summer. Some of our lads who had played on the previous surface said they thought it was a lot better now... the bounce is still high but nowhere as bad as it used to be."

Banno? "He played up the middle but our three centre-halves played very well and coped alright with him. I didn't have a chance to speak to him after the game because I went outside to speak to my dad and grandad."

What about that Luton game in October when he was so looking forward to making his First Division debut and was stretchered off after just two minutes? "That was unbelievable... all week I'd had a bad

throat and from the Wednesday on I'd been feeling pretty rough, but on the Saturday I was fit enough to play. Afterwards I couldn't believe that I'd only lasted two minutes especially after battling away all week to make it."

How did the clash come about? "There was nothing intended, just an accident. There was a goal-kick and I went up for a header with Luton's Steve Elliott. Our clash happened on the half-way line and the ball stayed in play. As soon as it happened I knew my nose was broken from the noise it made. My eyes filled up but with the ball still in play I ran back into defence. When I stopped running I felt groggy, noticed the bleeding and had to go off. I went to see a specialist and fortunately my nose didn't have to be reset and it's not altered the shape too much."

Although he has not yet become a first team regular he does feel well prepared to step into the side when required. "Our manager names about 14 or 15 players in his squad for each game and I've been fortunate to be included in that squad most of the time. It's good to get such experience, to travel and see other First Division grounds. It makes you feel part of everything and then it's simply a matter of keeping yourself prepared for when you are wanted."

If not selected how long do they remain with the team before a match? "It all depends on how big the bench is at the ground... if it's big enough we can stay with the team until they run out... we follow them and sit on the bench. Otherwise we get tickets to sit in the stand or sometimes get a place in the directors' box."

He confirmed that he has played in quite a few positions. "Yes I'm generally regarded as a centre-half or right back but when I was substitute last season I came on and played up front against Portsmouth and Darlington, and I've played a few games for the Reserves at centre-forward. I enjoy it up there... it makes a change."

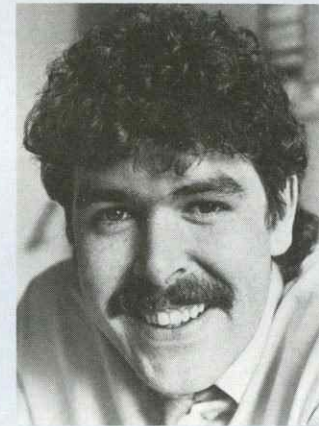

John Pearson hammered a scorching shot from a David Mossman cross, and United were fortunate to find themselves only two down at the break.

The home side began the second half in a style which indicated a severe ticking off in the dressing room, and Atkins somehow contrived to miss the easiest chance of the night, when he skied the ball over from three yards when confronted with an open goal.

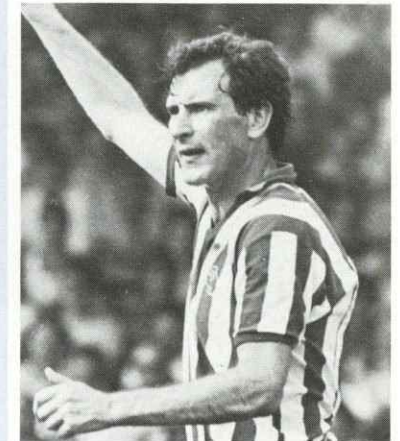
As United came more and more into the game, the qualities of leadership and experience shown by Lawrie Madden shone like a beacon, and when Russell Black missed another excellent chance, the United heads bowed.

SIDELINES

Tonight's Milk Cup clash is the first ever cup meeting between ourselves and Luton — and as far as the league goes, Luton have played only 17 times at Hillsborough.

Of those, Wednesday have won 10 and Luton only one. That single success was largely due to a Malcolm MacDonald hat-trick in October 1970, though on their last league visit here in 1982 they shared six goals with us in a thrilling draw. **John Pearson** (2) and **Gary Bannister** scored that day, and there was some controversy over a penalty awarded to our visitors.

Wednesday v Luton games have had their highlights in recent years: **Peter Rodrigues** blasted in his first goal for the Owls in the September 1972 meeting and untried amateur 'keeper **Trevor Pearson** was thrown into the big-time at Kenilworth Road when an injury crisis sidelined regular 'keepers **Peter Springett** and **Peter Grummitt**, also in 1972. **Terry Curran** scored two goals in a minute against Luton here in 1981 and seconds later came within a whisker of the quickest hat-trick ever!

Going back a few years, **Eddie Quigley** — eventually to score 50 league goals in just 74 appearances in a Wednesday shirt — marked his 1947 debut for us with the winning goal against

Luton at Hillsborough. Nine years before that **Doug Hunt** scored a hat-trick at Luton in a 5-1 Wednesday win (later that season the Owls won the return by 4-1). Our biggest home win over the Hatters was 6-0, some 85 years ago.

Amongst the few connections between us and our visitors are **Tony Read**, our reserve 'keeper who switched successfully to a

centre-forward later on at Luton, and **Hugh McJarrow**, a centre-forward in the more traditional style.

By the way, our home Milk Cup/League Cup record now reads: played 29, won 13, drawn 9, lost 7. It might not seem a great return but it has improved considerably since Blackburn won here in the autumn of 1981 — by then we had won only nine in 23 home League Cup games. Since then we have beaten Barnsley, Darlington, Huddersfield and Fulham and drawn with Bristol City and Liverpool.

Our away record has been a little more useful however, with 14 wins and 4 draws in 33 games.

Finally, a quick look at the highs and lows of the First Division following the games of 10th November, Everton's win at West Ham gave them the best record from away games (five wins this season so far), while Watford got their first home win of the season at the expense of Sunderland, one of six clubs without an away win at that stage. North London rivals Spurs and Arsenal were setting the goals standard with 29 each.

Stoke had only managed one goal in six away games but Sunderland had conceded only three goals in seven home First Division games. Watford had been involved in no less than 62 goals in 14 leagues matches!

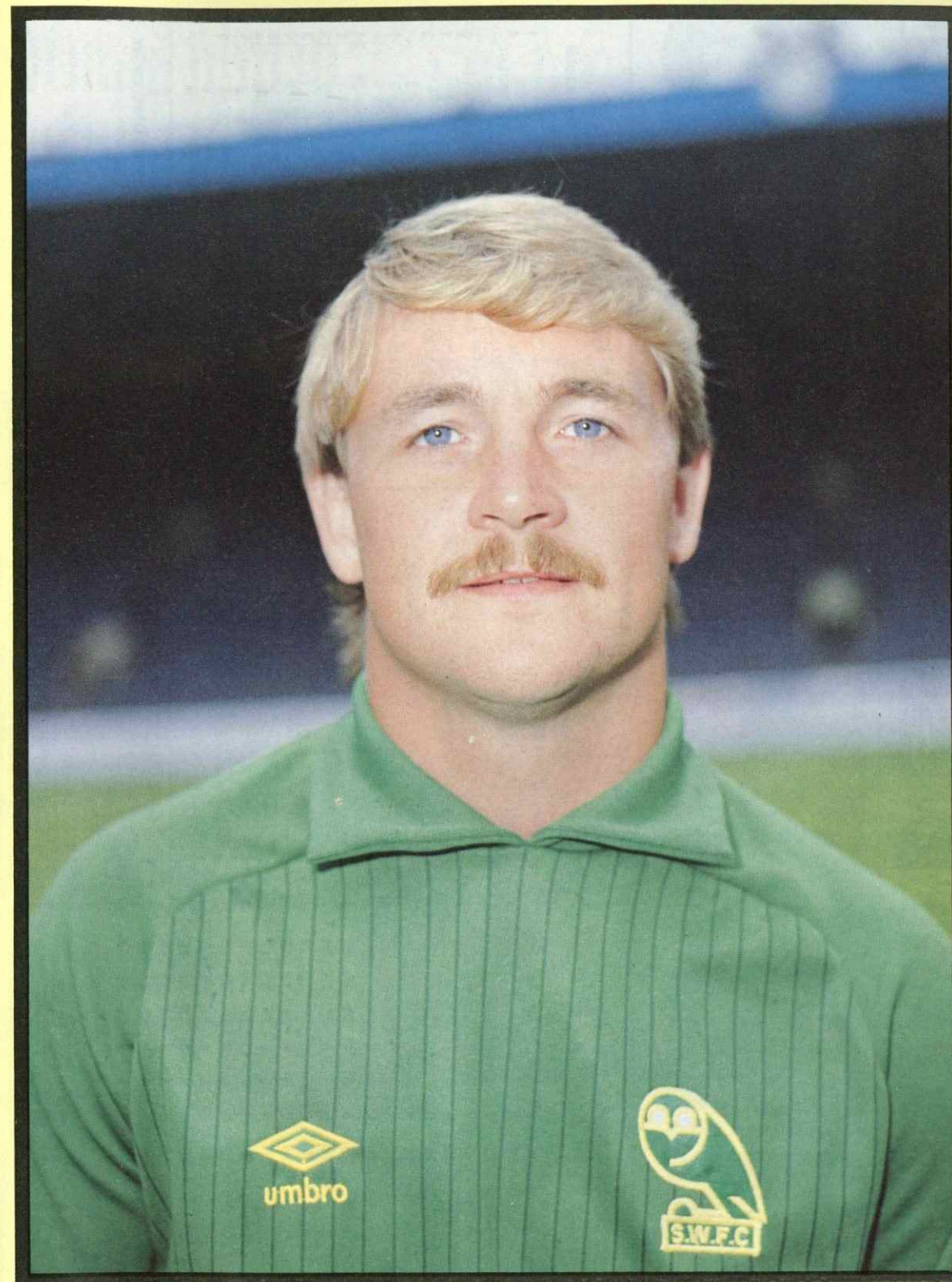
