AT LAST Luton have something to shout about! A battle-hardened Steve Foster and diminutive David Preece, new men in the fight against relegation, were the heroes as Luton ended a six-match sequence without victory.

Preece won instant approval from Luton's smallest crowd of th season as he prepared Villa's goal in a one-man first-half blitz.

He forced busy Villa goalkeeper Nigel Spink to turn one shot over the bar and go full length to save another. A third effort was drilled just wide before Preece finally found the target five minutes before halftime.

Brian Stein and Frank Bunn opened up Villa's defence and though Preece didn't catch his shot perfectly, Spink could only turn it on to a p ost and into the net.

The goal put some pep into a disappointing Villa. They came out fighting in the second half and even the loss of Steve McMahon with an ankle ligament injury couldn't halt their efforts to save something from the game. Then it was Foster's turn to weld the Luton defence into a formidable unit.
