# COMMENT

Well, what were we saying about TV only the other week?

No sooner the word about limited coverage of Everton games — and bingo! Our third-round FA Cup-tie at Leeds will be shown in full on BBC's Match of the Day on Friday evening.

That's one answer to those Evertonians who wondered where the cameras had gone. But, really, it's only what we were talking about recently: the TV people are only too willing to take notice if a team is successful.

When the draw was made, we were not only the Cup holders but also leaders of the First Division. Leeds United, meanwhile, were showing signs of launching a concerted challenge for promotion. What could be better than such classic Cup ingredients?

Fortunately, the venue at Elland Road is sufficiently close, in travelling time, to remove any serious reservations about the size of our support.

THE SCALE OF VOCAL BACKING IS A TRADITIONAL AND WELCOME ASPECT OF CUP FOOTBALL. There were many occasions last season when the Evertonian contingent positively willed the team to victory in away ties.

A study of attendances at live TV games since the experiment began last season would suggest that the Friday night match is more likely to reduce away support than the Sunday equivalent. But there are always exceptions, and we hope to see a full turnout at Elland Road, just as Newcastle United fans travelled in their thousands to Anfield for a live BBC game at a similar stage last season.

Four ties were covered last year — from the third round to quarter-finals — and, in general, gates held up reasonably well. The figures were: 33,566 Liverpool v Newcastle; 19,057 Brighton v Liverpool; 15,357 Blackburn v Southampton; 43,030 Sheffield Wednesday v Southampton.

In each case — and as the BBC are starting this year — the TV companies went for Cup-ties where First Division met Second Division. It was probably a well-balanced way of showing top standards while retaining the chance of showing an upset.

Incidentally, there is a difference between Cup and League in the way clubs are compensated for loss of revenue.

For League matches, the home club (who now take all the gate money) can apply for an appropriate share from a special fund set up for this purpose. For Cup-ties (where turnstile money is divided between the two clubs and the Cup pool), there is a straight cash payment to each club.

By tomorrow morning, all of football will start building up for the magic of the Cup. Thousands of fans will have their annual wager riding on their club — but where will it all end?

Predicting the two Finalists before the third round is probably more difficult than trying to name the first three in the Grand National. For instance, we would have to agree that Everton v Watford would not have been an odds-on choice last January. We were 16th in the League, with Watford one place lower.

The draw inevitably influences people at this stage, which explains why Manchester United, at home to Bournemouth, were installed as favourites. But, there again, look what happened when they met Bournemouth last season.

The make-up of this weekend's ties is marginally against the First Division — 10 clubs at home (including four matches between Division One teams) and 12 away.

Only Chelsea, Manchester United and West Ham are at home to opposition from lower than the Second Division. On the other hand, Ipswich, QPR, West Brom, Arsenal and Leicester face awkward trips to either Third and Fourth Division clubs, or in the case of Leicester, to non-League survivors, Burton Albion. That match will be played on the nearest Football League ground — Derby County.

# GROUND AND PROGRAMME

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We could not have asked for a more entertaining game with which to finish 1984 at Goodison Park than the thriller with Chelsea. But we could have asked for a better result!

The basic story is that we made mistakes and were punished for them by some quality finishing from Gordon Davies.

We battled back very well but when it looked as though we might draw level they nipped away and scored again.

Right to the last seconds we were in with a chance of a point. The ball skimmed a post when it could have so easily gone the other way and made it 4-4.

We have to give full marks to their goalkeeper Eddie Niedzwiecki, for an excellent display but a run through of our video showed that Joey Jones handled from Andy Gray in the first-half. Had that penalty been given Graeme Sharp could have had a hat-trick of penalties which happened once before this season with Andy Blair of Sheffield Wednesday.

Obviously, we shouldn't expect to be left empty handed after scoring three goals but I am not complaining about our spirit and application. The side kept going, the crowd got behind them and it was all very exciting.

Really I thought it was more a case of pressure than neater build up play because Chelsea worked hard and closed down very quickly in midfield.

While we were disappointed to be knocked off the top of the table after seven weeks, there were no problems in picking up the lads for the trip to Sunderland.

They knew where they'd gone wrong. Individual mistakes had cost us goals and the individuals concerned accepted the responsibility.

We had to make a late change at Roker Park because Gary Stevens was left with a dead leg after a knock in training on Monday.

Unfortunately, Alan Harper was also unavailable because of a hamstring strain and had to miss the opportunity he had been waiting for. So Ian Atkins made his debut and did well considering he was out of his normal position.

Before the game we recalled that Roker Park had not been a very happy hunting ground for us. In the previous two years we played well there but came away with nothing.

We put the record straight this time, although there

wasn't a great deal of flowing football because the two
midfields cancelled each other out for much of the time.
Derek Mountfield got back into the scoring habit with

two goals and we almost killed Sunderland off when Sharp shaved a post while it was 2-0.

After their goal we were under pressure for a short period but defended well.

The morning results — Spurs being held at home and Liverpool losing at Anfield — had the lads bubbling and afterwards we heard that Manchester United had lost, thus putting us level on points at the top with Spurs.


We were the only winners among the morning's top six and despite the Chelsea set-back a six point gap opened between ourselves and fifth place by the end of Boxing Day.

Today we welcome Luton Town to Goodison Park. They have made a number of changes recently signing experienced men like Steve Foster and Mick Harford and they did themselves a lot of good by winning an important game with Coventry City on Boxing Day.

I would like to wish all our supporters a Happy New Year and hope that 1985 is as successful for Everton Football Club as 1984 was.

We have now crossed the half-way mark of the season after a generally pleasing first-half. There have been one or two hiccups along the way but we've scored goals and I feel that we can approach the New Year with plenty of confidence.











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
# CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE

> 'The idea', says Ray, 'is for football clubs to put their facilities and coaching staff at the disposal of young boys, in the hope that we can improve their technique and general

> 'Because the scheme is run by the FA, we are able to coach boys of 11 and 12-yearsold who would not normally be permitted to train with a League club.


'After a month, they have to be registered, which entails the signatures of the boys, their parents and their school headmaster. Having registered for a particular club, they cannot go to any other club for 12 months, but after that period, they are free to move.

'If the lads are really enjoying what they see and learn here, then, hopefully, some will want to stay with us.'

The boys are chosen on recommendations from schools and our scouts, and as numbers are restricted, we are not advertising for boys to come along.

The coaching is aimed strictly at individual skills. There will not be any competitive matches or even practice games of 11-a-side.

'The general idea is to give an hour's expert coaching which will certainly do no harm and should only do good for the young players,' added Ray.



# REVIEW

# **HOWARD KENDALL COMMENTS...**

With our League position as it was, the continued progress in the Milk Cup and the advent of the FA Cup became important in giving the team impetus. Good results in the Cups seemed to build up confidence in League performances.

'Sometimes, it does have the adverse effect. A team can find themselves concentrating on the Cup-ties when they are in a safe League position, but every game was vital to us in the early part of the year.

'Obviously, the highlight was beating Aston Villa to qualify for Wembley for the first time, but in terms of the League, nothing was more valuable than the win at Birmingham on 2nd January.

'When you look back on successful Cup runs, there are always ties where the result might have gone the other way. I suppose the one which sticks out in the FA Cup was against Gillingham.

'I remember that they had a spell of set-pieces which caused us problems in the first match at home. Steve Bruce, who has since gone to Norwich, had a tremendous long throw-in and he was also very useful, attacking free-kicks and corners.

'Then we had a scare in the first replay. Tony Cascarino broke away and might have ended our hopes there and then, but Neville Southall made the crucial save.

'After another draw, we lost the toss for the home advantage in the second replay, but we went back to Gillingham and made no mistake at the third attempt.

'The Milk Cup semi-final with Villa was really settled when we won the first leg 2-0 at Goodison Park. The enthusiasm of the fans that night, and again when we went through despite losing 1-0 at Villa Park, was marvellous to see.'

# **HOWARD KENDALL** COMMENTS . . .

'The first match with Liverpool was one of those occasions which we will always remember, especially the fans on both sides. They were brilliant.

'In terms of the games, I felt we had the edge at Wembley but that Liverpool just about had the edge at Maine Road. It always looked as if the result would be settled by one goal - and that's what happened.

'To our intense disappointment, it was scored by Liverpool, but that was where our interest in the FA Cup was such an uplift. We didn't have time to dwell on losing a Final because we were looking towards Wembley again.

'Without the FA Cup, the season might have died. Instead, we were still involved in exciting times, and no-one was more keyed up than Andy Gray. He was Cup-tied in the Milk Cup but had no intention of missing out on a Wembley appearance.

'In the League, we continued to climb the table, although March brought our first defeat since 27th December.



# HOWARD KENDALL COMMENTS . . .

'People say the Charity Shield is not important, but when you meet Liverpool at Wembley, it means a lot to win.

'But we then lost our first two League games and wondered whether we had peaked too early. Every side needs its first win and eventually got ours in the third match at Chelsea. It's nice to win one at home and one away as quickly as possible, which stops people saying you've gone so many games without doing this or that.

'In the first few matches, we were doing things that we hadn't done last season and it was all a matter of how quickly we got back into the groove.

'Paul Bracewell, who was signed from Sunderland in FA Cup Final week, made a good impression from the start and, later in September, we strengthened the squad by signing Pat Van den Hauwe from Birmingham City.

'Pat's arrival gave us extra cover at left-back, although he was not signed in time to play in the first two rounds in Europe.'

# HOWARD KENDALL COMMENTS . . .

'A marvellous period in which we had some tremendous results, culminating in a post-War record number of wins before we lost an incredible Milk Cup-tie at home to Grimsby Town.

'We played consistently well throughout the two months and the quality of our football was especially pleasing. It's not easy to beat Manchester United twice, but we did it in style when trouncing them 5-0 in the League. Our performance that day was absolutely superb.

'It was also nice to go to Anfield and win there for the first time since my playing days with the

'At the start of November, we went to the top of the League and stayed there into December. But even in a good year, there are sometimes disappointments.

'We were only just coming to terms with the terrible news that injury had ended Mark Higgins' career when Adrian Heath damaged knee ligaments and learned that he would have to miss the rest of the season. A double set-back on that scale was a bitter blow, but, fortunately, we had players to come into the side.

'Andy Gray replaced Adrian and, of course, we had also signed Ian Atkins from Sunderland to give us cover in the centre of the defence.'

# LUTON

Mick Harford became the 24th player to appear in Luton Town's first team this season when he arrived at Kenilworth Road in a deal worth around £300,000 to his former club, Birmingham City.

That is a measure of the changes — some planned, others enforced by a crippling run of injuries — since the Hatters maintained their First Division status by finishing 16th last term.

Paul Walsh, the England striker sold to Liverpool for a reported £700,000, headed the list of departures during the summer. Brian Horton went to Hull City as player-manager, Raddy Antic returned to Yugoslavia, Kirk Stephens moved to his home town club, Coventry City, Mick Saxby signed for Newport and Trevor Aylott switched to Crystal Palace.

'This is the third new side since I became manager in January 1978,' said manager David Pleat as he began the rebuilding programme by signing Ashley Grimes (Coventry), Andy Dibble (Cardiff), Vince Hilaire (Crystal Palace) and Steve Elliott (Preston).

Dibble, the highly-rated Wales Under-21 goalkeeper, was only 19 when he went straight into the First Division and celebrated a debut win against

Stoke City on the opening day of the season.


Three other teenagers — Stacey North, Tim Breacker and Mitchell Thomas — were in the side in the early games. North went in at centre-half because Paul Elliott, the England Under-21 defender, was under suspension and the more experienced Clive Goodyear was lined-up to join Plymouth.

But the No. 5 position was to become a problem spot. The talented Elliott broke a leg in a Milk Cup-tie against Leicester City at the end of October, prompting Mr Pleat to venture into the transfer market again.

He signed former Everton defender Colin Todd (36 last month) from Vancouver Whitecaps, but after only three appearances, he was sidelined by a knee injury. Then Micky Droy was taken on loan from Chelsea, but he, too, suffered a bad injury, tearing a hamstring in only his third game.

That set-back led to Mr Pleat paying around £70,000 for Steve Foster, the former England centre-half who was transfer-listed after losing his place at Aston Villa.

At the same time, Hilaire ended his short stay at Kenilworth Road by moving on to Portsmouth. Then another close-

season signing, Steve Elliott, went to Walsall in a £150,000 exchange package which took the talented David Preece to Luton. Preece, barely 5ft 6in tall, highlighted his potential with outstanding performances for Walsall in their run to last season's Milk Cup semi-final.

Injuries continued to thwart Mr Pleat's hopes of getting together a settled side. Dibble damaged a knee at Old Trafford in November, bringing the return of Jake Findlay, who, in turn, was injured after only two games. Fortunately, Luton were able to call on last season's first choice, Les Sealey.

It was perhaps not surprising that Luton struggled defensively in a period of disruptions. After 10 successive games, in which they never conceded fewer than two goals in a match, they were trapped in 21st place at the start of last month.

Only four players remain as regulars from the squad which lifted the Hatters back into the First Division in 1982. Defender Mal Donaghy is an established Northern Ireland international, while midfield man Ricky Hill and striker Brian Stein have won England caps under Bobby Robson's management.

The other member of the 'old boys' group is winger David Moss, who reclaimed the No. 11 shirt after missing much of last season through injury.

Although Luton have been noted for their wheeler-dealing in the transfer world, they have always kept up a flow of promising youngsters. Apart from the teenagers mentioned earlier, Wayne Turner, Frankie Bunn and Garry Parker have all featured frequently this season.

While it would appear that the side has some catching-up to do in the second-half of the campaign, the battle to maintain First Division foothold on gates of around 10,000 is a challenge which appeals to Mr Pleat.

He anticipated some of the problems, although he could not have predicted the added hazard of so many injuries.

Writing in the club's first programme of the season, he said: 'Whatever the past, we know that to have a successful future, we shall have to work even harder than before. Our gates do not give us sufficient confidence to speculate in the transfer market, and so we will fight and work to make our resources 100 per cent efficient.

'The challenge is there. We would love more support through the turnstiles, but we are aware of the problems. We shall continue to enjoy our football and we shall aim to provide you with a season that will produce excitement and good results.'

Luton have also had a major change off the field. Denis Mortimer, chairman for nine years, resigned in November and was replaced by David Evans, now a highly successful businessman after playing professional sport, as a footballer with Aston Villa and a cricketer with Gloucestershire and Warwickshire.

Mr Evans said that his first job was to 'ensure the financial security of the club' while still giving the manager an opportunity to sign new players.

But perhaps the main issue is the proposal for Luton to move 18 miles long the M1 to play in a covered stadium at Milton Keynes. The need for a new stadium became evident when Bedfordshire County Council announced plans for a new road which will take away the club's car and coach parks and sponsors' suites at Kenilworth Road.

The prospect of the town losing its League club inevitably brought a conflict of opinion. Out of 14 alternative sites examined in Luton, the club found that only one was suitable for a new stadium, but objections from all quarters seemed to kill that scheme.

That was when Luton began to pursue the proposal to move into a multi-million pound sports complex at Milton Keynes.

A Paul Walsh goal, 14 minutes from time, gave Luton a 1-0 victory at Goodison Park last season, but we later gained a full revenge when we scored a 3-0 success at Kenilworth Road, scoring all our goals in the closing 30 minutes.

It was two seasons ago that we scored our two best League victories over the Hatters. At Goodison Park on the Saturday before Christmas, goals from John Bailey and Kevin Sheedy put us 2-0 in front by half-time. That score remained until the final 20 minutes when Terry Curran and Adrian Heath, twice, extended our lead to 5-0 — our record League victory over Luton.

We also scored five times at Kenilworth Road at the tail end of the season and that certainly didn't help the Hatters' fight against relegation. After Ricky Hill had given the home side a fifth minute lead, David Johnson equalised in the 40th minute and Graeme Sharp edged us in front from the penalty spot two minutes later.

Two goals from Sheedy, plus another from Sharp, gave us a 5-1 win. Luton then found themselves third from bottom, a point behind Manchester City, but with a game in hand. Their First Division status was eventually saved when they scored their winner at Manchester City five minutes from time a week later.

Many great players have turned out for both sides during the course of the various meetings between Everton and Luton and it was one player, who performed well in one of those games, who eventually found himself wearing first the Everton shirt and, later, becoming our manager.

Billy Bingham was already a famous Northern Ireland international winger when he joined Luton from Sunderland for £15,000 in 1958 and for just over two years he was one of the inspirations in their side. In 1959-60 he led their scoring list with 16 goals but this didn't stop the club dropping back into the Second Division.

During his spell with Luton, Billy won seven international caps and played for them in the 1959 FA Cup Final which they lost to Nottingham Forest. Everton signed him for £28,000 in 1960 and he stayed with us for almost three years as a player. He won 13 caps as an Everton player and, even after he dropped down through the divisions to sign for Port Vale in 1963, he continued to play for his country, eventually ending up with 56 caps.

A broken leg ended his playing career and, after a spell as trainer/coach, he took his first managerial appointment with Southport, leading them to promotion for the first time in their history. He later moved to Plymouth and, whilst with them, also managed the Northern Ireland team for a while.

He returned to Ireland to lead Linfield to the League Championship and in 1971 accepted the post as manager of the Greek national team.

Two years later he left that job to take over as Everton's manager, remaining here for four years. He later managed Mansfield and in 1980 he was again appointed manager of the Northern Ireland team — a post he still holds today.

A far more recent transfer transaction between the clubs brought Andy King to Goodison Park in 1976 in a £35,000 deal. Andy had been a Luton apprentice and had progressed remarkably well in his first season in their senior side. He played only 33 League games for the Hatters before coming to Everton where his career really blossomed.

Andy won two England Under-21 caps in his first spell with us. He moved on to Queens Park Rangers for £425,000 in 1980 and a year later joined West Bromwich Albion for £400,000. He returned to Goodison Park in a player-exchange deal in 1982, remaining for two seasons. Upon his release at the end of last season, Andy joined the Dutch club Cambuur.

Jimmy Husband was one player who moved in the opposite direction. He became a great favourite at Goodison after making his First Division debut at Fulham in 1965 and he went on to make 165 League appearances for the Toffees. Jimmy won England Youth and Under-23 caps (five) and in 1973 he was transferred to Luton for £70,000. He remained with the Hatters for about five years, leading their scoring list in 1975-76. By coincidence, he scored 44 League goals for both clubs.

Imsight

INSIGHT, the feature which spotlights an opposing player, today looks at Luton Town's new centre-half, Steve Foster, with professional comment from Evertonian John Bailey.

The advent of a New Year is probably welcomed by Steve after a turbulent 12 months in which he left Brighton, failed to settle at Aston Villa and then moved to Luton.

Only two years ago, he was a World Cup player with England, and in the season after the Finals in Spain, the well-built six-footer was a flamboyant figure in Brighton's march to the FA Cup Final.

'He's always going to be noticeable with that headband he wears to protect himself from cuts, says Everton full-back John Bailey. 'He's a big, strong type of defender, a battler who could give Luton a lift.

'From our experience of playing them in the last two years, they have been a bit vulnerable at the back, so he's going to help them tighten up.

'Like most defenders of his style, he does a lot of his good work in the air, and his heading ability makes him dangerous when he comes forward for corners and free-kicks. In many ways, he's like Mick Lyons.'

Steve played for Hampshire Boys and was originally linked with hometown club, Portsmouth, in the Fourth Division.

In those days, he was a striker, but he was firmly established at centre-half when Brighton bought him for £150,000 in June 1979. They had just won promotion to the First Division and Steve's debut for them meant he had played in all four Divisions of the League.


He was voted Player of the Year by the fans at the end of his first season, which also included his single England Under-21 cap. Ron Greenwood subsequently called him into the full squad in May 1982, and he made the last of his three England appearances against Kuwait in the World Cup.

Brighton were back in Division Two by the time he made the second move of his career, joining Villa last March for £150,000 plus the Midland club's £50,000-rated full-back Mark Jones.

An injury delayed his Villa debut for six weeks and he made only seven appearances before Tony Barton, the manager who signed him, was replaced by Graham Turner during the summer. His relationship with the new boss reached a crossroads when he was dropped after only seven League games this season.

In all, he played in only 17 first-team matches in eight months with Villa, who accepted a cut-price offer of around £70,000 from Luton at the end of November.

Manager David Pleat saw him as a figurehead character in a side struggling at the lower end of the table. 'At his best, he's a big, strong commanding defender, and that's what I'm looking to him to produce,' said Mr Pleat, who appointed the 27-year-old newcomer as captain for his debut at Arsenal on 1st December.



#### BRITISH IS BEST!

A six-week stay with Everton gave New Zealander Matt Walker a closeup view of the standards at the top of the English First Division.

'It stands out that the game here is professional whereas we are amateurs at home,' said the University student who gave up his vacation to visit Everton on an exchange visit.

'The trip was sorted out early in the year when Rob Wakenshaw and Stuart Rimmer came to my club at Hamilton,' he added.

Hamilton, based in the fourth largest

city in New Zealand, won the Kiwi equivalent of our Second Division with the help of Rob and Stuart but had to turn down promotion to the National

'It was all a question of money,' explains Matt. 'We didn't have a good enough financial base to go into the top Division.'

Matt is a midfield player with Hamilton, a North Island club from the Province of Waikato. During his time on Merseyside, he stayed in digs in the Old Swan area and was shown around the city by Rob and Stuart.

'I'm hoping to get a look at London,' he said before flying back home to resume his university studies.

'The people here have looked after me tremendously well,' he added. 'It has been a great experience training with a club like Everton. I have been very impressed by the standards at all
