



I hope their recollections of today's game and the hospitality received will be as pleasant as their welcome to Trevor Hartley, John Williamson and myself last Wednes-


Welcome to both sets of supporters too for this Fourth Round FA Cup-tie.



The main talking point of the third round of the FA Cup was the Football Association's decision to make Burton Albion and Leicester City replay their game that ended in a 6-1 victory for the First Division side. The incident which caused this replay was brought about by some idiot in the crowd throwing an object at the Burton goalkeeper, striking him on the head which resulted in him having extensive treatment. The score at this time was one goal each. In the replayed match Leicester scored after four minutes and that goal was the only one of the game. The arguing point is, did the Football Association do the right thing in ordering a replay. The first thought is that the maniac fringe of supporters were given a licence to throw things at players if their side is in trouble hoping to get the match replayed if they happen to lose. On the other hand it proves that the powers to be will not tolerate any form of violence especially from so called supporters. In

the end, justice was done, but just think if Burton had won the second game, what would the media and newspapers have made of that.

The bad weather has really played havoc with the fourth round and at the time of writing at least nine ties have still to be replayed. One name on the score sheet at Barnsley was that of Ron Futcher, the former Luton striker who has returned from a spell in Holland to join brother Paul in the North of England. Wigan nearly made the headlines by going in at half-time at Chelsea winning 2-0 but the Londoners pulled the two goals back before the end to force a replay. Doncaster under Billy Bremner had a wonderful win over First Division Queens Park Rangers as did Orient who beat West Bromwich Albion 2-1. Ironical that both the scorers here, Silkman and Cadette both had spells at Kenilworth Road. Oxford United continued their winning ways by winning 2-0 at Shrewsbury and Telford United brought high-flying Bradford City down to earth by beating them 2-1 Top score of the round was Watford's 5-0 victory over Sheffield United, (Leicester Čity's six was knocked out by having to replay) with England star Luther Blissett scoring four of the goals including one from the penalty spot. Paul Goddard scored a hat-trick as West Ham beat Fourth Division Port Vale 4-1. Non-league Dagenham made only one slip against Carlisle United but it proved costly for them. Malcolm Poskett scoring for the home side after 48 minutes. Another former Town player who got on to the score sheet was Mark Aizlewood. Now playing in midfield he equalised Garth Crooks sixth minute goal in a somewhat fortunate way. Ray Clemence saved his spot-kick and in the goalmouth melee that followed Mark knocked the ball in from close range. John Lukic made his manager eat his words in the previous week by giving a fine performance for Arsenal at Hereford. At least manager Don Howe was the first to admit that he was brilliant. The match ended in a 1-1 draw and the 15,777 crowd, lower than what was expected, had their money's worth. Steve Foster kept Luton in the Cup with an 86th minute goal after Ian Painter had put Stoke City in front but in the replay at the Victoria Road ground the Hatters made no mistake this time by winning the match 3-2. Sheffield Wednesday did well to win 3-2 at Craven Cottage and after the match Fulham manager Ray Harford said, I think the late goal cost the club about £20,000 - this would have been their share of a gate had a replay been necessary

And so to the next round of the competition — who will get through — well football is such a funny game that the gates to Wembley are open to anyone, but watch out for Telford United, they could cause a few surprises. Although away to Darlington it will come as no surprise if they get through to the fifth round.







HUDDERSFIELD TOWN

One of football's unsung management heroes brings his Second Division side to Kenilworth Road today hoping for a taste of Cup glory.

Mick Buxton's track record in six seasons in charge at Leeds Road is remarkable and yet the Huddersfield boss has maintained a low profile which is the way he likes it.

Injury ending his own playing career after spells with Burnley and Halifax Town and following coaching stints with Huddersfield and Southend, Buxton took on the manager's job at Huddersfield when the club was struggling in the Fourth Division in the late 'seventies.

Six years later, Buxton has guided them into the Second Division and turned the famous old club's fortunes around to such an extent that Town have emerged as one of the outsiders for promotion this season after a useful run of results following a far from impressive start to the campaign.

Buxton had never sought publicity and his down to earth outlook on life is reflected by his side which has few individual stars but works hard and puts the emphasis fairly and squarely on team work and solid application.

The first club to win three successive League titles back in the 1920's, Huddersfield were FA Cup winners in 1922 and returned briefly to the big time in the early 'seventies before the rot set in and the Terriers slumped to the depths of Division Four.

But Buxton's return to the club as manager sparked off the revival and there are now genuine hopes that the club can get back into the First Division in the next season or so.

Town needed a couple of matches to dispose of Wolves in the Third Round and are likely to bring an experienced lineup to Kenilworth Road this afternoon with a balance of younger players developed through the junior ranks at Leeds Road.

Goalkeeper Brian Cox was a Sheffield Wednesday man before moving to Leeds Road for the 1981-82 season. He's been a consistent performer throughout his time with Huddersfield but Town also have a useful understudy in Keith Mason who made 19 League appearances last season.

Former Bolton defender Paul Jones and Sam Allardyce who's played for Bolton, Sunderland, Millwall and Coventry, provide plenty of height in the middle of the back four. Both are well over six feet tall.


When skipper Jones was ruled out of the first match with Wolves through injury — youngster Steve Stoutt stepped in at centre half.

Full backs Brian Laws and David Burke moved across the Pennines from Burnley and Bolton while Steve Doyle won Welsh Under-21 caps for Preston and switched to Leeds Road two seasons ago.

Doyle is a key figure in midfield where his usual partners are Phil Wilson, another ex-Bolton man and Dave Cowling who plays out wide on the left and who has topped 200 games for the club after starting off as an apprentice at Mansfield Town.

Up front, Town rely a lot on Mark Lillis, top scorer for the

last couple of seasons and with around 50 senior goals for the club since breaking through as a teenager.

Graham Cooper, a former apprentice, got his first team chance over the last three games of last season and a newcomer to the side this season is Dale Tempest, a Leedsborn striker who returned to Yorkshire after playing 41 League and Cup games for Fulham.

Daral Pugh, another Welsh Under-21 cap, was substitute for Town's tie at Molineux three weeks ago. He comes from the North East and was with Doncaster before joining Town a couple of seasons ago.

Other names who could come into the reckoning for today's tie include young midfield player Julian Winter and locally-born striker Liam Robinson.

At the half way stage of the Second Division campaign, Town were still in touch with the leaders after starting off the season with a heavy defeat at home by Oxford. They also crashed 5-1 at Grimsby on New Year's Day but generally Huddersfield have produced some useful results against the Division's better sides this season and Watford and Queens Park Rangers were both beaten in Milk and FA Cup-ties by the Leeds Road Terriers last season.

That gives an indication of Huddersfield's ability and manager Buxton will be hoping that a successful Cup run this season can provide a spur for his top priority . . . to take Town back into the First Division.

40 different teams have won the FA Cup: Aston Villa, Tottenham Hotspur, Blackburn Rovers, Newcastle United, Arsenal, Wanderers, West Bromwich Albion, Manchester United, Bolton Wanderers, Manchester City, Sheffield United, Wolverhampton Wanderers, Everton, Sheffield Wednesday, West Ham United, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Liverpool, Old Etonians, Preston North End, Sunderland, Barnsley, Blackburn Olympic, Blackpool, Bradford City, Burnley, Cardiff City, Charlton Athletic, Chelsea, Clapham Rovers, Derby County, Huddersfield Town, Ipswich Town, Leeds United, Notts County, Old Carthusians, Oxford University, Portsmouth, Royal Engineers and Southampton.

Up to and including the 1984 final there have been 115 matches including replays which have produced 304 goals. The successful teams have scored 239 and the beaten sides 65 goals. 59 defeated teams have failed to score. The most popular result has been 1-0 which has occurred on 31 occasions.

Between 1909 and 1927 there were 15 consecutive finals in which the beaten side failed to score. Three goals is the highest by a defeated side, Bolton losing 4-3 to Blackpool in 1953.

The first match to be screened in colour on television was the FA Cup Final between Everton and West Bromwich Albion in 1968.

The 1969 FA Cup Final was played on 26th April between Manchester City and Leicester City. There had been no earlier final played since Aston Villa met Newcastle United on 18th April 1905.

Wembley Stadium has housed the FA Cup Final since 1923 and has combattly streamed and the streamed of the stream

Wembley Stadium has housed the FA Cup Final since 1923 and has regularly attracted crowds of 100,000. But in a first round tie in 1980-81 the Wembley Football Club played before the lowest attendance of the competition that season when they attracted only 852 at Enfield.

Sheffield Wednesday were involved in replays in three successive rounds of the FA Cup in 1938-39. In the third round they drew 1-1 at

home to Yeovil and Petters United and won the replay 2-1. In the fourth round they drew 1-1 at home to Chester and again 1-1 away after extra time. At Maine Road in a second replay they won 2-0. In the fifth round they drew 1-1 at Chelsea and again 0-0 at home after extra time. In the second replay at Highbury they were beaten 3-1.

Stan Crowther played for Manchester United in the FA Cup in

Stan Crowther played for Manchester United in the FA Cup in 1957-58 after the Munich disaster even though he had already played in the competition for Aston Villa. Ernie Taylor was signed by United from Blackpool a week after the air crash but was allowed to play in the fifth round against Sheffield Wednesday on 19th February 1958. The FA waived the rule that a player has to be registered 14 days before the date of the round. Taylor had not played for Blackpool in the FA Cup that season.

The smallest goalkeeper seen in the FA Cup in the post-war era was Norman Preston who stood 5ft 2in (1.57m) tall when he kept goal for Hereford United against Scunthorpe United on 11th December 1952 in a second round tie.

In the 1945-46 season the two-legged FA Cup ties produced one of the most unusual turn round of fortune seen in the competition. Bradford (Park Avenue) were beaten 3-1 at home by Manchester City but won the second leg 8-2 at Maine Road.


