THE draw against Spurs made Luton Town the only one of the four bottom teams to pick up a point this week. They are still in 21st place, but have narrowed the gap to four points from the safety line.

Goal difference keeps them below 20th-placed Ipswich -the Town's figure is minus 16 and Ipswich's minus 13. Coventry can be overhauled-Ipswich and the Town both have two games in hand of the Sky Blues, are three points adrift, and have better goal difference figures than Coventry.
