





Football League skill and sportsmanship will shine through.



There was only one match played in the Division last week because most of the clubs were involved in the FA Cup. West Bromwich Albion played Queens Park Rangers at the Hawthorns but neither side came out of the game with any satisfaction and neither sets of supporters or players will want to remember this one. The home side were taunted with jeers of 'Rubbish' by their own fans towards the end of the game as the Rangers had the edge and Gary Bannister had a chance to snatch victory in the final 10 minutes as he was allowed a free header from a Robbie James cross but he could only watch in despair as the ball hit the underside of the crossbar and rebounded to safety.

The recent bad weather has caused clubs a fixture pile up and in the games that we played a week before we last saw Aston Villa win away from home for only the second time this season. Even then their match at Coventry was one of only three games played because of the weather. Goals from Mark Walters who hit the net twice and Paul Rideout saw Villa home by three goals to nil. Liverpool moved into the top six with an impressive four nil win over the Canaries of Norwich, Ian Rush was again on target with two goals and John Wark and Kenny Dalglish rounded off the scoring. A crowd of 30,627 proved that the money paid by Liverpool on undersoil heating has paid off for them. The other game saw Chelsea and Arsenal draw the London derby one goal each with Speedie scoring for the home side and Mariner for the Gunners. Chelsea paid out nearly £10,000 in their efforts to beat the big freeze and the pitch was a credit to the ground staff at Stamford Bridge and chairman Ken Bates insisted on all of them taking a bow before the kick-off. Their hard work paid off because 34,752 fans turned up to watch the game and put £125,000 into the home side's bank account. Armchair supporters were also disap-

pointed because the scheduled live match between Watford and Manchester United was called off.

Now that the season is half-way through we made some predictions in our first programme against Stoke City, so let's see how they are working out so far. We said would it be Liverpool or Manchester United well at this time they are sixth and third respectively. Our other two tips were Nottingham Forest and Chelsea well they are in eighth and ninth position and could still come with a late run.

On the transfer front it is as if Peter Nicholas the Crystal Palace midfield player will shortly join Luton Town. Other Division news is that Mark Hughes hasn't broken his arm as first feared and should be fit for today's match against West Bromwich Albion. West Ham skipper Alvin Martin is to have an X-ray on a suspected broken nose.





TOTTENHAM HOTSPUR

It's 24 seasons since Tottenham last won the League title back in their famous double season - but the long wait for another Championship could be over in a few months.

Although neither Spurs manager Peter Shreeves nor his Everton counterpart Howard Kendall have publicly stated . it's beginning to look like a two horse race for the Canon League title between two clubs whose successes in recent seasons have been almost entirely in one Cup competition or the other.

With the season well past the half way mark, Everton and Spurs had opened up a six point gap at the top of the table over the chasing group. And although that's far from being an uncatchable lead, recent form suggests that the title could well be heading for either Goodison Park or White

If Tottenham do carry off their first League prize for more than two decades much of the credit will fall on manager Shreeves, very much an unknown name outside North London when he succeeded Keith Burkinshaw last summer.

Once a player with Reading and in the non-League game, Shreeves turned to coaching when injury ended his career and progressed through the ranks with Spurs to replace Burkinshaw following last season's UEFA Cup suc-

During the close season the new manager raised almost £2 million from the sales of Steve Archibald to Barcelona and Alan Brazil to Manchester United and spent roughly half that figure on signing Clive Allen from QPR and winger

John Chiedozie from Notts County.

Although injuries have limited both Glenn Hoddle and Ossie Ardiles' appearances, Tottenham have shown the consistent streak that's always needed to win League titles and their form away from home has been particularly impressive . . . in their first game of the campaign they went to Everton and won 4-1.

Spurs won more than half their first 13 away games of the season and were the First Division's leading scorers on their travels in that period.

Heading the scorers list at the club is Mark Falco, having by far his most productive season with the club while Garth Crooks, who seemed set to leave White Hart Lane earlier in the season, recently went through a seven game spell scor-

But there's also been a marked improvement at the back and only Sheffield Wednesday could boast a better defensive record than Spurs away from home over the first half of the season.

That delights their manager who said in the early weeks of the campaign: 'We've no chance of winning the title if we concede as many goals as we have over the past two seasons. The whole team has to show some responsibility. Not just the defence'.

Former England keeper Ray Clemence who missed the climax to last season and the UEFA Cup Final win over Anderlecht has re-established himself in goal and is having an outstanding season while skipper Steve Perryman, cen-

tral defenders Graham Roberts and Paul Miller and full back Chris Hughton have been providing an effective defensive cover further forward.

Former Brighton man Gary Stevens, capped for the first time by England this season, has emerged to keep out another England man Gary Mabbutt in midfield while when Hoddle was missing, Mike Hazard suggested that he too could break through into the full international reckoning.

Chiedozie, one of the Division's most exciting wingers even when playing in a struggling Notts County side in recent seasons, has given Spurs an extra cutting edge on the right hand side with Tony Galvin providing a similar service on the opposite flank and although Falco and Crooks have been Spurs' main striking partnership recently, Allen, too, has come up with the goals when given his chance.

There haven't been too many opportunities this season for former Coventry full back Danny Thomas, nor for goalkeeper Tony Parkes, Spurs' UEFA Cup Final hero last May when he virtually won the cup on his own with a vital save in the penalty kick decider against Anderlecht at White Hart Lane.

Tottenham were due to meet Everton at home a couple of weeks ago in a game being billed as a potential title decider. And although the bad weather put paid to that, it's beginning to look as though that match, when fitted in, could provide the key to who takes over Liverpool's crown this season.

If the Championship does end up at White Hart Lane to end those barren years, then Spurs might look back to the first match of 1985 as one of the decisive moments.

Trailing 1-0 at half time at Highbury against North London rivals Arsenal, Tottenham struck back to win with second half goals from Crooks and Falco.

That performance showed Tottenham's new resilience. And that's a quality that all Champions need.

Iceland had never staged an outdoor soccer match in January and, adapting well to a newly laid artificial pitch, Luton took full advantage of the season's most bizarre expedition.



HATTERS

We welcome for today's pre-match entertainment the Royal Air Force Police Dog Demonstration Team.

Each year some 400 pedigree German Shepherd dogs join the RAF for Police training, as well as a substantial number of Labradors, Pointers, Spaniels and other working Retriever strains.

Since the first dogs joined the RAF in August 1941 over 9,500



have been trained. They have served almost everywhere that the RAF has served, and nine have won the Dicken Medal — the dog's VC.

To be suitable for training German Shepherd dogs or bitches should, preferably be aged between 15 and 36 months, although slightly younger or older dogs can be considered while the working retriever breeds should be aged between eight and 36 months.

The German Shepherd dogs are trained for security duties and general Police work, while the Retrievers receive special training to sniff out drugs, firearms and explosives. The dogs remain in service so long as they are fit for their



job and they are usually retired at about eight-years-old although a number do carry on until they reach the age of 12.

Anyone who has a dog to offer should write to the Royal Air Force Police School, RAF Newton, Nottingham, where expert handlers will arrange to see the animals in its own home.
