# Dispute on next round

A HOME tie with Third Division Millwall, and a very good chance of going into the semi-final, is the prize for the winners when Luton and Watford finally settle their local derby.

Few seats for Saturday's second replay are likely to be on general sale. Season ticket holders have until 5 pm immorrow evening to claim their seats, and Watford have been sent an allocation which was expected to be snapped up in quick time at Victarage Road.
