Everton continued their winning ways with a convincing win over Sunderland by four goals to one at Goodison Park. Andy Gray was the hero scoring twice — both classic headers. They flew by Sunderland goalkeeper Chris Turner in the 34th and 38th minutes after lan Wallace had put the Geordies in front in just 81 seconds. England's Trevor Steven got the third goal just six minutes into the second-half and an own goal by Gordon Chisholm saw the Toffee men retain their lead at the top of the Division.

West Ham United dented Tottenham Hotspur's Championship hopes by scoring with only five minutes to go. Ossie Ardiles returned to the big time after a long spell out with injuries, to put Spurs one up two minutes from the interval. West Ham raised their game and Roberts and company defended magnificently and they looked certain to hold



the home side at bay. Then Roberts made an error and Alan Dickens was on hand to score the equaliser. Two days later they visited QPR and ran into difficulties when they lost goalkeeper Tom McAlister who was taken to hospital with two broken ribs. Ray Stewart put on the goalkeepers sweater but by then John Lyall's team had lost its composure and the points. John Byrne opened the scoring after just 38 seconds and Tony Cottee equalised on the stroke of half-time. Bannister (2) and Terry Fenwick put the game beyond the Hammers' reach before Cottee grabbed a late consolation.

Norwich City must be glad that Easter is over as they were beaten at Highbury by 2-0. Charlie Nicholas and Stewart Robson responded to Don Howe's ultimation to get results. Norwich manager Ken Brown wasn't to happy about Nicholas's involvement with former Arsenal player John Devine. That foul was diabolical. To hit someone like that with your elbow and not be sent off was rank bad refereeing.

He went on to say about the games other flash point, a touchline clash between rival skippers Watson and Rix, 'It was just a fair challenge for the ball. The game is about competing, not fighting with your handbags.' At Carrow Road on Monday they again were in trouble as they were beaten by neighbours Ipswich Town 2-0. Throughout the game there were some hefty tackles and referee Colin Downey worked overtime to keep the game under control. Six names went into his book before Asa Hartford made a reckless tackle on Mark Brennan and was given an early bath.

Ipswich went in front after six minutes when Terry Butcher glanced in a header from a Gates free-kick then with the second-halfonly a minute old Mich D'Avray powered in a rightfooted shot to give Ipswich the points which lifted them out of the relegation area. They also had a fine win over Nottingham Forest on the previous Saturday when Alan Sunderland playing only his 16th match of the season scored with a rare header from an Eric Gates corner.

An explosive but miss-cued shot by Kerry Dixon gave Chelsea the winning goal against QPR but he wasn't complaining nor was his boss John Hollins. 'If Kerry had hit it properly the keeper might have 'saved it.' The game itself never lived up to expectations and as Hollins said 'Local derbys are never what they are cracked up to be. It was a poor first-half and didn't improve a lot in the second.' Manchester United didn't have any sympathy for lowly Stoke City as they swept to a 5-0 victory. Manager Bill Asprey said 'They are a class side, the best in the country and if Everton slip up United will be there.' Two goals apiece from Mark Hughes and Jesper Olsen and one from Norman Whiteside were the United scorers.

Stoke again ran into trouble on Monday at the Victoria ground when Luton Town were the visitors in the relegation battle. Two goals from Mick Harford and one apiece from Nwajiobi and Moss saw the Hatters move out of the bottom three for the first time since Christmas.

Watford's new striker Colin West was again on target with a goal in the match against Southampton at Vicarage Road, and only some brave goalkeeping by Peter Shilton stopped him from adding to his goal tally. It was the Saint's veteran Nick Holmes who rescued his side with a goal with five minutes left to play when he headed in a George Lawrence 'chip' into an empty net. Watford manager Graham Taylor said' It was a scrappy game but I thought we did enough to win.'

Sunderland and Newcastle played out a goalless draw at Roker Park whilst West Bromwich Albion won the Midlands derby match against Aston Villa with a goal after 10 minutes from Carl Valentine. Albion manager Johnny Giles said after the m⁻¹ch 'That was a heart stopper. They dominated the secondhalf and we were hanging on. I thought we defended well.'

Everton moved a step nearer the Championship title on Tuesday without kicking a ball when Sheffield Wednesday beat Manchester United by 1-0 at Hillsborough, Lee Chapman scoring the important goal. The same evening saw Southampton go a step nearer a place in Europe when they defeated Leicester City at the Dell 3-1. This victory was not won without a disaster as Danny Wallace their England Under-21 star broke his ankle and will be out for the rest of the season. 





FA CUP VERSUS MILLWALL 13.3.85

Recently the FA Enquiry was held which related to the incidents that took place prior to, during and after the match. The enquiry decided that the club were guilty of misconduct and we shall be looking seriously at appealing the FA decision. In our view, the fencing in our family enclosure and our own season seating ticket holders defies all logic. They were never at any time involved in the crowd misbehaviour. It was not our fans who wrecked our town, our stadium and the trains enroute.

We have an excellent disciplinary record, spanning fourteen years. This decision is a direct response to outside factors where more fencing was called for. But surely not the families' areas whom we are asked to actively encourage, and surely not our season ticket holders.

In our view, this decision has been influenced by other factors. Indeed, we were asked not to make a Press Statement until the DOE have been informed.

But Luton Town will not be tainted in this way, and will continue to protect the interests of its families and season ticket holders. We are not guilty as charged, by the Referee's Report, and we shall therefore be taking the issue at least to Appeal.





When Harford made it 2-0 immediately after the restart the home fans turned their attention to the directors box calling for action, but it was the Town who gave them the action.



Mick Harford scoring his second goal only three minutes after the break.




Welcome return by Hatters winger David Moss keeps control of the left wing.



The Canon League goalscoring awards for the season will be worth another $\pounds 2,500$ following the cancellation of the January award because weather caused so many postponements.


