Kick Off

Our last two League matches have proved beyond doubt that we are worthy members of the First Division — as if we had any doubts!

At Anfield our supporters outsung the famous Kop and became the first team to score three goals against the Reds at home for over three years. Our team's performance deserved a reward; a point or even three, but it wasn't to be and we had to leave Anfield content that we had played our part in what Liverpool manager Joe Fagan described as "one of the best matches at Anfield for a long while".

Last Monday we faced a different challenge — how to beat the boring tactics adopted by Sheffield Wednesday. We've seen a great deal of Wednesday this season and have a lot of respect for their players but none at all for the way in which they are used. Our supporters summed up our feelings perfectly when they chanted that Sheffield's offside tactics were 'killing the game'. Well said.

Our 2-1 victory was an important one as we chase UEFA Cup qualification and a victory for creativity over destructive tactics.

This evening we welcome Luton Town, who always try to play attractive football and are very aware of the responsibility that all clubs face to entertain their public.

The First Division table now reveals that our visitors should maintain their First Division status next season, and that, even if we win our remaining fixtures, we may have to wait on Southampton's results to see if we are to compete in the UEFA Cup in 1985-86. No doubt our readers will have heard by now of how the club lost a £1m contract with a prospective sponsor because of the behaviour of 'supporters' at the Chelsea-Sunderland match. This news was splashed on the front page of 'Bridge News' and subsequently repeated on Match of the Day and in the national newspapers. The exposure given to this story has caused embarrassment to the company concerned and not helped us as we try to attract a new club sponsor. But this search must continue and the day we find a new 'partner' will be an occasion for celebration for it will be further proof that the battle over hooliganism is being won.

"With the season nearly complete, I think I'll be looking back quite soon over the events of the last few months and have some regrets that we've not managed to win a trophy. The way the team has played this season has been a revelation considering how few of them have experienced life in the First Division. Of course the competition we came closest to winning was the Milk Cup and there's little doubt that we were the best side of the four semi-finalists. The first half at Roker Park in the semi-final was the most significant of the whole season as we lost Joe McLaughlin through injury, and had Colin Lee and Mickey Thomas both struggling with further knocks. Up until then we had looked solid in nearly all our matches but with those injuries we looked a completely different side. So that was unfortunate for us but we had a good run without injuries last season so must expect the odd set back.

After losing that first leg, we then lost two

away games at Coventry and Ipswich, grounds where we would expect to bring home good results. Those two defeats have made qualification for Europe a lot harder than it should have been, but generally the team have recovered well from the disappointments of February and, as I write, are beginning to gather momentum again.

When I see how many games some of the lads have played this season I think we perhaps should have rested some of them earlier in the season. It's never easy to tell a player he's being rested but at one stage when we were having a number of games in the space of a few days we maybe should have brought in some of the excellent players in the reserve team. That would have given them valuable experience and allowed the regular first-teamers to rest their knocks and bruises properly.

A few of our youngsters have won places in the League side recently, and judging by their performances we should have no worries about the quality of player being produced by our youth programme. As always we shall be seeing if the squad can be strengthened before next season but a major priority has to be the pitch, which is in poor shape and not suitable for our ball players at all. The spadework has been done — not literally! — to ensure we have a better surface next season.

So onto our visitors, Luton, who thrilled everyone with their performance against Everton in the F.A. Cup. I wouldn't blame David Pleat and his men for feeling annoyed about the 1-2 defeat as they played exceptionally well in the first 90 minutes and the free-kick which led to Everton's equaliser was far from clear-cut. On that showing they are far too good a team to be relegated so I hope they pull clear from the danger area, and that they can do without the three points we want to win today!

All that's left is for me to thank you all for your support of all our teams this season and enjoy the summer."



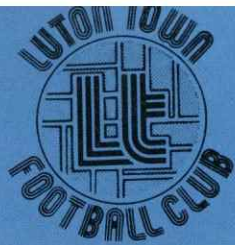

FLASHBACK

PAST ENCOUNTERS

It is only comparatively recently that Chelsea and Luton Town have been regularly involved in Football League meetings. Indeed, Chelsea were more than 50 years old before the first such confrontation took place on March 30th 1956. Before that there had been an F.A. Cup tie at Stamford Bridge on January 8th 1927 when Chelsea won a one-sided contest by four clear goals. And a much more memorable occasion occurred, in the same competition, six years later when the "Hatters" extracted a full measure of revenge by winning a replay at Kenilworth Road, 2-0, before a record crowd (at that time) of 23,041, after a worthy one-all draw in the first instalment four days earlier.

There have also been connections between the clubs in transfer dealings. The legendary "ten goal" Joe Payne was signed from Luton in March 1938 but, unhappily, before he had had a real opportunity to make his mark in a Chelsea team in urgent need of rejuvenation the outbreak of World War II had stifled a career of great promise. Even so his 21 goals from 41 games is not to be scorned and, in fact, as Sergeant J. Payne (R.A.F.), he became one of the most prolific goalscorers in war-time football in the south of England. Later, two other stalwarts followed the same trail. It was another "transfer deadline" move which brought Welsh international full-back Billy Hughes and forward Hughie Billington to Stamford Bridge in March 1948. Having first helped to banish the threat of relegation they then became vital parts of a team which took Chelsea to two epic semi-final encounters against Arsenal at White Hart Lane two years later. Hughes was one of the most stylish and cultured defenders of his day; Billington a forceful and powerfully-built attacker who, although nearing the twilight of a long career, made the transition from Third to First Division football with a minimum of difficulty as his tally of 32 goals from 90 first-team outings indicates.

Since the League battles began thirty years ago there have been several exciting and tense tussles of which the two in the 1979-80 season stand out. It was on New Year's Day when Luton (second in Division Two) and Chelsea (third with the same number of points) met for the first of these games. And a wonderfully thrilling and entertaining match ensued, with the teams sharing six goals on a bone-hard surface, passed as fit to play only after an early morning inspection. Three times Town took the lead, through Mike Saxby, Mal Donaghy and David Moss; three times Chelsea levelled the score via Mike Fillery, Ian Britton and, finally, Clive Walker, who raced clear in typical fashion to lob a late equaliser into the net as Jake Findlay came off his line. In between all this activity Luton had two goals disallowed — "the first offside decision against us was tragic enough," said their manager, David Pleat, afterwards. "But the second took the wind right out of our sails. Even so I can't think of two other Second Division teams who could have produced such a splendid game. I hope we go up together."

Sadly, that didn't happen. In the return game at The Bridge, on Easter Monday, Tony Grealish opened the scoring for Luton with a long-range effort from thirty yards and this seemed likely to prove decisive until Colin Lee, twenty seconds from the end, scored his first-ever goal for Chelsea to force another division of the points. And even that last-gasp effort needed a deflection off a defender to beat Findlay and leave poor Mr Pleat, once more justifiably, bemoaning his team's misfortune. "All I can say is that if we don't go up this season I hope we'll have Chelsea's luck next year." In fact, he was forced to wait two years before promotion was achieved, two years ahead of Chelsea's elevation to the top class.

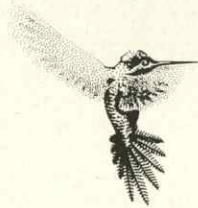

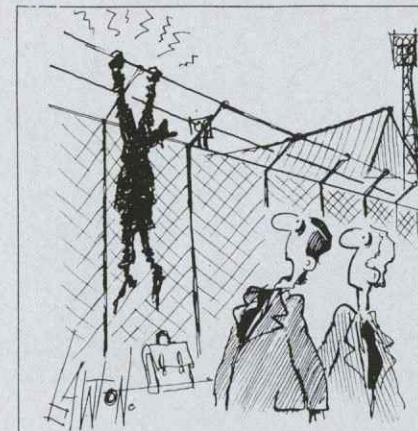

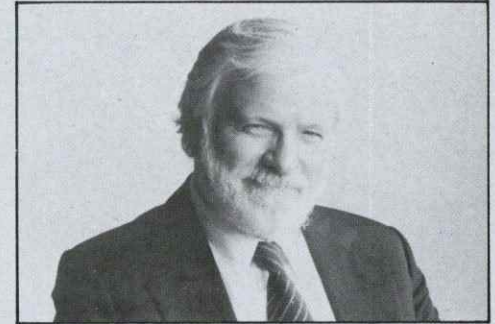
A win tonight will put us 7th, so cheer the lads on and we look forward to seeing you here next Tuesday, for the season's final game with Norwich.

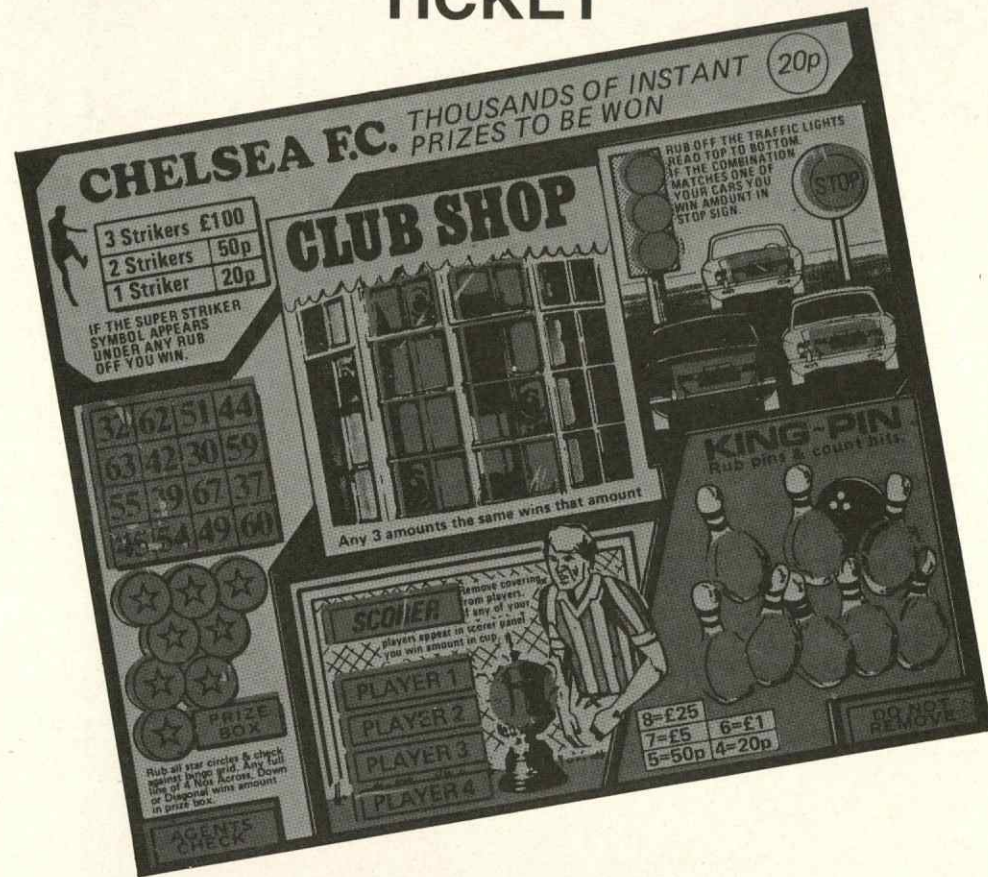

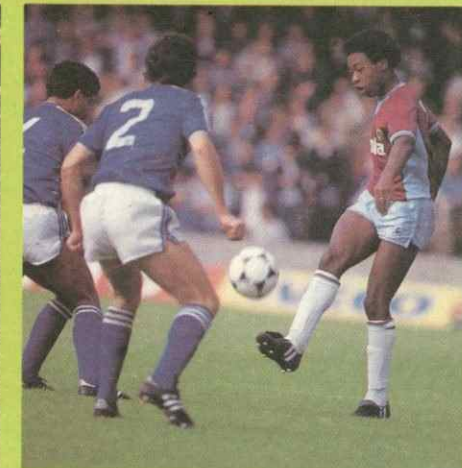
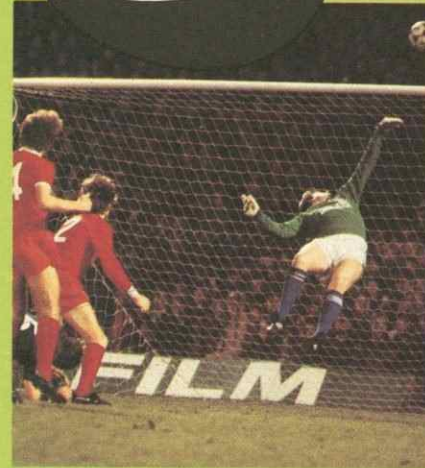

CHELSEA SPOTLIGHT

TERRY HOWARD

*talks to
Hugh Hastings*

Q: Tell us a bit about your background.

T: Well I've been at Chelsea nearly four years now. I stayed on at school to get some qualifications and signed for Chelsea later than the other players who were apprentices with me. When I joined the club I was a centre-half but Gwyn Williams moved me to right-back for a match when we had two other central defenders playing and I've been in the position ever since. My first game in the reserves came against Watford when I was a 16 year old. The club were struggling a bit that day and put a few 'unknowns' out. I think I've played about 60 games for the reserves so I was hoping for a first team opportunity. The management said that the younger players would be given a chance towards the end of the season and they've kept their word. I couldn't ask for any more as there's such a large squad at Chelsea. At the moment there are six players trying for the full-back positions; myself, Darren Wood, Colin Lee, Keith Dublin, Doug Rougvie and Joey Jones, so I'm delighted to have been given the chance to establish myself.

Q: Is it good to be a member of such a large squad?

T: It's good for the club, but not always for the individuals. But it keeps us on our toes and makes us better players. It really is a case of one mistake and you could be out of the first team.

Q: Was First Division football everything you expected it to be?

T: It's far quicker than I thought it would be. I've travelled with the first team squad to League matches on a number of occasions, but I never appreciated watching from the stands just how quick the game is. Players have very little time on the ball, especially with the way we play, which is to get the ball up to Kerry, David or Gordon as fast as possible.

Q: Did you enjoy your debut against Aston Villa's Mark Walters?

T: Very much. He was a tough man to face being one of the most skilful players in the First Division. I was quite pleased with my debut. I know I haven't set the stage alight in my games so far, but I think I've been steady, which is what's required from the defenders.

Q: You've scored seven goals for the reserves this season, so you're clearly an attacking full-back. Can we expect a more adventurous approach from you in the near future?

T: I would hope so. I like to get forward as much as possible for the reserves but opportunities for attacking in the League have been limited so far. In the reserves I often have a younger player opposite me on the wing and I can risk the occasional wander upfront, but in the first team it's up to me to stick to my responsibilities. You can't afford to give players like Galvin or Walters any spare room. Most of the goals have been hit with my left peg, the 'swinger', after I've cut inside from the wing and I had one such effort against Spurs, but not a very good one.

Q: How helpful are your team-mates during the first team matches so far. Do they encourage you or are they too busy concentrating on their own games and leave you to look after yourself?

T: They've been very good. They've got their own jobs to do but have still found time to give me advice. Eddie and the back three defenders have been very helpful, correcting my positional play whenever I've wandered.

Q: Had you played in front of a crowd before making your League debut?

T: No, the most I'd played in front of was a few thousand for a Youth Cup match at Sheffield Wednesday two years ago. I found the fans quite helpful as I could hear them calling where to play the ball at times. Unfortunately, I spent too long listening to them on one occasion against Villa and Walters took the ball off my toe but the fans seem to have forgiven me for that.

Q: If you could plan your career over the next few years what would it be?

T: I'd like to play as many games as possible this season then challenge strongly for the right-back position next season. It's going to be tough but the competition is going to make me a better player.

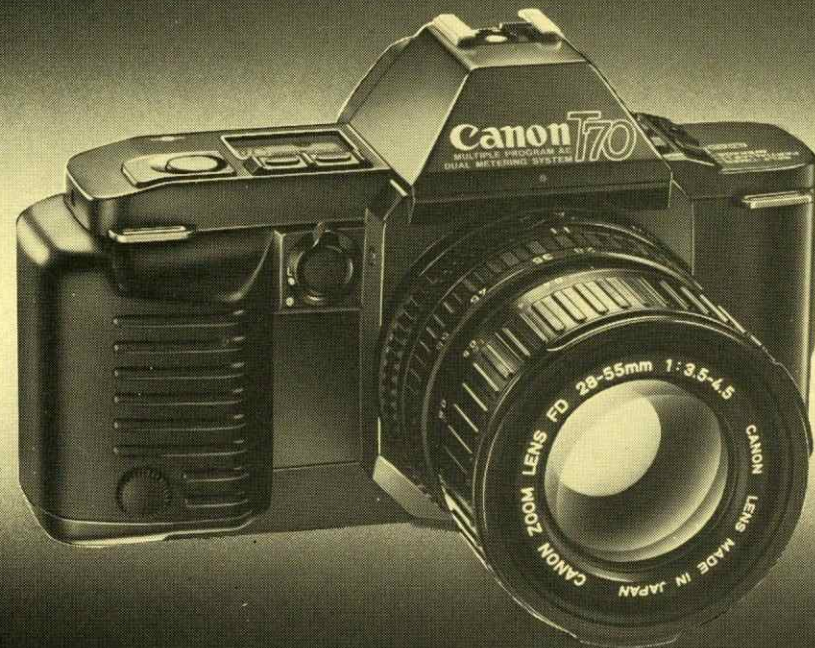
Q: Are you, like Darren and Colin, a player who can put in good performances in a variety of positions?

T: I don't think so; I've played in midfield a couple of times this season but I've not really got the stamina for the role. Apart from that I suppose I could still play centre-half although it's a long time since I've played there.

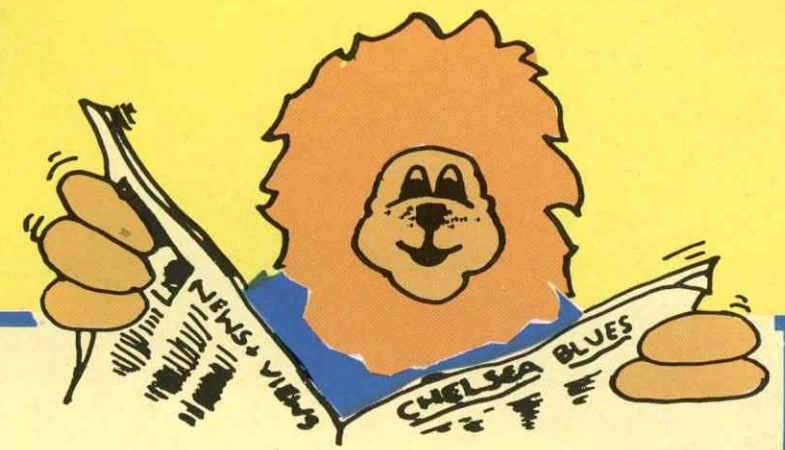

● NEXT SEASON'S PROGRAMME

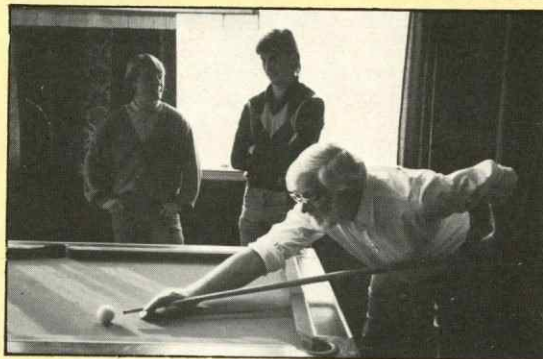
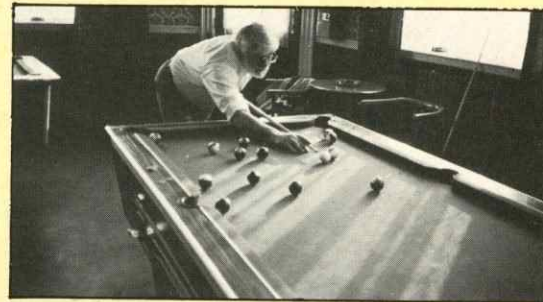
