A MICK Harford penalty gave Luton their first win of the season at Upton Park

yesterday.

A gritty determined performance secured the points for the Hatters, who had to withstand a blistering last five minutes of pressure, in a match short on thrills and punctuated by a series of spills.

Rob Johnson, the 23year-old Hatter whose career was twice nearly finished by crippling knee injuries, was given the chance to resurrect his future at Upton Park yesterday. Johnson, preferred

Grimes, was the only change from the Luton team that drew 2-2 with Newcastle on Wednesday.

West Ham included £340,000 signing Frank McAvennie who David Pleat tried to lure to Kenilworth during the summer. When the teams met at Upton Park last season, both were in danger of relegation and the game ended 0-0.
