HOW could Luton play some of the best football they have ever produced and then four days later dish up some of the worst?

Even master tactician David Pleat couldn't find a ready answer. "Some things you can't explain," he said.

There was no obvious reason why a team that threatened to annihilate Arsenal such a short time before should hit rock bottom at Villa Park.

The first-half display, which ended with the Town trailing by three goals and thankful it wasn't more, was atrocious.

It was a day when almost everything went wrong. Individuals made basic errors they may never repeat.

Villa were never contained and Hatters looked void of ideas when they had a chance to go forward.

The defence, midfield and attack played like three independent units, with rarely a hint of cohesion.

There were no excuses. The side that began the game was virtually the same line-up that gave Arsenal such a hard time.

The only difference was Johnson replacing Parker in midfield, although a substitution meant these two swapping places in the second-half.

On paper Villa looked beaten. Injuries

meant no Williams, Evans, Gibson and Gray and Liverpool-bound McMahon was left out.

Unfortunately, former England international Mark Walters chose this day to make up for his absent friends by having the game of his life.

The gloom began after two minutes when Walters rounded Dibble as the keeper advanced beyond his penalty area and Nicholas had to clear off the line, conceding a corner.

Celebrated

The corner kick was poorly defended and Walters had room to produce a bicycle kick to put Villa ahead.

Steve Hodge celebrated his home debut, following his transfer from Forest by scoring after 15 minutes, a shot deflected in by Donaghy.

The third goal which killed the game came after 34 minutes when flying winger Daley crossed from the left and Norton steered the ball past Dibble.

It was really one-way traffic with only a flash of Luton attacking to savour, notably a back header by Thomas

following Hatters' first corner of the game and a drive by Harford, well tipped over.

Dibble produced a great save from Hodge during the Villa siege on Luton's goal.

Luton started the second-half with more purpose but frankly it could hardly get worse. There was more emphasis on footballing their way forward and the familiar flowing moves began to reappear.

After 53 minutes there was reward as Breacker charged forward, found Stein in space and the striker, Luton's best performer on the day, slotted the ball past Spink.

The 10,524 crowd, Villa's lowest ever for a Division One game, saw Stein net again but given offside.

The second-half, much more of a contest than the first, featured close efforts from both sides, Dibble producing another memorable save and Harford going close twice.

But this is one the Luton contingent will want to forget.
