




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LUTON TOWN


No swearing, please!

Brian Stein could not have scripted it better himself—a hattrick on his 28th birthday, completed with a last-minute penalty against England's most-capped goalkeeper. It was our best win in the First Division.

Yet, Brian was not the only hero, as he pointed out afterwards: "Mick Harford was brilliant. He and Emeka made some fantastic runs, produced some fantastic movement today. The whole team was great."

It was the fourth hat-trick of Brian's League career—two in the First Division and two in the Second. He took home the match ball and a bottle of Champagne as the man of the match.

"I'll just go out for a quick meal to celebrate," he said with a smile. But he said he had felt terrible before the kick-off! "After our trip to Trinidad—where we had a great time and played superbly—I coudn't get any sleep when we got back.

"I took some sleeping pills but they didn't make any difference. Before the game, we were saying how jaded we felt."



seen many fine Town performances since he came to Kenilworth Road to join David Pleat's staff in June 1970. But none allowed him to relax so early in a game as our recent 7-0 victory over Southampton. Today he gives his views on the value and the background of that historic result, our best win in the First Division.

"It was the first time I have ever sat back and relaxed during a first team game since I came here. Once we were 4-0 up in the second half, the pressure was off and I was able to sit back and enjoy the performance. It was not the same at Stoke last season because we were still in relegation trouble and had the FA Cup semi-final looming up. I was worried about injuries.

"But against Southampton, once the fourth goal went in, we looked at each other in the dug-out and relaxed. We had had a spell away in Trinidad where we played two games and it was the perfect end for a good week. In a way, it came as a bit of a surprise-but you have to be ready for anything in this game.

"We had only arrived back at the ground on Thursday at midday after a night flight and we deliberately got the players to do some training. To get their body clocks back to British time. All they wanted to do was go off to bed. But we wanted them to stay up, do some training, and then watch the golf on television or something before going to sleep.

"The trip was great for team spirit. It is always nice to get away like that. In some ways the team spirit it fostered came out in our performance. The basis of all good play is good teamwork and that needs understanding and a good team spirit. We have worked on a lot of things and I was pleased it came off on that day though I am always pleased to see goals going in, especially the scrappy ones. They can make all the difference—like the one Kerry Dixon scored here for Chelsea.

"Of course it adds an extra satisfaction when you can score seven goals against a team with as a good defensive record as Southampton had before they met us and against a goalkeeper like Peter Shilton who had been the centre of attention in the newspapaers all week. Does the new artificial pitch help us? Any home pitch helps is the real answer, I think. Like all the teams in the First Division, we shall have to play on wet, dry, hard, waterlogged, muddy and perfect pitches during the course of the season.

Professionalism

"Anyone who wants to play can on our pitch. The bounce is perfect and it invites a good performance. If just happens that Southampton crumbled on that day. It is also a good thing to set records. Always nice to do that. We did not want to let in a goal in the last minute and win 7-1 because we want to have pride in our performance. Right up to the final whistle. That is real professionalism.

"People are talking about a super league and I know all our players want to be a part of it. On their performances and their entertainment value, they should be. I'd like to think we can do it again and score a seven-goal win, but it will be more difficult now because teams will come and defend. But that is just another pressure, another part of the game we have to learn to handle. It is another test of our character as we try to climb into the top group of clubs."

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





Introducing Norwich



AFTER their success last season in winning the Milk Cup at Wembley with a 1—0 victory over Sunderland, our visitors tonight Norwich City suffered a nightmare end to their First Division campaign and were unexpectedly relegated. The shock had its effects throughout the club and, coupled with the ban on English clubs in Europe, left the Canaries not only in the Second Division, but facing up to a season of hard work to regain their status instead of a rewarding term including the bonus of European football at Carrow Road.

Manager Ken Brown, one of the most popular men in the game, was forced to put the accent on youth and veterans Mike Channon and Asa Hartford stepped aside to make room for the younger men brought in to stimulate a promotion challenge.

Last week, it seemed as if Brown was finding the right blend as the Canaries followed up a good 3—1 home win over Shrewsbury—which lifted them to sixth in the Second Division table—with a 1—0 victory over Everton

at Carrow Road in the Super Cup, Peter Mendham notably finding the net in both games.

David Williams—Cardiff-born midfielder David joined Norwich from Bristol Rovers where he was player-manager.

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



Mail on Sunday: "After the midweek euphoria of Wembley and the promise of Mexico to come, England's Peter Shilton and Mark Wright were brought crashing back to earth at Kenilworth Road.

And ironically it was Brian Stein and Ricky Hill, who now appear to be out of the England reckoning, who produced the Luton style that shattered the Saints."

Sunday Telegraph: "Brian Stein celebrated his 28th birthday by smashing a thrilling hattrick as Luton demolished Southampton at Kenilworth Road yesterday with a magnificent exhibition of attacking football.

The victory was Luton's best in the First Division since Sunderland were crushed 8—2 in 1955 and but for some astonishing Shilton saves would almost certainly have been

enlarged to double figures."


The Sunday Times: "This was Southampton's biggest defeat since Peter Shilton took up residence in their goal, and Luton's biggest win since they came back into the First Division. On Wednesday Shilton became England's most capped 'keeper and had nothing to do. This morning he'll have a backache from picking the ball out of the net.

For Luton it was not a flattering result. Indeed, if it hadn't been for some euphoria in the dying minutes, Stein could have scored two


hat-tricks instead of one.'

Daily Mail: "But if Stein's hat-trick hunger sent Harford home goalless then he may find impressive consolation in Stein's words of praise. Stein said: 'Mick must be England's best centre-forward. In touch and movement he is far ahead of both Mark Hateley and Kerry Dixon.'

Similarly, Luton were streets ahead of Saints. Harford gave England stopper Wright a nightmare time and had it not been for the agility of Peter Shilton, Luton would have topped double figures."

CALLOUR

TONIGHT'S Cup meeting with our old friends Norwich City is sure to stir a few old memories. Although we have met them before in the League/Milk Cup, it is more likely the match will arouse thoughts in other directions however. For over the years we have had many stirring battles with the Canaries in the Southern League, the Football League and, of course, the FA Cup.

Our first meetings with Norwich took place during our Southern League days of 1905-06 and during the time that has elapsed since we have met them on 50 further occasions in the Football League alone. Equality remains the overall feeling after all these years in the league encounters, but we definitely hold the edge when it comes to the cup competitions.

In the FA Cup we began with a 6-0 triumph in 1927-28—a result, incidentally, which remains the Canaries' worse in that competition. A crowd of 10,750 saw that particular second round match on December 12. 1927 when Sidney Reid hit a hattrick and James Yardley, Harry Woods and George Dennis added the other goals. Jack Slicer who later played for the Town was on the left wing for Norwich that day.

The next meeting in the FA Cup between the two clubs did not take place until 1959 when we met in that famous semi-final-a hard-earned but sweet victory for the Town, but a defeat that the Canaries, then in the First Division, still talk about with some sadness. A Billy Bingham goal in the replay at St. Andrews, Birmingham, after a 1-1 draw at White Hart Lane, was enough to see us through to Wembley and an FA Cup Final against Nottingham Forest.

Our most recent meeting in the FA Cup took place at Carrow Road in a fourth round tie on January 24, 1967 when City, then in the First Division, took sweet revenge for their 1959 defeat with a 2-0 victory in a disappointing game.

The first Football League meeting was on November 20, 1920, at Kenilworth Road, where
