Well said Terry.

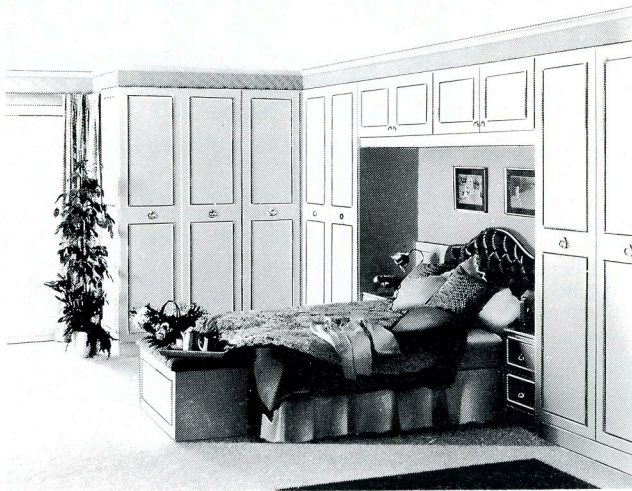

FA SHY BLOND BOY

A quiet, blond 14-year-old lad blinked at me through a thick fringe of hair. "Robert Peel founded the police force," I dictated. He and his classmates dutifully wrote. He stood out from the rest—a rowdy, boisterous group—because he was so quiet. He didn't seem to have any particular talent. The P.E. staff at his school used to talk about potential professional sportsman they taught. But this boy's name was never mentioned. He is now Coventry City's captain.

I talked to Wayne Turner's mother after our match against Coventry in November. She'd hoped to see him play, but a knee and ankle injuries have dogged him this season. Nevertheless, he's settled well at Coventry and revels in his new rôle.

FA Cup semi-final

I asked what it was like to have a First Division football captain as a son. Mrs. Turner clearly enjoys the way she is treated when she visits Coventry. She finds it a very friendly club; being Wayne's mother increases her status. She doesn't treat Wayne any differently from his brothers; she watches all her sons play football. A prior engagement prevented her watching the FA Cup semi-final last season. "I wasn't going to alter long-standing arrangements just because Wayne was playing," she said. "Besides, he wouldn't have wanted me to."

He recently bought his own house in Luton. "I see more of him now than I did when he was at home," said Mrs. Turner. "He brings me his washing and calls in for meals about four times a week." An experience shared by many mums whose sons have set up on their own.

Like me, she can't account for the transformation from retiring boy to gregarious man-about-town. She's clearly and justifiably proud of him—as she is of all her children. But can't he, on a captain's wages, afford his own automatic washing machine?

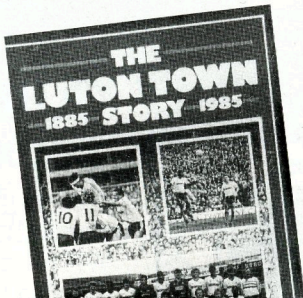

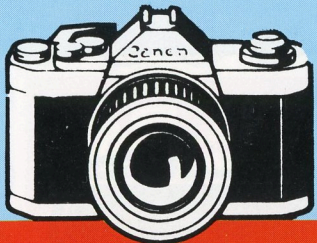

STEIN AT THE DOUBLE

Luton Town 2 Manchester City 1
Brian Stein hit a goal in each half to give the Town their fourth win in five League games and consolidate their grip on eighth position in the table last Saturday at Kenilworth Road.

Stein scored after three minutes and 64 minutes, both goals following free kicks by David Preece. City's Mark Lillis pulled a goal back six minutes from time from the penalty spot after Tim Breacker had upended Paul Power.

Broken bone

Strangely, on the last occasion Stein scored twice against City, two years ago, when we won 3-1, he was to limp off with a broken bone in his foot. Last Saturday, it was Emeka Nwajobi's misfortune to suffer a similar injury. Emeka is expected to be out until the New Year.

Views

from the bench

Manchester City manager Billy McNeill was as forthright and intelligent in his after-match press conference last week, when he discussed his team's defeat at Kenilworth Road, as he always appeared to be in his sterling and famous performances at the centre of Celtic's defence in the 1960's when the Glasgow team became the first British side to win the European Cup. Today he gives his views on the way in which his team and others play and adapt to the specialised demands of our synthetic pitch.

Home advantage

"The new synthetic surfaces are definitely a big advantage for the home teams as I think it takes the away sides a while to get settled down. For example, today, we were a goal down before we knew what was happening or had found our feet. We hadn't got used to the pitch and of course Luton are much more used to it than us and play just the right sort of football for it.

"Mind you Luton are a very much more exciting team to watch on their synthetic surface than Queens Park Rangers at Loftus Road on their pitch. But once you are behind against a team it is always uphill afterwards and I thought Luton played very well, passing well and making the ball move around quickly and accurately. They have got some very good players.

"Of course one of the problems with these sort of surfaces is that they are hard and this was shown when Clive Wilson was hurt. He went off with concussion after taking a hard knock and falling. Mind you, I wouldn't have fancied being the meat in a sandwich between

big Elliott and McCarthy.

"Overall though, like most managers who have been down here, I think the pitch plays very well. It is certainly not half as bad as some people say or want you to think it is! I think a lot of the problems the players have when they play on it may be in the mind, you know. The big thing is what you as an individual think of it... if you like it and relish the idea of playing in it, then fine, if not—then you've got problems haven't you?

"I think if you took a poll among the players, however, most of them would vote against it. They are traditionalists really, you know. Luton's lads are skilful and their style of play, a lot of accurate passing and good running, is well suited to it. It's the sort of football that would suit any good surface anyway, mind you. You've got to get on the pitch and get on with it and that's it.

Old-fashioned striker

"We practised on it for an hour or so during the week before and that gave us some idea of how it would be, but it didn't make much difference. Luton have got some great players and they are a very strong side—Harford is a real handful, an old-fashioned centre-forward really, and Stein always caused us problems. We couldn't close him down at all. Harford is a good foil for him up front and they looked very good.

"In theory I suppose the pitch helped Luton, but at the end of the day it is the same for both teams. Another interesting point—in theory—is that regular playing on this kind of surface should be good for skills and should lead to a steady improvement in them."

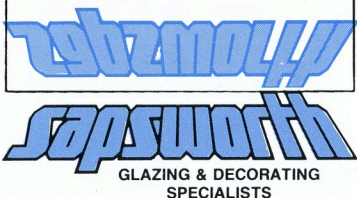

ONE MAN AND HIS DOG

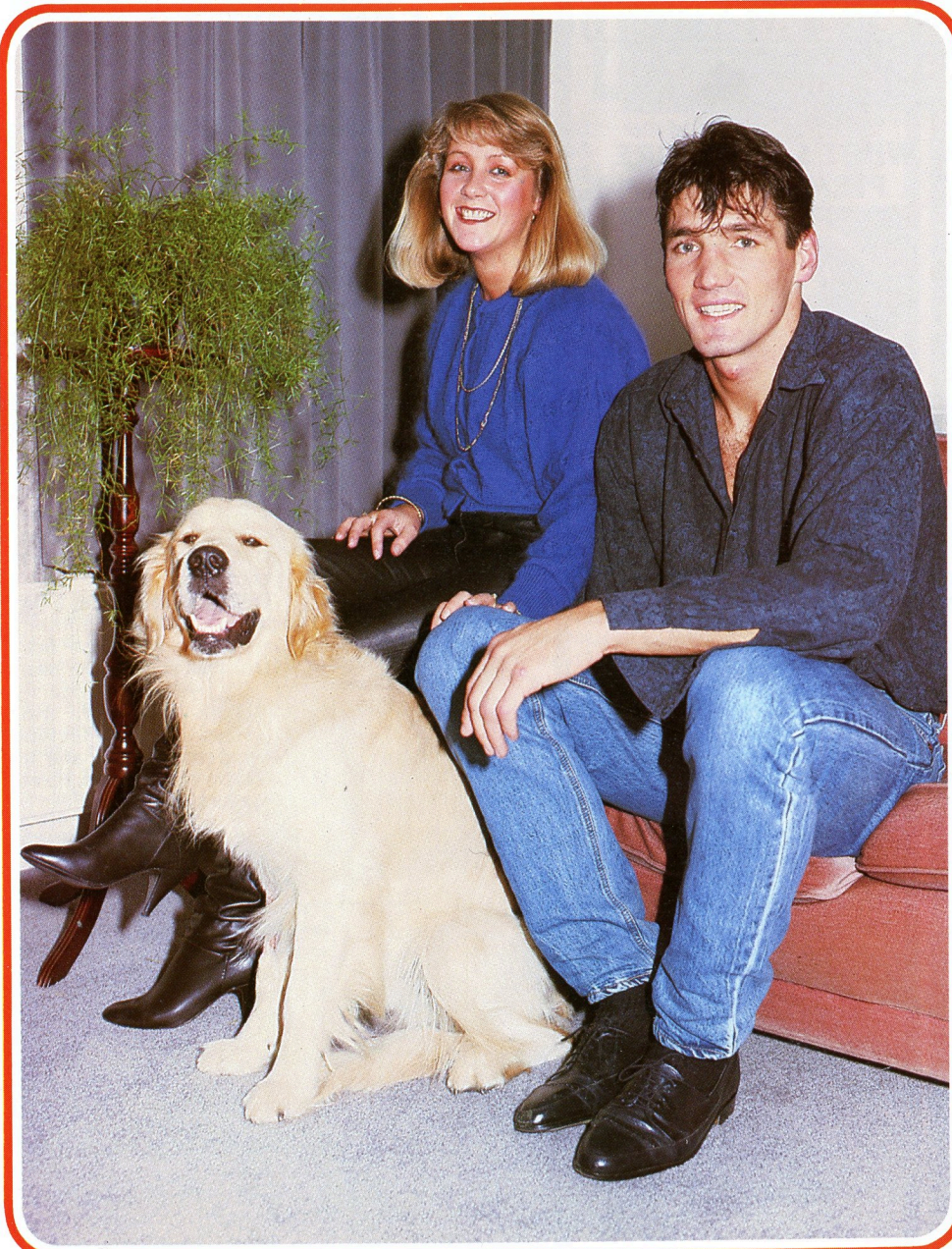

Introducing Newcastle United



NEWCASTLE United arrive here this afternoon riding high in the First Division and fresh from a victory over Leicester City at St. James' Park last weekend. After all the traumas they suffered at the start of the season, when former manager Jack Charlton resigned in a blaze of national publicity following close-season reaction to the transfer of winger Chris Waddle to Tottenham, it is a credit to the current man in charge, Willie McFaul, that the Magpies have kept their composure and made the most of a bright opening run.

Newcastle started with two draws—including our 2-2 meeting on August 21—and then reeled off three wins before going down 3-0 at Old Trafford. Since then their results have been mixed with heavy defeats by Spurs and Forest compensated by good wins over WBA, Oxford and Aston Villa.

Players likely to be on duty today:
John Anderson—Dublin-born John, 26, began his career at West Brom in 1977, moved to Preston in 1979 and went to Newcastle in

1982 on a free transfer. An Eire international, he is a strong and versatile defender.

John Bailey—John, an England "B" defender, joined Newcastle from Everton in October for £80,000. He began his career with Blackburn. Now 28.

Peter Beardsley—Last season's top scorer, Peter cost £125,000 from Vancouver Whitecaps in 1983. Born in Tyneside in 1961.
Jeff Clarke—Jeff, born in Pontefract in 1954, is now 31. He joined Newcastle from Sunderland on a free transfer in July 1982 after starting his career at Manchester City.
Peter Gascoigne—Youth team captain last season, Paul, born on Tyneside in May 1967. Made his debut against QPR last April. Led the youth team to FA Youth Cup final win over Watford.

Glenn Roeder—Elegant former QPR defender Glenn joined Newcastle in December 1983. Born in Woodford, Essex on December 13th, 1955.

Ian Stewart—Another former QPR forward,



Willie McFaul was appointed manager of Newcastle United following Jack Charlton's shock resignation in August. He had spent most of his career at St. James' Park after arriving from Linfield in 1966 for a fee of £7,000. He developed into a fine goalkeeper and would certainly have won many Northern Ireland internationals caps, but for the brilliance of Pat Jennings in goal throughout his career. Willie played for Newcastle in their European Fairs Cup win over Ujpest Dozsa of Hungary in 1969 and was an FA Cup finalist in 1974. He was previously right-hand man to former managers Bill McGarry, Arthur Cox and Jack Charlton. He is 42.

Ian joined Newcastle in August for £150,000. A Northern Ireland international winger, he made his debut earlier this season against the Town.

Martin Thomas—Joined Newcastle from Bristol Rovers in March 1983 and has developed into a regular Welsh under-21 international and one of the most promising goalkeepers in the First Division. Born November 1959.

Kenny Wharton—Newcastle's longest-serving player. Born Newcastle, November 1960, he has more than 200 first team appearances behind him since joining in January 1979.

David McCreery—Belfast-born midfielder David signed from Tulsa Roughnecks after previous experience with Manchester United, and QPR. An experienced Northern Ireland international midfielder. Born 1957.

Billy Whitehurst—Born in Thurnscoe in June 1959, Billy joined United this week from Brian Horton's Hull City in a £250,000 deal. A tall and powerful striker, Billy makes his debut here today.

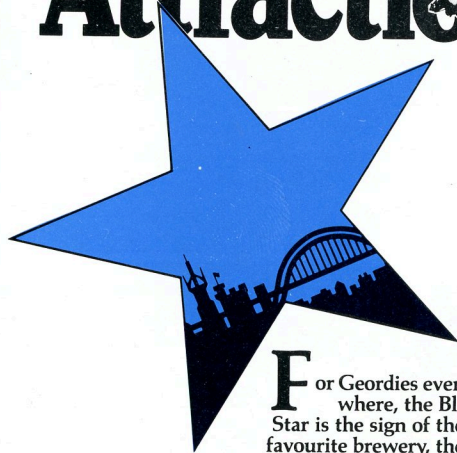

Club Comment

The way forward

A working party, established at our suggestion, to explore the possibilities of creating a multi-purpose covered stadium in Luton, held its first meeting on December 2nd. It comprised representatives of the club, the council and local business. Eric Fountain, director of public affairs at Vauxhall Motors, was elected chairman of the working party.

I felt it would be interesting today to draw attention to the meeting and its aims. The club envisages a stadium which embraces not only an international-sized synthetic pitch, but also a home for a wide range of major sports, entertainments and leisure activities. These could be available to the public on a general basis.

Examining the issues

The aims of the working party are to examine all the issues involved in this proposal and to further examine and see if such a facility is possible. The first meeting of the working party aimed at setting out its programme of study and it established three teams to study sites, the planning issues involved and the possible financial arrangements that would be necessary to fund such a scheme properly.

The study teams will prepare reports on their individual areas of particular study and report back to the next meeting of the full working party, due to be held early in the New Year. At this stage it is difficult to draw any conclusions, but it is clear the working party has a will to succeed in creating proposals that will result in firm recommendations to the appropriate local authorities.

After the meeting, Mr. Fountain commented: "It is very early days and a great deal has to be done . . . A multi-purpose stadium will be of benefit to Luton and the whole surrounding area."

Another triumph for Brian Stein

Last week's home win was a triumph for Brian Stein who seems to have made a habit of scoring doubles against Manchester City at Kenilworth Road. He was on the mark twice in our 3-1 win here in 1982. Here is a selection of the Press comments on our victory last week:

News of the World: "Against City, Luton flitted through the fog like ghosts and proved they are now real First Division quality. They have lost only three of their last 12 games and rarely looked like losing this one."

Sizzling

"It took Stein only three minutes to score his first goal from David Preece's hard centre and he collected another in the 65th minute after hitting a post. 'We never really got to grips with him,' admitted City manager Billy McNeill. Poor Eric Nixon, City's young goalkeeper, must also have saved at least half a dozen other efforts from the sizzling Stein." **Sunday Telegraph:** "No doubt Luton will be

content with the two goals by Brian Stein that brought them their fourth League victory in five games. Yet they must feel frustrated that their superiority was not further rewarded."

In fact, a late rally by Manchester City might well have cost them more than a penalty scored by Lillis, seven minutes from time, after Breacker had up-ended Power. City however never showed the kind of imagination which is Luton's trade mark, and they were hampered just before the interval when their most creative player, Wilson, was taken off on a stretcher suffering from concussion."

Sunday People: "Two-goal Brian Stein was the name on the lips of both managers. City's Billy McNeill said: 'He was a threat all the time.' Luton's David Pleat said: 'He was very sharp, especially in the first half. He could have had three more.' And Pleat added: 'Our football in spells was as good as when we beat Southampton 7-0.'"

ANOTHER EXCITING MATCH ON THE CARDS . . .

Newcastle United are eagerly-awaited visitors to Kenilworth Road. The chances are that goals will flow as they have always done in a fixture that has produced an average of four goals per game in its last 37 matches.

The first meeting took place at Dunstable Road on February 19th, 1898, during Luton's initial season in the Football League. In front of a crowd of 3,000, the home team took a 2-0 interval lead with goals from Edwin Birch and Bill Stewart before running out 3-1 winners.

Following Newcastle's promotion at the end of that campaign, we had to wait another 40 years before meeting again, this time at St. James' Park, where we upset the predictions by winning 3-1, our first away win of 1937-38.

Repaid Liddell's faith

Following two away defeats, it was decided to reshape the Town team that day and so Tom Mackey and Ronald Stevens were drafted in for their first games of the season with Freddy Hogg and Edward Griffiths making their league debuts. Stevens and Griffiths repaid manager Ned Liddell's confidence by scoring two of the goals with the third netted by Joe Payne.

We finished off a highly-satisfactory season by beating Newcastle 4-1 in our final home game which marked the final match for stalwart Billy Fellowes.

In the following season an optimistic early home crowd of 17,689 saw a Town victory by 2-1, but by April 1939, with both sides out of the promotion race, and war clouds looming, only 10,341 watched the return at Newcastle in which the Magpies won 2-0. This game marked the final League appearance of Joe Coen in goal. He

TODAY'S meeting with Newcastle United will be an evocative one for our supporters with long memories and short ones too! Goals have always been in plentiful supply and the Hatters-Magpies clash has always provided more than the average number of thrills too . . . dating right back to our first meetings in 1897-98.

One of the most famous clashes of the two clubs came in 1946-47 when we came from behind to win 4-3 with Dally Duncan in brilliant form on the wing and this was almost equalled in 1981-82 when Brian Stein hit a memorable second-half hat-trick to secure a 3-2 triumph against the odds.

Second Edition

Both of these victories are fully reported in the fast-selling official club history THE LUTON TOWN STORY 1885-1985, a fully-documented book of the 100 years of incidents and excitement that have created Luton Town's colourful history.

Viv Busby burst into the Town team in 1970 when he scored four goals in nine appearances and helped inspire the final push for promotion from the Third Division. He followed Macdonald to Newcastle for a short loan period before going on to Fulham, Norwich, Stoke, Blackburn and York.



Mick Harford began his career with Lincoln City, joining Newcastle in 1981. He made 19 League appearances, scoring four goals, before moving on to Bristol City, Birmingham and the Town.

Yesterdays

was killed in a flying accident in October 1941.

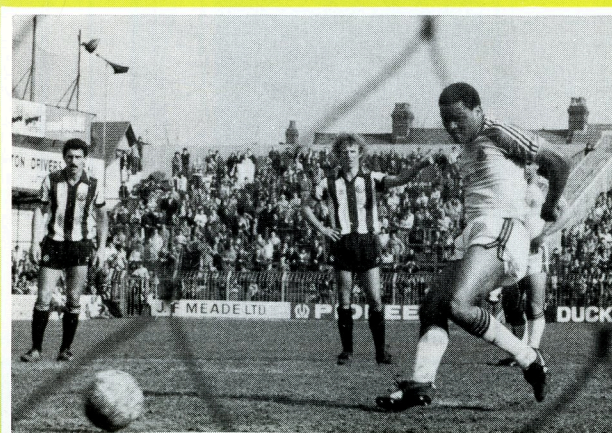
The next meeting was a famous one. It took place on October 30th, 1946 at Kenilworth Road. Newcastle were then the all-conquering team with a forward line of Milburn, Bentley, Wayman, Shackleton, and Pearson. A near-record league crowd of 24,410 saw the Town win 4-3 after trailing by three goals.

Record crowd

Newcastle had threatened to

run riot in the Second Division that season, but surprisingly failed. They made no mistakes in 1947-48, however, but not before the Town had won what was by then a customary home win, by 2-1, with one of the goals coming from ex-United player Eddie Connelly. The game at St. James' Park that season drew 64,931—the highest figure to watch a Town team in a League match.

Our next meeting took place in Division One in 1955-56. On September 10th, we won 4-2, but Newcastle gained revenge
