

We are all experimenting in our own ways and it will be interesting to see if their idea works.



But good luck to him. He's done an excellent job for the club and although they occasionally sell top players, they've always managed to make life difficult for the so-called bigger clubs.





TODAY'S VISITORS

It's a credit to Luton manager David Pleat that he has built one of the First Division's most attractive sides on what must be a shoestring budget.

Luton's gates hover around the 10,000 mark but a mixture of big sales and astute signings has assured them of their First Division status over the last four seasons.

And there is optimism at Kenilworth Road that the most recent squad assembled by Pleat is capable of giving Luton their best Division One season of all time.

Eighth is the highest position Luton have finished a season in the top flight—and that was way back it the 1957-58 campaign — a year before they met us it the F.A. Cup final at Wembley.

But victory over Newcastle last Saturday put Lutor into seventh place in the table and they are evidently playing well enough to stay there.

On their new synthetic pitch — we were the first visitors there on the opening day of the season — Luton have lost just once...a surprise defeat by Coventry.

And away from home, their form has shown a marked improvement with successive victories ove Tottenham (3-1) and Watford (2-1).

Luton also had an early season away win ove Championship challenging West Ham, so they arrive here with no shortage of confidence.

They are a free-scoring side and get their lead from twin strikers Brian Stein and Mick Harford, who have 13 and 10 goals respectively to their name this season.

Both players now have over 100 League goals to their credit and although Harford's height gives Lutor a different kind of threat than they had with his predecessor Paul Walsh, the goals have continued to flow.

Harford, signed from Birmingham last season is just one of the several new faces in a Luton square that has been given a new identity over the last 18 months.

In defence Steve Foster arrived from Aston Villa and in midfield Peter Nicholas was signed from Crysta Palace and David Preece from Walsali.

Ashley Grimes also joined the club from Mancheste United but with Nicholas and Preece linking up with Ricky Hill, he's had few opportunities of late.

The signings have more than been financed by the sale of Walsh to Liverpool and just recently Pau Elliott to Aston Villa for £400,000 but there have beer other departures.

Wayne Turner moved to Coventry, Steve Elliott to Walsall, Vince Hilaire to Portsmouth, Frankie Bunn to Hull, Clive Goodyear to Plymouth and David Moss who scored in both games against us last year, has returned to his old stamping ground Swindon.

Only last week Luton moved into the transfe market again to sign the experienced Andy King from Wolves to cover the loss of their exciting prospec Emeka Nwajiobi.

He has a broken bone in his foot and will be out o action for several weeks.







ON THE RIGHT ROAD WITH FOREST

In response to several requests, we are re-introducing information, provided by the R.A.C., on how to get to future away games when travelling by car.

Set out below are directions to the matches against Southampton at The Dell (next Friday) and Birmingham at St. Andrew's (on Boxing Day).

To Southampton

NOTTINGHAM

A453 through Clifton to the M1 Motorway, then South along the M1 for 48 miles to Intersection (16) Northampton, Daventry, A45. 59 Miles.

A45 to Road Weedon, turn left along the A5 to Towcester then turn right along the A43 to the Oxford by-pass 102 Miles.

A34 via Abingdon by-pass, Newbury and Whitchurch to the Winchester by-pass 152 Miles.

A33 to Southampton entering by the Avenue. Follow one-way system into Archers Road to:

SOUTHAMPTON FOOTBALL GROUND 167 Miles.

To Birmingham

NOTTINGHAM

A52 via the Sandiacre by-pass to the junction with the A5111 Derby Ring Road. Turn left and follow ring road for $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the junction with the A38. 19 Miles.

A38 by-passing Burton-upon-Trent and Lichfield to Bassetts Pole. At roundabout take third exit and $4\frac{1}{4}$ miles on at roundabout take second road to the Gravelly Hill Interchange with the A38(M) and M6 Motorways. 55 Miles.

Follow signs "Birmingham City Centre" along the A38(M) Aston Expressway to Intersection Middle Ring Road East. 57 Miles.

Follow the Middle Ring Road East via Dartmouth Street and Lawley Street into Watery Lane. Turn left along Kingston Road and at end turn left along Coventry Road to: BIRMINGHAM CITY FOOTBALL GROUND. 58 Miles.

But when you are not in the side it's important to keep yourself ready, both mentally and physically, in case you are needed.

I enjoyed it very much apart from the result but it would be nice to think we can start to put a run together... and the sooner the better.




