It is ludicrous to think that two teams should play for high stakes like an FA Cup quarter-final against either Spurs or Everton on such a surface.

To be fair to the teams, they gave us a game far better than the conditions should have allowed.

When the action came it was exciting stuff and, as the match moved into

Arsenal will claim they should have had three penalties, but referee Allan Gunn wasn't in the mood to award one to the annoyance of a superb 26,547 crowd who deserve all sorts of honours for turning up on such a bitterly cold night.
