EVERTON kept alive their bid for a hat-trick of FA Cup final appearances with a dramatic revival which earned them a replay and stretched their unbeaten run to 15 games.

Everton had lacked their usual pattern until that setback with just a wide shot from Paul Bracewell. Yet stung by the Luton goal we suddenly saw the true Everton as they took command of the midfield and put Luton under constant pressure
