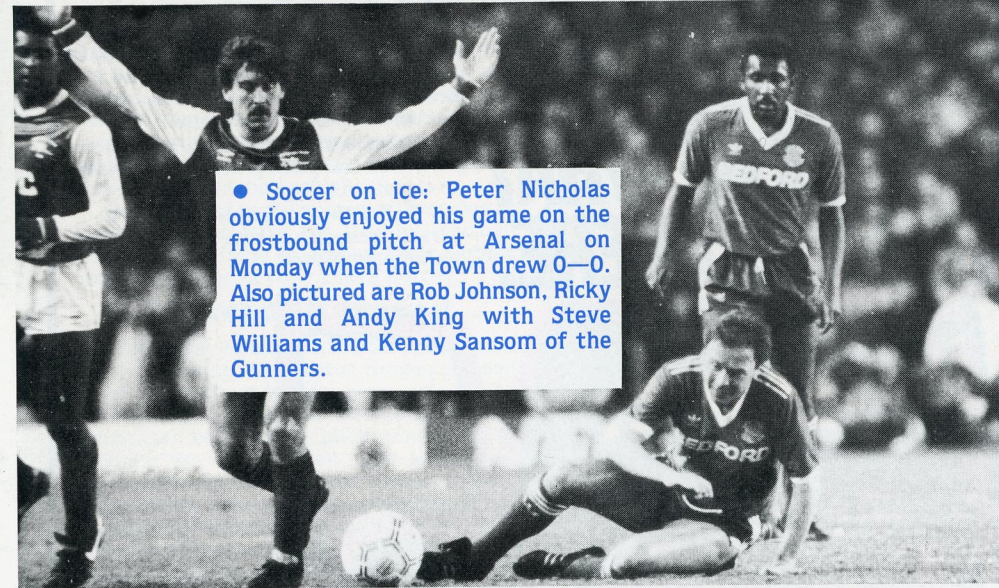
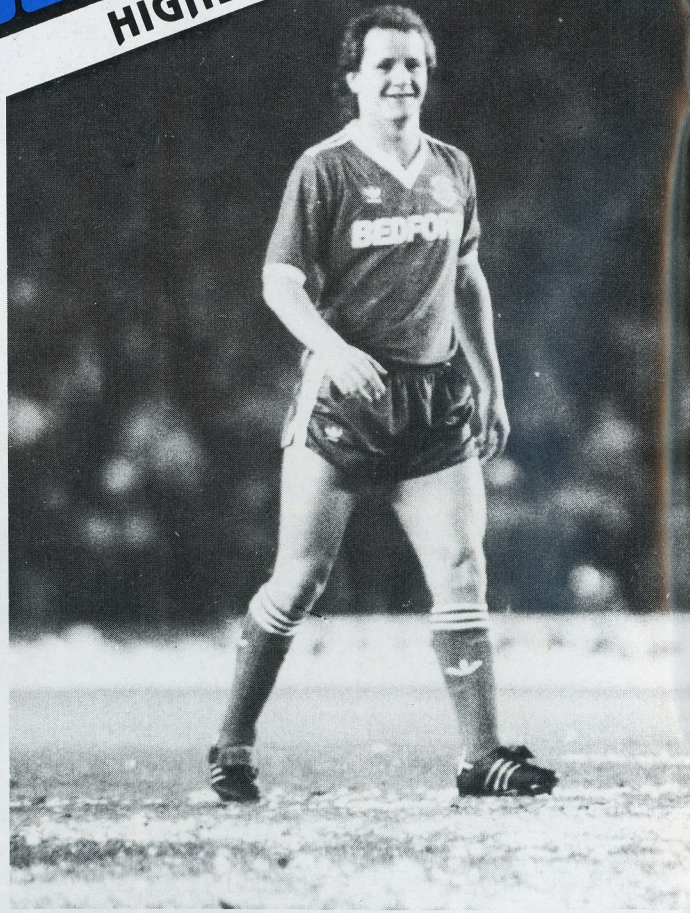

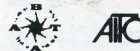

RENEE'S WASHTUB

WHEN you next load your automatic washing machine (or Wayne Turner loads his!) spare a thought for jolly, motherly Renée McNamara. Not only does she have a Monday washing day but Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday as well: Renée is the Club's launderess. She started 10 years ago on a recommendation from a friend. Her day starts after the players' morning training and finishes in time for her to collect her children from school. On Monday she has 36 shirts, shorts and pairs of football stockings from the Saturday and on Friday she has them all to wash again, iron and pack into fibre-glass wheeled skips for away matches.

Pride in her job

Renée enjoys her job. She takes pride in the fact that her "boys" are always well turned out. Her interest in sports' wear began when playing hockey for her State in India as a girl. Her colours were predominantly white and blue, and she had to keep them clean herself. She was an international standard hockey player.

Her job has become slightly easier this season because of the artificial pitch; there's not the mud to remove. But the pitch does damage the elbows of long-sleeved shirts because of friction.

Renée uses a long barrel-shaped washing machine that operates similarly to a domestic machine, although it can be easily stopped mid-cycle. The kit is made of a cotton/man-made fibre mix and is consequently washed at about 40° for 10 to 15 minutes after a couple of pre-washes. Before the final wash each item is checked and stains are scrubbed at the sink. Renée says that the dirtiest first-team kits are from Ricky Hill, Mal Donaghy and Micky Harford.

Before I do I would like to give a brief outline of my soccer career. Although I was never a professional player, I played senior amateur standard with Hitchin Town in the 1960's. I have played representative games for Hertfordshire and also the Old Isthmian League. I have played on many Senior grounds including Luton in the 1960's.

Having played on your pitch, I can now only praise it. It encourages soccer to be played as it should be (a game of skill). I found the footing superb (I wore rubber studs), the bounce was consistent and the speed of play superb. The only "knockers" I found were the "cloggers" who couldn't catch the faster players as there was no mud.

Anyhow, I cannot give anything but praise for your venture into this pitch and I am sure many other clubs will soon follow suit. Many thanks for a very good day and the opportunity to experience the artificial surface.

Criticism and praise

Dear Sir,
Having visited Kenilworth Road for the first time last December 7th on my slow trudge around the league in England and Wales, I hope you will allow me to contribute to the various debates evident in the match programme.

Firstly, the negative points. I have to agree with previous correspondents that prices are high. Indeed, together with admission, £5 is a lot to pay to stand at the uncovered end. Having been to Spurs and West Ham recently, £3.00 combined is a more realistic price, although I appreciate that their larger crowds help to keep prices down.

Secondly, the outward appearance of the main stand does not fit well with First Division status. Again, however, I do appreciate the land problems as I

have followed the British Rail and Council and club negotiations about the railway line over the years. I note the tentative plans in the programme for a new stadium and I hope this comes off as the team certainly deserves better surroundings. A move to Milton Keynes might have been sensible a few years ago as Town gained better results away rather than at home, but I hope a new site can be found for you in Luton.

Now the good points. It was very thoughtful of the team to play so well as it ensured the crowd kept its hands warm by repeated applause at the high level. My visit to White Hart Lane was for the Luton match and I was impressed then by Town's ability to withstand early pressure, keep to the plan and take chances when offered. Coincidentally Harford (the English Andy Gray) scored then at the end I was standing.

On December 7th, both Town

and Newcastle had individuals possessing a lot of skill. The difference was that the Hatters showed class, style and above all teamwork. Donaghy showed why he is going to Mexico, Nicholas proved why he should. As a fellow Welshman I feel disappointed for him.

Preece's one-touch football is a revelation, especially combined with Thomas and although Nwajobi is exciting I felt King gave the team further stability, and a little more luck (and being more used to the pitch?) might have given him two or three goals welcome back to the big time!

All in all, Luton have impressed me more than any other team I've seen this season including Liverpool, West Ham, QPR and Arsenal and I hope the team continues in this vein as it is certainly the style I like to see.

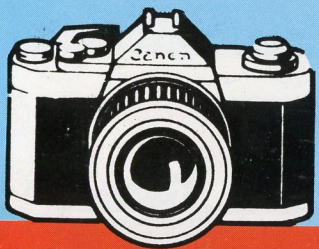

Luton Town 3 Arsenal 0

A brilliant performance full of exhilarating attacking football finally swept Arsenal out of the FA Cup at the third attempt at Kenilworth Road on Wednesday night. Goals from captain Steve Foster, an own goal by David O'Leary and a late first senior goal by Mark Stein carried the Hatters to a thoroughly-deserved victory after five hours.

Passionate play

On the day Ricky Hill celebrated his 27th birthday and the players endured their third match in five days, Kenilworth Road was alive with a passionate Cup atmosphere.

The Town dominated the match in midfield where Peter Nicholas, Ricky Hill and David Preece controlled the game with aggression and skill, creating a stream of chances for Mick Harford, Mark Stein and Andy King. At the back Steve Foster, Mal Donaghy and full-backs Rob Johnson and Mitchell Thomas defended confidently and provided full protection to Les Sealey.

Foster opened the scoring with a fierce drive after Hill flicked on a King corner. O'Leary stabbed the second into his own net under pressure from 20-year-old Stein, and Stein himself seized the third with a low left-foot shot from 10 yards.

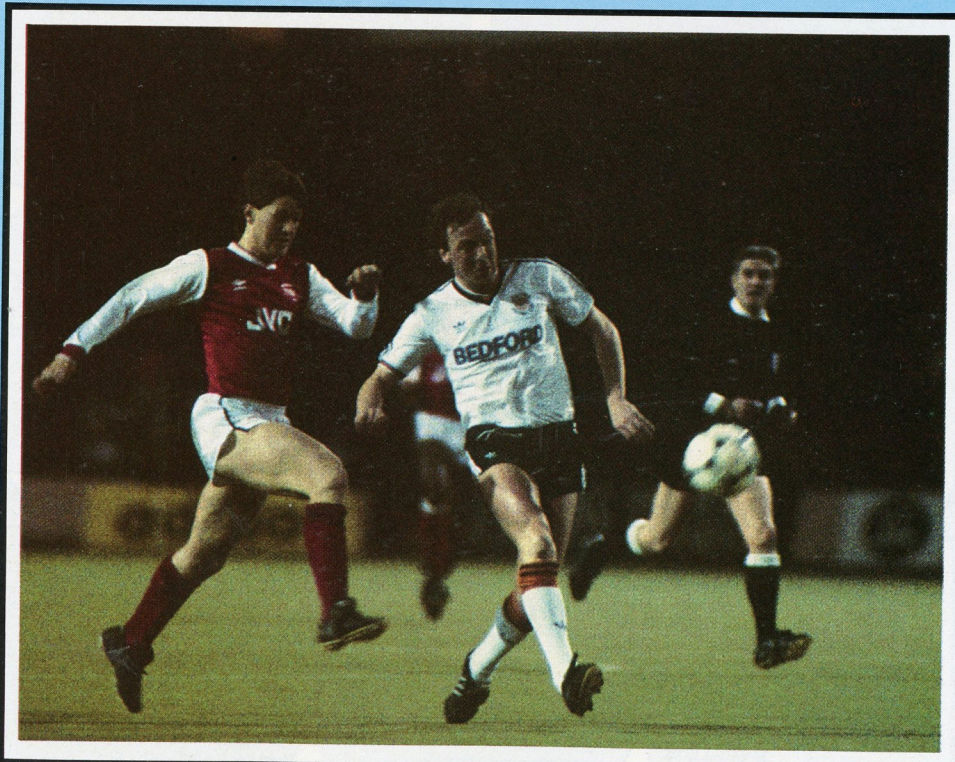

Views

from the bench

Town midfielder Peter Nicholas spent most of last week enjoying warm sunshine in Saudi Arabia with his team-mates from the Welsh international squad. Today he talks about that trip, his career with Wales and the British teams' chances of success at the World Cup finals in Mexico.

"It was a very nice break for me and the rest of the lads because at this stage of the season, with all the terrible weather we have been having, there is nothing better really than to get away and enjoy a break from routine and some sunshine.

"It was good to see the Welsh lads again too. Sometimes a change of faces for a few days is a good thing. As you know, we had a new cap among us for the match in former Luton player Mark Aizlewood, who is now the captain of Charlton Athletic.

Beautiful touch

"Mark played at left-back for Wales against the Saudi team—we won 2-1—which is quite a change for him as he usually plays in midfield for his club. I thought he did very well. But it was an easy going sort of match for us.

"The Saudi team had very good skills and a beautiful touch, but tactically they were not so good at all and we were able to overpower them a bit in that respect. One of the things we were surprised by was the pitch. We expected it to be AstroTurf, but it turned out to be grass and in quite a good condition too. A lot different from the surface we played on at Highbury in our FA Cup replay.

"The game was slow to get going. We went 2-0 up though and then they pulled one back with a penalty near the end. They provided the referee!

"Rushie played for us, but we were without Mark Hughes. People often ask me about their partnership. They are just different class to most lads and make a fantastic pair. In short, as Marc North would say, they are 'just the business'.

Impressed by Hungary

"Looking further ahead to the World Cup, I might surprise a few people by saying that I fancy Northern Ireland to be the best of the British teams. They have a great team spirit and are a very well-organised and compact team with plenty of experience of playing together. I am not sure England and Scotland have that same sense of togetherness.

"I also fancy at least one European team to reach the final. Personally I think Hungary could do very well. They looked a very good side when I played against them not long ago and they beat us 3-0. They are also playing a lot of games at the moment and getting themselves properly prepared with matches against club sides.

"Saudi Arabia, incidentally, was a typical Arab country where you had to be very careful what you said and did or what you read. I roomed with QPR's Robbie James, by the way, which was a coincidence after our game there the previous Saturday."

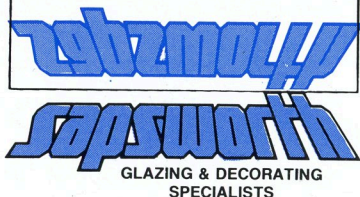

TOP HATTER



Born in Luton on August 14th, 1956, Andy has enjoyed a long and colourful career since joining the staff at Kenilworth Road as an apprentice in 1973. His attacking midfield play and accurate finishing quickly brought him a first team chance in 1975 and the following season he claimed a regular place before moving to Everton. He had five years there, won England under-21 caps and then moved on to QPR, WBA, a Goodison return and spells abroad and with Wolves before arriving back at Kenilworth Road last November.

BACK HOME

After a career spent sampling the best of British and some European soccer, Andy King has returned to his home town club and the challenge of recovering a regular place in a First Division team. An all-round sports lover—“Anything but cricket, I cannot stand cricket” he said—Andy is relishing his chance for top action again after a spell in the reserves. And today’s clash with Everton makes it even more special.

Thrilled

“You never know what is going to happen next in football,” he said. “When I came back I was absolutely thrilled to have the opportunity of joining a top First Division club again. And with it being my old home-town club, it meant even more. I really wanted to do well. For a start it meant my father could come and see me play again.

“When I was in Holland he couldn’t and when I was at wolves it was too far for him to travel. So that has been a bonus. I suppose I have been aware of something a bit extra in coming back and so it has been a disappointment not to have been in the team until recently.

Love of goals

“I’ve only ever wanted to play football and score goals since I was a 10-year-old at Tottenham. I love it. When I was at Wolves, I enjoyed it because I was scoring goals and I was the captain even though it was a struggling club.

“Now I’ve trained hard and lost more weight and I am hoping to find my scoring touch as we aim for a high finish. It would be really something if were able to get into Europe because that’s the greatest pleasure of all in professional football.”

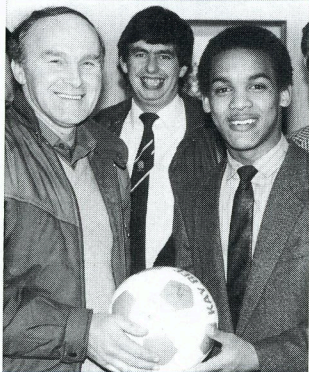

Club Comment

**In answer to the
critics . . .**

Synthetic soccer pitches have recently come under renewed attack in the media. Much of the criticism is ill-founded and requires a knowledgeable reply. In the Daily Mail last week Liverpool chairman John Smith, who is also the chairman of the Sports Council, and Everton secretary Jim Greenwood, who will be with us today, were both quoted on the subject.

I have therefore chosen, today, to quote extracts from letters I have written to each club in response to the said gentlemen's comments.

Discourteous

To Mr. Smith, I wrote: "It surprises me that if you made the statements attributed to you, that you can make such statements without ensuring that what you are saying is so. As you have never been to Kenilworth Road since our installation, it does seem to us discourteous to make statements in that light and in particular as you are the chairman of the Sports Council whose report furnished us with the information which enabled us to install this surface."

I also said: "Our pitch was developed from the criteria provided by Sir Walter Winterbottom in his Report on Artificial Grass Surfaces on behalf of the Sports Council. This report measured several Football League pitches using professional footballers to obtain criteria on what made good grass pitches."

To Mr. Greenwood I wrote: "The Luton Town pitch is the first pitch installed from that criteria. It is called "Sporturf Professional". This was in answer to his quoted comment that the Everton training ground has the same surface as that here at Kenilworth Road.

I hope both men accept my invitation to come and see things here for themselves. The quality of the entertainment provided is a measure of our pitch's success.

CUP FEVER 1930's-STYLE!

WE turn the clock back today to season 1932-33 when we reached the sixth round of the Cup for the first time and coincidentally met today's opponents.

We were rather fortunate to survive the first round that particular season, as although drawn at home to non-league Kingstonian we struggled to finish level at 2-2. Andy Rennie and Tom Tait scoring the Town goals.

Rennie and Tait were on the scoresheet in the replay, but a further goal from Hugh McGinnigle saw us through 3-2 in front of a record crowd for the Kingston club of 6,227.

Similar score

A win at Stockport in the second round by a similar score again with Rennie and Tait netting but this time joined by a goal from captain Fred Kean who played for Bolton in the 1929 Cup Final set us up for a difficult third round tie at Barnsley.

It was "backs to the wall" stuff at Oakwell for the Town who managed to return with a scoreless draw. No problems in the replay, however, as Rennie bagged both goals in our 2-0 win.

The draw for the fourth round created intense interest in the Town as we were placed with Spurs who although then in Division Two were on their way to promotion and also had a fine pedigree in the Cup competition.

Cup fever struck as 17,213 spectators filled a smaller than now Kenilworth Road to see if Third Division Luton could progress to the fifth round for the first time.

The several thousand Spurs fans of which some staged a football match at 7.30 that morning on the Moor, roared with approval as their side tore into the Town from the start.

Gradually the Town fought back and with mistakes rife on a bone hard pitch Tom Alder-

ton converted a long centre from Arthur Mills to put us one up after eight minutes.

It was Mills again, deputising for the suspended Rennie, who set up Tait for the Town's second goal after 21 minutes. Despite these setbacks Spurs fought back and it was only a clearance from Charlie Fraser that kept the goal intact.

With the final whistle the crowd invaded the pitch to congratulate their heroes but their enthusiasm waned slightly on the following Monday when it was learnt that we were away to Halifax in the fifth round.

Blizzard

Snow had fallen immediately before kick-off leaving the pitch rather treacherous but the sun broke out early on to see Tait score after 19 minutes.

The snow began to fall again, a blizzard developed and the referee led the teams off after 27 minutes for close on half an hour.

As there were no floodlights in those days there was a danger the game would not finish so the teams changed ends at half-time and continued.

It came as no surprise when Alan Nelson put us further ahead after 55 minutes.

The quarter-final draw pitched Luton away to League champions Everton. Enthusiasm had reached such a peak that several special trains were chartered to run the Town supporters to Liverpool.

With Alderson missing through injury, Town manager Harold Wightman decided on a strange forward formation to confuse the international-studded Everton defence. This plan unfortunately misfired as after brief Town pressure Everton took the lead.

Everton gradually got more on top and it came as no surprise when they doubled the score shortly before half-time.

The second period was one way traffic as the Town folded and conceded four more goals. Hard-
