MICK Harford, the man spurned by England despite universal acclaim, produced his own Mexican hat-trick on the eve of the World Cup squad announcement.

There was irony too in the fact that Harford scored his 23rd, 24th and 25th goals of the season against a team managed by the man who introduced him to league football.

Watford boss Graham Taylor signed Harford as a 19-year-old on a free transfer when he was in charge at Lincoln.

Harford went on to become David Pleat's most expensive acquisition at £260,000 but has amply justified investment.

The final game of the season at Kenilworth Road saw the return of the A team, the first choice side that produced title-winning form until stricken by injury.

Pleat took a chance by bringing back Brian Stein, dogged by knee injury, to partner Meka Nwajiobi, playing his first game since breaking a foot against Man-City chester on November 30.

But Watford's second half revival, in which they tightened up their marking and denied Luton the space in which to play their one-touch football, brought a more customary look to the proceedings.

A delightful move involving Stein and Nwajiobi ended Harford clipping the ball over Coton to give Hatters the lead after 10 minutes.

Mitchell Thomas was judged to have handled McClelland's cross, enabling Jackett to score from the spot after 58 minutes to initiate the Hornets' revival.

Harford regained the after advantage 75 minutes, crashing home a left-foot volley from the edge of the box.

But three minutes later Sinnott gave Watford hope by diving to head home a cross from substitute Bardsley.

The result could have been different had Foster not made the tackle of the season when West beat the offside trap.
