PLEASURE DENIED

There were 5,000 people 15 miles away who were denied part of their Christmas pleasure, he said. He did not dispute the Town's right to ban away fans, but felt that on Boxing Day a team from 200 or 300 miles away should have been sent to Luton, with Watford playing elsewhere and able to give their supporters holiday entertainment.

Town fans might have wished for something similar—perhaps Newcastle v Luton. Most of 11,000 fans would then have been spared the worst home showing so far.

Manager John Moore blamed senior players for the match-killing problems. Mal Donaghy tried to dribble a ball out of defence to give Kevin Richardson a gift second goal, with the game only 17 minutes old, and in the 58th minute Peter Nicholas became the third Town player this season to miss a penalty.

KEEPER UNTROUBLED

Watford goalkeeper Tony Coton had an almost untroubled match, and the entertainment vanished after the goals. "It became a non-event," admitted Mr Taylor.

Most of the match was nondescript, and the absence of visiting fans was felt more than usual, with the play doing little to generate anything like the normal derby day atmosphere.

The Town's defence was about as mobile as candles on a tree when Gary Porter nipped in to score in the sixth minute after Richardson had hammered in a free kick to the near

Eleven minutes later Worrell Sterling attacked down the Town's right, and although Stacey North and Les Sealey scrambled to complete half a clearance Donaghy tried to drib-ble clear. Richardson punished such audacity by taking the ball off the defender and smacking it into the net.
