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

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#### BUSH TELEGRAPH

On the day after Liverpool and Luton first drew the F.A. Cup Tie at Kenilworth Road, we were telephoned by Liverpool to make arrangements for their game against us in the next round of the competition. Alas for Liverpool's confidence, they did not get through to the next round and it is Luton Town whose team and supporters we welcome here today. Our congratulations to the Hatters for their trouncing of Liverpool last week and for the fact that their victory had absolutely nothing to do with the game being played on an artificial pitch. We hope that the replay of our own game taking place this evening will be up to the same standard as the match at Kenilworth Road last Wednesday (although, of course, we shall be hoping for a rather different result!)

If this evening's game results in a draw after 90 minutes, stay in your seats! Thirty minutes extra time will be played (fifteen minutes each way). If the two sides are still equal after this extra time, a further replay will take place; we shall toss up to decide the venue; and we shall announce the details just before you leave the stadium.

All this talk of extra time and replays is getting very confusing. Let's make certain we get a clear-cut decision tonight! Statistical history favours us: if you read Derek Buxton's notes in this programme, you will find our record in Cup Replays at this stadium is remarkably good.

#### What A Fan!

The media devotes practically all its coverage of soccer to the more critical and destructive news stories. Here's a story about the other side of the picture: a superb football supporter. (As this is **good** news, it is quite certain it will never see the light of day in a newspaper or on television).

Mrs. Maureen Dauwalder tells us that her husband, Ray, has followed Rangers for 20 years and in all that time he has only missed one home game. That was on Boxing Day a few years ago when he was let down by someone who had promised him a lift to the match. (Maureen, with some justification, complains over the idea of staging matches on Boxing Days when there is little public transport).

On Boxing Day 1986, when we were at home to Coventry City, Ray left his home in Haywards Heath, West Sussex at 5 a.m. As he does not drive, he walked 13 miles to Crawley Bus Station from where he caught a coach to Victoria and then came to Shepherds Bush by underground. He was stopped by the police early in his mini-marathon walk as they were suspicious of someone out at this time on Boxing Day morning. Ray managed to convince them that he was only a harmless QPR lunatic and eventually got to this stadium in time to celebrate our 3-1 victory over Coventry. They don't make many fans like Ray, and, to show our appreciation of his loyalty, he and his wife have been invited along as guests in our Directors Box and will be meeting the team after a forthcoming game.

At least tonight Luton and ourselves will be able to get on with the Cup game without anyone blaming the pitch for the result!

And it was nice to read Terry Venables in last Friday night's Evening Standard defending Rangers' decision to lead the way, in what seems all those years ago, and lay the first Omniturf pitch. I felt particularly angry on Luton's behalf when Bobby Charlton on television went on and on about their pitch in their first game with Liverpool, which Luton deserved to win. I am sure that if companies are encouraged enough, their researches will eventually provide the perfect pitch, and, looking back, we'll all wonder what all the fuss is about

Nothing is perfect, but those of you who can cast your mind back some years to Derby County playing here, and I think it was in a Cup match, will recall how ridiculously muddy our old pitch was. The players on that soaking afternoon had to make a superhuman effort to kick the ball out of the inches deep mud up-field. The ball often not making half the amount of progress it was meant to do. I remember we used to bemoan the fact that we had bought good players', and here they were before our very eyes, on our own pitch, unable to play as they should be able to.

You see there are two, if not more sides to a debate, and I do not think over these past few weeks there has been a proper debate. I will add no further opinion to this fact.

But the last word on our pitch, and the effect it has on visiting teams, is that Luton came here and won the first game on it, well before they followed our example.

As for Luton itself, it is a club that has had the courage of its convictions. And I am sure they will soon be allowing some form of away support. But if you had been at Luton on the night that Millwall played there, as I was! And then last season when they played one of the Bristol teams, you would not question their policy for at least a season.

As far as the playing side is concerned they lost their manager, David Pleat, to Tottenham. And their young international full back Mitchell Thomas followed him. David Moore took over and the team have done wonderfully under him. So adversity,

as so often happens in life, can ultimately revolve into good.

As for the fitness of grass pitches, you only had to watch Sunday's televised

game between Watford and Chelsea, to see that, if they are played on while the frost is still in the ground, they can remove a lot of the skill from the game. Players were sliding this way and that, losing their footing, and not being always able to run flat out. Brian Clough, who was one of the commentators, made several adverse remarks about the pitch.

However, the match itself was exciting, although it suddenly dawned upon me that it was an F.A. Cup game. I can't get used to

them being played on a Sunday. And I wonder what it is about the F.A. Cup that makes it better than any other competition, even the plethora of similar Cup competitions that have followed it.

"Ah, well, it's all about sudden death", I can hear the back-room experts say, Hmmmm! It didn't look like that to me when Luton met Liverpool in the first of their three games. It looked suspiciously as if Liverpool had come for a draw at Kenilworth Road, thinking that once they'd got that, Luton would be easy to beat up at Anfield. In fact Luton were very unlucky not to win that first game.

Looking through my library at home I came across a book, published in 1968 in which the author says this about the F.A. Cup: "Cup glory is like the bloom of a flower. It looks great while it lasts, but it doesn't last long enough. Promotion is more of an evergreen. It can give you something for keeps". Who was the author? I should really print his name at the bottom of the page to give you longer to guess. It was Rodney Marsh in his book: 'Shooting To The Top', which was priced in old money at 21/-. Rodney added about the Cup: "The point about Cup glamour is that it tends to overshadow bread-and-butter League games; and even though a manager tells his players until he is blue in the face that promotion comes first, the prospect of Wembley will still be topmost in their minds. The Cup is instant fame. The League is like getting something on a long

hire-purchase agreement".

Mr Marsh was always highly

Mr Marsh was always philosophical.

The book centres on the years 1966-68. They were the years of the Rangers rocketing to fame, as Rodney recalls: "The F.A. Cup saw us beaten in the third round for the second year running... 3-0 by Sheffield Wednesday at Hillsborough in 1966-67, and 3-1 by Preston at Loftus Road in 1967-8. Defeat is never a happy event, home or away, but again I say we shed no tears. We saw our priorities elsewhere in the first season... no Third Division Club, let's face it, is going to win the F.A. Cup as well as the League Cup and promotion, and in the second season we were already obsessed with getting into Division One when F.A. Cup time came around"

It is a fascinating book on the most important period of Rangers' history, and I often think some sports books, like this one, would bear a small re-print, and I am sure keen Rangers fans would buy it. Stanley Paul published it.

It certainly reflects another age in our national game. And there are some marvellous 'period pieces', such as a photograph of the youthful Rodney Marsh sitting in manager Alec Stock's office sketching him!

Still, since 1966-67, we have been at Wembley three times. But even our League Cup win in 1967 had nothing on that afternoon five years ago when we were in the F.A. Cup Final against Tottenham. Last year's Milk Cup Final didn't have the same emotion as the Cup Final itself. And with the Falklands War bringing the nation together there was a certain poignancy at the event that there hadn't been before, and never will be again.

However, a win tonight would see us well on our way again. And the win against Southampton took some pressure off in the League. Given the luck of the draw, who knows?

#### F.A. Cup Scene **RANGERS PLAY WAITING GAME**

Rangers were not the only side kept waiting to discover who would be their opponents in the fourth round of the F.A. Cup. A combination of bad weather, and the progress of the Littlewoods Cup, meant that Swansea City and Sheffield United had to wait until last Saturday before getting any indication as to whom they would meet.

Because West Ham progressed to the fifth round of the Littlewoods Cup, they had to wait three weeks before replaying their third round tie with Orient. The Fourth Division club had saved the day in their home game with a lastminute penalty converted by Steve Castle.

Orient's hopes of doing a giant-killing act at Upton Park seemed to have lessened with the long delay in arranging the replay. Psychologically, this generally favours the

West Ham's own fixtures were complicated still further when they drew at home to Tottenham (1-1) in the Littlewoods Cup last Tuesday. The replay was fixed for this Monday, two days after the Orient tie was due to be played. West Ham also faced the possibility of another replay with Orient - or a fifth round tie at home to Sheffield United - this week.

Swansea's fourth round tie could not be played on Saturday as Shrewsbury and Hull had still not decided their third round game. The F.A. Cup tie was continually put off because of the weather and, because of other complications,

Shrewsbury's Littlewoods Cup tie at Southampton was delayed until last week. They eventually went out to a penalty goal and were due to stage their home F.A. Cup tie against Hull City on Saturday.

Caernarfon Town, the last of the non-League clubs, finally bowed out last week in a third round replay at Barnsley. Until this season Caernarfon had never beaten a League club, nor had they progressed beyond the first round.

But they made up for that this season. Stockport County were beaten 0-1 in round one but the Welsh club's run seemed to be over when they were held at home by York City (0-0) in round two. But they produced their best performance to win 2-1 at York.

Next came a goalless home draw with Second Division Barnsley, watched by a record crowd of 2,630. Caernarfon were beaten only by a solitary goal, from Rodger Wylde, in the reply.

Barnsley thus qualified to visit Aldershot who again took a controversial decision in increasing admission prices. In the last round, against Oxford, Aldershot charged £9 to stand — a record price for any F.A. Cup tie. Ground capacity had been limited, for safety reasons, to

For the visit of Barnsley, Aldershot raised prices to £6 for a standing place and were hoping to have had their capacity raised to 5,000. Only 1,996 watched their sensational 3-0 visit over Oxford.








Luton's magnificent 3-0 victory over Liverpool, after two tough goalless draws, in the last round of the F.A. Cup provided further proof that the Hatters are now one of the best teams in the country. Apart from the possibility of winning the F.A. Cup for the first time. Luton have an outside chance of landing the League Championship for the first time, too.

Luton have achieved this success without the services of two key players who have missed long periods through injury — last season's top scorer Mick Harford (25 goals) and England midfield man Ricky Hill. Happily, both are back in action now.

**Danger Man**

It has certainly been a splendid first season for manager John Moore, the former assistant, who succeeded David Pleat last summer.

In the League Luton have won three away games at Chelsea (3-1), Wimbledon (1-0) and Coventry (1-0). They drew at Leicester (1-1), Tottenham (0-0) and Nottingham Forest (2-2) but were beaten at Aston Villa (1-2), West Ham (0-2), Manchester United (0-1), Sheffield Wednesday (0-1), Oxford (2-4) and Arsenal (0-3).

Luton's attacking philosophy makes room for three strikers. Brian Stein, who has scored 10 goals, and Mike Newell, with eight, have been playing all season. Harford, who returned at the end of December. scored his first of the season from the penalty spot against Liverpool in the F.A. Cup. It made the score 2-0 and virtually ensured victory. Brian Stein got the vital opening goal from a freekick whilst Newell iced the cake with a late third goal.

During part of Harford's absence, Mark Stein — Brian's younger brother - made a big impact, scoring five times in one five-match spell.

#### **POINTERS**


If Luton win they will participate in the fifth round of the F.A. Cup for the third successive season.

It has taken Everton to knock them out in each of the past two seasons. In the 1985 semi-final at Villa Park, Luton seemed destined for Wembley when they led through a Ricky Hill goal with only four minutes to play. Then Kevin Sheedy equalised with a swerving free-kick and Everton won 2-1 in extra-time.

In last season's sixth round, Luton led 2-0 with 25 minutes to play at Kenilworth Road. But Everton hit back to equalise and then won the replay 1-0.

Luton have appeared in only one F.A. Cup final, losing 1-2 to Nottingham Forest in 1959.





Derek Buxton, our Statistics Wizard. has assembled one of the best collections of club records in the football league, and uses it to look back on the other times we have played today's visitors.

@ Probably most of you will not realise the difficulties that this match has caused. Firstly, because it was not until Wednesday that we knew who we had to play last Saturday, and of course these notes had to be prepared just in case we got the unexpected draw

@ Cup replays at Loftus Road, are fairly uncommon things. We haven't had one down here since 26th January 1982 when we beat Blackpool 5-1 after achieving a 0-0 draw on their ground.

@ Before that you have to go back to 31st January 1978, to that memorable match against West Ham, when after drawing 1-1 at West Ham, and being a goal down here we won the match 6-1

 Although the match against Luton tonight is going to be a difficult one we do have an excellent record at home in cup replays.

In 1975 we beat Southend 2-0, in 1974, Coventry 3-2 and Chelsea 1-0 and in 1965 Colchester 4-0.

Description So, when did we last lose a cup replay at Loftus Road?? Shouldn't think too many people here tonight would remember it. Believe it or not, it was way back in 1930, when after drawing 1-1 at The Valley. Charlton beat us 0-3 in the

Our 5-2 win against Leicester in the 3rd

round was our highest score in a daytime Cup match at Loftus Road since 1936 whèn we beat Brighton 5-1. In 1962 we beat Hinkley Athletic 7-2, but that was at the White City.

Terry Fenwick's penalty against Leicester was only the 9th we have scored in an FA Cup match in the last 50 years (the others being scored by Mike Keen, Terry Venables, Rodney Marsh, Stan Bowles (3), Simon Stainrod and Terry Fenwick (at WBA).

@ On the negative side, the crowd of 9684 was the smallest crowd for an FA Cup match at Loftus Road since November 1966, when only 9534 turned up to see us play Poole Town. I think also one of the coldest days of which we have played an FA Cup game - but I don't keep records on temperatures!! It was so cold, that during the match spectators were complaining of things dropping off. Please apply to the Secretary who has an assortment of ears.

@ It is 39 years since we last entertained Luton in a Cup match at Loftus Road: I remember it well, as the gates were closed an hour before the game kicked off at 2.00 with 30.564 packed like sardines into the ground. They paid £2844 in gate money (It was 71/2p to get in, in those days). We won the match 3-1 after being a goal down at half-time. Danny Boxshall, Cyril Hatten and Billy

McEwan scored our goals

@ It would be nice if we could break the "hoodoo" that Luton have got on us at the moment. Since 1980 our combined record against Luton reads:-P13 W1 D4 L8.

 Our last win against them on this ground was in November 1980 when we played on old fashioned grass - since then, we haven't enjoyed 3 defeats and a draw.

Our draw at Luton extended our run to 14 matches without a win there. Our last victory was in January 1952 when we on 1-0 Luton haven't failed to score against us on this ground since 1973 - scoring in their last 7 matches here.

Several people have asked me about our home record in the FA Cup because we don't lose very often at Loftus Road. Our full record of matches played at Loftus Road and the White City since 1921, reads:-

P87 W47 D21 L19 F194 A98.

@ Should we win tonight, we would have won 5 consecutive Cup games at home - which would equal the club record we have achieved this 4 times already.

The omens are good for tonights replay. We have only lost one match home or away on February 3rd since 1912. (1-3 at Bournemouth in 1962).

As Luton fans are reading this, let's just say this was a hard fought battle on both sides well deserving a replay

AND THE MICK HARFORD kept Luton's FA Cup hopes alive with a dramatic late penalty equaliser - just five PRESS SAID. minutes after Terry Fenwick had given Rangers the lead from the spot.

> This was Luton's fourth game in a week and the strain showed as they failed miserably to break down a Rangers defence in which Fenwick was outstanding.

The offside trap was also sprung effectively and it often limited Luton to ambitious through balls which were woefully overstruck.

#### Chance

Luton's best effort in a tedious first half came when Steve Foster flicked on an Ashlev Grimes corner and David Seaman made a spectacular save from Mal Donaghy's 20-yard volley.

The game deteriorated until the 83rd minute when Rangers were awarded a penalty. Rob Johnson fouled John Byrne and Fenwick, stepped


Amazingly it was the first goal Luton had conceded this year ending a six-match run.


They pressed forward in search of an equaliser and it arrived when Mike Newell got to the byeline where Gary Bannister brought him down.


Severton were surprisingly held to 2-2 at Swindon, though they won the replay 2-1. 

A last-minutes goal from lan Edwards gave Third Division Chester a 1-0 home win over Luton. 

Northwich Victoria, the last of the non-Leaguers, transferred their home tie to Maine Road where they were beaten 3-1 by Oldham. 

Manchester City, meanwhile, were winning by a similar score at Newcastle.

YEARS AGO: Rangers had no further interest in the F.A. Cup, having been knocked out by Fulham in round three. © Luton, beaten at West Ham in round three, played at home to Oxford in Division Two. Vic Halom scored for the Hatters but they were beaten 1-2. © Biggest Cup shock of the day—and of the decade—was Southern League Hereford United's 2-1 win over First Division Newcastle. © This was a third round tie delayed because of the weather. The match seemed to be going normally when Malcolm Macdonald scored for Newcastle eight minutes from time. But Ron Radford equalised four minutes later and Rickie George hit Hereford's winner in extra-time. © Two goals from Alan Gowling in the closing six minutes gave Manchester United a 2-0 triumph at Preston. © Alan Durban scored a hat-trick in Derby's 6-0 hammering of Notts County.



YEARS AGO: We had crashed out in the third round at Burnley (1-6) and had hoped to have pursued our Third Division promotion ambitions. But, in those pre-artificial pitch days, our home game against Bradford P.A. was postponed. Luton had been knocked out by Ipswich in the previous round. Plymouth staged one of the biggest games in their histery, First Division title chasers Tottenham drawing a 40,040 crowd to Home Park. Sadly, it was a one-sided game. Southern League Weymouth's tie at Preston was abandoned after only 14 minutes with no score. When it was re-staged Preston won 2-0. Sunderland were held at home to 0-0 by Port Vale who won the reply 3-1.

We normally open up this page to the visiting Manager to enable him to express his views on whatever subject he wishes. As a result, however, we have not accorded this courtesy to our own Manager, **JIM SMITH.** This fault is remedied today.

#### "I HOPE WE CAN CONTINUE OUR IMPROVEMENT — JIM SMITH

"Our draw at Kenilworth Road means we can now look back on four wins and a draw from our last seven games," says Rangers' manager Jim Smith. "After that very poor run suffered before Christmas, when we endured nine matches without a win, our confidence has received the boost it needed.

"Naturally, we were delighted to get a draw at Kenilworth Road. Luton have emerged as one of the best teams in the country, as a glance at the First Division table will show.

"Only one visiting team has won at Luton this season and only four others have managed to draw there in League or Cup. Having done what many consider was the hard bit, in avoiding defeat at Kenilworth Road, we would like to think that we now have a chance of winning and of going into the next round.

"This is a very important game for us for, if we can win, it will maintain the interest and excitement for our supporters.

"Hopefully, we shall now start to rise away from the danger area in the League. I hope we can continue the improvement shown since Christmas and produce some more positive results. "But, we all know, that there is nothing quite so exhilarating as a good run in one of the Cups."

Mr Smith finds many other aspects of the game are pleasing him at the moment.

"Managers, coaches and players have all been making a big effort to put the game back on its feet," he says. "We have seen here this season that it is vey rare for a visiting team to settle for a draw. With three points at stake, most teams go all out for victory.

"It's tremendous because it keeps the fans on their toes.

"It's not only the standard of play that has improved. There has also been a marked improvement in sporting attitudes on the terraces.

"What happened in Belgium and Bradford were dreadful tragedies. No one will ever forget them. But, you know, a lot of good has come out of them. It pricked everyone into action from the government down.

"The police have done a wonderful job. With video cameras they can now more easily identify the troublemakers. And, like all true lovers of the game, I was delighted to hear that, after a long campaign, the police recently brought another batch of thugs to trial.

"Unless they are completely stupid, I think the hooligans must

have got the message. It just doesn't pay to get into trouble. At all the big grounds they are put on video tape and, faced with that sort of evidence, they don't have much defence.

"If anyone thinks it's worth facing a long period in prison, for one act of stupidity, then he can't complain if he is put away.

"Football has consequently begun to get back to family entertainment. The game can be seen to have benefited from those tragedies."

Back to the playing side again, Mr Smith believes there are more good footballing sides around today.

"When it comes to choosing who will eventually win the Championship, though, I don't think you can look beyond Everton, Liverpool and Arsenal. They really are a class above anyone else though it is refreshing to see so many other clubs building impressive squads for the future.

"I believe that football is heading back towards good times."

#### Rangers Become First Third Division Club to win Major Trophy

QUEEN'S PARK RANGERS (0) 3 Morgan (R), Marsh, Lazarus WEST BROMWICH ALBION (2) 2 Clark 2 100,000

This was the first League Cup final ever staged at Wembley but, with Rangers becoming the first Third Division club ever to play in a final in that famous stadium and W.B.A. deep in First Division relegation trouble, experts were predicting a crowd of no more than 50,000 in the week before the confrontation.

Until now many of the big clubs had not taken this new competition too seriously. But Rangers, with a magical performance, changed the whole country's thinking about the tournament.

For the first time the winner — or so it was thought — would automatically qualify for the European Fairs Cup (now the UEFA Cup).

In spite of Rangers' position on top of the Third Division, few neutrals gave them much hope. They were at Wembley simply to provide the opposition for an Albion side, managed by Jimmy Hagan, that had too many First Division stars to be troubled by the West London side.

Indeed, in the opening stages, Rangers appeared to be over-awed by the occasion and the massive crowd. When they won possession, they tried to release the ball too hurriedly lest they made a mistake.

When Albion took the lead after only seven minutes, Rangers looked to be in for a catastrophic afternoon. And the man who delivered the body blow, and was later to land another, was no other than former Q.P.R. favourite, outside-left Clive Clark.

An oblique ball from the right from Doug Fraser pierced into the Rangers' defence. At the same time Clark came darting in from the left and struck the ball home firmly with his right foot.

In the 35th minute Clark scored again with

another right-foot shot, this time from a Tony Brown pass.

Rangers were wandering around in a daze, longing for the half-time whistle. Albion might have increased their lead but Peter Springett made a diving save to deny Jeff Astle.

It was manager Alec Stock, one of football's pair and into the net great psychologists, who changed the course of the game and, many argued, the course of C.P.R.'s history during the interval.

Albion claimed it would of the wise. And world Cup England

Yet it's difficult to appreciate how those demoralised men could believe Mr Stock when he told them: "Your're the better side!"

Perhaps, more important, was his aside to Rodney Marsh as the teams went out for the second-half. "There's no one out there who can lace your boots," said Mr Stock. "Go out and show them what real football's about. Go and show them you're the greatest in the world."

With nothing to lose, Rangers did seem to relax, start to enjoy the occasion. But the minutes ticked by and it seemed Albion would contain them.

The break came in the 63rd minute. Mark Lazarus, who had enjoyed some good runs down the right, was clearly becoming too great a threat. And, in one of his attacks, he was hacked down

Les Allen sent the free-kick high into the penalty box where Marsh rose majestically to head it into the net.

A brilliant individual run from Marsh brought the equaliser in the 74th minute. Picking the ball up on the half-way line, Marsh twisted and turned through a maze of defenders to end with a right-foot shot that went in off a post.

From that moment, Rangers believed they could win.

The crowd was now right behind the Rangers. They could see soccer history in the making.

With ten minutes remaining, Rangers forged a goal out of nothing. Centre-half Ron Hunt for some reason decided to make a solo run from his own half. But the ball seemed to be

slipping away from him as he approached the penalty box. Dick Sheppard, the Albion 'keeper, seemed to have grabbed it.

As Hunt slid to an end to his run, he collided with the goalkeeper. The ball ran loose to Lazarus who lifted his shot above the prostrate pair and into the net.

Albion claimed it was a foul. The referee ruled otherwise. And, like that famous 1966 World Cup England goal, no kind of evidence has ever been able to prove that it should have been disallowed.

Rangers were the first Third Division club to win a Wembley final. The only sour note came later when UEFA ruled that only First Division clubs could qualify for the Fairs Cup. RANGERS: Springett (P); Hazell, Langley.


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
