United, with Bryan Robson playing well, began to take advantage and Harford made a double substitution on the hour taking off the wingers and reverting to a familiar pattern of play.

And that change saw Mick Harford, Britain's most wanted striker, showing his aerial power in the 76th minute with a brave header which flew just wide of a post.
