But Tuesday night's emphatic 4-1 triumph over struggling Portsmouth means Hatters need just one more win to reach the magical 44 points target with 11 games remaining.

Harford will probably resist the temptation of altering the team before the FA Cup semi-final against Wimbledon on April 9.

And Wilson made Portsmouth pay as the defence waited for Ashley Grimes to try his luck.
