

DAVID OLDFIELD . . . sparked late comeback.

Dave sparks late late show!

WEMBLEY BYSTANDER David Oldfield came on against Norwich to spark a second successive late-show revival.

In a near repeat of their 3-2 Littlewoods Cup win over Arsenal, Hatters scored twice in the last three minutes at Carrow Road, to come away with a point they scarcely deserved.

And Australian-born Oldfield, 20 this month, made the difference.

As a 67th-minute sub for Ian Allinson, he injected new life into Luton.

Three minutes from time, with Norwich winning 2-0, Oldfield scampered onto Foster's pass and crossed for Mark Stein to stab in with the side's first on-target effort.

And in injury time Danny Wilson banged in a

penalty, awarded when Oldfield latched onto Ricky Hill's header, only to be flattened by 'keeper Bryan Gunn.

Delighted Oldfield, whose only other league appearance was as a sub in the 4-0 thrashing at Newcastle, said: "I'm very happy with the way things turned out.

"It was a great ball over the top from Ricky and I just got my head to it before the 'keeper. It was definitely a penalty."

The teenager had come into an unfamiliar-looking Luton line-up, missing Mick Harford, Brian Stein David Preece, with Mark Stein taking his brother's Ashley Grimes in midfield.

Marvin Johnson replaced injured Mal Donaghy after a tame, goalless first-half.

And after Drinkell's spectacular flying header from Fox's cross gave the Canaries a 52nd-minute lead, Marvin Johnson's ill-judged back-pass put in Putney to round Dibble for number two.

The home side had several opportunities to sew it up before Oldfield's intervention. But Hatters' boss Ray Harford rejected the notion his side looked disinterested and added: "We've played a lot worse than that away from home."

He complained of the tiring 52 games up to Saturday, commented that Oldfield was "terrific" and claimed Marvin Johnson's blunder would teach him a valuable lesson.
