## Sad Everton so close to humiliation

EVERTON'S injured captain Ratcliffe enthused in the match programme that his Welsh international colleague Southall was the best goalkeeper in the world.

At the end of probably the bleakest afternoon Goodison Park has suffered since the for-tunes of the club took an upswing four years ago, that assessment remained valid.

If not for Southall, the embarrassment of being comprehensively beaten by such moderately accomplished opponents, claiming their first away League win in 10 months, would have turned to humiliation.

He parried a Black drive after 74 minutes, only to be beaten by Oldfield who followed up from the edge of the area. Ten min-utes later, Black scored after a superb Oldfield pass.

Earlier Southall produced two brilliant saves to keep out a Wilson header and a Johnson drive.

Without Ratcliffe's pace and know-how, Everton's defence looked makeshift. That was perhaps not surprising when the back four on Saturday included only one natural defender. Watson.

What must cause more concern, however, is that Cottee, Britain's first £2 million striker, and Sharp, who would fetch even more if put on the market tomorrow, failed so crucially to convert chances. Two of those opportuni-ties had come and gone by the 13th minute.

Colin Harvey, the Everton Colin Harvey, the Everton manager, attempted to explain his team's display by claiming they seemed too tense. "We played a bit frightened. Frightened when we had chances, frightened when we had opponents against us," he said.

But there was little he could do to prevent Luton taking a 75th minute lead.

Southall could only beat away a hard rising drive from Black and Oldfield pounced to tuck the ball smartly into the bottom corner.

As Everton pressed for the equaliser Black galloped down the left, drew Southall and slotted in the second from an acute angle with just seven minutes to go.

The nearest Everton came to a goal was when Tony Cottee hit the post with a header and Luton defenders thankfully scrambled the ball away.
