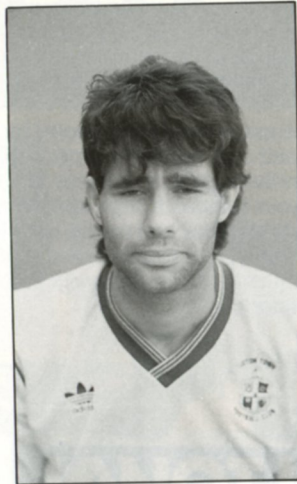
opposition!

Les Sealey was the most unlucky man in the Town squad last season when he played in all the Littlewoods Cup matches leading up to the final against Arsenal at Wembley, but missed out on the big day through injury. Tonight in Dressing Room Talk he looks back and forwards on the old and the new as we start out on a new Wembley trail against Burnley:

Poor starters

"To be honest, I don't feel anything very special about the cup last season anymore. I am just working hard for this season and trying to help us get over our poor start. We have had a very bad start really. I don't think we have played to our full capabilities, but it was the same last year when I don't think we had more than about 12 points after 14 games.

"And look at the season we ended up having! We are slow starters I suppose and this year it is also taking us time to get the new players and the team to knit together. It always makes a difference.

The team is still gelling together and we are still getting used to things. And remember we only lost the two away games by one goal. So, it is not a big thing at the moment.

"We have a few different players and a different way of playing as a result. It means, for example, that the back four have to play differently because the midfield has changed. It is not quite working out yet but I am confident that we have the players in the squad to do the job.

Fantastic

"The cup, though, could make a bit of difference for us although it is obviously not something I am treating specially myself. I

cannot imagine we will have another season like last year when we played in every single possible cup match except for the FA Cup final – and we should have played in that too.

"It was fantastic and I cannot imagine anyone being able to repeat all that again at any club. We did not play very well in the league last year though and I thought we should have finished higher than 10th in the table.

"I think we need to be a bit harder. Harder all round and harder to beat. Two years ago, we finished seventh and only conceded 46 goals I think. Teams found us hard to play against then.

Clean sheets

"But of course you don't win anything unless you can score goals. And although that year we had 19 clean sheets, we ended up with nothing. Should I try something new – playing up front? I played at right-back in a pre-season game in Sweden and that was enough for me. The ball keeps going behind you there and you don't know what is going on! No thanks – I'll leave it to the other lads."

VISITING FANS RETURN FOR OUR FIRST CUP DEFENCE

Tonight we welcome visiting supporters back to Kenilworth Road for the first time since our Littlewoods Cup semi-final against Oxford United last season. I hope all the Burnley fans enjoy the match and, like our own supporters, behave in a manner that will enhance our great sport.

Regular supporters will know, of course, that our price structure tonight as for all cup matches this season is different from league matches and very attractive. Children and Senior Citizens, for example, can watch First Division football in action from the seats in the main stand for as little as just £2.

Attractive

This is a very worthwhile offer to fans wishing to take advantage of the opportunity to see the best football for a very reasonable price with the best facilities.

Our main stand regulars may have thought our last home match was attended by visiting fans as well judging from the number of guests in the ground who clearly supported the visiting club.

It is important to reiterate – since

the police evicted several people on September 17 – that members are responsible for their guests and should escort them to their point of entry to the ground. This ruling exists to protect our membership scheme and should be respected.

Another very important rule to be respected is the ban on smoking in the main stand which is obviously a very serious safety measure. Our main stand is an old wooden structure and could be a fire risk if people ignore the rule and smoke and drop cigarette ends.

Dangerous

The consequences do not need to be detailed and, of course, our safety certificate might be at risk if we cannot ensure the stand is free of the dangers from smokers.

I am sure all our fans and those visiting from Burnley tonight are well aware of the common sense in the smoking ban and will respect it. Just as I believe both sets of fans will demonstrate yet again the excellence of the vast majority of English football fans.

UNITED STAND FIRM

Luton Town 0 Manchester United 2

A goal in each half scored by Peter Davenport and England captain Bryan Robson ended the Town's hopes of a first victory of the season here on September 17 when Manchester United, after surviving a period of intense pressure, won 2-0.

Davenport struck midway through the first half, capitalising on a slip by Marvin Johnson and taking full advantage with a well-struck low shot past Les Sealey. Robson headed the second in the final minutes when the Town were heavily committed in search of an equaliser.

But the result could have been very different if lady luck had smiled on the Town in the opening 20 minutes. Shots by Mick Harford, Steve Williams, David Oldfield and Kingsley Black all set the alarm bells ringing in the United defence, but none found the net as Scottish goalkeeper Jim Leighton showed why he was signed from Aberdeen in the summer.

Harford, who had a brilliant game only three days after making his full home debut for England against Denmark at Wembley, was particularly unlucky and nearly scored again in the second half with a towering header which flew beyond Leighton but over the bar.

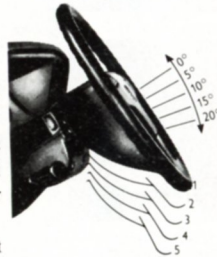

NOGAN GOALS KEEP YOUNGSTERS ON THE WINNING TRAIL

The Town youth team maintained their tremendous start to the season on September 17 when they won 3-1 at Oxford in a league cup tie despite a below-par all-round display. Kurt Nogan, Gary Crawshaw and Mark Pembroke, with a penalty, were the Town scorers.

Nogan's goal took his tally for the season to 14 goals in only seven games and made him the club's leading scorer.

The Town's record in all games read: played 7, won 6, drawn 1, lost 0. Truly a very encouraging sequence of results!

Youth team coach John Faulkner reported: "We did not mount many sustained attacks, but we were always dangerous and always confident."

Oxford took the lead in the first half, but Nogan equalised with a superb individual goal. Late strikes by Crawshaw and Pembroke did the rest.

Earlier that week, the youth team won 4-1 at Cambridge in a Southern Junior Floodlit Cup tie with goals from Nogan, Crawshaw, McGonagle and O'Brien.

The reserves meanwhile continued their steady start to the season with a 2-2 draw at Watford on September 17. Sean Farrell and Ian Scott gave the Town a 2-1 lead before Luther Blissett grabbed a late equaliser.

Goal'den Oldies

BURNLEY BACK FOR THE FIRST TIME IN NINE SEASONS TONIGHT

We welcome Burnley to Kenilworth Road tonight for the first time in nine seasons. Only Ricky Hill and Mal Donaghy remain from our last meeting on 29th March, 1980, when a goal from Bob Hatton secured a 1-1 draw before a home crowd of 8,507, writes club statistician Roger Wash.

Our first clash came during our first Football League season - 1897-98 - and we were unceremoniously thumped 4-0 by promotion-bound Burnley at Turf Moor. In the return a crowd of 4,000 witnessed the surprise of the day when the Town beat their illustrious rivals 2-0 with the goals coming from Gallagher and Donaldson.

Paths did not cross again until 1937 when, with both teams in Division Two honours were even over the season with a 3-2 defeat at Turf Moor and a 3-1 win here.

The win at Kenilworth Road saw Tom Mackey score two goals - a remarkable feat considering he had not scored previously in 180 league games for the Town. They were also to be his last as he hung his boots up at the seasons end to become Assistant Trainer.

"a happy double win in 1957-58"

A parting of the ways came again with Burnleys promotion to Division One in 1946-47 and it was not until our elevation in 1955 that we met once more although it was not a happy reunion with the 'Clarets' winning three of the first four clashes.

Our turn came in 1957-58 with the double being achieved - 3-2 at Luton with Gordon Turner scoring twice and 2-1 away with Turner again on the scoresheet to climax a run of four straight wins during which Sunderland had been thrashed 7-1 at Kenilworth Road.

The next season saw our biggest ever win over Burnley with a 6-2 victory at Kenilworth Road. A timely win as the supporters were not convinced that what was to be our 'Cup Final' team was the best combination. A hat-trick from Allan Brown, two from Bob Morton and a single strike by Dave Pacey gave the 15,783 crowd a chance to alter their opinion.

Following our relegation we did not play each other for League points until 1971-72 when honours were even once again but the next season saw probably the best game between the clubs.

A crowd of 12,197 and millions more on 'Match of the Day' witnessed a 2-2 draw that could have gone either way up to the final whistle. John Aston with a penalty and Vic Halom scored for the Town with Leighton James notching both for the 'Clarets'.

Burnley won promotion at the end of that season

with ourselves following a year later to suffer two defeats in 1974-75 at a time when Leighton James said that the Luton defence was "the worst I have ever played against".

The Town conceded 65 goals in 1974-75 with Burnley letting in one more the next season to join the Town once again in Division Two.

Season 1976-77 saw the Town win for only the second time at Turf Moor with Ricky Hill (in his 5th game for the club) and Dixie Deans (remember him!) knocking in the all important goals to set up a season that boasted a nine-match winning run including a 2-0 home win over the 'Clarets'.

Both the Town and Burnley struggled in 1978-79 and the game at Kenilworth Road in April 1979 was vital to both sides but it was goals from Bob Hatton with two, Brian Stein and present day 'Claret' Steve Taylor that sent the crowd of 6,466 home happy.

Both teams survived that season but Burnley were sadly relegated in 1980 and have enjoyed mixed fortunes since including a near Conference place a year ago.

We have not met previously in the Littlewoods Cup but our paths have crossed twice in the FA Cup. A 3-1 defeat at Turf Moor in a 4th Round tie in 1934-35 and a 3-0 reversal in the 5th Round in 1946-46 after a 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road.

INTRODUCING...

BURNLEY

Tonight, we welcome a Burnley side still unbeaten this season at the time of writing and eager for further cup glory after last season's Wembley appearance in the Sherpa Van Trophy final, writes *Geoff Allman*.

Burnley were founded in 1881 as Burnley Rovers, being originally a group of young men at the local YMCA who played rugby as well as soccer. The soccer element took hold quickly enough for them to become one of the twelve members of the Football League in 1888. They spent seasons 1897-98 and 1900-1913 in Division Two, but then enjoyed an unbroken spell in Division One lasting until 1930 with major honours either side of the First World War. They won the FA Cup in 1914 and after being runners-up in Division One in 1919-20 they topped the table a year later after a run of 30 games without defeat.

"long spell in Division One"

They then had a long spell in Division Two from 1930 to 1947, bringing this to an end in spectacular

style by winning promotion and reaching the FA Cup final in the same season. Those were the days of Jim Strong in goal and amateur Peter Kippax up front and they then spent 24 successive seasons in Division One. During this time they win the First Division Championship of 1959-60 and in 1961-62 were runners-up in both Division One and the FA Cup. By that time Adam Blacklaw was in goal, present day manager Brian Miller and Jimmy McIlroy in midfield and Ray Pointer in attack.

They lost their First Division place in 1971, climbed back up again in 1973 and then a steady slide landed them in Division Three for the first time ever in 1980. They returned to Division Two in 1982 but despite reaching the semi-final of the Milk Cup and the last eight of the FA Cup in 1982-83 they were relegated at the end of it.

1983-84 saw them in mid-table in Division Three, but they were relegated a season later to land up in Division Four for the first time. In 1985-86 they spent much of their time in the top half of the table, but

then won only one of their last eight games and slipped to a final position of fourteenth.

986-87 was then one of the most dramatic in their history. After losing only one of their first seven games they seemed to have promotion potential, but then a run of ten games without a win at the start of the New Year left them battling to stay out of bottom place. They went into their last game against Orient needing a win to stay in the Football League. A crowd of 15,781 (four times their previous home game) saw them win 2-1 and so pip Lincoln by a point.

There were no such problems last season and promotion was a distinct possibility early in March when they were in fourth place. They had to be satisfied with a final position of tenth, however, with a visit to Wembley for the final of the Sherpa Van Trophy providing the season's highlight for them. Though they lost 2-0 to Wolves the game watched by 80,841 fans was a credit to football.

"experienced cup fighters"

Now in the third season of his second spell at the helm Brian Miller has so far seen his side win at Halifax, draw at Stockport and beat Rochdale both in Division Four and in the Littlewoods Cup to earn tonight's tie. They have a fair amount of experience of this competition for in its days as the Football League Cup they reached the semi-final in both 1960-61 and 1968-69 and in its days as the Milk Cup reached the semi-final again in 1982-83 putting out both Coventry and Spurs before going out 3-1 on aggregate to Liverpool.

New signing **Brendan O'Connell** from Exeter has scored four times up to the time of writing as has former Wrexham midfielder **Paul Comstive**, who is now in his second season at Turf Moor. Last season's top scorer **George Oghani** (ex-Bolton) and new signing **Paul Atkinson** from Oldham are also likely to be up front while in midfield **Andy Farrell** came from Colchester last season and **Ian Britton** from Blackpool a year earlier.

In defence **Steve Davis** (ex-Crewe) and **Ray Deakin** (ex-Bolton) are likely to be linking up with much-travelled **Peter Daniel** (ex-Hull, Sunderland, Wolves and Lincoln) and former Manchester United junior **Steve Gardner**. In goal **Chris Pearce** made the position his own last season after moving from Wrexham. **Steve Taylor** in his second spell with them and new signing **Gary Rowell** from Carlisle have been substitutes recently.
