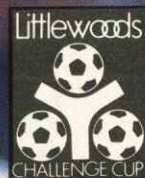

## THE LEAGUE'S SPONSORSHIP BONANZA

The Football League's competitions are being sponsored to the tune of more than two and a half million pounds this season.

Barclays Bank's sponsorship of the League competition is worth £1½ million this season while the Littlewoods Cup which will commend the interest of thousands of fans up and down the country this evening is worth a total of £600,000 in sponsorship money.

The other sponsored competitions making up that £2½ million nest egg to the League are the Simod Cup, which gets underway next week, valued at £125,000, the Sherpa Van Trophy for Third and Fourth Division clubs - £110,000 and the Guinness Soccer Sixes indoor competition worth £200,000.

Add those figures up and they come to a total of £2,535,000 reflecting the vast commercial value that business now puts on the nation's number one sport.

### IF IT'S A REPLAY

If tonight's game ends in a draw the replay will take place at Kenilworth Road next Tuesday, 8th November with a 7.45 p.m. kick-off. A replay at Luton next Tuesday would mean a new date being arranged for our Simod Cup, first round tie against Shrewsbury Town, due to be played at Elland Road a week tonight.

### MORE CUP ACTION

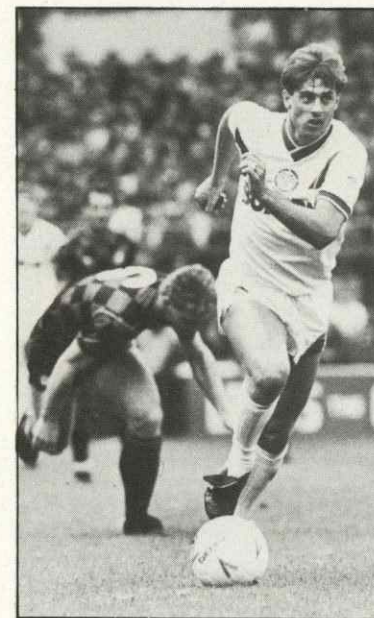

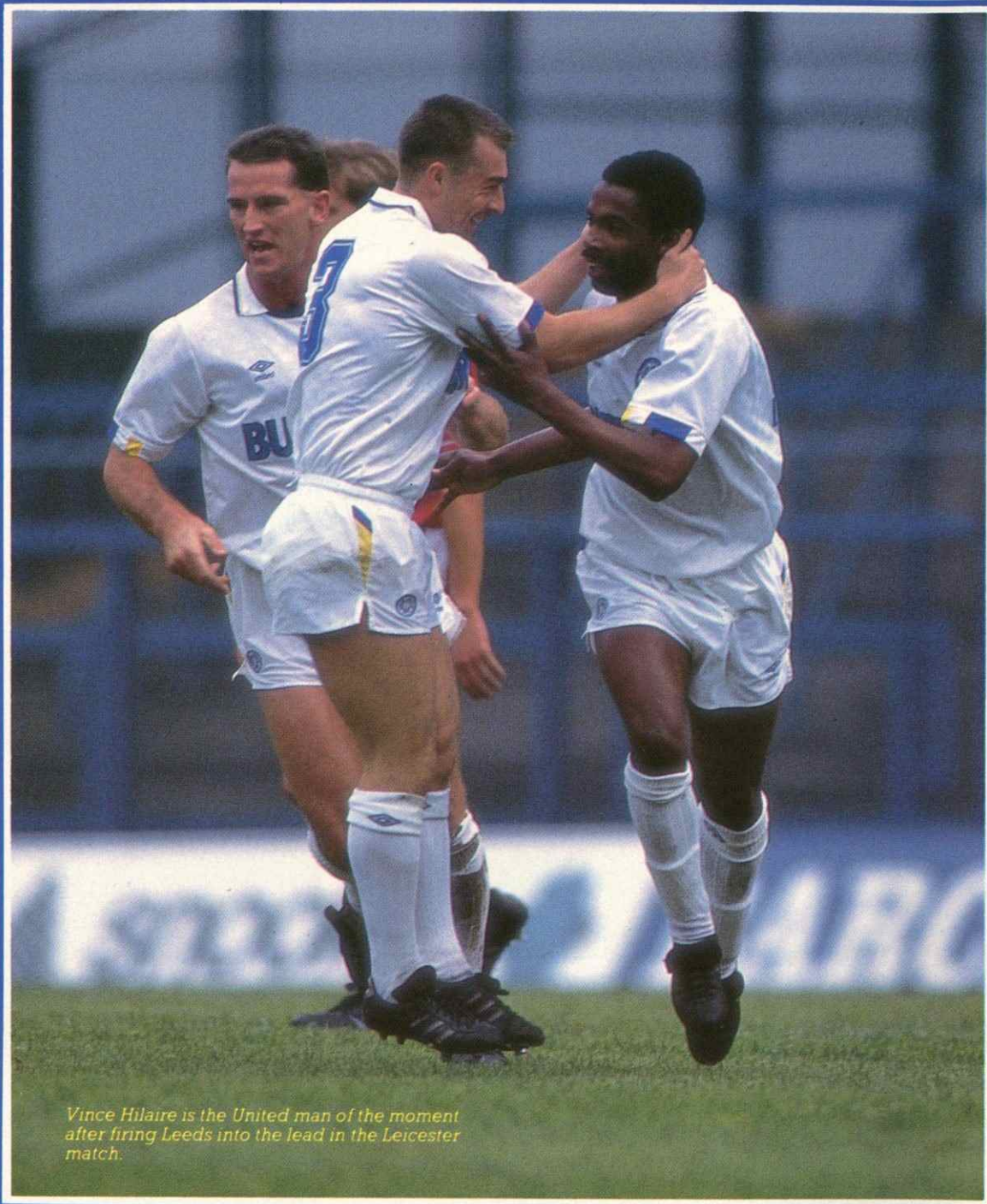

**5 1983**  
Our third round opponents in the Milk Cup (now the Littlewoods Cup) were Oxford who took a first-half lead at Elland Road through Mick Vinter. Though George McCluskie equalised to earn a replay, we went down 1-4 at The Manor.

Luton had been knocked out by Rotherham (3-4 on aggregate) in the previous round.

**10 1978**  
Goals from Tony Currie, Frank Gray and Eddie Gray (2) earned us a convincing 4-1 third round victory at Sheffield United.

Luton won 2-1 at home to Fourth Division Crewe, Ricky Hill and Bob Hatton scoring their goals.

**15 1973**  
Our League Cup interest was over. We had been beaten 0-2 at Ipswich in the second round.

Luton survived the shock of being held at home to a goalless draw by Fourth Division Bury to win the replay. 3-2 with goals from Peter Anderson, Don Shanks and Alan West.

**20 1968**  
Albert Johanneson and Mick Jones were on target as we ousted Bristol City by 2-1 at Elland Road.

Luton's run ended in a 1-5 defeat at Everton. Laurie Sheffield was their goalscorer.

**25 1963**  
Ian Lawson and Jim Storrie grabbed the goals in our 2-0 home third round victory over Swansea.

Luton had been beaten 3-4 by Coventry in the previous round.

# PROGRAMME FROM THE PAST



## LEEDS UNITED v LUTON TOWN Match Date: Wednesday 13th December, 1978

The clubs on duty tonight at Elland Road in the Littlewoods Cup third round met ten years ago at the fifth round stage of the League Cup, with United pushing for a place in Europe and Luton striving for promotion from the Second Division.

The programme for the game, featuring a coloured action photo on the front, was priced at 20p and on the first editorial page United manager Jimmy Adamson stressed the importance of the game.

"The League Cup is a prestigious competition and it has probably even more significance for us this season because of the ruling that will affect us when the third round of the F.A. Cup comes along in a month's time.

"We must play all our ties away from Elland Road and as we approach the half way stage of the League season we still have some ground to make up before we can consider getting into Europe next season through our League position. So tonight's game has additional importance for us at Elland Road."

Further on in the programme a story pointed out that the only previous time Leeds and Luton had met in the competition was in the 1967-68 season when United won 3-1 at Elland Road on their way to winning the League Cup that season.

Featured in the Luton team group

pictured in the programme was "Mark Aizlewood... who moved from Newport County in April and although mainly a defender can also operate in midfield."

The middle pages featured action photos from United's 2-0 win at QPR in the previous round and United captain Tony Currie gave his tips to win the four quarter final ties... Southampton v Manchester City, Stoke v Watford and Nottingham Forest v Brighton. He chose Manchester City, Stoke, Forest... and Leeds.

A feature called 'Turnstile Talk' said that attendances in the previous round of the competition had averaged just over 25,000 for each match... "reflecting the popularity of the competition". United's League average at Elland Road was 28,392 from nine games with a best gate of 36,845.

The programme ended with a feature on the next visitors to Elland Road - Middlesbrough two days before Christmas and supporter Julian Wilson from Sheffield wrote that United had played 23 successive home games in the League without a draw.

The tie with Luton attracted an attendance of 28,177 who saw First Division class win through with United claiming a semi-final place following a 4-1 win, goals from Cherry, Currie, Eddie Gray and a Frank Gray penalty. In the semi-finals United bowed out to Southampton who went on to lose to holders Nottingham Forest in the Wembley final.

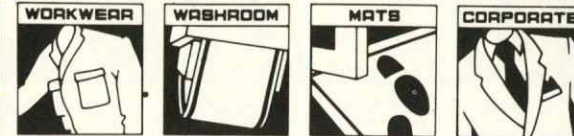

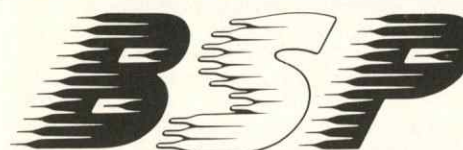

# DEBUT DAY

## Mark Aizlewood



Mark Aizlewood's debut was big news. He was just 16-years-old and still at school when picked by Newport County to face Darlington in a Fourth Division League match.

"I had to get permission off my headmaster to play on the Saturday" says Mark. "There was a lot of ballyhoo because I was still at school at the time. I was a star for a day at school, a schoolboy with my pictures in the national press. It was enjoyable while it lasted."

It wasn't all good news for Mark though, Newport lost 4-0 at Darlington, but Mark confesses "I can't remember much about the game. It passed very quickly, all I can remember about it was going up by train."

After 40 appearances for his native club, Mark joined Luton Town, but had to wait for a season before making his debut for the Hatters. It was worth waiting for though, as Luton came from behind to overwhelm Oldham Athletic 6-1. "Luton were a small club then, and they were struggling in the basement of the Second Division. That season wasn't a

good one, despite the win over Oldham. We had to win our last game to stay up, which thankfully we did. After that it gradually got better, culminating with us winning the championship. The disappointing thing for me was picking up an injury and missing the final run-in," reflects Mark.

Aizlewood was on the move again though in a couple of years, by which time he'd turned out over 100 times for the Hatters. Charlton Athletic signed the Welshman, and once again Mark tasted Second Division success. "Basically it ran along the same lines at Charlton as it had done with Luton. We struggled to stay up at first, but got it together, and ended up winning promotion." Ironically, Mark's debut for Charlton was against Leeds "I remember the debut for Charlton at Elland Road, it was a good win for us at the time, and little did I know I'd be playing for United myself in a few years."

One of Mark's teammates with the Valiants was John Pearson, and just a couple of weeks after Billy Bremner had signed Pearson for United, Mark was also on his way north to join John at Elland Road. "Once I knew that the move was about to come off, I phoned John up and had a chat with him about the place, but when you get the opportunity to join a club like Leeds you jump at it."

Mark's first game in a United shirt was a goalless draw at Bramall Lane against Sheffield United. "We should have won that game" says Mark, "I enjoyed it, we were the better team. Billy had signed about three or four players and the season really took off from there. We were unlucky in the play-offs and the F.A. Cup. To come up against Charlton in the play-offs was a bit sad, but they won and good luck to them. They played well and worked hard, and that's what we've got to do."

# QUESTION TIME

PETER HUTTON PUTS THE SPOTLIGHT ON VINCE HILAIRE

## VINCE HILARE

**Q. Vince, we're talking after Leeds' 2-1 win against Hull City, it must be a relief to get the first League win under Howard Wilkinson out of the way?**

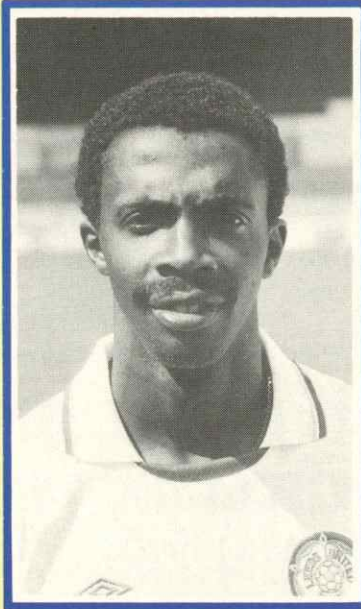
**A.** It was a bit close at the end of the game, but we got the three points, which is what we really wanted.

**Q. Lets talk about the Leeds goals in that game, both really fine efforts, first from John Sheridan then Ian Baird . . .**

**A.** John Sheridan's was a great effort from about 20 yards, then Ian Baird's goal was perhaps even better. He had a little run just before the shot and then struck it in from about 30 yards, it was just like Peter Lorimer in the old days here.

**Q. It was certainly a game to bring back memories with a really stirring end to the game, and credit to the defence for holding out.**

**A.** Like you say it was pretty desperate defending at the end, but you have to remember that when myself and Bobby Davison came off 10 minutes before the end John Sheridan also picked up a knock so we were virtually down to 10 men for the last part of



the game. So all credit to the way everyone played to hold out.

**Q. When you came off was it a tactical substitution or had you taken a knock yourself.**

**A.** I did have a slight hamstring strain but that wasn't the reason I came off. The manager's policy here is to play an all action style of football, which means you have to use all 13 players and a lot of hard

running and the use of the long ball game. It takes its toll after so much running, it's a lot of hard work.

**Q. You get through a fair amount of work in training as well at the moment.**

**A.** That's right, well our game now is geared to fitness, and you have to do the right preparation before that style of play. If you don't do the preparation you can't do it on the pitch. The manager is a hard taskmaster, but he's getting results.

**Q. At the moment are you happy with the way things are going at Elland Road.**

**A.** Yes I'm happy, we've got a good unbeaten run going. The next step is to get a good result against Luton, but the thing to say is that the players have come to Leeds used to playing one style of football, now we're getting used to another style of football, which proves quite a challenge.

**Q. What about your home life, have you managed to move up to the Leeds area yet.**

**A.** I'm still looking around the Leeds area at the moment. I'm living in a hotel, which is far from ideal, particularly given the hours spent training at the moment.

**Q. You say that with a smile on your face Vince, but I'm sure you'd like to be able to settle down, and you wouldn't refuse a free house if it was offered.**

**A.** I certainly wouldn't, and it would only get used 2 hours a day, the other 22 we're training.

**Luton, who came from behind to beat Arsenal so dramatically in last season's Littlewoods Cup final, have not found it easy to keep their fingers upon their treasured trophy. The Hatters had great difficulty in overcoming Fourth Division Burnley in the second round of this season's competition.**

Burnley drew the first-leg 1-1 at Luton and a Ricky Hill goal was all that separated Luton in the away game. And they know they face another tough tie at Elland Road this evening if they are to survive one more stage on the rocky road back to Wembley.

Luton were trailing 1-2 to Arsenal at Wembley when stand-in goalkeeper Andy Dibble saved a penalty. That proved the turning point in the

game as Danny Wilson and Brian Stein hit late goals to snatch a famous victory. It was the first major trophy achieved by Luton in more than 100 years.

Wembley's two-goal hero Stein has now moved on and **David Oldfield** is partnering **Mick Harford** in the Hatters' attack.

Oldfield is a former Luton apprentice who scored three times in only six full League appearances when introduced to the side last season.

Harford, who won his second full England cap in the friendly against Denmark in September, scored 21 times last season in spite of a long absence through injury. He began his career with Lincoln and commanded a then record £200,000 fee for a

Fourth Division player when he moved on to Newcastle in 1981. He was soon on the move again, to Bristol City, and he spent just over three years with Birmingham before signing for Luton in 1985.

**Ian Allinson**, another forward, is usually one of the substitutes. Ian spent a decade with Colchester and it was after he had twice led their scoring list that Arsenal signed him in 1983. He moved on to Stoke in 1987 and to Luton a few weeks later.

**Steve Williams**, **Danny Wilson**, **Ricky Hill** and **Kingsley Black** have been filling the midfield positions.

Williams was a member of the Arsenal side which won the League Cup two seasons ago though he did not appear in last season's final. Luton



## IT'S A FACT

• Tonight's is the third meeting between the two clubs in the competition. Both the previous ties were also at Elland Road and United progressed both times.

The first occasion was on 13th September 1967. A hat-trick, including one penalty, from Peter Lorimer saw United through by a 3-1 margin, with Luton's reply coming from Whitaker (penalty).

United went on to win the trophy that season and this victory over Luton was the first of nine successive wins that United recorded in the competition, which equalled the record set by QPR (66-7 and 67-8). That record stood until earlier this year. Arsenal, the 1986-87 winners, won their last three games of that season's competition and their first seven last season. Indeed, they were less than ten minutes from making it 11 on the trot, but then another chapter in Wembley history unfolded. Andy Dibble produced a fine save from Winterburn's penalty to prevent Luton going 3-1 down. Danny Wilson equalised and Brian Stein, who had earlier given Luton the lead, scored a last minute winner.

• It was also on the 13th of a month, this time December 1978, when the clubs contested a quarter final tie which United won 4-1. Trevor Cherry, Tony Currie, Eddie Gray and Frank Gray were on target for Leeds in a match which for a long time was not as one sided as the scoreline suggests. Brian Stein was Luton's scorer.

• In the only F.A. Cup meeting between the clubs it was Luton who came out on top with a 5-1 victory at Kenilworth Road in a third round tie in 1959.

Luton went on to reach Wembley, where they lost to Nottingham Forest. A major influence for the Hatters was Syd Owen, who won the Footballer of the Year award that season and was later to become an important member of United's backroom staff under Don Revie.

• The last League meetings were in 1974-75. At Elland Road it ended in a 1-1 draw (Allan Clarke and Barry Butlin) and was United's last League match with Brian Clough as manager.

Luton won the return 2-1 on 22nd March, thus inflicting the first defeat on United since before Christmas.

signed him for £300,000 this summer. Steve spent nine successful years as a Southampton first-teamer, winning the first of his six England caps as a Saints player. He was transferred to Arsenal in 1985.

Wilson, who won his 11th N. Ireland cap in the recent World Cup clash with Hungary, was signed from Brighton during the 1987 close-season. He played his early football with Bury and Chesterfield, joining Nottingham Forest in 1983. But he played only a handful of games for Forest before moving to Brighton in 1983.

Hill is a one-club man who first played in Luton's senior team in 1976. He now looks back on more than 400 games and he has played for England on three occasions. Ricky scored the winning goal in the last round at Burnley.

Black burst onto the scene last season when he was one of the stars of the Wembley final. He also played twice for N. Ireland.

**Ashley Grimes**, **David Preece** and **Roy Wegerle** are also in contention for midfield places.

Grimes made his name with Manchester United after joining them from Bohemians. He won 13 caps for the Republic of Ireland. He was transferred to Coventry in 1983 and joined Luton a year later. He has played for the Hatters both in midfield and at full-back.

Preece developed with Walsall and moved on to Luton in 1984. Wegerle played a couple of dozen times for Chelsea over the past two seasons,

signing for Luton this summer.

Last week's transfer of centre-back Mal Donaghy to Manchester United is going to leave a big gap in the Hatters' defence. Luton's most-capped player - he won 58 N. Ireland caps - Donaghy had formed a formidable partnership with **Steve Foster** in the middle of the back four.

Foster, capped three times by England, joined Luton from Aston Villa in 1984. He started as a striker with Portsmouth but switched to defence before joining Brighton in 1979. He played for the Seagulls in the 1983 F.A. Cup final replay and joined Villa almost a year later.

**Rob Johnson** and **John Dreyer** have been filling the full-back positions.

Johnson is a Luton discovery, first introduced to their League eleven during 1983/84 when he also played on loan with Lincoln.

Dreyer learned his game with Oxford but played League soccer with both Torquay and Fulham, whilst on loan, before winning a place in the Oxford side in 1986. He was transferred to Luton this summer.

**Tim Breacker**, another full-back, could be one of the substitutes today. He broke into the Luton side in 1984 and held a regular place until the end of last season.

Goalkeeper **Les Sealey** had the misfortune to miss last season's Littlewoods Cup final through injury. He spent many years as a Coventry first-teamer before signing for Luton in 1983. He later spent a short spell on loan to Plymouth.

LITTLEWOODS CUP SCENE BY TONY PULLEIN

## FINALISTS HAVE TOUGH TASK

As Luton continue the defence of the Littlewoods Cup, which they won at Wembley last season, with a tough trip to Elland Road this evening, runners-up Arsenal faced an even more difficult prospect as they were drawn away to League Champions Liverpool.

Liverpool have a double reason for wanting to win this one. For one thing, manager Kenny Dalglish sees the Littlewoods Cup as a winnable trophy – and a good substitute for the League Championship, if they fail to win that again. For another, Liverpool are anxious to gain revenge over Arsenal for beating them in the Wembley final two seasons ago.

The Gunners had a fairly easy time in the last round against Second Division Hull City. Former Hull player Brian Marwood set up their victory with a goal in their 2-1 first-leg victory at Boothferry Park. Arsenal then won their home leg by 3-0.

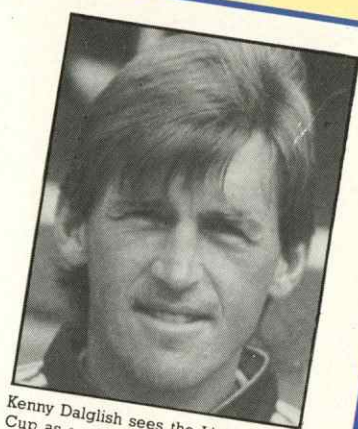
Manchester United are more than a little embarrassed to be one of the major clubs who have never won this competition. They disposed of Fourth Division Rotherham by 6-0 on aggregate in the last round – Brian McClair scoring a hat-trick at Old Trafford – but the Reds had to travel to F.A. Cup holders Wimbledon in round three. Plough Lane is no easy place for even the most illustrious of visiting teams these days.

Everton are not treating their home tie with Oldham lightly. They remember the Latics' visit to Goodison Park in the fourth round last season. Dennis Irwin, the former Leeds' player, gave Oldham the lead in the 14th minute and they held on until Dave Watson equalised early in the second-half. It was only five minutes from the end when Everton got their winner.

One of the most romantic ties of the round takes place at Seamer Road where Scarborough take on First Division Southampton. Scarborough, who were promoted to the Football League only last season, are in the third round for the first time but manager Neil Warnock believes they can pull off a surprise result.

"We have had Southampton watched and we shall certainly treat them with respect," he said. "But we certainly don't fear them."

Southampton, who disposed of Lincoln City 4-2 on aggregate in the last round, are expected to win at the first attempt and they quietly fancy their chances of making the final this season.

Fourth Division Scunthorpe United pulled one of the most amazing feats in the last round when they beat Chelsea 4-1 in the first-leg and then drew 2-2 at Stamford Bridge. Andy Flounders scored in the second game to take his tally in the Littlewoods Cup to four goals.

He is now joint-top scorer, together with Tommy Gaynor (Nottingham Forest) and Sean McCarthy (Plymouth).

Flounders will be hoping to add to his tally but Scunthorpe have a difficult away tie at Second Division Bradford City.

Gaynor scored a hat-trick for Forest in the second-leg at Chester as they completed a 10-0 aggregate victory but he will not find Coventry City's defence quite as accommodating in round three. The Sky Blues are being backed to win the Littlewoods Cup and, though they must travel to Forest, Coventry are expected to win – possibly after a replay.

In the last round they hammered Bournemouth 4-0 at Dean Court and 3-1 at Highfield Road.

At least one Third or Fourth Division club will appear in round four as Tranmere Rovers entertain Blackpool at Prenton Park. There will be plenty of Littlewoods Cup activity on

Merseyside – which should please the Liverpool-based sponsors.

Tranmere, Everton and Liverpool all had home ties.

Tranmere held their own superbly over two legs against First Division Middlesbrough in the last round. After drawing 0-0 at Ayresome Park, they won at Prenton Park with a goal from Mark Hughes.

But Blackpool also claimed a First Division scalp, ousting Sheffield Wednesday on away goals after drawing 3-3 on aggregate. Former Wednesday player Tony Cunningham scored one of the goals as Blackpool won their home leg 2-0.

Leyton Orient, another Fourth Division survivor, recovered from a 1-2 first-leg home defeat by Stoke City to win the tie on penalties. They now have another stiff task away to Second Division Ipswich Town.

Third Division Sheffield United ousted First Division Newcastle by 3-2 on aggregate and now face an away tie at Manchester City.

# FACT FILE

## TERRY COOPER

Born in Brotherton, near Castleford, in July, 1944, Terry Cooper was playing for Ferrybridge Amateurs when spotted by a Leeds United scout. An offer of a trial in May, 1961, led to him signing professional forms in July, 1962.

An outside left, Cooper made his debut at Swansea in the promotion-winning 1963-64 season, but remained understudy to popular South African Albert Johanneson throughout the ensuing two seasons. Just 34 appearances in two seasons led to a transfer request which was reluctantly granted by Don Revie. But a transition to the left-back role, in 1967, changed the course of his career.

Two years after remaining, unwanted, on the transfer list, he was winning the first of 20 full England caps. In 1970 he emerged as one of the finest full-backs in the world during the Mexico World Cup, when he faced Rumania, Czechoslovakia, Brazil and West Germany.

In 249 League appearances for Leeds, Terry scored just 7 goals – but made countless others – yet his thunderous volley in the 1968 League Cup Final gave United their 1-0 success over Arsenal. It was the club's first major knockout trophy after a succession of 'near-misses'.

A broken leg, sustained on the eve of another Wembley victory against the men from Highbury (in the 1972 F.A. Cup Final) robbed Cooper of almost three years of his career and virtually ended his top-flight career. The country's finest overlapping left-back made his departure from Elland Road, after almost fourteen years, in March, 1975, rejoining former Leeds and England colleague Jack Charlton at Middlesbrough.

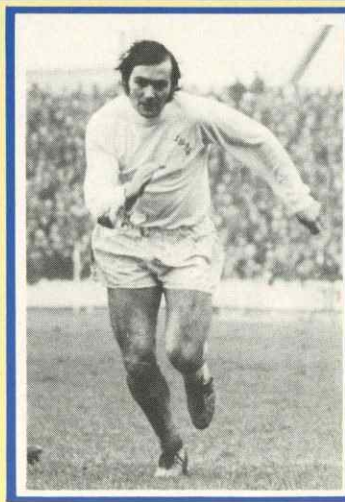
At Ayresome Park Terry made 105 League appearances, and courageously reclaimed his England place for a final time, against Portugal, before moving South to join Bristol City in the summer of 1978. He had spells with both Bristol clubs, returned to Yorkshire to play for Doncaster and managed at both Eastville and Ashton Gate.

Managing Bristol City to promotion and success at Wembley in consecutive Freight Rover Trophy Finals meant as much to affable Terry as his spectacular triumphs with Leeds and England. But when he felt that the Ashton Gate club did not share his ambitions for them he took the opportunity to move further South, to Devon, as manager of Exeter City.

Football-mad, Cooper, at 44, still regularly, and enthusiastically, turns out for Exeter's reserve team in a midfield capacity, and is motivated by the challenge of taking his club back into the Third Division.

# WHERE ARE THEY NOW

Ian Proctor looks back with a former United favourite



As Leeds United bid to eliminate League Cup holders Luton Town at Elland Road this evening, the man who gave the club their only success in the tournament, twenty years ago, reflects on his rare goal which won the 1968 decider against Arsenal.

Swashbuckling full-back Terry Cooper was a renowned attacking full-back who created countless goals with mazy runs and pin-point crosses, yet his goal ratio was, as he admits, modest.

His winner at Wembley was extra special for the player and significant for the club, in that it broke the ice for Don Revie's thoroughbred side. As Cooper recalls: "We'd been there or thereabouts in all the major competitions following promotion in 1964, but the fates had always seemed against us. At Wembley my goal was one of those hit-and-hope volleys that either fly into the crowd or into the back of the net. When it went into the roof of the net we all knew that, at last, we were going to win a major trophy."

"It meant so much to everyone at the club because after all those near-misses there was a danger of us becoming too conscious of narrow failure. It was a significant result in Leeds United history, alright."

Cooper, like Leeds, went from strength to strength after that 1-0 defeat of Arsenal. The following year he won the first of 20 England caps and became established as the finest attacking full-back in the country, a perfect successor to Ray Wilson, in Sir Alf Ramsey's 1970 World Cup party in Mexico. Leeds lifted the Championship for the first time in 1969 and contested the 1970 F.A. Cup Final.

In 1971 there was a place in the Final of the UEFA Cup, against Juventus, when the Italian players gave Cooper the accolade of 'best full-back in the world'. Said the Juventus coach of the time, Cestmir Vycpalek: "My players can't believe how much skill he has, how good he is. Cooper is without doubt the best full-back in the world."

Cooper played his football in the cavalier fashion which he has taken into football management. At Bristol City, and, currently, Exeter, Terry has ensured that his players enjoy the game. Their lead comes from the man at the helm, still going strong in the club's reserve team.

"I still love playing", says Terry, "and I'm in a midfield role these days. It's particularly rewarding being alongside the club's youngsters and passing on my experience."

"Devon is a lovely part of the world, and while the Exeter fans are slightly less passionate about the game than fans in the North, it doesn't put as much pressure on the manager. That comes from the media!"

"Jack Charlton always said to me that the best place in the country to manage would be Plymouth, Torquay or Exeter, because Devon is such a nice place to live, and the pressure is less intense."

Clearly, Terry does not miss West Yorkshire, although he maintains regular contact with the United players who were his colleagues for more than a decade.

"I've lived in the Bristol area for ten years now", he says, "so I'm used to the slower pace of life down here. When I was player-manager at Bristol City it was one of the most satisfying spells of my career. Taking them to Wembley, even if it was a 'smaller' competition (in the Freight Rover competition) was very gratifying – 30,000 fans went with us on each occasion."

Wembley Finals and internationals appearances there, were, of course, an integral part of Cooper's career in the 70's, but he still winces at the recollection of the broken leg sustained against Stoke City, in April, 1972. At 27, he was at the peak of his career, and it effectively curtailed his Leeds United career.

"It was a devastating injury", reflects Terry, "coming in the last five minutes of a game we were winning 3-0 and the week before our semi-final with Birmingham. I took virtually three years to overcome it."

"I'd lost the best part of my career. Instead of retiring with 70 or 80 England caps I had to be content with just 20, and when I did finally return to action I'd lost that edge, and a yard of pace."

"I teamed up with big Jack at Ayresome Park and it was only then that I realised just how good the Leeds team had been. It was a different world after Elland Road, where we had a once-in-a-lifetime team."

"The fact that seven or eight of us had come through together from the juniors made it a special unit, and Don Revie fostered a marvellous family atmosphere that ran right through the club. I was fortunate, as a player, to play under three great managers in Don Revie, Sir Alf Ramsey and Jack Charlton."

"Naturally I've attempted to take their good methods into management with me. At Bristol City I felt we were on the verge of great things but the men in charge did not seem to want the club to fulfill its potential as a big city club. Now, at Exeter we've made a good start and are looking for a good season in the Fourth Division. It doesn't matter what level in the game you are at – it's enjoying the involvement that matters. Happily, I've never lost that."

minor incident apart, was played in a keen and spirited manner. The one incident was when a Huddersfield player fouled Kevin Noteman to concede a free kick on the United right.
