Millwall went ahead after 24 minutes. Cascarino and Sheringham began the move and Carter took Sheringham's pass to rifle home a great drive past Les Sealey.

With Millwall cruising through a hesitant Luton defence the second goal—after 30 minutes—came as no surprise. Cascarino cashed in on a Luton defence that waited in vain for an offside decision and his cross was met sweetly by Carter who drove it home.

Luton's best effort in the first half was a snap drive by Tarford in the 18th minute that flashed over the bar.

They came alive in the second half following the boost of a 53rd-minute penalty. Terry Hurlock held back David Preece and Danny Wilson blasted the kick past goalkeeper Brian Horne.

## Pressure
