THE WORLD OF FOOTBALL MOURNS HILLSBOROUGH

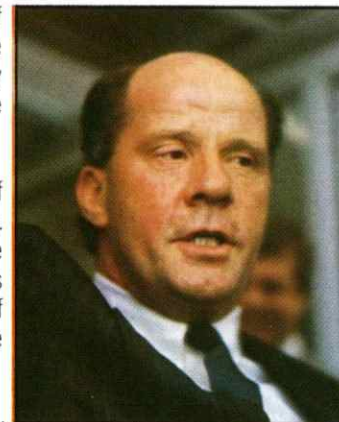
The horrendous enormity of what happened in my native city of Sheffield last Saturday afternoon has touched the hearts of the entire nation.

Once again the game of football is in mourning. Everyone connected with the game is heartbroken and it is impossible to find the words of sympathy we all feel for those who have lost loved ones.

The shock as the tragedy unfolded a week ago was numbing. I listened to the mounting list of dead and injured in disbelief.

Hillsborough was the ground on which I stood so many times as a kid. Sheffield Wednesday was the club I supported - and now a great and glamorous sporting event had turned into the worst disaster British sport has ever known.

I was sick with disappointment at losing to Arsenal last Saturday. But that result - and any other result - meant



nothing when we heard of the horrors of Hillsborough.

We were feeling sorry for ourselves because we had lost a football match when we heard that so many had lost their lives.

All our problems immediately paled into insignificance. The words and pictures we have all read and seen go some way to telling us what happened.

But words and pictures cannot adequately express the terrible grief and sadness that has affected the lives of so many in Liverpool.

It has affected us all and I can tell you that it has not been easy preparing for this afternoon's game against Luton. Ray Harford and his players will understand what I mean.

But the players have to be ready to give their all. We have only five games left, three of them at St. James's Park, and we certainly have not given up hope that we will be playing First Division football next season.

We have lost four games on the trot, our last two here against Aston Villa and Sheffield Wednesday, both clubs in real danger of going down at the time. Both should now stay up.

Luton are only two points better off than us in third bottom place. They must be beaten this afternoon and if Charlton lose to Manchester United our belief that we can beat the dreaded drop will be enormously strengthened.

But even as I write these words the horror of Hillsborough remains in the mind. It will never go away.

LUTON TOWN

HAVING enjoyed a spot of Wembley glory a fortnight ago, Luton must now get down to the battle of avoiding relegation. If they can consistently find their Wembley form, they will have a fighting chance of avoiding the drop. Though they were beaten 3-1 by Nottingham Forest in the Littlewoods Cup Final, Luton produced one of their best performances of the season.

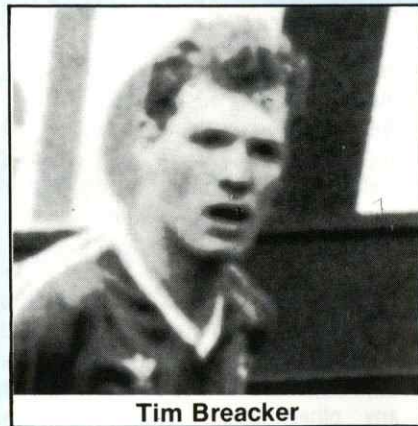
It's not certain if a place will be found for winger **Richard Cooke**, a £140,000 pre-deadline signing from Bournemouth. Richard won England youth and under-21 caps in his Tottenham days before joining Bournemouth in 1986.

Danny Wilson and **Kingsley Black** have been playing on the flanks. Wilson, a Northern Ireland international, picked up his 12th cap against Spain, in February. Once with Bury and Chesterfield, he joined Nottingham Forest for £100,000 in 1983. His stay at the City Ground was not too successful so, after a loan spell at Scunthorpe, he joined Brighton in 1984. Wilson was transferred to Luton for £150,000 in 1987. Black entered the Luton side towards the end of last season and started in their Littlewoods Cup victory. He quickly won a place in the Irish side and now has six caps.

David Preece and **Ricky Hill** have been filling the other midfield places. Preece got his League chance with Walsall in 1981 and Luton paid £150,000 to sign him in 1984. He was a member of their winning side at

Wembley last season. Hill is Luton's longest-serving player and he should chalk up his 500th senior game for the club before the end of the season. He has developed an uncanny art of scoring vital goals this season. During more than a decade as a first-teamer, Hill won three England caps.

Mick Harford and **Ray Wegerle** have established themselves in the attacking positions, but **Raphael Meade** and **John Dowie** are now in contention here. Harford, who won his second England cap against Denmark in September, has been more of a provider, than a scorer, this season. He scored his ninth goal at Wembley against Forest, while last season his tally of 21 included six goals on their run to Wembley in the Littlewoods Cup. Mick first became top scorer with Lincoln and commanded a

record fee (£200,000) for a Fourth Division player when he moved here in 1981. But it wasn't long before he was on his way to Bristol City, then Birmingham signed him in 1982. It was after his transfer to Luton two years later that he hit his best form and in 1985/86 he was top scorer with 25 goals.

Wegerle was playing in the U.S.A. for Tampa Bay Rowdies when he was recommended by their manager Rodney Marsh to Chelsea. At Stamford Bridge, he made only 20 outings in their League side but he has now come into his own at Luton following his £75,000 summer transfer.

Luton signed Dowie from Hendon in 1988 after he had scored 20 goals in two-and-a-half seasons for the non-League club. He previously played for St. Albans, Hertford and Cheshunt. Meade played three dozen First Division games for Arsenal before signing for Sporting Lisbon. He joined Dundee United at the start of this season and moved on to Luton for £250,000 last month.

Dave Beaumont has settled in alongside Steve Foster in the middle of the defence. Luton signed him from Dundee United for £150,000 and he made an impressive debut in their Littlewoods Cup semi-final over West Ham. He joined Dundee United from school, made his League debut in 1983/84 and became a Scotland under-21 international the following season.

Tim Breacker and **Ashley Grimes** will probably be the full backs. Breacker is a former Luton apprentice, he got his chance in their League side in 1984 and was for four years a regular member of the side, winning two England under-21 caps. Grimes is a player of vast experience who has been capped by the Republic of Ireland on 14 occasions. In his Manchester United days he played both in midfield and defence. He moved to Coventry in 1983 and to Luton a year later.

Darron McDonough can play in several positions. He enjoyed four years as a regular member of Oldham's Second Division side before moving on to Luton two seasons ago. **John Dreyer** is pressing for a place in defence. He started with Oxford but played on loan for Torquay and Fulham before getting his chance in the Oxford side. Luton signed him last summer.

Goalkeeper **Les Sealey**, a regular for most of the time since his £120,000 transfer from Coventry in 1983, had the misfortune to miss last season's Littlewoods Cup final because of injury, but played at Wembley this year.

STEVE FOSTER

STEVE Foster had the distinction of skipping Luton in a Littlewoods Cup final at Wembley for the second season in succession a fortnight ago. Last year he came off with the Cup, but this time he collected a runners-up trophy.

So he has now compensated for the bitter disappointment of missing the 1983 F.A. Cup Final because of suspension. He was a Brighton player at the time, but he did get a second chance as they earned a replay against Manchester United.

Foster was then free to play — but Brighton crashed 4-0. There was more Wembley agony for him last March when Luton reached the Simod Cup final and were well beaten by Second Division strugglers Reading.

Steve is now one of the most accomplished central defenders in the business, yet he started his professional career hopeful of becoming a successful striker. He developed in the junior teams at Portsmouth, but the club was in decline as he earned a place in the senior team.

He dropped with them from the Second Division to the Fourth Division, by which time he had switched to a defensive role. Brighton paid £130,000 to sign him in 1979.

Brighton were then enjoying life in the First Division and when he made his debut for them he created an off-beat record by having played in all four divisions of the Football League within the space of three years and five months.

Playing against First Division opposition lifted his game and, after winning under-21 honours, Foster made his debut in the full England team against Northern Ireland in February 1982. He went on to win three caps.

Brighton's relegation shortly after their Wembley final of 1983 started a break-up of the team and, the following season he was transferred to Aston Villa for £200,000.

But he remained at Villa Park for less than a year before he moved on to Luton, where many feel he is playing better now than at any time in his career.

Help fight the identity card scheme

THE Government plans to introduce a compulsory ID card scheme for football supporters in England and Wales.

You, the fans, will have to buy an ID card if you wish to attend football matches.

You will have to fill in an application form and provide a photograph before you can be issued with a card.

Your personal details will be stored on a computer and monitored.

Football supporters will be the only people in the country who are made to have ID cards.

On match days you will have to join a queue of people waiting to have their ID cards checked before you enter the ground.

If the computer breaks down there will be chaos.

Even if the computers are working normally there is a good chance that somebody in the queue in front of you will have a card that will cause you delay.

If you are opposed to this scheme, please write to your local MP at:

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS, LONDON SW1 0AA and ask him or her to oppose the Government's proposals.

- The ID card will not stop hooliganism (away from grounds).
- The scheme could cause serious delays at turnstiles.
- The bureaucracy and cost of the scheme will deter thousands from going to matches and could ruin some smaller clubs.
- Millions of law-abiding citizens including pensioners and season ticket holders are going to be inconvenienced by a scheme which will **not** benefit them, just to deal with a tiny minority of hooligans.

Three minutes before the interval, a bottle was thrown towards the opposing side's goalkeeper. The incident was captured by the CCTV system and 57 seconds later police had arrested the offender. BJORN KRISTENSEN

ANSWERS

10 QUESTIONS

DANISH international Bjorn Kristensen will be playing with determination today — to keep United in the First Division next season. He is our star for today's Spotlight.

1 What's your background?

I played for a small club in Denmark called Beder-Malling just outside Aarhus before moving to Aarhus in the Danish first division when I was 18. I was there for seven years before moving to Newcastle this year. I always wanted to be a footballer. I have been playing since I was five years old. I have 17 full caps for Denmark plus 14 appearances for the Under 21s and nine caps for the Under 18 side.

2 How did you get the chance to come to Newcastle?

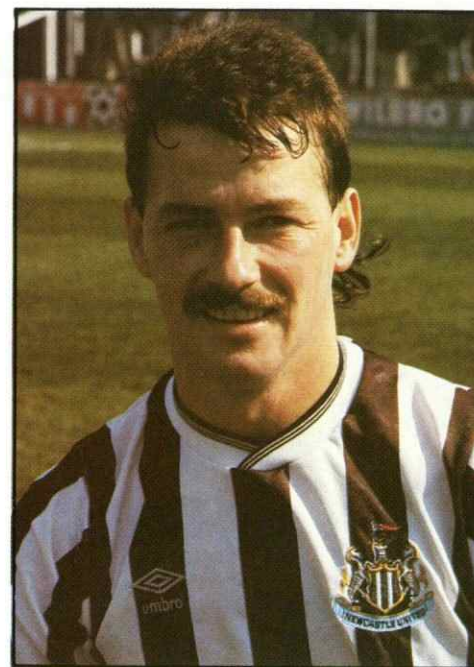
I was contacted by an English agent who said that Jim Smith was keen on signing both me and Frank Pingel. I was very interested straight away. Mr. Smith was boss of QPR when they played Aarhus in a pre-season friendly and we both did well in that game. That match obviously stayed in his mind and he saw us again on television when we played Cardiff in the Cup winners cup this season. I got a couple of goals in the match.

3 Tell us something about your international experiences.

I made my debut against Sweden in 1987 but the biggest game I played in was for Denmark against Italy in the European championships in Germany last year. There were 60,000 in the crowd and it was a terrific match. We lost 2-0 but we played well because we only had a young side and Italy were one of the favourites.

4 What do you think of English football?

I always liked English football because of the size of the crowds and the passion in the game. We used to see a lot of first division matches on television in Denmark. You must always do your best every game in England because if you have a bad game you are out of the side — there are so many other players to choose from. It is tougher than the Danish league and faster. It is not always very beautiful it can be very exciting.

5 What is your best moment in soccer so far?

Probably winning the league title with Aarhus two seasons ago. But I will always remember playing in an Olympic international side against Rumania in 1987. We played some brilliant stuff, won 8-0, and I managed to score a goal. But I hope I will have many more happy memories from my time at Newcastle as well.

6 How did you enjoy your debut against Aston Villa?

I was ready to play because I had already been at the club for three weeks and I could hardly wait for my chance. But I was very disappointed at the result and not altogether happy with my own form. I have had a few problems but I am not making any excuses. I will get better when I am more used to the players.

7

7 Where do you prefer to play?

I have played in a lot of positions, especially in the middle of defence and as a sweeper. But I have also played in the sort of midfield role that David McCreery has at the club. I think I will be best for Newcastle as a centre-back but I must admit I like midfield because I can move forward and get more involved in the game.

8

8 You know Frank Pingel well. Do you back him to get goals for Newcastle?

I'm sure he will once he really settles in the side. He is not 100 percent confident at the moment — like me he is still finding out about the game in this country. But I have seen him score some great goals for Aarhus. He says he is no defender and he is best in the box. In this country strikers have to cover back more than in Denmark.

9 What are your ambitions?

Firstly to help Newcastle stay in the first division. Everybody has been so nice to me since I came to the club and I want to pay back the fans for their goodwill. It means a lot to players to play at top level and I desperately want to be going to places like Arsenal and Manchester United next season.

10 What about the problem of three foreign players?

That has been a worry. It has been difficult because Mira, Frank and I know that one of us is going to be disappointed every week. It's extra pressure but it's good as well because we are all very competitive, even in training. I thought the rules allowed two of us to play and the third to go on the substitute's bench. But we have just got to make the best of it and knuckle down.

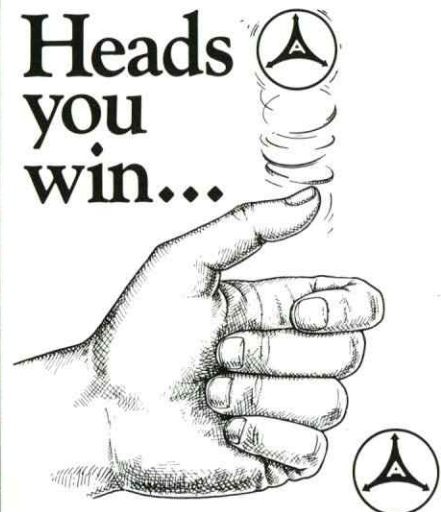

5 YEARS AGO

WE gained another invaluable point as we tried to clinch promotion from the Second Division. After going behind at Blackburn to a Derek Fazackerly penalty during the opening moments of the second half, John Trewick's equaliser 15 minutes from time earned us the point which kept us four points clear of fourth-placed Manchester City.

Three goals in the opening halfhour enabled Liverpool to defeat W.B.A. 3-0 at Anfield. Ken McNaught started the rot for Albion by conceding an own-goal after 20 minutes and Graeme Souness and Kenny Dalglish quickly added to the Reds' tally.

Manchester United remained two points behind Liverpool in second place with a 4-1 home win over Coventry.

10 YEARS AGO

OUR Second Division game against Fulham at St. James's Park ended goalless. Luton were held to 1-1 at home by Brighton in the same division. Their goal was given to them by Brighton defender Gary Williams who put the ball into his own net.

Kenny Dalglish scored after only five minutes against Bristol City at Anfield, but Liverpool could not add to their tally. Their 1-0 win kept them six points clear of Nottingham Forest at the top of the First Division.

Goals from Garry Birtles and John Robertson gave Forest a 2-0 success at Birmingham. Ian Wallace contributed a hat-trick to Coventry's 4-0 victory over Southampton.

Tony Currie was the goalscorer in Leeds' 1-0 home win over Everton.

15 YEARS AGO

Keith Robson edged us in front in the 27th minute against Birmingham at St. James's Park. Trevor Francis equalised before the interval and the score remained 1-1.

Luton's Second Division promotion challenge kept in full swing as they defeated Millwall 3-0 at Kenilworth Road. John Faulkner, Peter Anderson and Gordon Hindson scored their goals. They then needed one point from two games to guarantee promotion.

Leeds gained a point on Liverpool, stretching their lead to five points after defeating Ipswich 3-2 at Elland Road. Peter Lorimer, Billy Bremner and Allan Clarke got their goals.

In the Second Division, Middlesbrough ran up an 8-0 win over Sheffield Wednesday. Graeme Souness scored a hat-trick with Alan Foggon netting twice. John Hickton, Bobby Murdoch and David Mills also scored.

"When are you going to feature the cup-tie at West Brom in the Memory Match series?" is the question posed by countless Newcastle supporters this season **writes John Wardle.**

The obvious answer was when a player selected the game which has special place in the hearts of so many United fans who were at The Hawthorns more than 15 years ago.

Finally, today, it's the choice of Pat Howard, the underrated defender whose steadiness and reliability alongside Bob Moncur was such an important part of the team of the early 1970's

Pat recalls how United totally dominated Albion in a team show of stunning quality — a performance matched by supporters who were at their most passionate and vocal.

The blond defender says: "It was like a game at St. James's. Thousands of fans made the trip and I remember wondering what happened to the Albion supporters."

It wasn't long before he must have been wondering what also happened to the Albion players. They were never in the game as United produced one of those devastating performances which they were always capable of.

Albion were overwhelmed and the United followers responded by keeping up a non-stop chant which is still talked about by the players and supporters who were there on that February day.

Pat said: "We ran the tie from start to finish, with Jimmy Smith in one of those moods when he was

simply unstoppable. He was marvellous, the goals were marvellous and I remember that I was proud to have been part of it at the end.

"We had struggled against Hendon and Scunthorpe in earlier rounds, so that was the game which started us thinking we could get to Wembley.

Jimmy Smith, a 19th minute substitute for Terry Hibbitt, ran the show and created the first goal for Malcolm Macdonald on the half-hour.

Stuart Barrowclough added the second when the ball reached him after John Tudor narrowly failed to turn in Supermac's cross.

Tudor's stunning header from Barrowclough's cross ended the scoring, but Albion knew they couldn't have complained if United had doubled their total. It was that sort of game.

Manager Joe Harvey summed it up. "They were magnificent". We have never played better and the fans were just tremendous." Howard, a £23,000 bargain from Barnsley, played for more than 200 games for Newcastle before moving to Arsenal, Birmingham, Portland Timbers and Bury.

He now works for Salford recreation department as their football administrator, handling the coaching and training of children of all ages.

He says: "I've applied for a few jobs with league clubs and maybe I will get an interview one day, but in the meantime I'm getting a lot of satisfaction from working with the youngsters.

Watch for details of a summer coaching course which is now being arranged by the club.

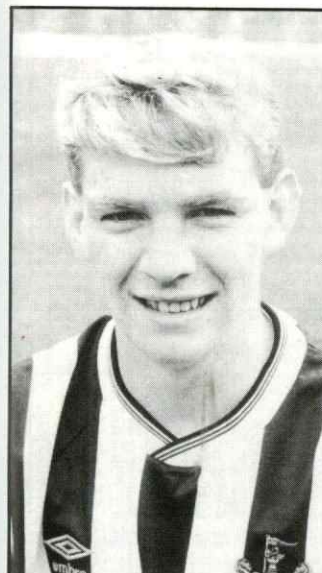
The reserves were back in action on Wednesday night when they lost 2-1 at Barnsley.
