

Littlewoods Cup 3rd Round ◆ EVERTON v LUTON TOWN ◆ Tuesday 24th October 1989



You couldn't ask for much more than two trips to Wembley and only one defeat in 19 games under the Littlewoods sponsorship.

This sort of thing happens from time to time in cup football. A team gets a run going and begins to believe they will end up at Wembley. A lucky break in a particular match or a home draw at an important stage can have a snowballing effect on confidence.

It was that way with us when we went to the FA Cup Final for three years in a row. We seemed to roll along without a thought of losing-and that's half the battle in this game of ours.

It's probably true that people look for omens or have their little superstitions when it comes to cup football, but all the luck in the world won't change the fact that you also need to be a good team to get to Wembley.

Luton got into that position in the years when David Pleat was building the club up. On reaching the First Division, he followed a well-tested formula by buying a goalkeeper, a centre half and a centre forward.

Les Sealey has given the club good service over a number of years and you would go a long way to find better value than Luton received for the £400,000 paid for Steve Foster and Mick Harford.

Successive managers, John Moore and Ray Harford, carried on the good work with a more-than-useful First Division side. Ray deserves every credit for the way he bought and sold in two of the best seasons in the history of a club which has done so well on attendances of only 10.000.

With fees for the top players here now going above £2m, clubs are looking more and more towards the Continent. While we bought Stefan Rehn and Raymond Atteveld, Luton signed the Danish striker, Lars Elstrup.

There is a certain risk for clubs and players because of the adjustment to a different country and a different style of football.

Some will settle quicker than others. Glenn Hysen, at Liverpool, is one who seems to have adapted pretty well, but he has had more experience than most. He left home to play in Holland and Italy before coming here as an established international at the age of 29.

Our two lads came from comparitively small clubs and are not used to full-time training, but they both speak English well and the opportunity is there for them to take. In saying it will be up to them, we should remember that British signings are not always instant successes. Quite often, it will take a player 12 months to produce his best.

Even within our own League, there are differnces in style of play, but at least our players are familiar with the pace of the game. That is the big difference with the way they

play in Europe.

It was there for everyone to see when the Italy-Brazil game was shown on TV the other week. There were some marvellously-talented players on view, but people have said to me that they wouldn't like to watch such slow build-ups every Saturday.


It all comes down to what you have been brought up with. Personally, I enjoy watching all styles and can only admire the technique of the Italians and Brazilians. They look so comfortable with the ball and can control it however it comes to them.

Their change of pace is another factor. They play in spurts and when they do move, they


seem to have tremendous acceleration. But I'm not entirely sure that they are so much quicker than our players. It's certainly not so obvious when they are pressurised, particularly away from home, by British teams.

Still, that's all a matter of conjecture. The certainty is that if you really love football, you will enjoy being a spectator, whether it's in the local park or Real Madrid.

Sky Television has given me a new insight into foreign football. They show a lot of Spanish matches and I can safely say their top teams are really outstanding. It was quite something to see Barcelona v Real Madrid "live" in front of 120,000 people recently.

WE MEET AGAIN

HE gateway to Wembley ... that's how you might label recent cup clashes between Everton and Luton. The clubs met three times in four seasons and the winners went to the final each time.

◆ In April 1985, Everton faced an FA Cup semi-final only two days after getting back from a European mission in Munich.

It seemed that tiredness had caught up with the treble-chasing squad when Luton confidently took the lead, but Everton came back to capture the Wembley spot after extra time.

♦ In March 1986, The Hatters again seemed to be in control with a 2-0 lead in an FA Cup quarter-final at Kenilworth Road. But substitute Adrian Heath inspired an Everton recovery and the tie moved to a replay which was settled by arguably the most spectacular of the 40 goals scored by Gary Lineker in his one season with the club.

In February 1988, it was a low-key occasion at Goodison Park when only 5,204 spectators gathered for a third-round Simod Cup-tie. Both clubs fielded

weakened teams and the honours went to Luton with two goals from Australian teenager David Oldfield.

THE LUTON CONNECTION

◆ Mike Newell had been a Luton player for only nine weeks when David Pleat brought The Hatters to Goodison for the Cup replay in 1986.

More than 44,000 fans turned out at Goodison ... but Mike (pictured right) was 700 miles away, waiting for news of the result after winning his first England Under-21 cap.

"I was cup-tied at the time and Luton released me to play for the Under-21s," he explains. "We played against Denmark in Copenhagen and it was the next day before I saw the Cup highlights on TV."

Mike was at Kenilworth Road for just over 18 months, but surprisingly, he did not make a single appearance in the League Cup competition.

"In my first full season," he says, "Luton were banned because they



wouldn't admit away supporters. Then I was sold to Leicester before the cup started in the following year."

The only cup football he played in for the club was in the FA Cup in 1987, and that did leave a special memory when he scored in a 3-0 win against Liverpool in a tie which stretched to three matches.

Mike stepped up from the Third Division when he joined Luton from

Wigan Athletic and the man who made the transition easier for him was England centre forward Mick Harford.

"He's the ideal striker to play alongside," says Mike. "He takes the weight up front and because he's so respected by defenders, he diverts attention away from his partner.

"Apart from being a good player, he's a nice lad as well, one of the best you could meet. People who don't know him may think the opposite because he is so aggressive on the field."

Harford may not be involved tonight because it was only last Friday that he made a comeback with the Reserves following an ankle operation.

The Luton side has changed quite a bit since Mike left Kenilworth Road two years ago, but he expects a hard game from a passing team noted for the quality of their football.

"We're lucky to have home advantage and it's up to us to make the most of that," he says. "I suppose most teams are happy to get Luton at home rather on their plastic pitch.

"I didn't particularly enjoy playing on it and I'm sure it is an advantage to Luton, but there again, you could say that they have to adjust from plastic to grass every other week.

"When I was there, the training was mixed up, with some days at Kenilworth Road and others on grass at Vauxhalls. You have to pass to feet on the plastic; if the ball goes a yard or two on either side, you won't get it.

"Obviously, I'd heard a lot about the pitch before I went there, but it didn't worry me, probably because I was more concerned about taking the chance to play in the First Division.

"I certainly enjoyed my time there. It's a good club and they deserve credit for what they have achieved in recent years on relatively small gates.

"If you look at the way they operate, they tend to sell at least one player a season, but I've no idea whether I went because I was one they could get decent money for. Ray Harford was just starting as manager and he may have wanted to try another partnership up front."



THE SURVIVORS

♦ It's doubtful if tonight's game will involve more than four or five survivors of the FA Cup meetings of the mid-1980s.

David Preece is the only member of Luton's 1986 side playing regularly this season, but goalkeeper Les Sealey and the injury-hit Mick Harford remain with the club.

On the Everton front, we still have Neville Southall, Neil Pointon, Graeme Sharp and Kevin Sheedy.

The game that "Sheeds" remembers

best is the semi-final at Villa Park in 1985 - the year The Blues won the League and European Cup-winners' Cup but lost a treble to a goal by a certain Norman Whiteside at Wembley!

"I didn't have a particularly good game against Luton," says Kevin. "The whole side struggled in the first half, but I was fortunate enough to get the equaliser and then Derek Mountfield headed the winner from my free kick.

"We've done pretty well against Luton in cup-ties and let's hope it continues that way tonight."

COMMENT

HE Second Division table last Saturday morning had a whiff of nostalgia. It could have been a tear-outfrom a newspaper of another era...

First: Sheffield United. Second: Newcastle United. Third: Leeds United. Fifth: West Ham United. Eighth: Sunderland. Ninth: Blackburn Rovers.

In fact, you would have to go back as far as 1966 - the year of Alf Ramsey and England's World Cup - to find the last season in which these clubs were together in the First Division.

Any football supporter with a feeling for tradition will applaud the revivalist spirit spreading through Division Two and especially the forward move by clubs in the old strongholds of Lancashire, Yorkshire and the North East.

There have been mutterings that some of the football is basic rather than brilliant, but the cash customers registering the only vote that counts. Second Division attendances were up by nearly 23 per cent in the first eight weeks of the season.

The growth was evident on the weekend before last when the Division Two aggregate (albeit with two extra fixtures) was within 35,000 of a First Division figure boosted by 40,000-plus gates at Old Trafford and Highbury.

The third highest attendance of 27,815 was at Elland Road for a top-three meeting between Leeds and Sunderland. West Brom and Sheffield United also pulled in 20,000 or more and Newcastle's turn-out of nearly 19,000 was greater than six First Division gates on the day.

The divisional average up to October 7th was 12,083 compared with 9,848 over the corresponding period last year. This can be partly attributed to the way promotion and relegation worked out.

The Second Division lost Manchester City and Chelsea but took in three well-supported clubs, Newcastle, West Ham and Middlesbrough, from the First. At the other end of the scale, Sheffield United and Wolves were among the replacements for three clubs averaging 6,000 or less.

Although more than half of the clubs

have fewer than 9,000 regular fans, the others generate income on their travels.

Last week, for example, Barnsley pulled in twice their average for a visit from Sheffield United. Another interesting figure was a crowd of 27,302 last month for the first Potteries derby match in 32 years.

All these developments have combined to make the Second Division good for business. The volatile nature of the promotion race, especially with playoff places for clubs finishing from third to sixth, can only add to the success story as the season unfolds.

Regular observers reckon that as many as 15 clubs will retain promotion ambitions well into the New Year. That can only be good for the Box Office. Indeed, it may well increase the division's representation in the Top 20 in the gate league.



NEV PULLED UP

◆ Everton goalkeeper Neville Southall was told to pull his socks up while playing for Wales in their World Cup match against Holland at Wrexham.

But it had nothing to do with his performance which was again immaculate despite his side's 2-1 setback.


Southall (pictured below) had his socks draped around his ankles in his accustomed style when he was told to pull them up ten minutes into the second half by Austrian referee H. Kohl.

"It's not a rule is it? I thought it only applied as regards wearing shinpads," said Southall, who had also received the same request from a referee during Everton's pre-season tour of Kualalumpur.

Southall captained his country for the first time against the Dutch in place of injured Goodison colleague Kevin Ratcliffe and admitted: "I really enjoyed it and would love to do it again if asked."

Meanwhile Southall is celebrating being chosen as the Liverpool Echo's Everton Player of the Year. And ex Goodison player John King was rewarded with the Dixie Dean Memorial Award for his achievements with Third Division Tranmere in recent seasons.

For the record the Echo's Liverpool Player of the Year Award was captured by Peter Beardsley.



RAY'S ITALIAN HOPE

♦ The Holland match had particular interest to Everton midfielder Raymond Atteveld (pictured right) who is still looking to make the breakthrough into the first team on Merseyside after his £250,000 summer move from Haarlem.

Atteveld, who has already won Holland Under-21 and 'B' caps, saw his country take a large step towards reaching Italy next summer.

"We played very well and although people in England would be well acquainted with the star names in the team there are several other fine players they would know little about who will make an impact in the future," he said.

"We have a good chance next summer although I don't think the side is playing as well as in the European Championships in 1988 but having sad that we had a few players out through injury.

"We are a bit like Denmark in having players who play all over Europe and it can present a problem getting everyone together."

Atteveld linked up with Everton in the belief that such a move would enhance his chance of full international recognition and he has no regrets despite being unable to force his way into the side.

"I have taken time to come to terms with the pace and having little time to dwell on the ball but I feel I am adapting and it is just a question of waiting for the opportunity," he said.

GOODISON DEBUT

♦ Martin Keown experienced playing 90 minutes at Goodison Park for the first time when he made his full Everton debut against Millwall.

Keown had always missed out on playing a full game at Goodison during his time with Arsenal and then Aston Villa.

"When Arsenal played there I had gone to Brighton on loan and at Villa I was substitute the first time and came on for 20 minutes and the second season I was suspended."



Keown, who had been hampered previously by a back injury, was reasonably happy with his first appearance." I had not many games behind me and felt the pace a bit and could have done better in the first half.

"But I got to grips with things in the second half more and it was important to get the first game out of the way although I was not especially nervous beforehand."

Keown admits that he had a rude awakening when he first came to Goodison after his £750,000 move from Villa in the summer.

"I have been used to first team football since I was 18 and have not played much in the reserves. It is not easy and can be hard to motivate yourself with hardly anyone watching. But you have to get something out of it and be in some sort of shape in case the call comes."

Keown is happier with the way he is being asked to play by manager Colin Harvey than at Arsenal or Villa. "At those two clubs it was man to man marking at the back where here we tend to mark areas and you get more chance to do things on the ball."

Now Keown, who has eight England Under-21 caps under his belt, is looking forward to his return to Villa Park on Sunday, November 5 for what is a televised game.

UNLUCKY EAMONN

◆ Friday the 13th certainly proved unlucky for former Goodison striker

Eamonn O'Keefe earlier this month.

O'Keefe celebrated his 36th birthday on that date by playing for Chester City, where he is commercial manager, against Cardiff City because of a player shortage.

But the move back-fired and O'Keefe dropped into Everton to see old friends recently carrying the legacy of a broken bone in his foot from that match.

FAMILY MIS-FORTUNES

◆ The Snodin family could be forgiven for thinking that fate is conspiring against them when it comes to football.

lan of course is laid low by a third hamstring injury this year but brother Glynn is also in the wars at Leeds United and has been out of action all season with glandular fever.

LEADING BY EXAMPLE

Everton coach Paul Power believes he can best help the starlets in the Goodison ranks by doing what he still loves most-playing the game.

Power, forced to retire in the summer of 1988 because of knee problems, now passes on his vast experience while turning out for the reserves.



Power (pictured below) said: "You can sometimes seem more from the side-lines but by being in contact with the lads on the pitch can actually benefit them more.

"You can lead by example, whether at full-back in making sure they are not playing too deep or in midfield in showing them things like how to close people down.

"The lads are not in awe of me and see me as just another player but I think my experience helps out, particularly in the mini-derbies with Liverpool when there were quite a lot of experienced players on show."

Power added: "There is no substitute for playing in the first team and when I had to quit it was a real blow. But this is the next best thing and, although I might not get as excited about the prospect of playing, once the whistle has gone I am as keen as ever.

CHAMBERLAIN TRIBUTE

◆ Reserve goalkeeper Mike Stowell today paid tribute to the man he got the nod over in the race to be Neville Southall's understudy at Everton and who will be between the posts for Luton tonight.

Alec Chamberlain (pictured right) was released by Everton at the end of the 1987-88 campaign but is now first choice at Luton and that is no surprise to Stowell.

"He is a very good goalkeeper and I remember him always impressing in training and then doing very well on loan to Tranmere and I am very pleased for him.

"When I was chosen as Neville's deputy I was obviously very pleased but I felt sorry for him although you can't keep too many good goalkeepers at one club.

"But he showed the sort of fellow he is when he came and watched me twice while I was on loan to Port Vale last season, and since he was thrown in at the deep end at Luton he has done brilliantly. We have kept in touch and I shall look forward to seeing him tonight."

Stowell has experienced a frustrating time so far himself this season and has been handicapped by a hip injury. "Last



season I felt I was making good progress but this season I have not had a lot of games and have got a lot to catch up regarding fitness. A loan period might do me good or a consistent run of games in the reserves."

Stowell admitted that it can be frustrating at times being number two to the seemingly unmovable Southall but said: "At least I have the consolation of trying to beat the best in the world.

"First team football is what it's about but you have to keep going, don't let your head drop, grit your teeth and hope to persuade the manager you are worth a go."

NEW SIGNINGS

◆ Teenager Bill Kenny has followed in the footsteps of his father and signed on the dotted line for Everton.

Sixteen-year-old Bill junior has signed schoolboy forms and the Campion High School pupil played for Merseyside and Liverpool Schools and reached the final trials for a place in the England Under-15 side.

Bill, who was also interesting Liverpool and Manchester United, still lives with Bill senior in the Anfield area of the city.

But whereas dad was a striker during his time at Goodison from 1969-1975, Bill junior is a midfield player.

Central defender Paul Brown, 15, from St Edwards College and striker Colin Ashton, 14, from Mossley Schoolboys, have also signed schoolboy forms for Everton.

LUTON TOWN

Formcheck...

◆ Luton Town suffered all the anguish that goes with defeat at Wembley when Nottingham Forest paraded the Littlewoods Cup last April.


Manager Ray Harford felt the disappointment as much as anyone, but his priorities were elsewhere as The Hatters approached the Final on a run of seven defeats in eight games in the League.

When the slump began after their semi-final win at West Ham, Mr Harford stressed: "I must regard First Division survival as the only aspect of the season that really matters."

His warning took on greater significance as Luton managed only one point from a possible 24 in the next five weeks and got tangled up with the most hectic relegation battle of recent years.

With up to ten clubs in danger early in April, Luton were third from the bottom, three points below the safety mark, when they drove out of Wembley with only six games in which to retain their First Division status.

The gap widened to four points with draws against Coventry and Newcastle, but after ten matches without a victory, they found their form with three home wins in succession. The final act in the cliffhanger was a penalty by Danny



Wilson against Norwich City - just 28 minutes from the end of the season.


The 1989-90 campaign opened with a narrow defeat at Tottenham, but Luton then had four unbeaten games without conceding a goal, a spell which included a 0-0 draw with Liverpool at Kenilworth Road.

Wilson was on target in wins against Sheffield Wednesday and Charlton, only to spoil his record with a penalty miss in a 1-0 defeat at Coventry.

A 1-1 draw at home to Wimbledon proved to be costly. Centre back Darron McDonough dislocated a shoulder and midfielder Mick Kennedy was sent off.

Luton were already without striker Mick Harford, who had two ankle operations in the summer, and former England midfield man Steve Williams, who was sidelined for a brief period after cartilage surgery.

The Hatters then went down 3-1 at Manchester City and lost their unbeaten home record when Aston Villa registered their first-ever win at Kenilworth Road.



 Ray Harford (pictured above) took Luton to Wembley four times in two seasons on succeeding John Moore as manager.

The former Fulham boss was involved in two Littlewoods Cup Finals, the Simod Cup and the Centenary Festival.

He is Luton's third manager in an unbroken run of eight seasons in the First Division. David Pleat won promotion in 1982, John Moore led them to a best-ever seventh place in 1987, and Mr Harford won the Littlewoods Cup in his first year.

His assistant this season is Terry

Mancini, the former Watford, Orient, QPR and Arsenal defender who joined the club on a part-time basis in April.

Mr Mancini, a publican during two years out of the game, became a full-time member of the backroom staff during the summer.

There were also changes at top level. David Evans, chairman for four years, handed over to Brian Cole, and John Smith departed after ten year as chief executive and managing director.

The squad...

◆ Northern Ireland midfielder Danny Wilson was appointed captain following the departure of Steve Foster to Oxford in the summer.

Ricky Hill and Ashley Grimes moved on to foreign clubs and full back Rob Johnson joined Leicester in part-exchange for £300,000-rated midfield man Mick Kennedy.

Another newcomer is Graham Rodger, an FA Cup Finalist with Coventry City in 1987. The England Under-21 international's transfer went to a Tribunal, who ruled that Luton should pay £150,000 plus £100,000 after 60 games.

The season was less than a week old when Danish international Lars Elstrup arrived from Odense for a fee in the region of £600,000. The 26-year-old striker scored five goals, including a hat-trick in the second leg, as Luton beat Mansfield 11-5 in the second round of the Littlewoods Cup.

Rodger made his debut in the first game against the Third Division club and then played his first League game for the club against Villa.

Dave Beaumont, signed last season as a replacement for Mal Donaghy, has been a regular at centre back and the two full backs are Tim Breacker and John Dreyer.


In midfield, Wilson, Williams, Kennedy and 21-year-old Kingsley Black have all won full international honours, and David Preece was on the England 'B' tour at the end of last season.

Roy Wegerle, a £75,000 signing from Chelsea, is already on course to beat last season's total of 12 league and cup goals after notching six in 11 outings this term.



"We called him 'Bunny' although I am not going to tell you why and he was a very important cog in that side . If he had a weakness it was in the air and he was not the greatest when it came to dealing with crosses at the far post but then nobody's perfect."

Regarding Stevens, Wright said: "He is very much a product of the modern era. In the early days in particular he was good at going forward but had to rely on his pace more than anything to get him out of situations where he was caught out of position which has never been his greatest asset.

"He has great attacking qualities with a good eye for goal and played more as a right winger. But gradually he changed and I think he was told to restrict himself by the coaches.

"He adjusted and stopped belting

helter skelter down the wing and realised he was meant to be a defender and that was when his skills in that department improved.

"I think Trevor Steven helped him a lot and they worked well together and complimented each other perfectly. Gary had a bad spell and was overtaken for a time by Mel Sterland in the race for the England spot.

"But full credit to him for getting over that and making the England shirt his own. I think there are a lot of similar players to Gary around such as Sterland but possession of the shirt is nine tenths of the law."

These days Wright, whose career was cut short because of a knee injury, works as a supervisor with Associated British Ports in Liverpool but he still follows Everton's fortunes fervently. "I never miss a home game and see Colin Harvey every week. The club still means a lot to me."

HARD ON HOOLIGANS

◆ A schoolmaster who is about to visit his 100th League ground is well worth a voice on the problem which has afflicted football for two decades.

When he can also tap in to the views of 17 soccer-mad 'A' Level students, his conclusions should cover a wide cross-section of opinion.

Mr L.M.Smith, Master-in-Charge of Football at the City of London School, indicates that his pupils believe in a hard-line response to hooliganism.

Reporting on their work in General Studies Course on Association Football, he says: "They were all disgusted and ashamed by the recent events in Sweden and feel that the root cause of much of the problem is excessive alcohol.

"As most of the problems seem to occur outside our football stadiums, they feel that it is more of a social problem that the Government should be dealing with.

"It is quite clear that 'small fines' are not the way to deter these mindless louts. They need to be taught a severe lesson, which we believe could come from either a period in jail or by enjoying the disciplined life and training in our Armed Services. With positive action, we believe that this problem could be minimised very quickly."

Perhaps the merit of this view is that it comes not only from contemporaries of the hooligans but from teenagers who care enough about football to devote a year's studies to the game.

One of the most popular projects is their annual survey of club programmes. For last season, they nominated QPR as the Division One winners, with Everton and Liverpool sharing second place.

Incidentally, Mr Smith is set to visit



JOHN EBBRELL

OHN EBBRELL was pleased to be selected against Millwall for only his second full appearance in the First Division and delighted when he was given his favourite central midfield role.

"That'as exactly what I've been aiming for," said the Wirral-based player who has been used on the left and right wings and as a striker in the Reserves this season.

"I think everyone here would agree that the centre is my best position, but the competition there has been terrific ever since I came to the club.

"Until the day of the match with Millwall, I only knew that Stuart McCall was doubtful and when I was named in the 14, all I was thinking about was that I might be one of the substitutes.

"It was quarter-to-two when I was told I would be in the team and, best of all, that I would be deputising for Stuart in the middle."

But the real surprise was to come when lan Snodin went off with a hamstring injury after only 26 minutes. In the subsequent re-shuffle, it was John who switched to right back - a position a he had rarely played in at any time in his career.

"The same sort of thing happened once in the Reserves and I did have one game there in pre-season in Switzerland last year," he explained.

"It's totally different to what I'm used to. If you are beaten in midfield, there's still the back four to protect you, but if they go past you at full back, they're in the danger area, and that's a frightening prospect.

"It was a strange game to play in. Millwall hit the bar three times in the first half and I hardly got a kick, but we were well on top in the second half and I quite enjoyed myself."

♦ John has every reason to be pleased with his progress this year. Last season finished with his full League debut, a trip to Wembley with the FA Cup Final squad, and three England Under-21 caps. Now, this season is shaping up well for a player who left his teens only three weeks ago.

After going on the pre-season tour to Japan, Thailand and Malaysia, he came back home to reserve football but travelled with the first team to virtually every game.

"At the start of the season, I could only hope that I would get in the first team as often as possible," he says. "Now I feel I am edging my way towards my target."

But he admits that he had his doubts when Colin Harvey bought three midfield players during the summer. "I was on a high when I came back from the Under-21 trip and it knocked me back a bit when I heard of the signings. My first reaction was, 'Oh, no!', but it was no use worrying.

"All I could do was work hard in training and do the same things that had got me this far. I had guessed the Boss was going to buy and, in any case, things have since balanced out a bit with Paul Bracewell leaving."

Apart from a stomach muscle problem which seriously interrupted him in the 1987-88 season, John has stayed on a



course that was mapped out when he enrolled with the first intake at the FA's National School in 1984.

In his first year at Lilleshall, he captained England Schools; in the second, he played in the international team who won an under-16 tournament in Monaco.

On joining Everton in 1986, he went into the England Under- 17 team, became a Central League regular when he was 16 and made his senior debut at 17 as a substitute in a Full Members' Cup-tie against Charlton.

Even though he missed half of his second season through injury, he was selected as the youngest player in an England Under-20 tour to Brazil. This was particularly significant because all his team-mates were appearing regularly in First and Second Division football.

It was much the same this year when Dave Sexton, one of his coaches at Lilleshall, invited him to join the Under-21s in France even though he had made only four League appearances, three as substitute.

His room-mate on that trip was Allan Miller, the Arsenal reserve goalkeeper who also came through from the National School. The only other player from the class of 1984-86 playing in League football is Brighton defender lan Chapman.

"You can't pick the best players at 14 and expect 100 per cent success," says John. "There are going to be failures, but it's worthwhile if only three or four make it"

◆ At club level, we all want to see local lads in the first team and there's no doubt that the fans here and at other major First Division clubs respond to home-grown talent.

"When I used to watch Everton and Liverpool, I preferred players who were local," says John. "The fans find it easier to identify themselves with players who might have gone to the local school. At the same time, it's everyone's dream to play for the team they supported"



IN RESERVE


