His whipped-in cross was powerfully headed home by the unmarked Dane, Lars Elstrup. It was the former Odense player's first League goal and it sent his team into the dressing room with huge smiles on their faces.

Dowie began the second half in the same vein and his strong and aggressive running was disturbing the Lions' defence and, at the same time, visibly lifting the spirit and morale of his own side.

One of his typical forceful runs got him to the ball before Steve Wood and the supporting Kingsley Black should have tucked away his intelligent squared pass. Fortunately for Millwall his shot hit the post and they survived the resulting goalmouth scramble.

It was only in the last ten minutes that the Lions awoke from their second-half slumber and they got at the reshuffled Luton back four. This was due to centre-half Darren McDonough dislocating his left shoulder in the 76th minute.

Gary Waddock hit the bar when his attempted cross was caught on the wind and looped over the stranded Luton 'keeper.

Tony Cascarino should have buried a header from six yards after great work by Teddy Sheringham had opened up the target for him.

The Hatters twice kicked the ball out of the ground in an attempt to quell this late flurry. The tactic worked and a defeat was averted.

Although Millwall failed to win they were more composed at the back, with fit-again Alan McLeary settling things down nicely
