ROCKET man Iain Dowie launched a missile past England keeper Peter Shilton to open his First Division scoring account.

The new darling of the Kenilworth Road faithful - who quit his job at British Aerospace's missile development centre to join Hatters — gave Shilton no chance with a 48th minute header.

Dowie, who came to Hatters for just £25,000, grubbed his first league goal while on loan to Fuban last month — but there was no hiding his delight after this cracker.

The striker — who revealed in last week's Heald & Post how he needed a run in the team to prove his worth — said: "I was desperate to score against Derby to stop the pressure building up.
"It was the sort of
